12th Circuit Court Cases

MANCHESTER SESSION
Richard O. Adams, 22, of 206 Center St. pleaded not guilty to a charge of breach of peace and his case was continued for jury trial in East Hartford on Sept. 13.

Adams was arrested several weeks ago after he allegedly fired several shots at the home of his estranged wife. He is free under \$600 bond.

David Cargo, 21, of Coventry, pleaded guilty to a substantive charge of breach of peace and was fined \$20. Cargo was originally charged with indecent exposure when he was arrested in Coventry on May 9.

The case of Irene L. Williams of Enfield, who is charged with fraudulently obtaining state aid, was continued to Sept. 13. An official of the State Welfare Department said that the accused received about \$2,800 in support from the state while at the same time receiving money from her husband, which she failed to report. The official said that the support payments were received over a period of about 18 months, and that some confusion was created when, at a divorce settlement in Superior Court, the husband of the woman chose to make support payments through the Circuit Court rather than directly through the Superior Court.

Albert B. Barter of East Hartford, pleaded not guilty to a charge of indecent assault, waived probable cause examination, and his case was bound over to the next criminal session of Hartford Superior Court.

Barter was arrested in Manchester last month after police say he was found in a parked car with a 14-year-old Hartford girl, who was referred to juvenile authorities.

No bond was set on Barter as he had already posted bond in East Hartford. Several weeks ago he pleaded guilty to that of that man charged with three counts of statutory rape as a result of alleged activities with the same juvenile in East Hartford.

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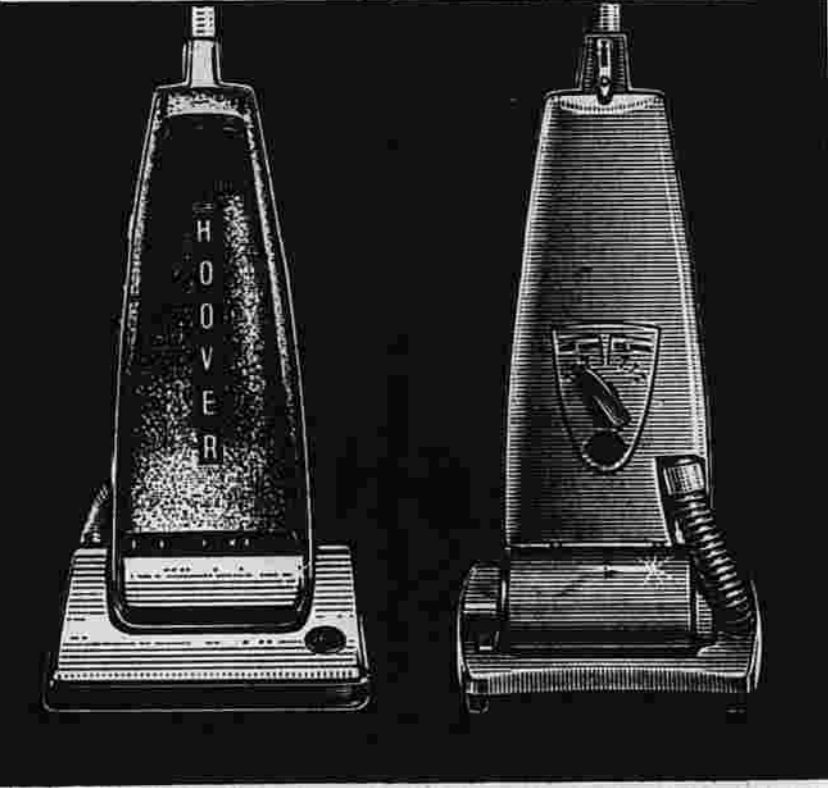

Wall Maintains Pace In Bid for ICC Title

"The golf course couldn't have played easier," Billy Casper said after the second round of the \$100,000 Insurance City Open, as he tried to explain the sensational scores being turned in at Wetherfield Country Club.
Art Wall, Jr. cornered the market on sparkling golf for the second straight day to go in front with a 65-64-126. His 15-under par standing at the halfway mark Friday put the 41-year-old Wall in his best position to win a tournament in the United States since winning the 1964 San Diego Open.
Only three Open champ and the year's top money winner at \$99,315, was nine strokes in back of Wall Friday at 69-68-138. The year ago champion was eight behind at the same point, but he rallied with a 64 to win.
"The greens were soft, the winds were gentle and the fairways gave a lot of roll," Casper said, adding that they key to taking advantage of the situation was to have a "putting stroke going." Casper didn't, but Wall, who plays in the 1966 Ryder Cup, shot his second straight 65 to tie the lead with Casper. Wall had another great chance on the 14th, but three-putted for a 66.

The new contract covers initial funding for work to be done over the next three years. The total amount of the contract could reach \$32 million.

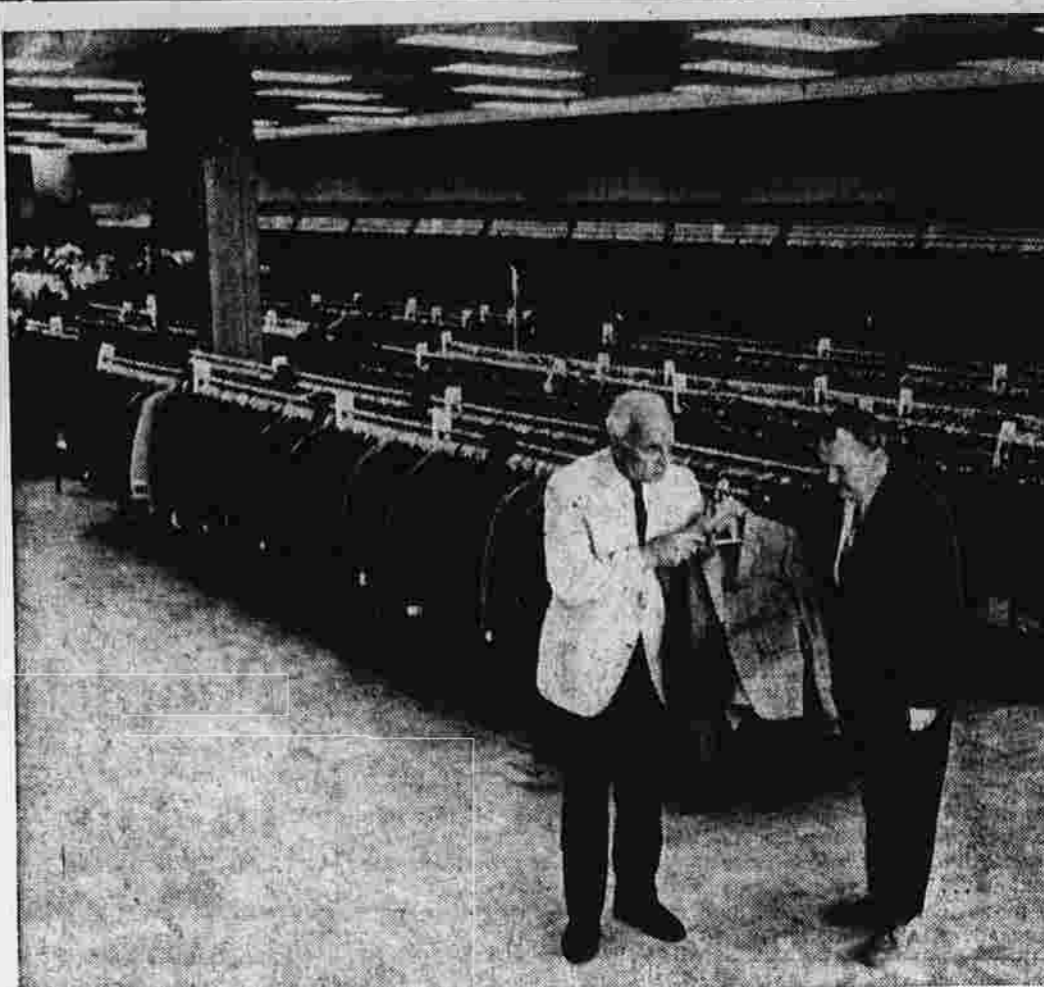

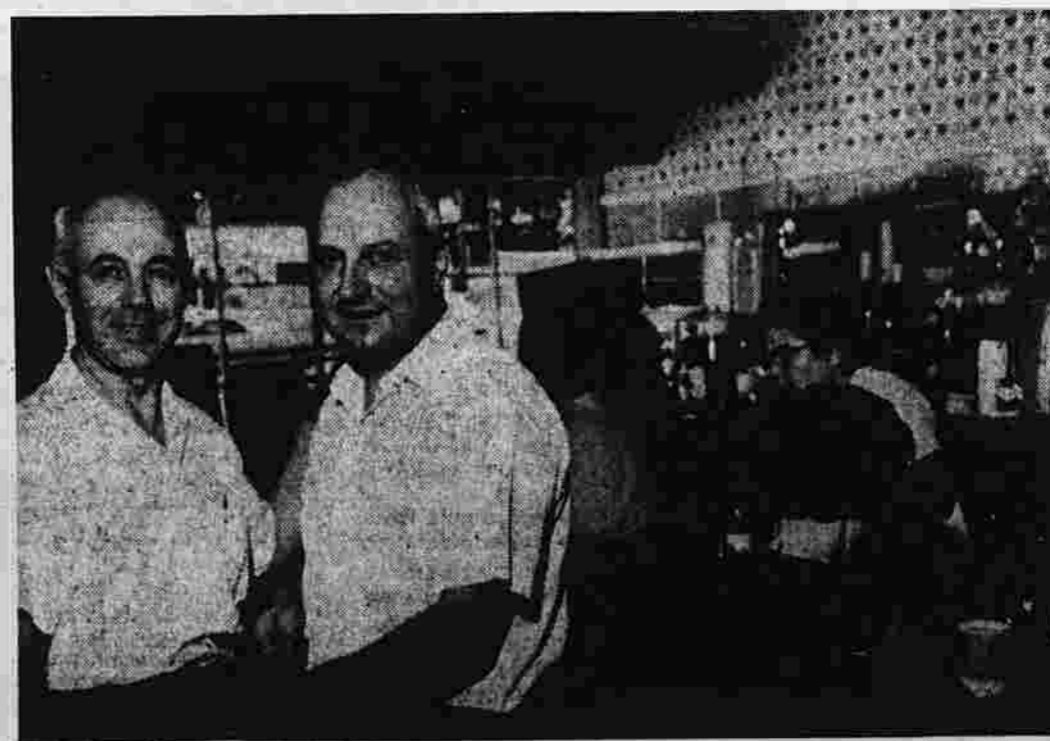

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A New Season Swings In

NEW YORK — (NEA) —
 Ready or not, here it comes. It's the 1966-67 television season, which officially opens the week of Sept. 11. Unofficially Sept. 6 when a couple of networks jump the gun.

And it's pleasant to report that the pilot crop this season is better by far than anything seen in recent years.

Not only are several pilots good, but also they are based on ideas that seem able to sustain a series. A few pilots are not so good and cynicism makes one think they will be the hits.

The first new show seen this season will be ABC's "The Founders," a comedy western from MGM, which stars Chill Wills, Ron Hayes, Patrick Wayne (whose teeth steal every scene he's in) and a great horse named Old Fooler.

By far the best pilots are "The Hero" on NBC, and "The Man Who Never Was," on ABC. "The Hero" is a comedy that, without being imitative, is reminiscent of "The Dick Van Dyke Show" for believable characters, hilarious situations and a talented likable cast.

The hero is Richard Mulligan, marvelous as a nice, slightly unco-ordinated family man

who is the star of a Western television series.

The Plot Continues
 "The Man Who Never Was" stars Robert Lansing, a spy trapped into assuming the identity of a deceased lookalike, and Dana Wynter, widow of the dead man, who must pretend to be Lansing's wife. The plot, continued, should indeed bring you back for succeeding episodes.

Other promising ABC pilots include: "Love on a Rooftop," which stars Judy Carne and Peter Deuel as newlyweds and Rich Little as an insensitive neighbor who barges in without knocking. "The Monroes," filmed in the Grand Tetons, is an adventure story of a family of five, orphaned, and trying to live in hostile territory. "The Hawk," is a well-photographed (in New York) detective series starring Burt Reynolds; Time Tunnel, with Robert Colbert and James Darren, is a fine science-fiction series about two men who can be manipulated to any era, but cannot be brought back to the present; and "Shane," starring David Carradine, is based on the old Alan Ladd movie.

Other ABC pilots are "Rat Patrol," about desert warfare in World War II; "That Girl," which stars personable Marlo Thomas as an aspiring actress; "Iron Horse," a Western about the building of a railroad, with Dale Robertson and Gary Collins; "Men Against Evil," a Dragnet-type with Howard Duff; "The Fruits of Southampton," which will only delight Dillerites; "The Tammy Grimes Show," which will only delight Tammy Grimes-ers; "The Milton Berle Show," which delights Milton; and "The Green Hornet," starring Van Williams, about your everyday newspaper publisher who fights crime at night dressed in green garb.

Bachelors and Gimmicks
 NBC has a promising comedy in "Hey Landlord," with Will Hutchins and Sandy Baron as two men "over 21 and before bumhood, and who have an instant coffee ring around their bathtub.

Also on NBC is "The Road West," a well-done Western with Barry Sullivan excellent as the head of a clan attempting to settle in Kansas; "The Monkees," about a rock 'n' roll group, filmed similar to the Beatles' movies; "The Roger Miller Show"; "The Girl from U.N.C.L.E.," with Stefanie Powers and Noel Harrison; "Occasional Wife," with Michael Callan and Patricia Hartley, is one of the more "gimmicky" series.

Also, "Star Trek," a fine, adult science-fiction which stars William Shatner as the captain of a spaceship touring the gal-

axy; "T.H.E. Cat," a fairly sadistic adventure series with Robert Loggia.

Then there's "Tarzan," which may be the most notable series of all. Starring Ron Ely, it is set in Africa, but was filmed in Brazil. The African natives look and sound exactly like what they are: Brazilian Indians, Spanish accents and all.

Gangster Comedy
 CBS' best is "Run, Buddy, Run" with Jack Sheldon, who is both funny and appealing as a man fleeing from gangsters he has overheard plotting a killing. Also promising is "Family Affair," with Brian Keith as a playboy who "inherits" three children and Sebastian Cabot as his butler; "The Jean Arthur Show," with the delightful Miss Arthur as pretty and funny-voiced as ever; "Jericho," a World War II spy series with Don Francks, Marino Mase and

John Leyton (a young Englishman who could be this year's David McCallum); "Mission: Impossible," an adventure series; "It's About Time," created by the man responsible for "Gilligan's Island" (this series makes Gilligan seem as sophisticated as Noel Coward); Garry Moore's new variety series; and "Pistols and Petticoats," a comedy Western with Ann Sheridan.

Brightest of all, and the best news since Frankie married Mia, is ABC's "Stage 67," top dramas and variety shows, and dramatic shows by name writers scheduled as specials by CBS and NBC.

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'Occasional Wife' Is a Bit Familiar

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — There is currently a lot of television talk about "meaningful" and "significant" drama in store for the coming season's audiences, but close to half of all the network regularly scheduled evening series are being played strictly for laughs.

It is hard to place some shows in a specific comedy category, since humor is in the eye, ear and brain of the beholder. Thus, while "Batman" may be forthright action-adventure for the under-12 set, it constitutes comedy for the older viewers. The same, undoubtedly, will apply to NBC's new, updated revival of "Tarzan."

Within the comedy category are all sorts of shows. But the largest group is the one that the industry calls "sitcom," short for situation comedy.

Within this form lies an upcoming NBC series called "Occasional Wife," and older viewers may have a feeling that

there is something very familiar about it.

There's a young executive who, although a devout bachelor playboy, thinks he would get ahead in business faster if his boss believes he is married. So he makes a platonic arrangement with a pretty girl to act the part of his wife when necessary, installing her in an apartment above his quarters, with mutual access via the building's fire escape.

Well, you can just imagine the fun that can be milked from this — business associates spotting the presumably married man out with other women; neighborhood gossips observing all the scurrying up and down the fire escape; jealous girl friends; jealous boy friends.

The difficulty may be, however, that vague stirrings in the back of the viewer's mind. Didn't Cary Grant, or Jack Lemmon or both of them do something like this before in films?

The new treatment of an old theme may be made very palatable by the fact that the girl is played by a very pretty blonde named Patricia Harty, and the man-about-town is Michael Callan, a versatile young actor who, on camera, bears a remarkable resemblance to Jack Lemmon.

Callan, a dancer in the Broadway production of "West Side Story," has been in Hollywood eight years and attracted most attention playing an outlaw in love with Jane Fonda in "Cat Ballou."

A slight, self-assured fellow, Callan explains that he aims toward films, but wanted a television series "for two or three years" to nail down his identity with the public, to have a chance to play comedy for a change — and make enough money so he can pick and choose among later opportunities.

"After all," he said, "I was under contract to Columbia for six years and nobody ever took the initiative in furthering my career."

Success Spurs Fad

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Change comes to Hollywood by extremes—very fast or very slow.

The instant success of ABC's "Batman," last season immediately turned television's attention to other cartoon and old radio characters. Next season ABC will follow up with "The Green Hornet," and NBC is preparing a TV version of "Dick Tracy."

Other similar properties, including "Orphan Annie," are available.

The same thing has happened before—"The Man From U.N.C.L.E." unleashed a rash of shows with James Bond heroes. And it will happen again with "The Girl From U.N.C.L.E." on NBC next season.

The fantasy fad, kicked off two seasons ago with "Bewitched," appears to be waning. Its last vestige will be "It's About Time," a CBS comedy about a couple of astronauts caught in a space mishap that lands them back on earth a million years ago. The show will bid for laughs by contrasting modern men with their ancestors.

Space adventure and science fiction will figure prominently in next season's schedules, undoubtedly because "Lost in Space" and "Voyage To The
