New Effort Being Made To End Strike

WASHINGTON (AP)—Negotiators for striking mechanics and five trunk airlines agreed today to make another effort at solving the dispute that has grounded about 50 per cent of the nation's airline capacity.

The parties, who met Monday night without narrowing the gap between their positions, yielded to urgent personal requests from the House Commerce Committee, which is considering a back-to-work bill already passed by the Senate.

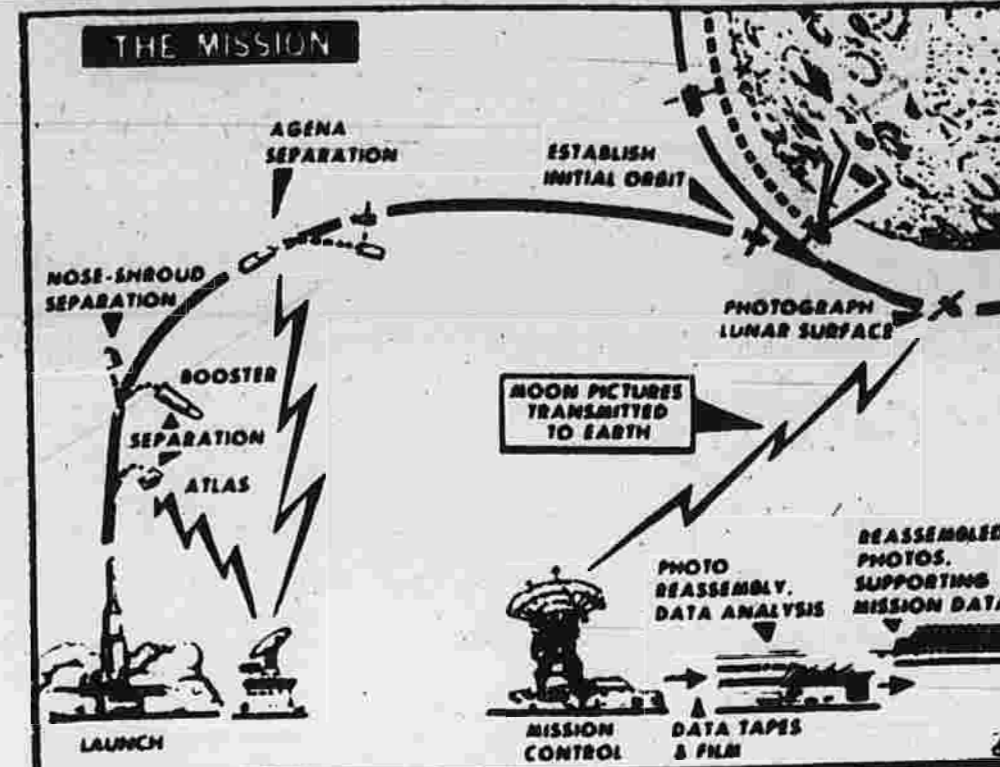
Rep. Samuel N. Pardo, D-Mich., presiding over today's hearing, asked first the president of the International Association of Machinists, J. P. Semmler, and then the chief negotiator for the airlines, William J. Curtin, whether they were willing to meet this afternoon. Both said they were.

The meeting was set for 2:30 p.m. at the Labor Department. However, nothing happened at today's committee hearing that gave any indication the negotiators were working any better at reaching common ground than they did Monday.

The Senate passed bill earlier this month, but it was vetoed by President Lyndon B. Johnson. The House is now working on a new bill.

Senators are expected to vote on the bill in the next few days. The House is also expected to vote soon.

The dispute has caused significant economic damage to the airline industry. Negotiations have been ongoing for several weeks.

Rights Bill Heads For Last Battle

WASHINGTON (AP)—The amendment, slanted through with little dissent, would make a federal crime, punishable by up to five years in jail or a \$10,000 fine, for anyone to cross a state line with the intent of encouraging, inducing or taking part in a riot.
