to rationalize its own success? Yet, on the other hand, we can't dispute and disprove it. The statistics belong to the experiment, not to us. Perhaps, instead of remaining skeptical, we ought to surrender to them, and make ourselves their enthusiastic partisans. The experiment in question?
