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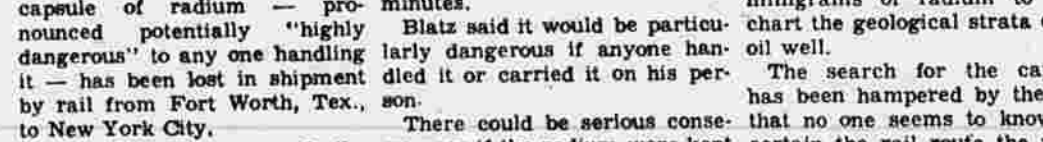

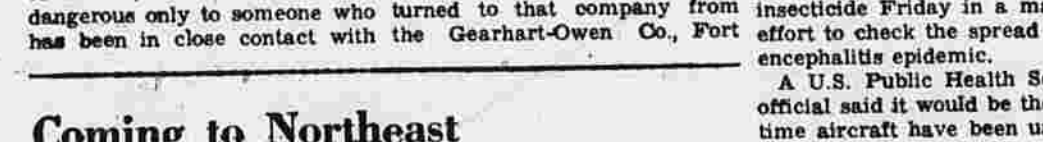

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College Takes Steps To Prepare Campus

In the wake of action Tuesday by the Board of Directors granting an access road to the Manchester Community College, college officials have expressed both relief and gratitude and are beginning to grind the ax.

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Sludge on Cove Is Revealed as Oil and Sewage

HARTFORD (AP)—Inspectors of the State Water Resources Commission have identified the sludge on the surface of Wethersfield Cove as a mixture of oil and sewage.

The sludge came from the overflow pipe of the Metropolitan District Commission sewage treatment plant, the water commission said Wednesday.

Last year a similar sewage overflow caused the largest fish kill in the United States in 1965, according to the federal government.

The sewage killed an estimated 1.2 to 1 million fish in the cove.

Money has been appropriated to change the location of the overflow pipe of the Metropolitan District Commission sewage treatment plant, officials said, but until the improvements are made, more discharges of sewage into the cove will probably occur.

Murder Suspect at Large London's Epping Forest Believed Shielding Roberts

LONDON (AP)—More than 200 policemen, many carrying rifles, moved into London's Epping Forest today to search for a suspect in the slaying of a young woman. Police said the suspect, a man named Harry Roberts, is believed to be hiding in the forest.

Robinson's comments in evaluating the entire sports picture are along the Negro, along with those of Pro Basketball star Bill Russell, taped in an exclusive deal interview for Sports Illustrated. He says that his major disappointment in sports has been the general inability of the Negro to advance beyond the playing field.

However, with Robinson now in the front office with the football Dodgers and with Russell having been appointed coach of the Boston Celtics, the white-collar Negro is beginning to change. Robinson says that the program is going to continue.
