### Troops Find New Types Of Gear

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — Some types of Soviet military equipment never before used by the Communists in North Viet Nam have begun to crop up on the battlefield, a military spokesman said today.

Among freshly captured equipment is a bulky "black bomber," suit used by chemical warfare decontamination teams.

The equipment was taken from units of the North Viet Nam 249 Division which infiltrated across the demilitarized zone between North and South Viet Nam.

Also included were such items as light machine guns and heavy recoilless rifle ammunition which, although new, have never before been used in South Viet Nam.

The heavy, black rubber suit is for use in decontaminating heavy weapons after a gas or chemical attack.

"In this weather, I estimate that a Vietnamese soldier who wears it would suffocate in about five minutes," a spokesman said.

"It was furnished the division he did not know.

"Perhaps they believe their own propaganda about our use of chemical warfare," he said.

Other captured equipment included an RPKM light machine gun which until recently was standard equipment in the Soviet army and is now being sent to the Vietnamese Communists.

Also taken was ammunition for the standard Soviet RPKM machine rifle—including anti-tank rounds.

"It appeared evident that the 249 Division was one of the best equipped units infiltrated into the south and that it was specially trained to use the most American in combat on something like equal terms.

Other North Vietnamese and Viet Cong units generally have been equipped with Chinese Communist copies of Soviet World War II weapons.

Occasionally Soviet-made weapons are found but most of these have been sub-machine guns and the like.

In cartoons, not in real life, a man sometimes paints himself into an awkward corner of a room. Don't laugh too hard; you wouldn't do it yourself at the bridge table, but your partner does it all the time.

Opening lead—six of clubs. Your partner is declarer at three notrump. He wins the first trick in dummy with the queen of clubs (sighing with relief), gets to his hand with a sign. Also on the stamps are his name, dates and the word India.

Since South cannot see through the backs of the cards, he plays the jack from dummy to force out the ace, wins the club return and leads the eight of diamonds to dummy's queen. East discards a spade, and South sees that he is in trouble.

If South tries the spade finesse, it will lose. If he gets to his hand with a heart to lead the nine of diamonds, West will play low. South can stay in his hand with the nine of diamonds or overtake with dummy's king, but he cannot run the rest of the hand.

# Rights Law Fight Shifts to Senate

in any activity associated with federal law.

On the other hand, it also would be a federal crime for anyone to go from one state into another for the purpose of leading, encouraging or taking part in a riot. The anti-riot provision was added after the series of racial riots in several northern cities this summer.

This amendment was put to a separate roll call vote Tuesday and was approved by a slender 202-196 margin. Rep. William C. Cramer, R-Tx., its author, prevented anyone from taking part in a peaceful demonstration.

Another innovation in the bill is the provision for a federal system selecting federal jurors. For the first time federal courts would have to select their own jurors from a pool of names that would be drawn from a list of names compiled by the state courts.

The bill also would authorize federal court action to end discrimination in state court cases. If discrimination were proved, an order could be obtained to change the state system of selecting jurors.

Opponents offered nearly 80 amendments during the 28 days the bill was on the House floor. They had to wait for one of the last to receive their only readout.

Rep. Earl L. Whitener, D-R.I., succeeded in knocking out a provision that would have let the attorney general initiate court action to desegregate schools. Present law requires him to act only on a written complaint and Whitener's amendment would keep that requirement in effect. It was approved by a 243-201 roll call vote.

**THE PROVISIONS**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Here are the major provisions of the 888 civil rights bill passed by the House Tuesday and sent to the Senate:

**Title I** — Would provide a uniform jury selection system for the federal courts, assuring that juries will be drawn from the broad cross-section of the community. Present qualifications for jury service would be retained.

**Title II** — Would authorize the federal government to initiate court action to eliminate racial discrimination in state court cases. It would also bar state laws that exempt women from jury service.

**Title III** — Would give the attorney general broad authority to seek a civil injunction against anyone who deprives another person of any federally protected rights because of his race.

This title would prohibit racial discrimination in housing transactions by anyone in the business of housing. It would not cover individual homeowners unless they engaged in three or more real estate transactions in 12 months, and it would not cover owners who occupy small apartments and boarding houses with four family units or less. About 40 per cent of the nation's housing is in large apartments and new developments, which would be affected by the bill.

**Title V** — Would make it a federal crime to use force or threats against a Negro or other rights worker who is lawfully engaged in a federally-protected section of the community. Most activities would be limited to the judicial districts now only on jurors named by leading citizens.

The bill also would authorize federal court action to end discrimination in state court cases. If discrimination were proved, an order could be obtained to change the state system of selecting jurors.

# Bad Dreams Haunt Youth Who Escaped Fiery Death

**SEABOARD, Ark. (AP)** — Gary Wayne Lay, 19, looks back on that dark afternoon one year ago and he knows it was a day that changed his life.

"I don't think I'll ever get completely over it," he says.

It still haunts him for what happened to me but my nerves are just about gone.

"I had nightmares for several months and I still have them every once in a while."

Lay, a student at the University of Arkansas, was doing summer work as a part-time laborer helping renovate a Titan house when an explosion and flash fire tore through the nine-story underground structure, called a launch site complex.

Lay and another workman, Hubert A. Saunders, 50, of Conway got out with minor burns.

Another 63 men died in the dark horror of the big tube, either killed by the explosion or the fire, or trapped at various levels and suffocated.

The underground site is one of 54 in the United States holding intercontinental ballistic missiles cocked and ready for a one-way trip with a nuclear payload. This complex, one of 11 in Arkansas, is outside this north central Arkansas town of 2,000 population.

The missile wasn't armed at the time.

Four Air Force crewmen in the control center — the most distant part of the complex — were not harmed.

A 30-man investigation team concluded that the tragedy, just soon to be the conclusion of Dr. Paul A. Putnam, a U.S. Department of Agriculture researcher, after a six-year study at Beltsville. ### European Market Officials Agree on Merging Markets

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — European Common Market officials agreed on merging agricultural and industrial markets of the six countries not later than July 1968.

This means that the main pillars are established for a single market for 200 million Europeans.

The new agricultural policy is protectionist, with high prices for farm products.

In year-long debates the six were reluctant to make concessions. The attractive side of the agreement was that the cost of staying outside and export subsidies will be financed from a common fund to which the national treasuries contribute.

The hand's annual budget, almost \$2 billion from 1968 onward, will cover part of the costs to moderate and mechanize farming.

The single market will make it easier for the six to tackle some of the major problems of modernizing their farming. A low level of productivity, resulting in farm income consistently behind those of industrial workers, has made it difficult for farmers to stand up to competition.

Farmers make up 17 per cent of the market's 70-million working population. They earn only 8 per cent of the gross community product. Industrial workers make up about 48 per cent, earning about 45 per cent.

People employed in the services represent 35 per cent, earning some 45 per cent.

Of the 11.6 million farmers, about 400,000 leave the land annually. More than two-thirds of those in agriculture are under 25 years. There is a lack of mobility due to the wide differences in language, religion and traditions between the community's northern tip in Hamburg and its southern tip in Sicily.

Other problems are those of shortages and surplus and the lack of a stable balance of supply and demand, often due to government and nongovernment articles and publications.

The estimate was made in a newly published guide for business. It shows the buying potential of more than 20 million Negro Americans.

Secretary of Commerce John T. Connor, in a foreword to the publication, said the size of the market reflects "a solid economic advancement" made by Negroes during the past five years.

"The market represents for America both an opportunity and an obligation," he said. "It will be an increasingly profitable market as the Negro is given greater opportunity to contribute to, and share in, the general prosperity."

The guide contains statistics of government and nongovernment articles and publications on the Negro market, and a list of Negro newspapers and magazines throughout the country.

work, are making strenuous efforts to get him freed.

They have now achieved success in one step they consider very important. They have succeeded in getting out into public domain, where they can have their people attack it, the famous supposed sketch of the atomic bomb which was dropped at Nagasaki. This is the sketch that David Greenglass testified he gave to the Rosenbergs, for their transmission to their Russian contacts, and the sketch which, so far as the trial of the Rosenbergs left the matter, presumably gave, the Russians great help toward their own swift manufacture of the atomic bomb.

The lawyer for the Rosenbergs, at their trial, moved, successfully, to have the sketch in question impounded. This other lawyers, and he too, reportedly, have subsequently considered a mistake, since it was an action which connected and established the government's own contention that the sketch was actually a secret of importance.

What the lawyers for Sobell have now succeeded in doing is to get the sketch into the open. And now that a federal judge has ruled it no longer has to remain secret, the lawyers for Sobell have an attack upon it. This, they say, apparently with some testimony from people who helped actually construct the Nagasaki bomb, is no valid sketch of an atomic bomb. And it required no theory that it had to be drawn for Greenglass by somebody like Sobell. It was so false, incomplete, and misleading, say these lawyers, that it could indeed have been drawn by Greenglass, who was no technical expert.

On this basis, they hope to prove that Sobell never did what he has been imprisoned for. If they succeed in this, they may prove, inferentially, that the Rosenbergs, ironically enough, didn't do what they hoped they were doing—help Russia speed the day when it could make its own atomic bomb. It may be that if Russia actually tried to follow the supposedly all important sketch it got from them, they slowed Russia down.

**Of Times And Beards**

Ten to one most of us were quite capable of absorbing the news from Kansas Monday without applying any of its charming history to our present day judgments.

The Governor of Kansas, Monday, dedicated a monument to the somewhat scatter-brained young lady of 1860, who wrote a silly letter to one of the presidential candidates of that year, suggesting that if he would grow a beard, she would vote for him.

It was about time there was a monument to this young woman who was silly enough to think the kind of face a candidate would be so important, for there have long been all kinds of silly enough, and unstable enough, and immature enough, and vain enough, undertakes to alter his own appearance to please one unlikable girl whom.

The silly young girl was Grace Bedell, and the 51-year-old candidate who was so willing, at his age, to try out a new beard, was Abraham Lincoln, and silly girls and bearded boys who traipse around together today are called beatniks.

**They're All Wet**

We have come a long way from the time when the word was a handful of slaves and a multitude of free men. This has been all to the good—the good life has come to the common man, as it should.

There is a leveling off point or conceivably the time will come when the individual won't be able to have a backyard pool unless it's open to the whole neighborhood.

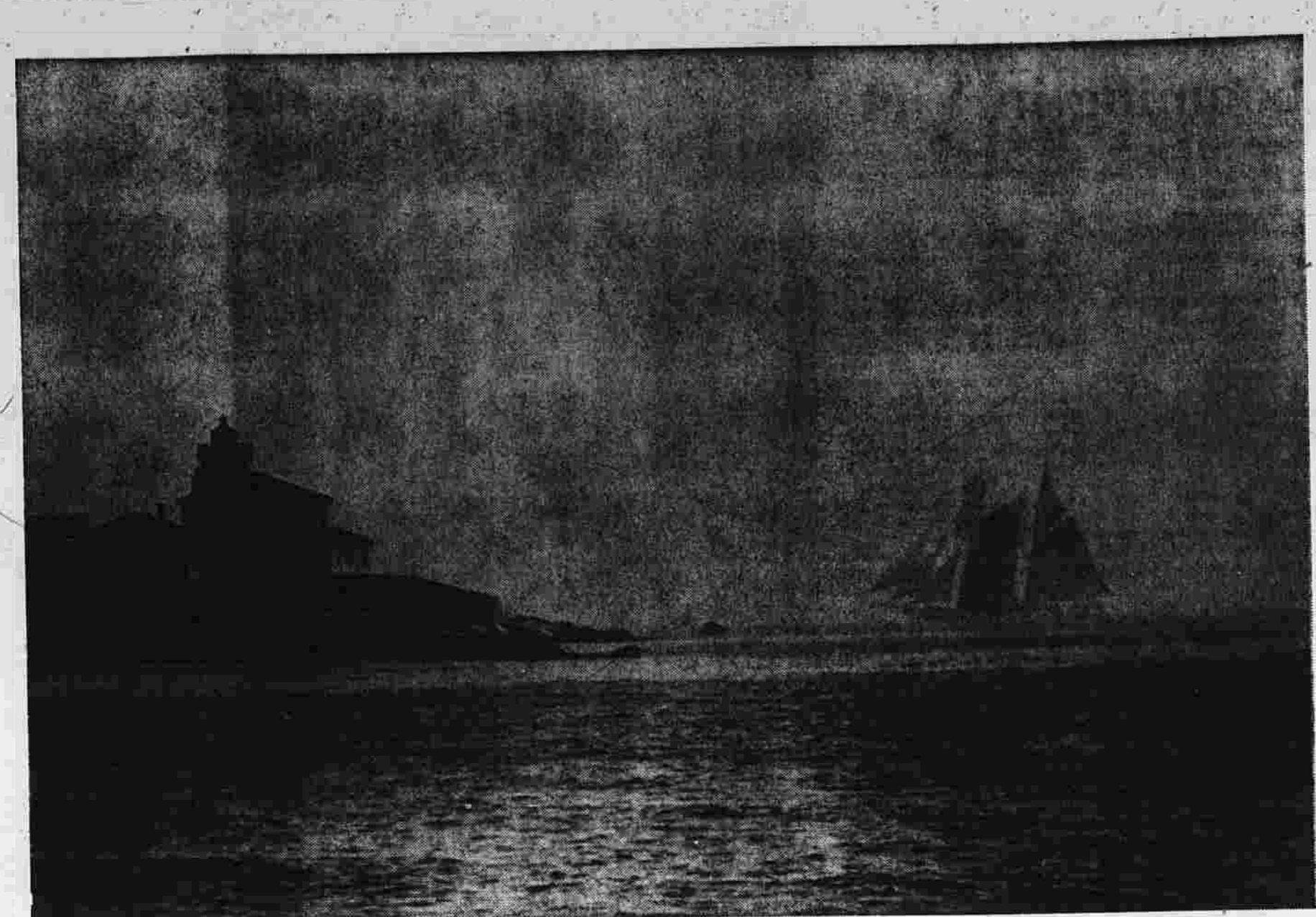

## Inside Report

**WASHINGTON** — Although saying little publicly about the growing crisis of the Negro ghetto in the big cities, President Johnson is working overtime in quiet ways to defuse the nation's worst domestic problem.

One revealing glimpse of Mr. Johnson's private efforts came in a conversation (fruitless, as it turned out) with Sen. Robert Byrd of West Virginia, a conservative Democrat and former Johnson ally who is now systematically opposing Great Society programs.

The call had one purpose: to line up Byrd's vote in the Senate Thursday (Aug. 4) when the rent-subsidy bill was to come up for decision. Although this bill contains only \$20 million for a pilot rent-subsidy program designed to break up Negro housing patterns in the big cities, Byrd was adamant. He told the President, not said the President, according to Byrd's own account a few days later:

"All I'm trying to do is to help these people get out of the ghettos and let them see a little sunlight."

Byrd, whose state has no large cities at all, was unmoved. The problem, he told Mr. Johnson, is the Negroes themselves, not the government. When the President warned that failure to make a start now at helping the Negro masses in the North would guarantee a far worse crisis in the future, Byrd only shrugged his shoulders.

When the rent-subsidy program was approved in committee on a close vote last Thursday, Byrd showed up with a couple of proxies of absent Senators and cast them, along with his own, against this modest pilot program.

What the President attempted to do with Byrd is only one small example of the tip of the iceberg — of his desperate effort to take the violence out of the Negro revolution.

For example, it is a well-kept secret that Mr. Johnson has dispatched a top-level team of White House aides to at least four major cities in the North, and one in the South, to study education, employment, housing — and the racial crisis — with university and political experts.

Headed by Joseph Califano, these White House teams are giving the President new insights into the problems of the big city, the flight of the whites to the suburbs and the dynamics of the Negro revolution. Harry McPherson, the White House counsel, and Douglas Cater, the President's chief for educational matters, have also been assigned by the President to this work.

Beyond that, Mr. Johnson's personal intervention in a problem right on his doorstep — the possibility of a racial flare-up in the capital — is now being studied in governors' offices across the country. When Mr. Johnson read a story in the Washington Post, that Negro children could not turn on the fire hydrants in a bitter heat wave and play in the spray in a problem that triggered the riots in Chicago's West Side, he ordered Califano to stop it.

Califano summoned District authorities to his office. Why no hydrants? he demanded. The answer: it would take too much water. How much? No one knew. Califano demanded immediate answers and got them. The amount of water expended would be minuscule. What about color?

## Costs of War Cause Pinch In Economy

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Heavy spending for the war in Viet Nam is squeezing civilians and industry at home.

The Defense Department has poured billions of dollars into the nation's economy to buy uniforms, food, bombs and bullets.

To meet the needs of the fighting men in Viet Nam, some 500,000 more uniforms are being produced for civilians.

Shortages of men's clothing have been reported by some department stores.

Factories make shortages of copper, electronic and chemical products, machine tools, small motors, stirlings and castings, computers and aircraft engines.

Defense industries had unfilled orders totaling \$24 billion in November. By May they had jumped to \$27.2 billion.

The shortage extends to transportation of many kinds, and to labor and credit, ripping through the economy.

The final tally on defense expenditures for the year ended June 30 is expected to be over \$50 billion, \$20 million more than predicted as recently as January. This year it may top \$50 billion.

The most noticeable pinch comes from the military's expanding manpower needs, subtracting men from the work force when they are needed in industry to meet thousands of increased military production.

Then the mills at home are pressed to clothe and equip the troops.

The problem is particularly acute in clothing and textiles.

In fiscal 1966, the Defense Department spent \$31.2 million on clothing and textiles. In the year ended June 30, it spent \$1.16 billion, and the current year the defense supply agency estimates that it will run another \$800 million.

"It will cut into civilian supplies, but not any more than it has to date," an agency spokesman said.

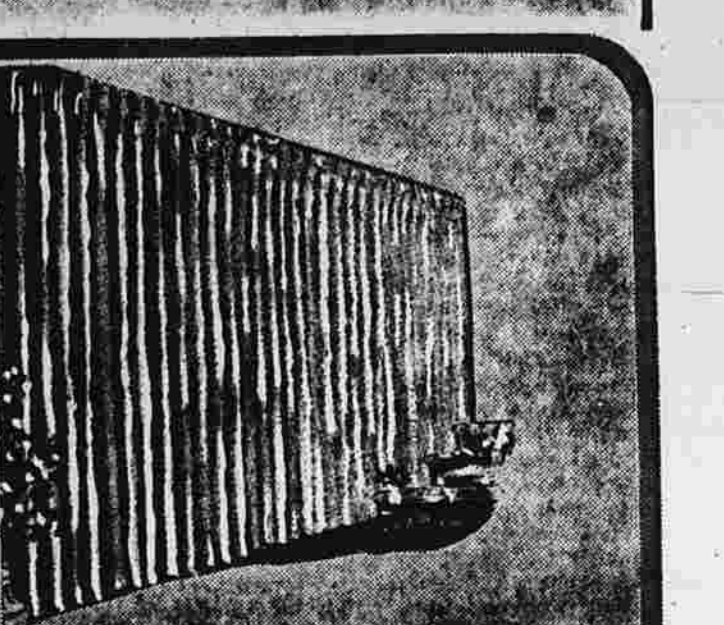

### Workshop Prepares Participants For Roles in Busing Program

One day last week at West Hartford's Aiken School, about 25 primary school children attended a get-acquainted party. Half were from suburban towns and half from Hartford's Negro sections.

The affair was watched by white and Negro educators from Hartford and the suburbs who studied the children's reactions.

The party, which the kids reportedly enjoyed, was planned as one of a series of month-long workshop activities currently carried on at the Aiken School.

The 30 adults are participants in a training project for a year-long desegregation program which will get under way next month, during which some 100 Hartford elementary school children will attend schools in the suburbs.

The children, mainly Negroes and Puerto Ricans from older North End schools, will be bused to the suburbs for the two-year period.

During the experiment, they will receive special remedial help where needed, in addition to their regular class work. And at the close of the program, the state grants, and being planned by the Connecticut State Department of Education.

A total of 40 Hartford pupils will be placed in six elementary schools here. The other participants are West Hartford, Farmington, Simsbury, and South Windsor.

The workshop sessions are under the overall direction of Dr. Alexander Piloni of Bolton, the busing planner and principal director of the state department's office of program development; and Dr. Thomas McEwen, who will actually direct the busing project.

At the workshop, which began at Aiken School July 20 and ended Friday, July 29, 20 teachers and aides from Hartford, have been undergoing intensive training for the project.

Classes are held five days a week from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The participants are paid at the rate of \$25 per day for teachers and \$15 per day for aides.

### Political Calm in Viet Nam May Change War's Course

By GEORGE MCARTHUR SAIKON, South Viet Nam (AP) — A period of unusual political calm in Viet Nam may be some way to solve their own problems without the Viet Nam war.

The constitution to be written by the prospective assembly must be approved by the strong presidential-type government, which Premier Ky said will not be a candidate for president. But it is unlikely, in this country at war, that any amendment can be passed.

There are many, however, who have doubts and reservations, as the time nears for voting to set up a 11-member assembly that will write a constitution for this war-weary country.

The campaign for the Sept. 11 elections begins officially Aug. 26. Candidates include 100 elected figures as the former chief of state, Phan Khanh Sui, and the outgoing president, Nguyen Khanh, who was ousted in a military coup.

There are also political unknowns in the field, persons such as Vuong Son Thuan, a personal photographer to Emperor Bao Dai, a Roman Catholic, is running in the mountain province of Quang Duc, where his knowledge of the Montagnard language will be more help than his association with Viet Nam's last emperor.

The object of these elections is simply to set up an assembly which will conduct the election. The elections are not designed to oust the military from government. After the election, the military will be completely controlled by the civilian government.

Communist propaganda, and Viet Cong terror threats can hold voters back. The Viet Cong hold virtual control in areas where about 50 per cent of the people live. The Viet Cong have called for a boycott of the election.

Another threatened boycott, however, is discounted on all sides. This threat came from Thieu Buokhien, who claims they have a following of about 1.4 million of the nation's 15 million people. They seem divided and disillusioned after being dispersed by Premier Ky's military and tough police action.

The titular chief of the radical Buddhist new to Thieu Quang Tri, is a courtier and Hoang Quynh, the long-waited Catholic priest who has organized splinter elements into small, frat opposition coalition whose members also say they will boycott the election.

"The people will vote, whether or not they are threatened by the Viet Cong or the Buddhist splinter groups," he said. "The people will vote because they want to end the war and the poverty despite the war and the poverty of the vast majority, people will vote."

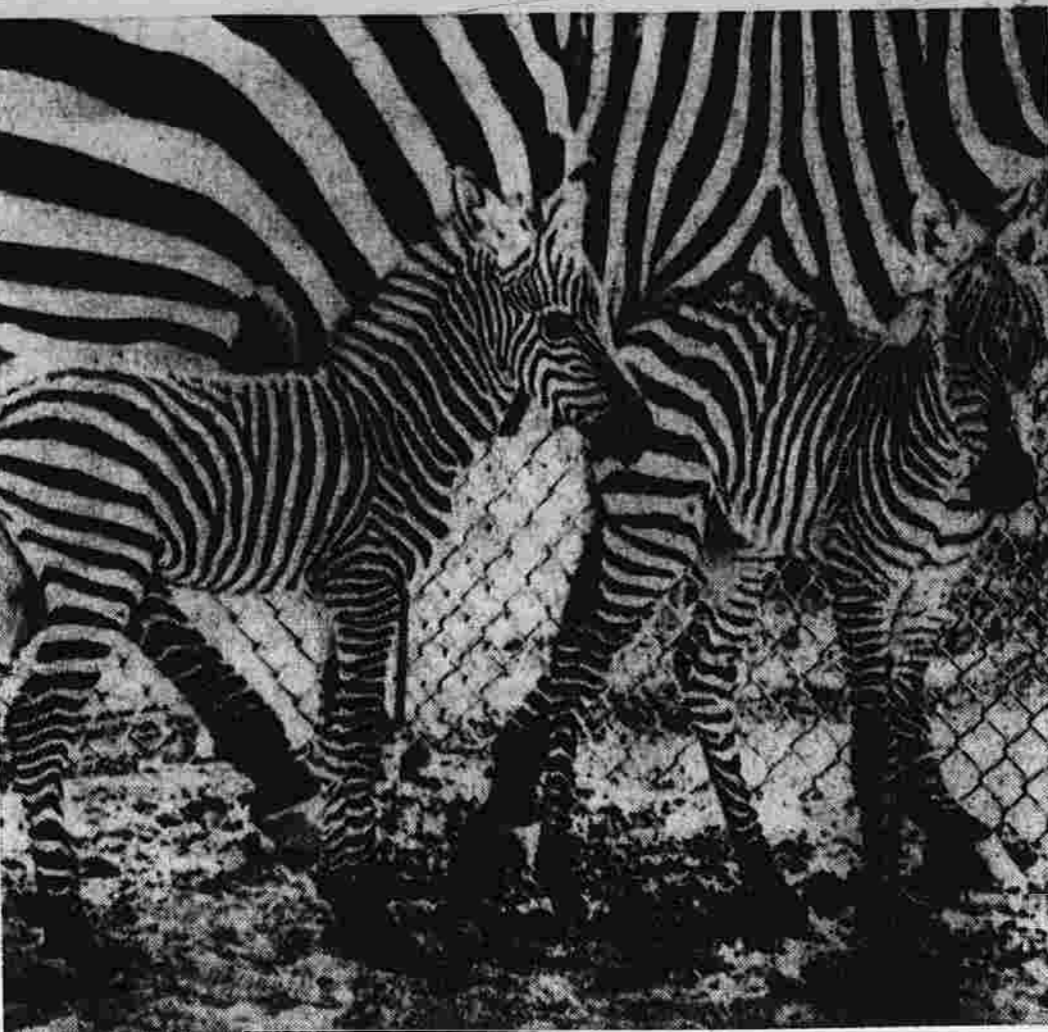
