Democrats Endorse Slate For Nov. 8 State Election

The Manchester Democratic Town Committee last night endorsed all of its incumbents for re-election in the Nov. 8 elections, named a newcomer to a newly created post, and gave endorsement to a Republican for local office.

The endorsed Republican is Probate Judge John J. Wallcut who has held his position since 1948.

The newcomer is Henry T. Becker of 736 Center St., endorsed for state representative from new Assembly District 20.

All candidates for Assembly seats are required to reside within their districts and will be elected only by the voters of their respective districts.

An unbroken string of 34 years in an elected post, a record for Manchester, will be continued, with the endorsement of Edward P. Moriarty for the post of Democratic registrar of voters.

Democratic Town Chairman Ted Cummings pledged last night, "We will run a positive campaign, based on past accomplishments."

Napalm Dropped in Error Over Battling U.S. Troops

Casualties Heavy; 7 Believed Killed

LAI KHE, South Viet Nam (AP)—Two U.S. Air Force Super Sabre jets accidentally dropped napalm today on American infantrymen heavily engaged with a crack Viet Cong battalion in the jungles only 20 miles north of Saigon.

The strike caused heavy casualties in the unit of 25 infantrymen who were killed or wounded. The precise number was not given for security reasons.

Red China Poll Inconclusive; Answers at Odds

WASHINGTON (AP)—The results of a questionnaire in Connecticut's 4th Congressional District show that 41 per cent of those replying are in favor of ending the United States membership for Red China.

The questionnaire, mailed in June and to which 12,686 replies were received, also showed that 46 per cent of those replying were opposed to the recognition of Red China by the United States.

The questionnaire's author, Rep. Donald J. Irwin (D), pointed out today that it would be difficult to permit Red China to join the UN without extending formal recognition to her.

Irwin's questionnaire contained three questions:

1. "In your opinion, should the U. S. cease opposing admission of Communist China to the United Nations, providing that Formosa's seat would be transferred?"

2. "Do you recommend U. S. recognition of Communist China?"

3. "Do you think the United States should follow a policy of 'containment but not isolation' toward Communist China?"

On the third question, 62 per cent of those replying indicated they were in favor of containing but not isolating. On this question only 18 per cent said "yes," 4 per cent said "no," 18 per cent had no opinion, and 18 per cent were not sure.

On the second question, 46 per cent wanted to recognize, 2 per cent had no opinion, and 18 per cent of the replies were designated for various reasons.

Five persons, including a 25-year old Rockville woman charged with aggravated assault, were granted suspended sentences yesterday morning in Tolland County Superior Court.

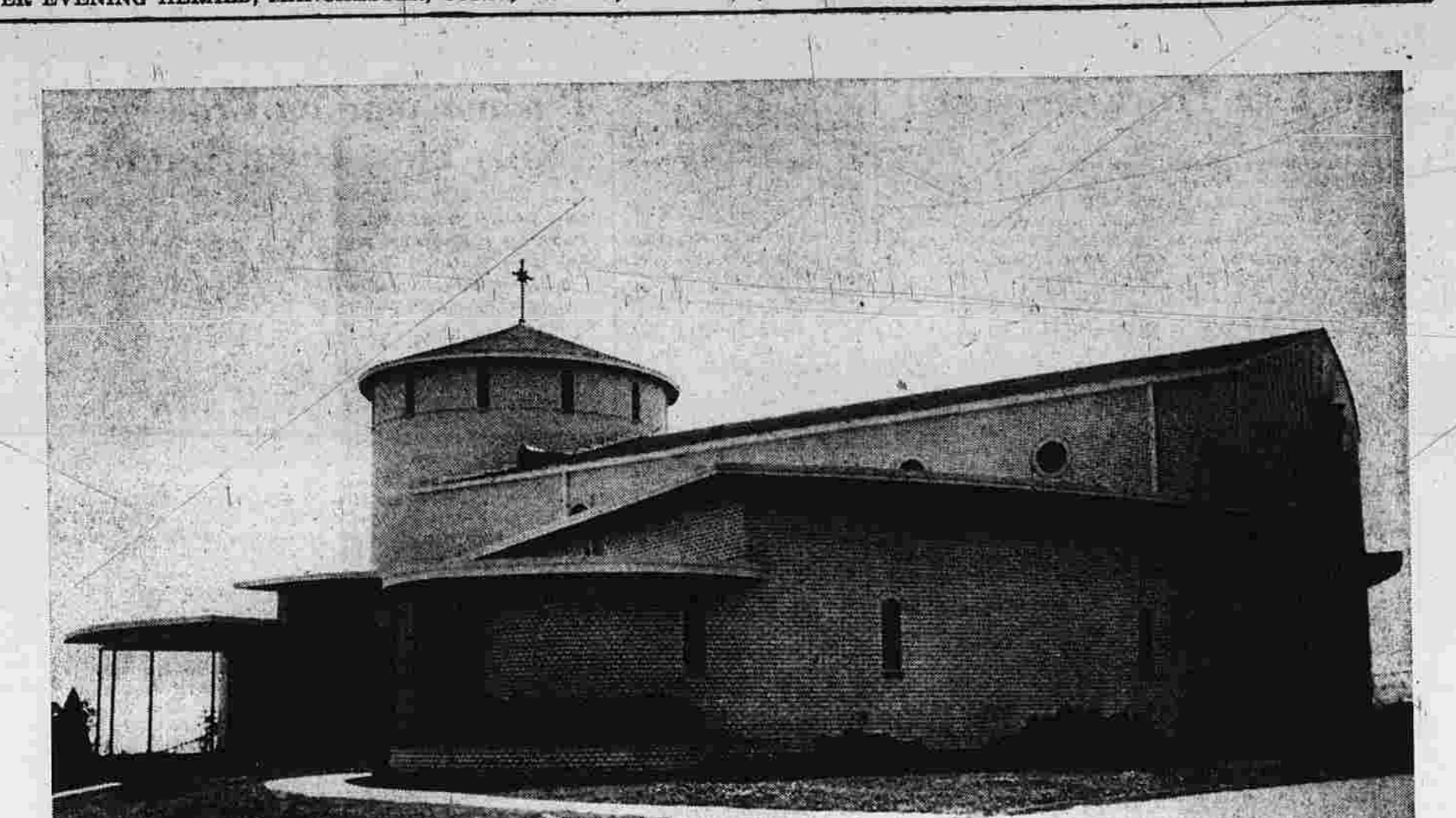

Hurricane Seeding Attempt Canceled

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—A history-making attempt to tame the fury of Hurricane Faith was canceled today as the storm lumbered relentlessly toward the southeastern Bahamas.

The storm churned toward the west-northwest on a path parallel to—but 150 miles south—of a well-shaped area where scientists had hoped to bomb her eyes with silver iodide to prove that man can conquer one of nature's mightiest forces.

"Project Stormfury is canceled," said a spokesman at the National Hurricane Center. "Hundreds of scientists and technicians and a fleet of planes had stood by all week waiting for their first chance in three years to test their theory that heat and moisture can be artificially drawn from hurricanes, wrecking their structure."

Hurricane Faith, not as strong as once feared, spun north of Puerto Rico, leaving little more than high tides and occasional gales in her wake.

At 5 a.m. her dead-center was 180 miles north-northwest of San Juan, P.R., or about 900 miles east-southeast of Miami, and whipping ahead at 15 miles an hour.

Peak winds near the center were estimated at 85 m.p.h., but Gordon Dunn, chief of the National Hurricane Center, said he believed the storm barely mustered enough strength to be called a hurricane.

56 Arrested At 3 Tracks

NEW YORK (AP)—Detectives and state police handed subpoenas to 56 drivers, track officials and gamblers Friday night to appear at a surprise grand jury investigation of Yonkers, Roosevelt and Monticello harness tracks.

Subpoenas were presented to the racing secretaries of the three tracks and to 26 drivers. Some were served in the paddock area of Yonkers Raceway just after the evening program began.

Market in Worst Drop Since 1962

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market took another plunging lunge this week, its worst decline since the big plunge of spring 1962.

The market which was heading for the fabulous goal of "Dow 100" in early February now was said to be heading for around 700 in the Dow Jones industrial average.

By the end of the week the Dow industrials had fallen another 24.06 points, closing at 700.19, their lowest reading since Jan. 21, 1964.

The Associated Press average of 80 stocks fell 8.9 to 292.1, their lowest figure since Nov. 26, 1963, when they closed at 279.4.

The 200 points that the Dow industrials lost in the spring of 1962 was now exceeded. The average had plunged 233.58 points since it reached its record high of 936.15 last Feb. 9. At that time, no reasonable observer would deny that "Dow 1,000" was only a matter of time. Now, the gradual upward progress of more than two years had been wiped out.

For example, a share of American Telephone & Telegraph common—the most widely held stock—which cost \$62.50 on Feb. 9, closed Friday at \$45.75.

Scientists Say Moon Is Bulging

WASHINGTON (AP)—The moon isn't round at all, report space scientists. It bulges.

Spoken said data accumulated thus far indicates there is a quarter-mile bulge at the moon's north pole and a quarter-mile depression at the south pole.

Strikes Hit Fuel Depots; No Jets Lost

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—American warplanes pounded North Viet Nam yesterday with the greatest number of missions of the war, the U.S. command announced today.

The command said no U.S. planes were hit in heavy raids, the second time this week. American pilots set a record for strike missions.

It said U.S. pilots, hitting fuel depots and other military targets, flew a record 156 missions, 10 above the previous high that was reached only last Wednesday. U.S. planes hammered the Communist north with 138 missions Thursday.

In Friday's record assault, more than 300 transportation trucks and other military targets were hit by bombs and rockets. The greatest number of strikes were attacked by Navy pilots who flew 73 of the missions.

An Air Force spokesman said Air Force jets attacks touched off more than 30 secondary explosions and 38 fires in an supply storage areas, convoy staging points and fuel dumps in the southern peninsula of North Viet Nam.

Earlier reports said U.S. planes had dropped one out of 40 bombs near Thanh Hoa. Around U.S. Marines beat off an attack by hordes of Red soldiers and other forces who demoralized some of the Marines fought the enemy hand-to-hand from their positions.

Reports from the field indicated that the enemy had possibly 50 of the North Vietnamese fighters while taking light casualties in a three-hour battle Friday at Cam Lo. The Marine tank and artillery position, firing support for the Marines, held.

The town ordinance that requires permits for parades was lifted for King's planned march, suburb of Cicero.

King presented the program to a virtually trainless week-long strike until Monday, when Parliament met in special session to try to get the trains rolling.

Canadians to Face Trainless Weekend

OTTAWA (AP)—Canadian rail workers and U.S. customers had enough supplies on hand to last 10 to 15 days.

A spokesman for International Nickel Co. of Canada Ltd., the world's largest nickel producer and Canada's largest copper producer, said there "was bound to be some delays in delivery," he said.

The strike was called by four unions representing 118,000 employees of eight railroads serving nearly 80,000 miles of track. Eleven smaller railroads are unaffected.

The striking workers, who earn an average of \$2.23 an hour, are seeking wage increases averaging 30 per cent and have rejected a wage settlement of 18 per cent over two years, as recommended by three different conciliation boards.

Union representatives met Friday with the two major railroads—the government-owned Canadian National Railway and the privately owned Canadian Pacific—for the first time across a bargaining table in five months.

Labor Minister John R. Nicholson said after the meetings that the railroads are in a financial bind which prevented any progress on the wage issue. But he said the fringe benefits question had been eased.

The government has promised to unveil Monday new rail legislation which is expected to give the railroads more freedom in rate-setting and permit the abandonment of uneconomical lines and services.

Railroad freight rates have been raised since 1964. Nicholson said he will call for a new rate structure.
