U of H Names Library In Honor of Dr. Poe

A central reference library that is being built at the University of Hartford will be named in honor of the late Dr. Pascal E. Poe of Manchester.

The announcement was made today by Henry R. Roberts, the chairman of the U of H board of regents.

The reference library will be located in Auerbach Hall, a \$1.9 million project that will be completed on the West Hartford campus by next fall.

Dr. Poe was named provost, or chief academic officer, in 1962. A native of Pueblo, Colo., he came to Hartford in 1946.

Dr. Poe also served as a member of the Citizens Committee of Manchester and the Manchester PTA Council.

Dr. Poe was elected in 1964 and re-elected in 1965 with the largest vote of electors in the history of the university.

String Beans with Cream: 1 can tomato soup, undiluted; 1 can string beans, cut and cooked, or 1 can string beans; 2 tablespoons bacon drippings; 1/2 cup dry bread crumbs; 2 tablespoons grated raw carrots; 1 tablespoon chopped parsley; 1/4 teaspoon onion powder; 1/4 teaspoon salt.

More Clues Sought In Odd Murder Case

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP) — A victim who has been missing more than a year. He said officers learned of his disappearance only through questioning they call one of the strangest they have ever known.

The victim was Quirio Guglielmo, 38, an immigrant Italian. Police say parts of what are believed to be his body were found in his Providence home and in the Poasset River at Cranston.

Franklin also said police are still searching for Guglielmo, 53, father of the 17-month-old boy.

Plan Ended To Start NY Newspaper

NEW YORK (AP) — Bernard Tassler, who said he had hoped to form a corporation to publish a morning newspaper here, announced Wednesday night that the plan was dead because the name of the defunct Herald Tribune could not be bought for the new enterprise.

Tassler said the World Journal Tribune Inc. rejected an offer of \$75,000 for use of the name.

Speaking in behalf of the corporation he hoped to form, Tassler said:

"We felt that the distinguished name 'Herald Tribune' was one that should not die and that the name was a great asset. We are not interested in publishing a 'New York press' or 'New York Bulletin.' The project therefore is now dead."

Tassler said that Matt Meyer, president of the World Journal Tribune Inc., noted in turning down the offer that the new daily and Sunday newspaper this corporation plans will be called the World Journal Tribune.

Tassler said Meyer wrote: "This it would be continuing to say the least for another newspaper to be published with any part of that name in its masthead."

However, we see no reason why the unavailability to you of our name should discourage you from your plans to publish a morning newspaper in New York City if you believe it otherwise possible to do so."

Meyer announced Aug. 15 that plans to publish the Herald Tribune as a weekday morning newspaper had been dropped. The corporation — formed in the merger of three newspapers — now plans to publish a weekday afternoon paper and a Sunday paper.

The new papers were to have started April 26, but difficulties with unions are still holding up publication.

Disarmament Recess Called: Resume in '67

GENEVA (AP) — The deadlocked 17-nation disarmament conference went into recess today but agreed to meet again next year.

After calling the talks "fruitless" and "a waste of time" Soviet delegate Alexei A. Roshchin surprised the West by promptly agreeing to a resumption of the negotiations after the end of the next session of the United Nations General Assembly — probably in mid-January 1967.

The final session ended with East and West blaming each other on the lack of progress during the seven-month session. But delegates from both sides stressed the importance of carrying on with the talks.

Roshchin said the session achieved "no real progress in any field. He blamed the United States for this and accused America of viewing disarmament as a means to "in terms of potential military and political advantages."

The class, started last year, enrolled 12 children from several areas.

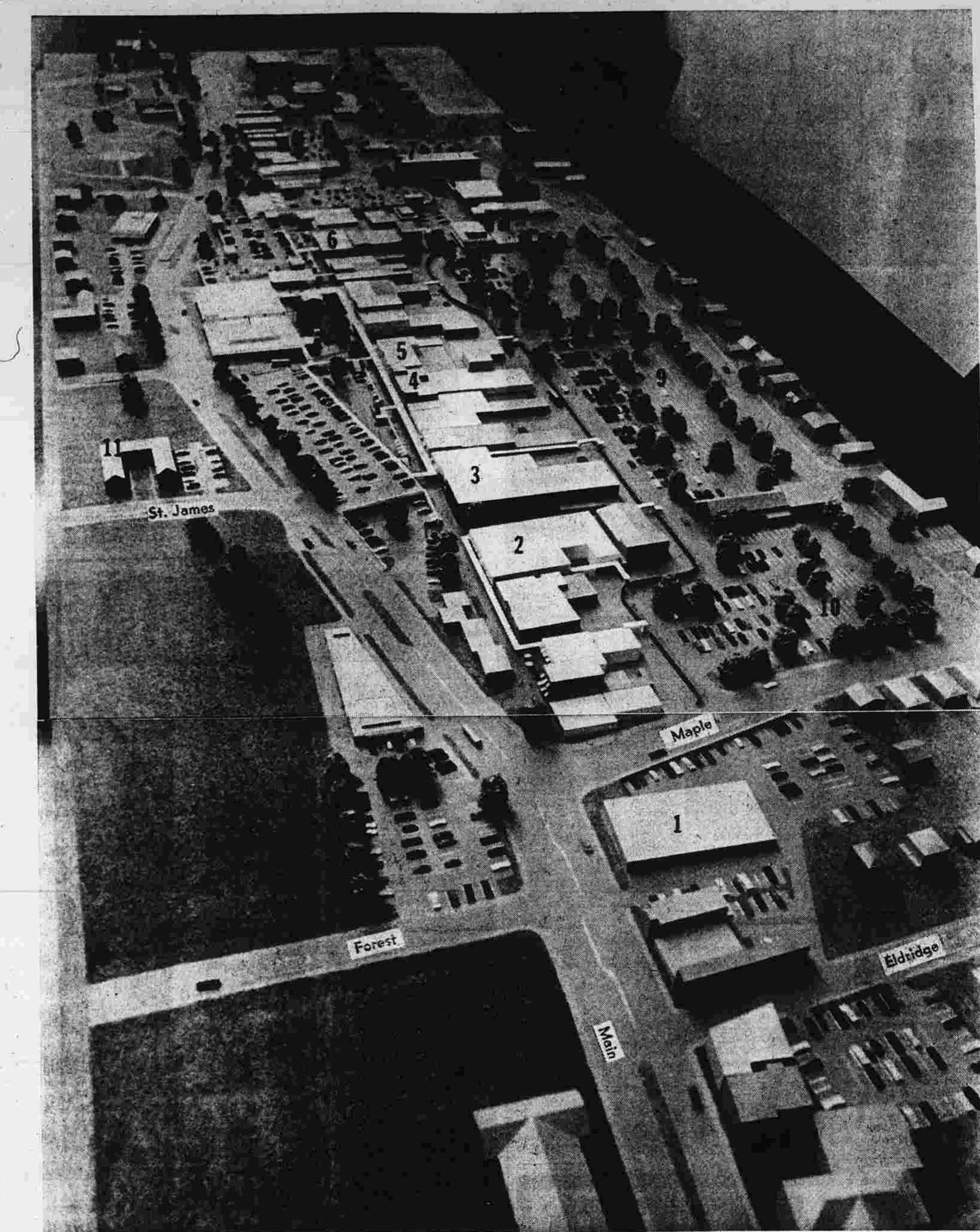
FDR Jr. Set To Quit Race

Pet Law Signed

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson has signed into law a bill aimed at curbing what some have called a multimillion-dollar racket — the theft of pets for sale to scientific laboratories.

The measure, which received final congressional approval last week, also requires humane care and treatment for animals to be used in medical research. During a signing ceremony in the White House Wednesday, Johnson said progress in science and medicine requires the use of animals for research but added that the measure would not interfere with that.

"But science and research do not compel us to tolerate the kind of inhumanity which has been involved in the business of supplying stolen animals to laboratories, which is sometimes involved in the careless and callous handling of animals in some of our laboratories," the President said. "This bill will put an end to these abuses."

The Humane Society has estimated that the nationwide traffic in stolen dogs alone has cost the industry about \$20 million annually.

No Mohole Funds

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate has voted against authorizing \$17 million in further funds for Project Mohole, a scientific program which called for drilling through the earth's crust in the Pacific.

The House voted last May to refuse funds for the project. President Johnson asked that the funds be restored to an appropriations measure for various federal agencies.

Last Thursday, the House rejected the Mohole money for the second time. The Senate, in a vote Wednesday, also refused to authorize the funds.

During the House debate, Rep. Donald Rumsfeld, R-Ill., said the cost contractor for the Mohole project, his family had contributed \$25,000 to the President's Club, a Democratic fundraising organization.

Asked about this at his news conference Wednesday, President Johnson said he was not aware of any such contribution. He said he had been strongly rejected by the people.

GARDNER, Ore. (AP) — First you laugh about it, then you get mad, says a waitress whose husband is among more than 300 workers who have struck the International Paper Co.'s plywood plant in the Southwest Oregon coastal community.



The strike began Tuesday when Miss Pat Morris, 35, was suspended from her job at the plant because she wore tight fitting clothes.

Miss Morris, whose vital statistics are 50-27-38, says she is "troubled about so much trouble it has caused."

Miss Morris works the overnight shift with other women, who like her, wear stretch jeans and sweaters. She is not a union member.

She was suspended by the plant foreman on the grounds that her tight fitting clothes were distracting to other workers.

"I don't know why they singled me out," she said. "The other women wear the same type of clothes. I told them I would buy other clothes on payday. They said something about me not to back to work until the company lifts the illegal suspension of this worker. We are willing to meet with the company at any time."

A local of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union held a meeting and maintained the company should have given her a warning in writing.
