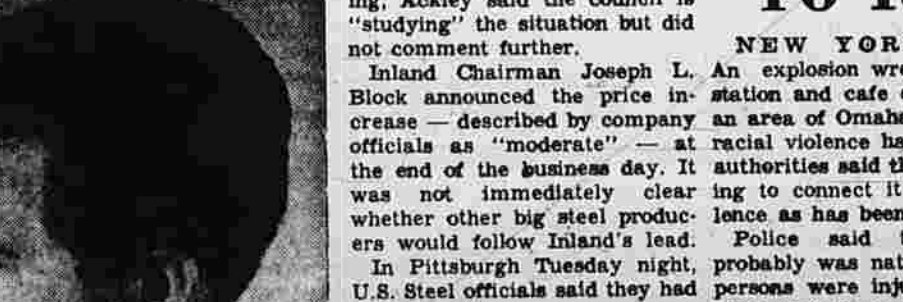

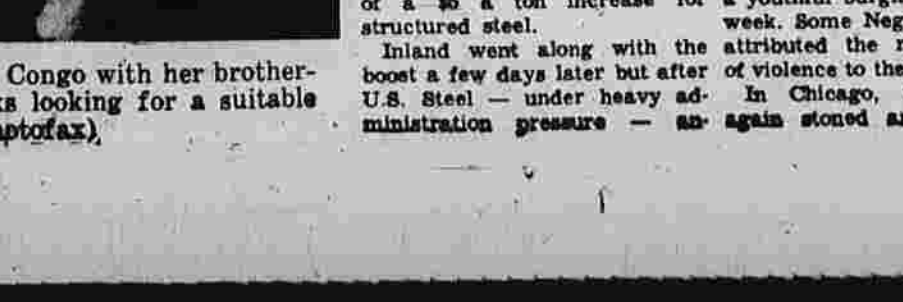
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Federal Prisoners Produce Key Items for Viet Fight

WASHINGTON (AP) — A growing supply line of carefully produced goods is finding its way into the Viet Nam war effort from behind the walls of more than a dozen U.S. prisons. From tarpaulin to toothbrush, from mattresses to back-bank bread, thousands of society's outcasts are turning out scores of items essential to the increasing number of U.S. forces in Southeast Asia.

The federal prisoners are supplementing the output of private industry — and, in several instances, producing goods generally unavailable from the Defense Department's usual list of supplies.

Dog tags and iron bed frames come from the prison at El Reno, Okla. Towels, washcloths and the special lightweight blankets needed in tropical South Viet Nam are turned out at Terre Haute, Ind. Duffel bags come from Tallahassee, Fla. While GI jackets, trousers and shoes are produced at Leavenworth, Kan.

Some of the best tire rebuilding in the country, federal officials say, is done at the Federal Reformatory for Men at Petersburg, Va. Truck treads and wheels are rebuilt there and at Texasboro, Tex.

El Reno makes gun bore brushes, Atlanta stuffs mattresses, Tallahassee and Terre Haute turn out canvas bottoms for the berms on ships, and ship look-

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP) — President Joaquin Balagar has charged that about \$3 million in public funds had been misappropriated over the past three years and vowed "without any quarter" to recover the money.

Balagar said Tuesday the missing money had been paid out to "criminal employees" and that records of their names had disappeared from ministry files.

He added that more than \$4,000 pedigreed cattle worth an estimated \$10 million had disappeared from state farms.

BONAIRES, Aruba (AP) — An American professor who reported he was beaten and humiliated by police during a battle at Buenos Aires University last Friday went to the university building, a presidential commissioner said Tuesday.

The commissioner said Prof. Warren Ambrose of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology "deliberately intervened in an episode which he was forbidden to do."

The woman claimed she was permanently scarred by burns suffered when a waitress spilled coffee on her four years ago.

The waitress, however, said the coffee spilled only on Mrs. Krattenstein's coat, and that the customer said she was not hurt.

Sheinwold on Bridge

KEVIN DUMPHY IN LEAD BY COUNTING POINTS

By ALFRED SHEINWOLD

Always count the points in dummy before you begin to play the hand. When you fail to make the contract you can complain if your partner didn't have enough points for his bids. This will keep your partner's eyes in line.

Opening lead — Queen of diamonds.

Declarer took the first trick with dummy's king of diamonds and tried the trump finesse, losing to the king. Back came a diamond, and declarer won in dummy with the ace, discarding a heart from his hand.

South drew trumps, ending in dummy and led the jack of clubs for a finesse. This lost to the queen and South was down one.

"You had only 16 points for your opening notrump," South complained. "It's hard to make the claim if you had the queen, holding clubs instead of the jack."

It was true, but North's opening bid was perfectly sound. South should make the slam despite the bad breaks in the black suits.

Buff Diamond

The first two tricks were correct, but South should not win the second diamond in dummy. Instead he should play low from dummy and ruff in his hand.

South drew trumps and cashed the ace and king of hearts if he had a heart in position to discard a heart on the jack of diamonds and then lead the jack of clubs for a finesse. It would have cost nothing to try the hearts five.

Actually, the queen of hearts would drop. Now South gets to lead his hand with the king of clubs to lead his third heart. A finesse gives him two tricks with dummy's jack and the queen. South discards one club on the extra heart and the other low.

Newest School Teacher Is a \$3 Million Computer

EAST PALO ALTO, Calif. (AP) — The reading and arithmetic teacher that 120 Brentwood School first-grade pupils will meet in September is a computer system developed at a cost of \$3 million in talent, time and hardware.

The East Palo Alto kids will be pioneers—learning all or most of their reading and arithmetic under computer control for a full school year.

The Stanford-developed project will be the first study of its scope in computerized instruction. Many short-term experiments have been made.

But none has yet been attempted over a full school term with all of an elementary school's first-year pupils relying system can keep going as long as the computer is on.

It is expected to invite these lessons to learn how to use words and numbers.

"This is instruction in a very rich form," said Prof. Richard C. Atkinson, psychologist at the Stanford Institute for Mathematical Studies in the Social Sciences.

It is geared completely to the individual student," he said. "We feel we will come closer to the ideal learning situation with the best learning for each child."

With a million-dollar supporting grant from the U.S. Office of Education, a new building will house a specially designed IBM computer and classroom with 20 learning stations.

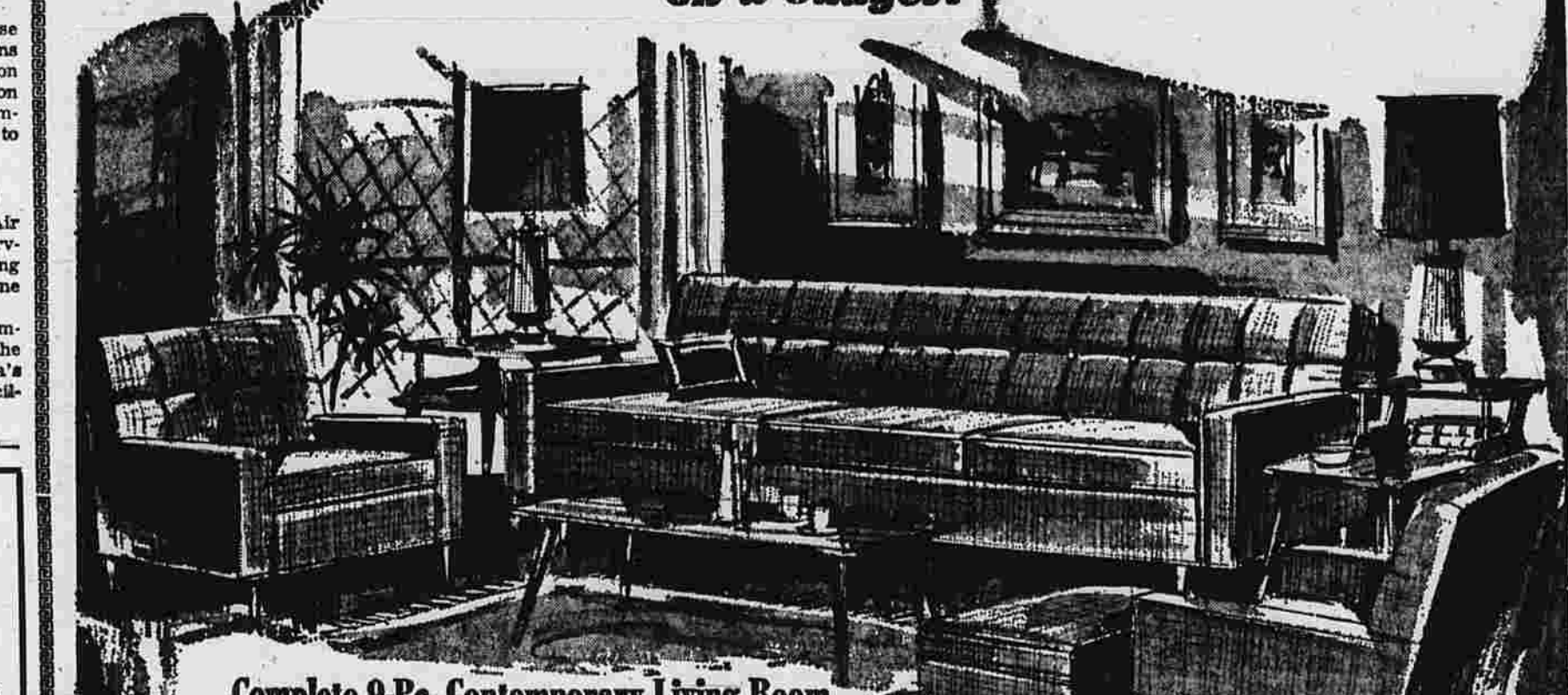

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Vernon School Principal Resigns; Second One in Eight Days

William West, principal of the Maple Street Elementary School, has resigned his post. The resignation came on the heels of a resignation by Gary Cairns, principal of the new Vernon Center Junior High School.

West announced he will assume a position in the Sudbury, Mass., school system. Cairns quit July 28 to become assistant principal of the South Windham, Maine, school system.

The resignations, coming a month before school opens, are believed to be related to the rejection earlier this year of a \$400 pay hike for principals with master's degrees.

Andrew Maneggia, presently principal of Building B on School St. and principal of the Vernon Center Kindergarten, was named Monday night to replace West. Allen Dresser, assistant for ROTC Distinguished Military Graduates, is currently named to temporarily head the junior high school.

The school board is seeking applications for both Maneggia's former position and for principal of the new junior high school. Applications will be accepted until Aug. 15. Information is available from the superintendent of school office.

West served in Vernon for three years. Last year he was co-supervisor of a federally sponsored program for disadvantaged children conducted at the Vernon Grange.

Maneggia began his career in Vernon as a teacher. He has been principal at Building B for two years, serving first as teaching principal until the school board eliminated the position from his duties. He was co-supervisor of "Operation Head Start" at the Vernon school system. Dr. Harold E. Ramadell, superintendent of schools, has announced.

Wallace Bonniwell, elementary school music instructor, has withdrawn his resignation and will remain in the Vernon school system. Dr. Harold E. Ramadell, superintendent of schools, has announced.

Ironsi's Execution Reported in Nigeria

LAGOS, Nigeria (AP) — Nigerian sources say rebels in Ibadan have executed Maj. Gen. Ironsi, Nigeria's military ruler, and Col. Adeniji Fajana, military governor of the western region. The reports could not be confirmed.

The informants said Ironsi, who took over after a military coup in January, and Fajana were slain Friday. Ironsi was reported in Ibadan when northern rebels rose up last Thursday and Friday.

News censorship was in force. Lt. Col. Chukwuemeka Ojukwu, military governor of the eastern region, charged in a speech Monday night that rebels carried out "cold, premeditated murder of officers from the eastern region."

Ojukwu said the army rebels were demanding the nation be split up regionally as the price of a cease-fire.

"In the course of the rebellion, I had discussions with the chief of staff of the supreme headquarters, Brig. Ogunjide, who should have assumed command of the army; the other military governors, and of the army chief of staff, Lt. Col. Yakubu Gowon."

Gowon, 31, a northern Christian, assumed power Monday after saying he had obtained the consent of a majority of the Bu-

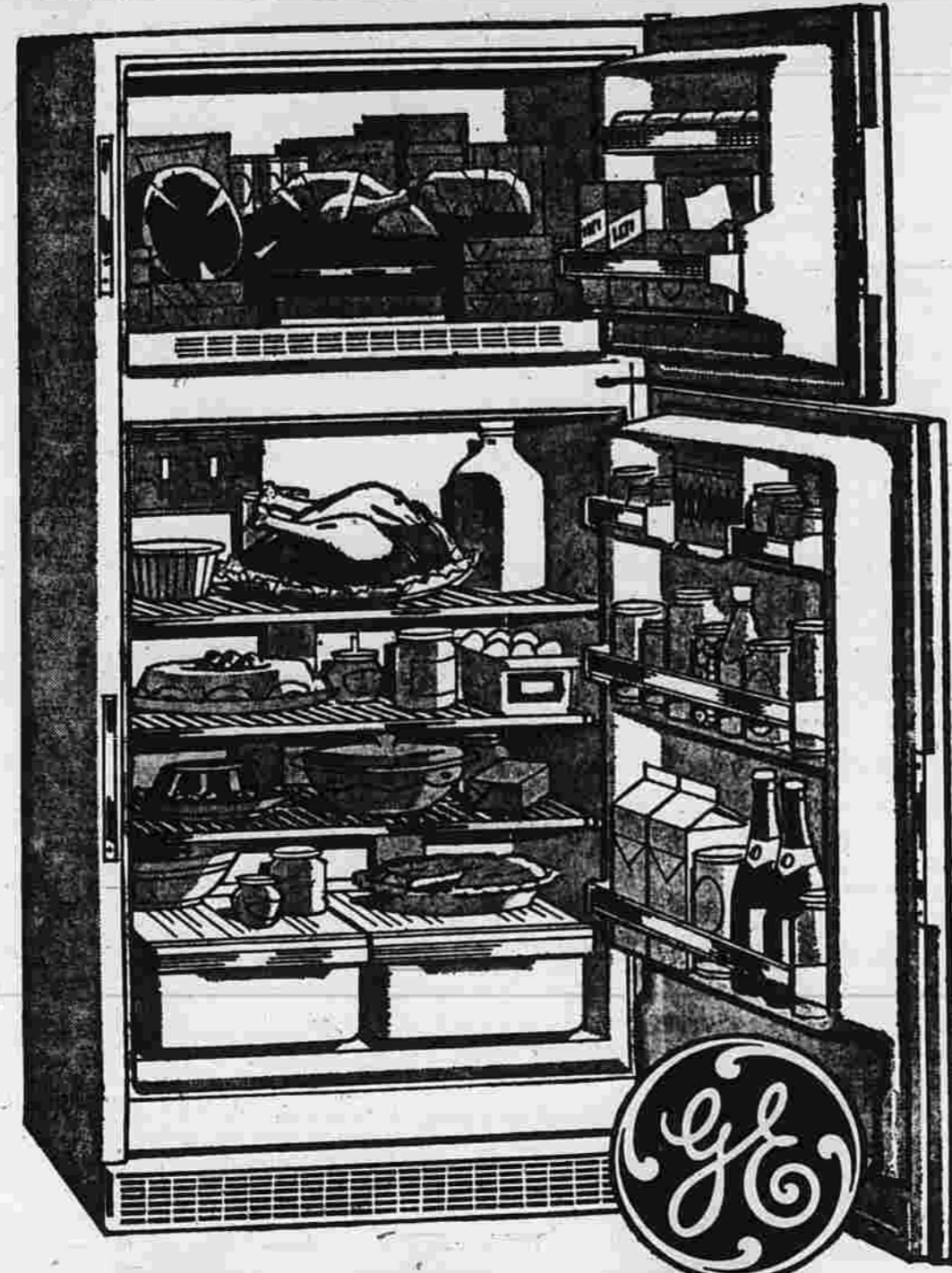

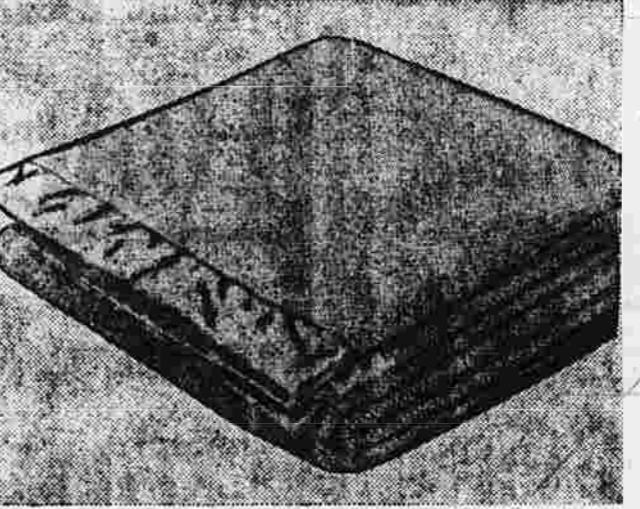

To Make Saigon a Capital

Sometimes the disclosure of some factual circumstances does more than long lists of exposition and appraisal can do to give people an idea of what the war in Vietnam may be like.

The other day—this after a year and a half of the intensified air war, this after the arrival of an additional 200,000 American troops in the country—the B-52's from Guam attacked and American helicopter patrols investigated and destroyed a Vietcong camp and arms depot which contained 80,000 rounds of ammunition and numerous hoarded weapons.

This Vietcong base, obviously of some importance in maintaining and supplying guerrilla warfare, was located at 27 miles from Saigon, the center of South Vietnamese civilization and political life.

The parallel suggested is that of the French in Algeria. The French finally had in that country a professional army of 800,000 men, enough to lick all the Algerian rebels easily, if they could ever locate them. But with their 800,000 men, the French were not able to control any given street of any given city.

We are proposing to do better in Vietnam than the French did in Algeria. But, although we can fly or march our strong forces to any given border of the country, or to any selected destination almost anywhere, we still have not succeeded in creating a secure life in the suburbs of the country's main city.

There is no sure guarantee, from any-thing the amount of bombing or doubling the number of American troops in Vietnam will make any appreciable difference in the treacherous nature of the countryside.

But the best thing going for us in this effort, it is not our planes, or our manned gunpower, but the political effort now shaping up toward elections of a constituent assembly next month. If we can get something political going with potential attraction and dynamism and a sense of national being and purpose involved, we have a chance of getting somewhere in Vietnam—and of getting out, eventually.

The French tried something like this, too, in Algeria. But they found, in the test, that they had to yield the country and the process not to the collaborators but to their enemies and that no simulation of self government would be a substitute for the full gift of freedom, which the French failed to make at the end, almost unconditionally. Our own current political effort in Vietnam is perhaps more ambitious than that of the French in Algeria, but our conditions remain about the same as those of the French when they never expected to get out of Algeria.

This has been, of course, merely a Republican primary. One proof of its wisdom, for the party, and in its interpretation of the mood of the voters in general, will come when the fall election is held.

At the moment, the Republican right wing is cheering, and so are the Democrats, who have previously made their own efforts to elect Governor Smylie's staff as dim as possible.

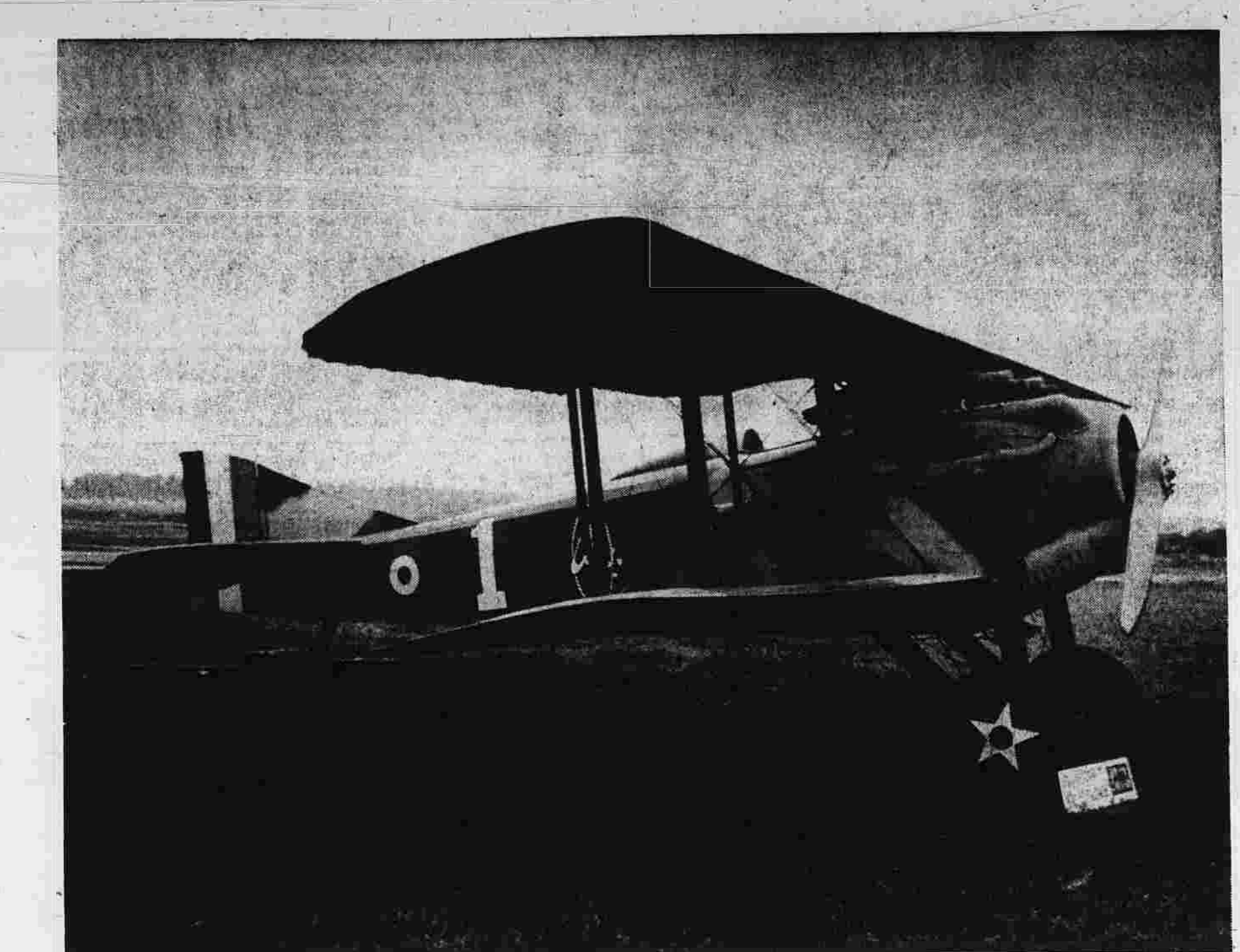

It was to be the year of a Republican who was to be named national chairman of the conference. The Republicans chose Smylie. But the Democratic governors, reportedly under the political advice of Democratic National Chairman John Bailey of Connecticut, decided against doing anything to enhance the national reputation of a Republican moderate from the West. They gave their strength, instead, to the Republican governor of Maine, who didn't seem to be providing the Republican party nationally with any dynamic new leadership.

Now the Republican voters of his own state have turned Smylie down too.

WASHINGTON—Accustomed to ordering Congress around, President Johnson has now given a most un-Johnsonian demonstration of withdrawal symptoms from the exercise of Presidential power in the airline strike.

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Rusk Tells Congress Viet-China Buffer Zone Honored by U.S. Forces

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Dean Rusk has told Congress the United States observes a no-bombing buffer zone along the North Vietnamese border with Red China...

In testimony before a House Appropriations subcommittee on May 11, made public today, Rusk also denied emphatically that the United States was drawn into the Viet Nam War by its economic and military assistance to that Southeast Asian country in earlier years.

Rusk said the United States decided in the administration of President Harry S. Truman that security of Southeast Asia from Communist conquest was essential to the security of the non-Communist world and that succeeding presidents had affirmed and acted on this basic policy.

When the United States intervened in a foreign land, Rusk said, it does so for security reasons, not because of aid programs. He said the president may act even where no alliance exists, as President Dwight D. Eisenhower did in sending troops to Lebanon in 1958.

"We do not go around looking for business in terms of making alliances through aid programs rather than by a more formal process," Rusk said.

He touched only briefly on the border zone along the Red Chinese border and did not give details of how it works. Although similar to other areas around Hanoi and Haiphong, Rusk said, it is not a no-bombing area.

Rusk gave this testimony, official said today that the rule of the zone is to be observed by the border on combat missions still holds.

Some authorities said the zone is probably about 20 miles deep but no official figure has been given out.

In his appearance before the appropriations subcommittee Rusk was asked why the United States refused to do a similar job of attacking targets at Hanoi, North Viet Nam's capital, and Haiphong, its chief port.

"In terms of the action we take in the North," he said, "we have to compare the military effect on the one side with the additional risk, and costs of various sorts on the other."

"At the present time we are bombing military targets in North Viet Nam every 80 hours, and we are spending \$800 million, the NDCB against overrun, and two small alysis shows.

The sheriff said that Betty Clark told her she had seen the man through the night and some time after daylight the car broke down and he let her go.

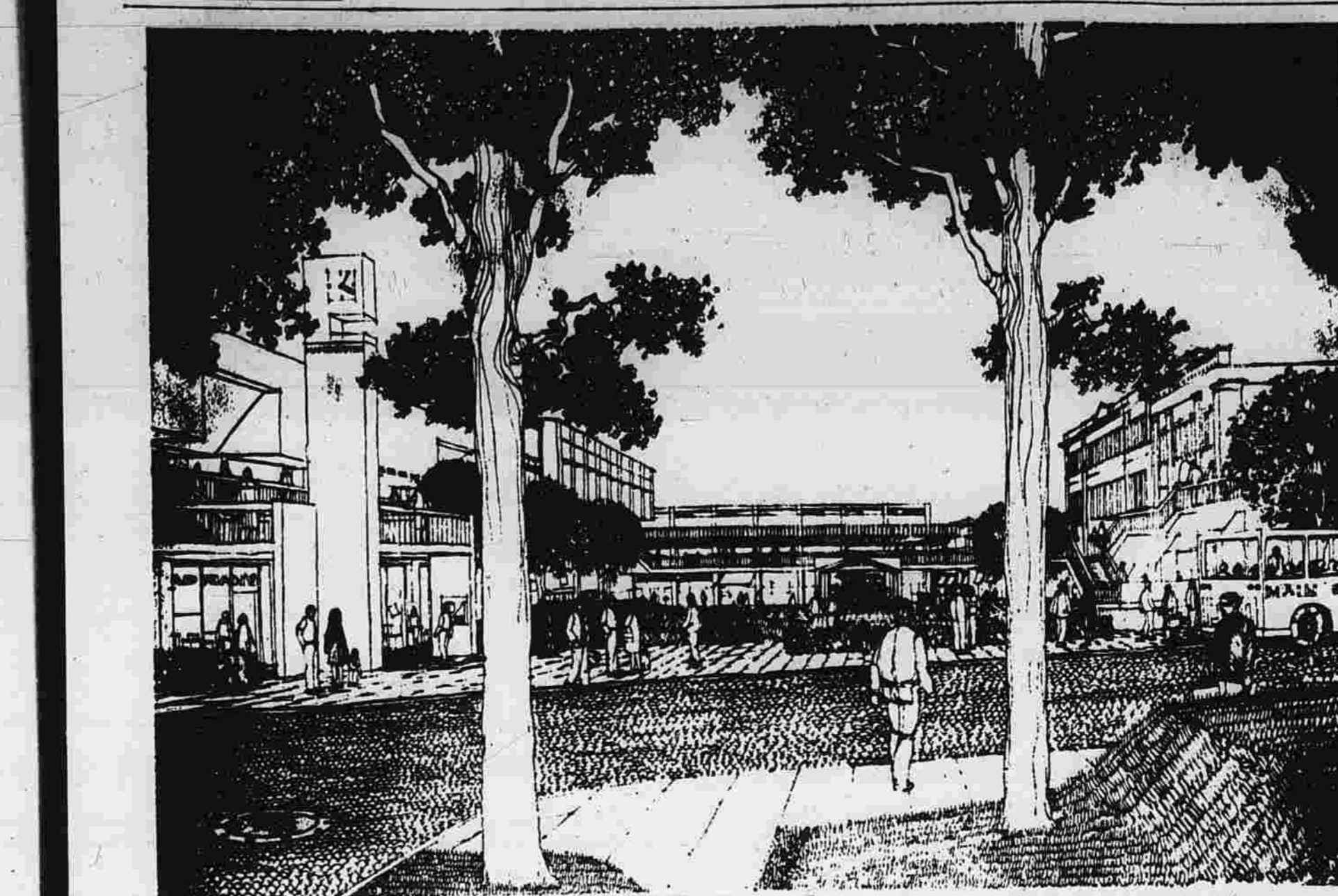

MRA Hopes Renewal Plan Rubs Off on Merchants

By TONY CHEMERSI

Down Town Renewal, the Manchester Redevelopment Agency hopes, will work in copasetic fashion.

A mall on Main St., enlarged streets, better parking areas, attractive landscaping, a new building or two—all at "about \$18.6 million—these should provide an example hard to resist for downtown merchants, the agency believes.

Behind the project, like any face-lifting, is an attempt to give both the potential shoppers and the merchants a new pride and hope for downtown. The MRA does not think there is now very much of either. Many shoppers would just as soon go to a shopping center and many downtown merchants would just as soon sit tight and watch over the downtown's decline.

The MRA doesn't really blame the merchants for the problems that face downtown. It thinks the merchants' making, it believes, and have more to do with convenience, with parking, with things and to make their own arrangements for loans.

The agency has other inducements to rehabilitation. For example, it will retain an architect who will be available to downtown businessmen in redesigning their buildings. Architect and merchant can meet and go over plans for remodeling the store. The architect will act as a consultant to the merchant; he'll stop just short of the final plans, Rybczyk said.

Those businessmen who renew will force to move—their virtue of the project is that there are not expected to be many—will also be helped. Small businesses, for example, that take in \$10,000 or less a year, will get a flat \$2,000 payment from the agency. 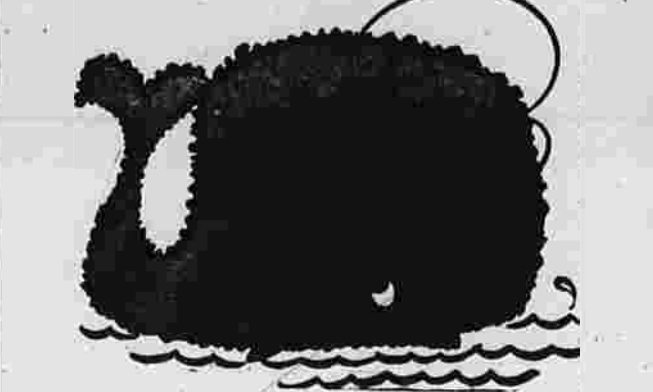

ing to the United States, one will be located at Mountain Home Air Force Base, Idaho, and kept in combat readiness status for any needed deployment. It would use facilities at Ramstein, Germany, under what the Pentagon calls a dual-basing concept.

The second squadron is being assigned to Shaw Air Force Base, S.C., and given a training role.

Since use as a training unit would affect that squadron's readiness, the Pentagon said it will commit another squadron based at Stewart Air Force Base, N.Y., to NATO. Its forward base will be at Sembach, Germany.

Explaining the moves, the Pentagon said: "The net result of the relocations from France will be that the United States will meet its commitment of eight reconnaissance squadrons assigned to NATO with six based in Europe and two home-based in the United States with alternate facilities in Europe."

The six affected squadrons include about 90 planes and about 4,400 military personnel. French President Charles de Gaulle has served notice that after April 1968, any foreign troops on French soil would have to be under French command, a position which forces the withdrawal of U.S. men and supplies from France.

which was reported headed northward toward Communist China and part of North Viet Nam.

B-52s also bombed today one mile south of the demilitarized zone between North and South Viet Nam. They hit suspected North Vietnamese troop concentrations and gun positions in support of U.S. Marines mopping up the area after two weeks of fighting in Operation Hastings.

American planes flew 477 sorties in South Viet Nam Tuesday and claimed destroying or damaging 487 enemy huts, buildings and fortifications. South Vietnamese planes flew 246 sorties. The U.S. military command in Saigon said U.S. Navy and Air Force planes made the strike at the big oil depot in the Hai-phong dock area two miles from the heart of the port city. The announcement said no American planes were lost, and pilot reported columns of smoke and a big secondary explosion.

Washington first confirmed the strike on the depot after North Viet Nam charged that U.S. planes made an indiscriminate raid on Hai-phong, "bombing residential quarters and factories."

This, said Hanoi, "gives the lie to the U.S. rulers' shameless talks about the United States seeking no wider war" and "peace being its objective in Viet Nam, etc."

The North Vietnamese said they had demanded an investigation by the International Control Commission, made up of Canada, India and Poland. Hanoi Radio claimed that six American planes were shot down.

The U.S. Defense Department said preliminary reports showed that American planes were "on target," indicating that the attacks were confined to the oil depot.

U.S. planes first hit the Hai-phong depot June 29 and again July 7. Before the raids, the facility reportedly handled 50 per cent of all fuel entering North Viet Nam and stored 40 per cent of the country's fuel capacity.

Hanoi's protest also charged that U.S. planes bombed installations of the Thai Nguyen steel complex Monday and said this was "particularly heinous." The steel plant is 35 miles due north of Hanoi.

The U.S. command has not announced any such raid, but it did disclose previously that a U.S. B-52 bomber was lost 40 miles north of Hanoi on Monday.

Operation Hastings Ends, U.S. Casualties Moderate

(AP) — Operation Hastings, the costly U.S. Marine offensive that shattered North Vietnam's defenses south of the demilitarized zone, ended Wednesday, U.S. military officials said. The Marines engaged in the fighting, which cost the United States 1,000 other North Vietnamese regulars listed as probably killed, 17 American Marines and 100 other U.S. personnel, and 100 North Vietnamese soldiers, were moving into or through the area that the Marines pounded on.

There are indications that the Marines, who previously had operated only sparingly below the zone, will remain. Three U.S. Marine battalions were at the scene of the fighting, and the U.S. force to stay in the area was increased to 10,000 Marines. The 1st Division, which operated in the area, has not been killed or wounded.

In the bitter fighting that broke out after Marine assaults began July 15, large units of North Vietnamese soldiers were captured, smashed and sent reeling.

The Marines' body count of enemy dead totaled 824, with nearly 1,000 other North Vietnamese regulars listed as probably killed. Seventeen North Vietnamese soldiers were captured, and more than 200 weapons, including eight heavy machine guns and six mortars, were captured.

The weapons gave proof of how well the North Vietnamese were equipped before they left their homeland a month or so earlier to invade South Vietnam.

"Their equipment was first class. We didn't find any trash weapons," said Brig. Gen. Lowell English, commander of the task force that blocked off an area of about eight square miles extending within 2,000 yards of the demilitarized zone between North and South Vietnam.

After Marine companies probing valley trails failed to find any Communist led to fight last week, the operation began to waver.

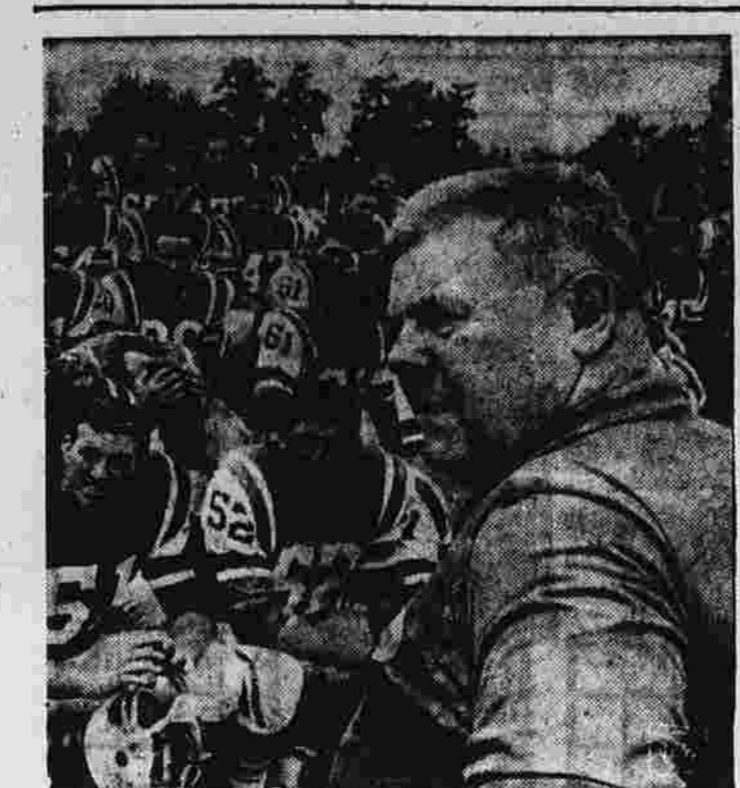

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Hutchinson Elected, Fills Barry Vacancy

Democrat John J. Hutchinson was elected last night to the board of directors. He will fill the vacancy left by the late Barry, vacated on July 12 by State Sen. David M. Barry, when he resigned to devote time to his re-election.

Hutchinson is on the Oct. 3 Democratic ticket for re-election to the board of directors. Last night's vote was 5 to 2. The two "no" votes were cast by Republicans Harold A. Turkington and John I. Garide. Both obtained from voting on July 12, when Hutchinson's election was first proposed.

Hutchinson is the third member of the Republican minority. He had voted "no" at the July 12 meeting. Because two of the Democrats majority were on vacation at the time of the July meeting, the 3 to 1 vote to elect Hutchinson last fall failed to muster the necessary five votes.

Hutchinson was a town director from November, 1962 to March 1964. A controversial figure, often at odds with both parties and with former General Manager Richard Martin, he resigned his post in 1964 over what he called "a lack of sound fiscal policy on the part of the Republicans."

"Turkington had a prepared statement last night, explaining his opposition to Hutchinson's election. He said that he believed that the real reason for his resignation was the difficulty he experienced in being related to the minority."

"Turkington said, 'I would be happy to see him (Hutchinson) come on the board on the basis of election in October—but not this manner.'"

Garide, who has been a board member since December, when he resigned as a director. He explained his "no" vote on the basis that Hutchinson's 1961 letter as treasurer was not acceptable to him. Garide lived in Berlin at the time of the resignation.

Mayor Francis Mahoney defended Hutchinson's letter of resignation saying, "He was probably carried away by his feelings for a strong fiscal policy."

Obviously referring to Garide, and to Stavinsky, who was also a director since March 31, Mahoney said, "His (Hutchinson's) experience will augment the lack of experience of some of our new directors."

Hutchinson, treasurer and general manager of the Standard Federal Credit Union, was vice chairman of the Manchester Housing Authority. He resigned on July 12, 1964, after having been in the position since 1961. He resides at 144 Lawton Rd. in the village of Manchester.

Late in the evening, Town Council Atty. Irving Aronson administered the oath of office to Hutchinson.
