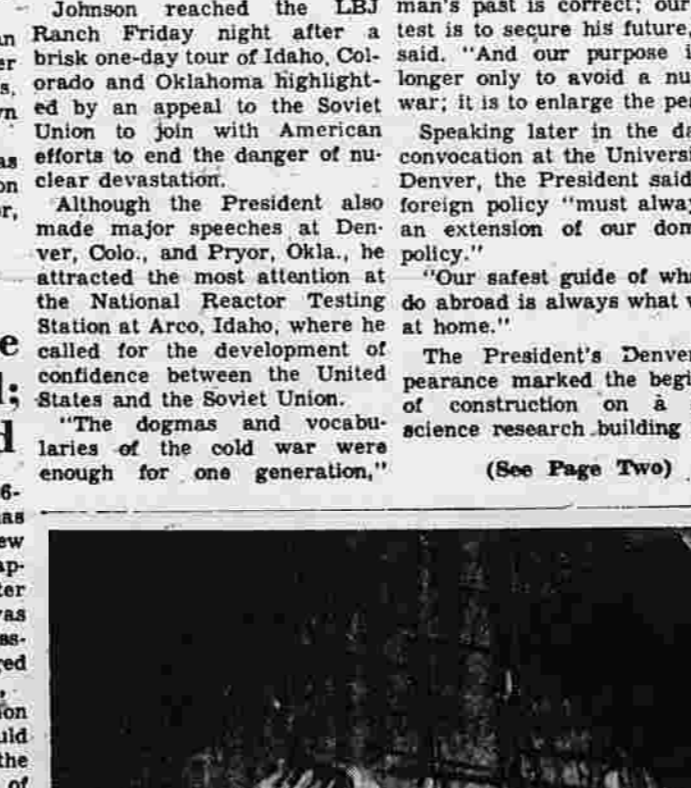
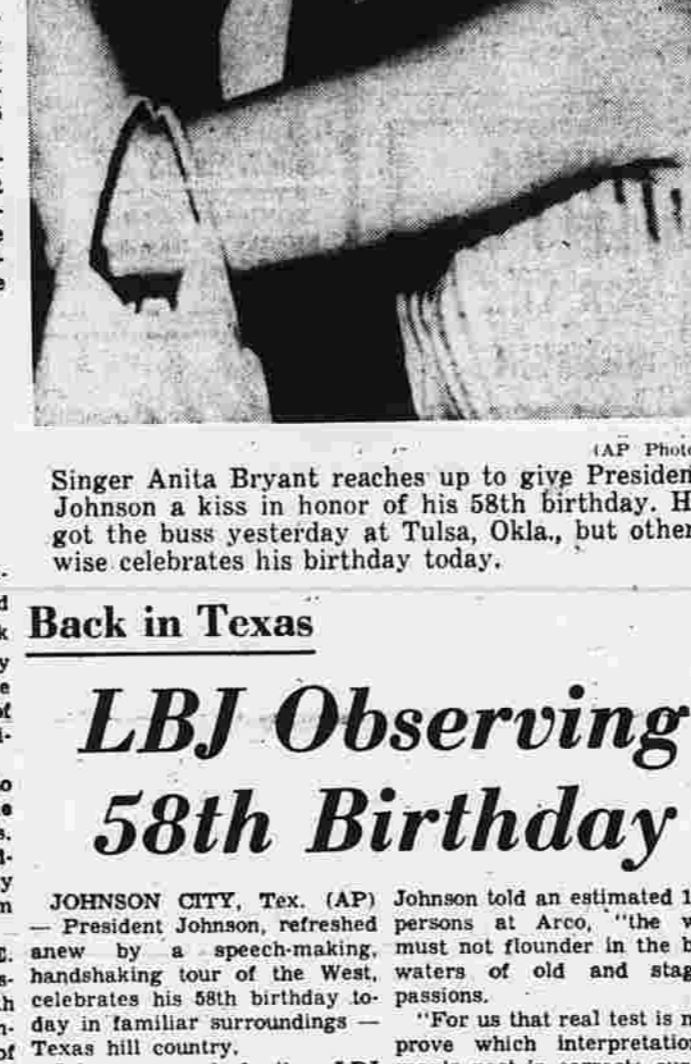

Slaying Suspect Returns To Face New Haven Court

NEW HAVEN (AP) — Arthur James Davis was in New Haven state jail this morning, awaiting a court appearance to face five counts of murder. Davis, 26, is charged with killing five persons in a New Haven apartment early Friday morning.

He was apprehended in New Jersey by police after a high-speed automobile chase Friday afternoon. Davis waived extradition, and was brought back to New Haven by detectives shortly before midnight Friday. The detectives who brought back Davis said a carbine, a pistol, and an ammunition box containing 37 carbine cartridges were found in Davis' car when it was stopped in Trenton, N.J., after a 90-mile chase.

Police said the five persons were killed with a carbine. Davis is accused of shooting the mother of his girlfriend and four others. Police said he had been trying to locate his girlfriend and had gone to her mother's apartment looking for information. Dead were Mrs. Mary McCleese, 61, and four visitors at her apartment; Mrs. Carolyn Sykes, 24 of 81 Harper St.; her son, Michael, 5; Richard Leath, 27, of 130 Essex St.; and Neal White, 27, of Dover, N.C.

The other victims of the shooting were still hospitalized this morning. Francine McCleese, 44, was reported in poor condition at Yale-New Haven Hospital with a bullet wound in her stomach, and Troy Sykes, 4, reported in satisfactory condition with a bullet wound in his chin. Police said a gouted gunman appeared at the McCleese apartment shortly after midnight. Mrs. Sykes was having her hair done by one Mrs. McCleese's daughters, Mrs. Leatrice McCleese, 26.

A Renovation with a Twist

By renovating and adding to the house originally consisted of five small rooms and a wood-burning fireplace, Mrs. Wood added to the left side of the house and a wing at the right side formerly by the dining room was converted into a family room. Besides these rooms the present layout includes a kitchen, dining room, (the former living room), and entrance hall on the first floor and two bedrooms on the second, which are in the process of being renovated.

White paneling and set-in cupboards are on the fireplace wall in the dining room. Mrs. Wood credits to Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Wood, they now have more than which has been recently redecorated. The upper half of the walls are done in a floral wallpaper, predominantly pink, and this is separated from the dining room by a chair rail. The dining room cabinet next to the fireplace and refurbished several of the original entrance way to the house.

Outside the family room is a screened-in porch where Mr. and Mrs. Wood spend most of their leisure time during the warm weather and have many of their meals.

Still in use in the kitchen, next to the family room, is an original fireplace with Dutch oven. Wood paneled cupboards are above the fireplace, and around.

It was originally, Mrs. Wood said, the top of an old parlor stove. The floor of the living room is carpeted in rose beige, and upholstered furniture is primarily in shades of soft green. The Woods most prized possession, a colored picture of Peter James Schaffey, their only grandchild, is hanging on the wall over an electric organ. He is the son of their daughter, Prudence, and her husband, Corporal Joseph Schaffey. The family lives in Puerto Rico where the organ man serves with the Navy. They are presently spending a month with the Woods.

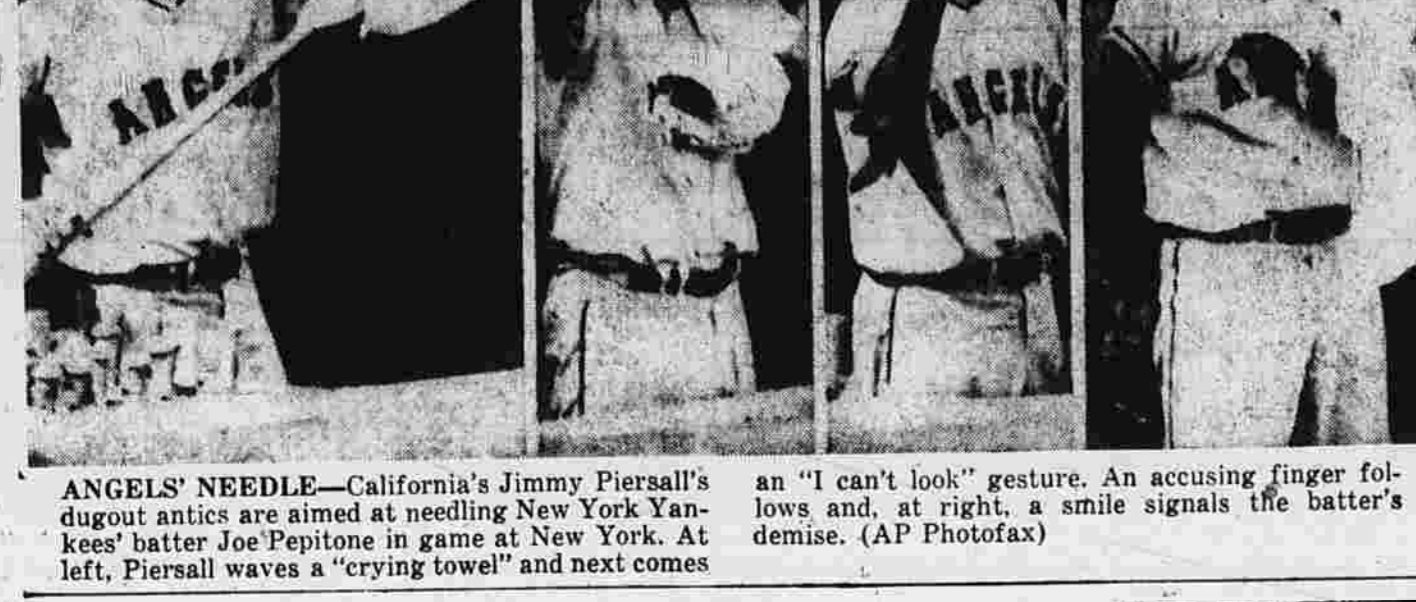

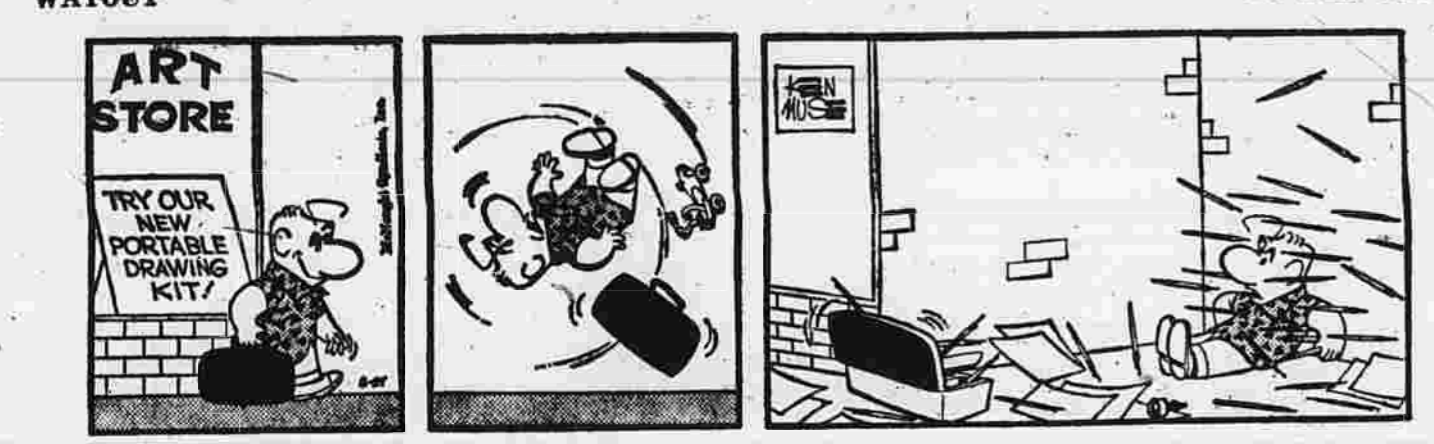

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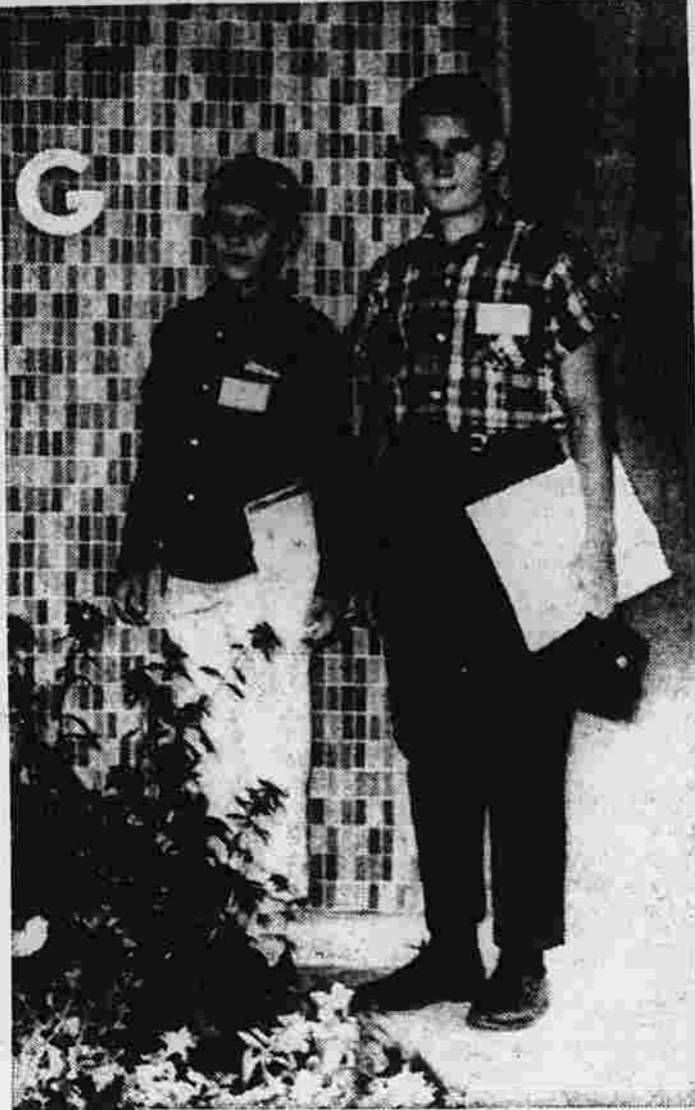

Boys Enjoy Rugged Maine

Two Herald delivery boys who won a trip to Maine because of outstanding work on their paper routes returned early this week after living with lumberjacks, observing logging and paper-making operations, and spending three days in a special wilderness camp, hiking, boating and fishing.

The boys, Richard B. Mora, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Mora of 330 Hackmatack St. and Raymond P. Fredericksen Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond P. Fredericksen of 179 Main St. attended the outing at the headquarters of the Great Northern Paper Co. at Millinocket, Maine from Aug. 17 to the 22nd.

Both boys were enthusiastic about the trip, and Mora is back working on his paper route, while Fredericksen's outing continues. When he returned from Maine, he went to the Lake of Isles Boy Scout Camp in Stonington where he is camping with the scouts.

According to the boy's father, Ray couldn't talk about anything but his Maine trip after he came back. "He really liked it a lot," the senior Fredericksen said.

The most enjoyable part of the outing, according to Mora, was the fishing he was able to do at the camp at Rainbow Lake. Here the boys spent three days, fishing from the dock at the campsite itself, and taking trips to other lakes, hiking through the woods to fish in virgin waters which abound with native trout.

The camp at Rainbow Lake is a specially built camp of 10 log cabins, situated on a small wooded peninsula which juts out into the sparkling water of the four-mile lake. The camp is used by the Great Northern Paper Co. for outstanding paper boys who become eligible to attend by becoming members of its Paul Bunyan Club.

The campsite is reached by an amphibious plane. According to Mora, after a visit with the lumberjacks, watching their logging operations, the boys traveled to a lake where a plane was waiting for them, and flew to the campsite. The trip took about 16 minutes.

When they arrived, they were given fishing rods and licenses. The following day Mora took a guided hike to another distant lake, where they fished for trout and had freshly-caught trout for lunch. Using nightcrawlers for bait, Mora caught three trout himself. The following day, he and a companion managed to land 17 trout from the boat dock at the campsite.

The trip was sponsored by The Herald and the paper company, and the boys were chaperoned on the trip by William Anderson, circulation manager of The Herald.

According to Mora, Anderson made one of the hiking trips to a distant fishing spot, but "he chickened out" from taking another hike the next day.

While spending the three days at the wilderness camp, the 21 paperboys attending saw movies in the evening—movies on fishing and films on wildlife and animals of the area. One evening a forest ranger spoke to them about a ranger's work and how rangers live in the wilds.

Mora was quite impressed by this, and said he would not mind being a ranger himself.

One of the jobs the rangers do is making lakes. They do this

with the help of beavers, which they trap in underwater traps and transport to areas where they want a lake. The beavers are then set free, build dams, and the area is flooded and a lake is made.

To emphasize the wilderness aspect of the camp on Rainbow Lake, Mora mentioned that no facilities were available for the chief symbol of civilization—TV. Electricity was provided by portable generators, but apparently the place was too distant from civilization for television reception.

The trip for Mora was educational as well as enjoyable, and he expounded at great length on how paper is made and some of the problems which paper makers run into.

On arrival at the company's headquarters, the boys visited the company's research center. Here Mora says the researchers are working on the problem presented when paper is made from hardwood. This paper, when made from hardwood, becomes brittle if stored for any length of time, and tends to shatter, making it useless. Paper made from softwood stays pliable no matter how long in storage.

At the lumber site itself, where the trees are cut, the hardwood is a problem because it cannot be transported by water. After the trees are cut, a way to transport them is to float them to the mills. Hardwood sinks and has to be carried by truck or train.

The visiting campers spent some time watching the logging operations and that night slept in the bunkhouses with the lumberjacks themselves. Most of the lumberjacks spoke only French, and lived in bunkhouses which housed about 16 men. In the morning, at breakfast with the tree cutters, the boys ate pancakes, sausage and apple pie.

The bunkhouses at the campsite are not permanent structures. As the trees in a section are depleted, the houses themselves are moved to another

area on log rollers, pushed and they trap in underwater traps

While observing the tree cutting, the watchers were all required to wear helmets to avoid being injured by any stray branch which may break loose when a tree is cut.

Apparently the days of the burly lumberjack swinging a biting axe against the tree have been replaced by modern technology. According to Mora, the lumberjacks used no axes, and cut the trees by using gasoline powered portable saws.

In a tree-cutting operation, three men are involved. One cuts the tree, another drags it by cable and machine to the stacking area, and the third one cuts the tree into small sections and stacks the stubby logs into piles of cords. Mora says that the "jacks" get paid by the amount of wood cut, receiving six dollars per cord.

While he was on his outing, Mora's route was covered by his twin sister, Bernice, who was aided by two younger brothers, Wayne and Bruce. The substitute carriers carried on with the deliveries well, and there were no complaints from customers, Mora said.

To become eligible for the trip and the Paul Bunyan Club, the young delivery boy was judged on the number of new customers he has added to the route, how he serviced them, and the length of time he has had the route.

Delivering The Herald has been a tradition in the Mora family for some time. Richard has been servicing the route for over three years, and he took it over from his brother, John, who is now 19 and serving in Vietnam with the Army.

This is the second trip young Mora has earned in a contest for the paper. In June he attended a baseball game at Fenway Park in Boston to see a Red Sox baseball game. He remembers the date well, June 5, because this day was also his birthday.

This is the first time that The Herald has sponsored this specific trip, and Mora says he will be competing again next year because he would certainly like to go again.

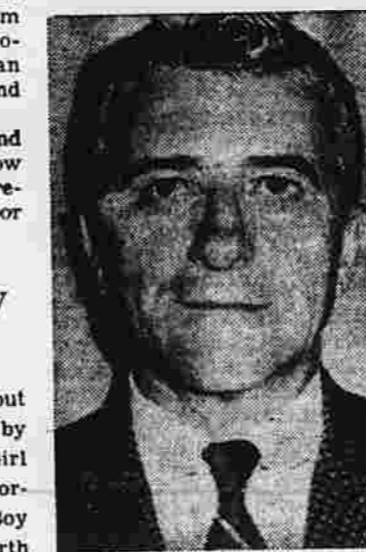
Sales jumped 13 per cent, with a gain of \$6,425,260 over the \$48,054,298 registered a year ago.

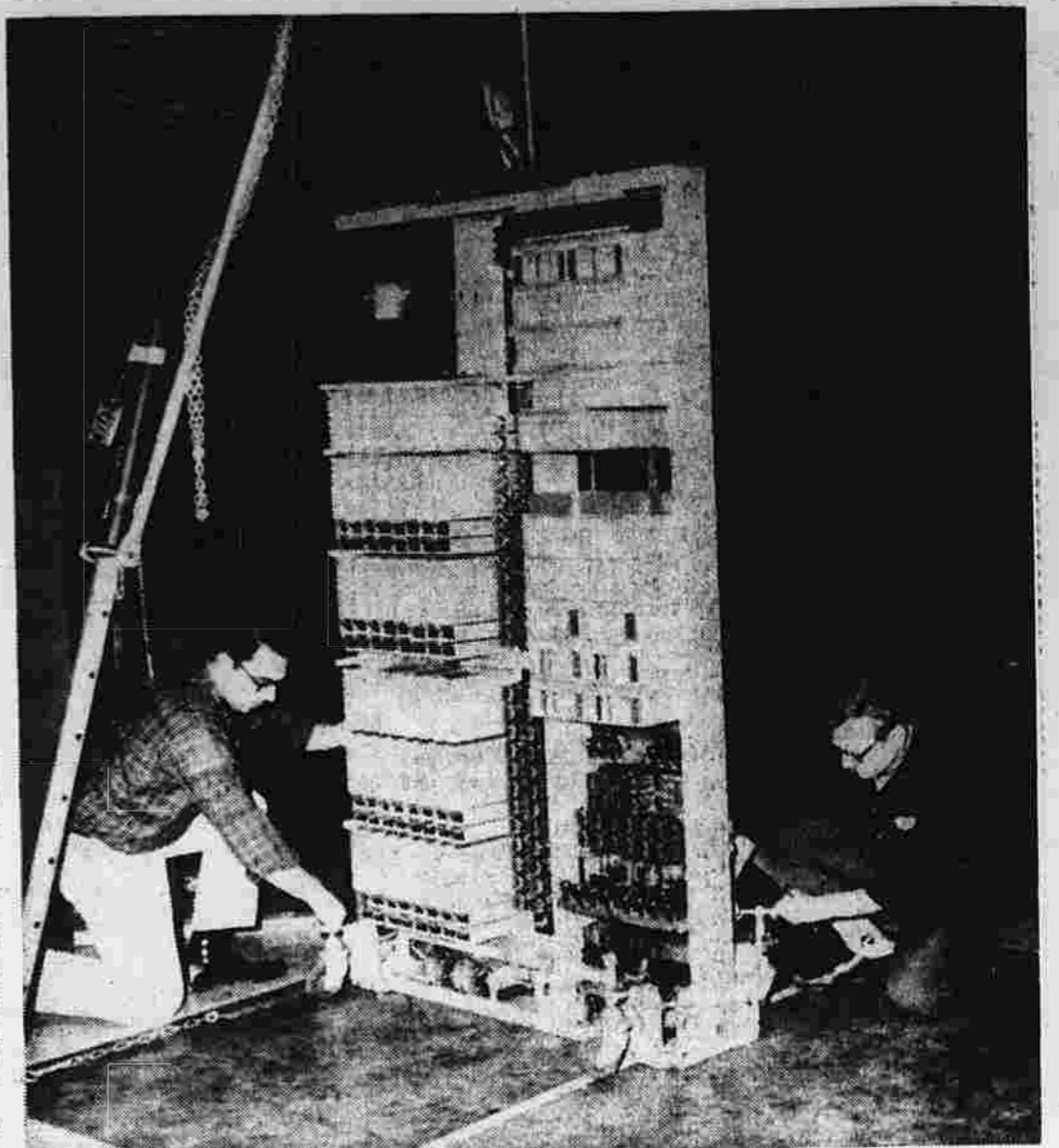

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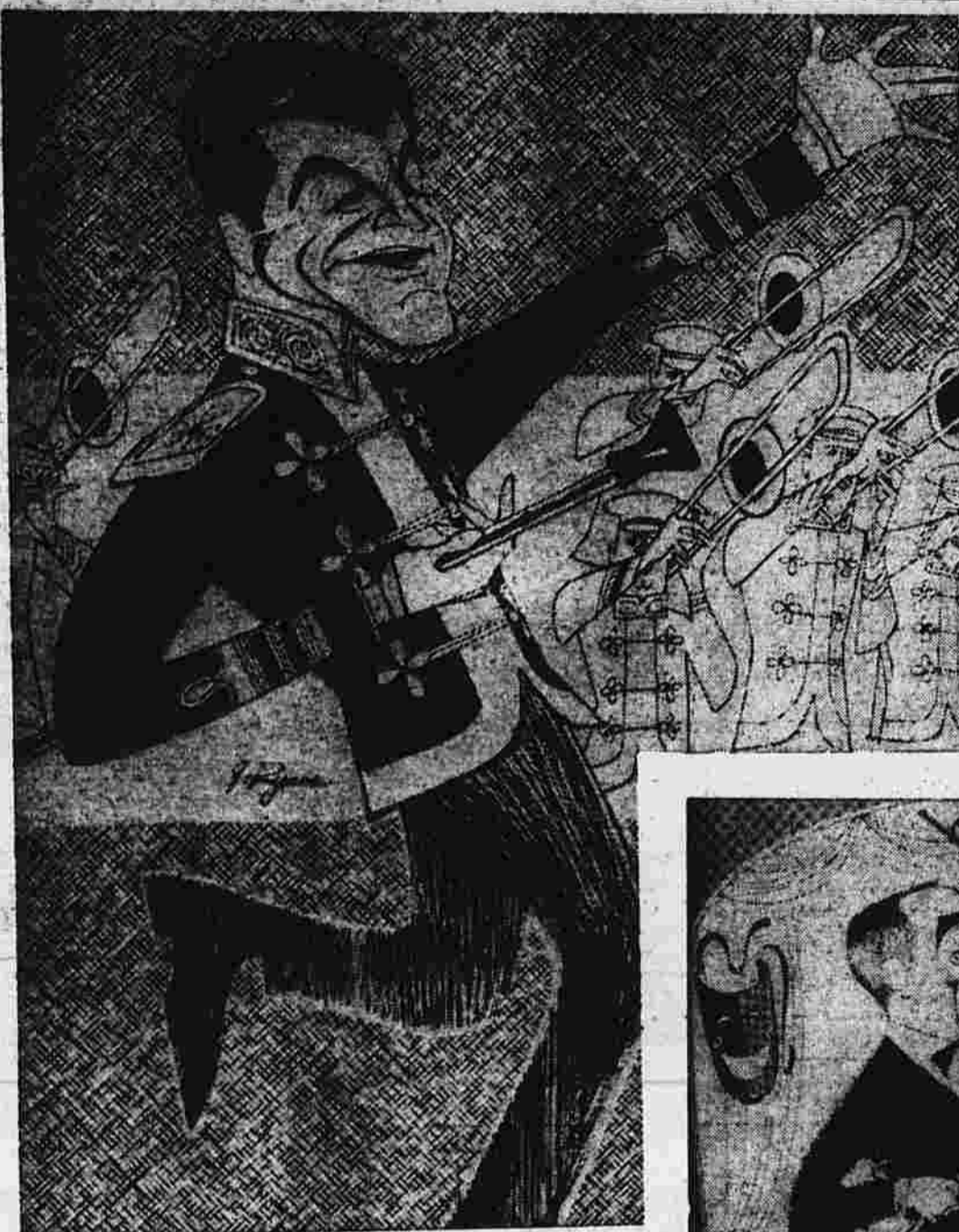

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Television producers, like custom tailors, usually can turn out anything a client orders, but the remodeling a planned evening soap opera called "Men vs. Evil" into a forthright police action show called "Felony Squad" must have taxed even broadcasting's most flexible writers.

The project started at a time when the success of "Peyton Place" was persuading packagers that its serial form was the hottest thing on the channels.

"Some guy called and asked if I'd be interested in a project like 'Peyton Place' but built around a police department," recalled actor Ben Alexander, the unforgettable Officer Frank Smith through eight seasons of "Dragnet."

Alexander, an off-hand type who seems able to squeeze all sorts of extra activities in and

around his basic occupations of running a string of automobile agencies and a chain of funeral parlors, said sure, although he raised an eyebrow even then at the kick-off situation: a police captain with a wife who has taken to drinking when her young daughter becomes seriously involved with the chief's son.

"Peyton Place" did not start a trend, and ultimately the sudsy aspects of "Men vs. Evil" were cut out along with the women's roles. Eventually it evolved as a straight series about a police sergeant, Howard Duff, and a young cop and his father, Alexander, a veteran policeman. The show went through a tortured period of title changes, from "The Force," to "The Heavy Squad," and finally, "Felony Squad." It will be launched on ABC's Tuesday night schedule in about a fortnight.

"I play the same kind of guy that I was in 'Dragnet,'" Alexander said, "except that this time I'm in uniform. I think we're pulling together a good, old-fashioned police action story, and maybe it's about time for one."

Alexander, who developed from a successful child actor into an extremely successful business man, may be the world's champion commuter. He and his family live in Hawaii. Under normal circumstances he flies between home and San Francisco on a weekly basis. In addition to his automobile and mortuary businesses — he is a licensed embalmer — he has his own daily San Francisco TV show, sponsored by his automobile agency for which he does the commercials.

'Get Smart' Readies More Catch Phrases

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The life of a catch phrase, whether it is the long departed "Wanna buy a duck?" or the contemporary "Holy wonder boy!" is mercifully short.

Two of them, which swept the country on a television tide, should be about in their final stages now, worn out from over use. But at this moment, it is hard to have a gas tank filled without the attendant asking, "Would you believe 10 gallons?" or to witness a minor mishap, like a sloshed cup of coffee, without the spiller exclaiming "Sorry about that."

Nothing delights an advertiser more than having his commercials become the subject of comment. And nothing pleases a television producer or star more than when his show's trademark is caught up by the public.

Last season, NBC's "Get Smart" kicked off both of these now trite lines, usually delivered in an attempted imitation of star Don Adams' clipped nasal twang.

The show's writers have two fresh Smart-isms warming up:

"I hope I'm not out of line," and, "Missed it by that much." Neither looks irresistible in cold print, but nobody can predict what odd phrase will be given a whirl by the public.

The secret agent spoof was such a hit that nobody concerned is interested in fooling around with the show's format in its second season.

It will continue to abound with communications gimmicks, a new one being a telephone disguised as a burning log in a fireplace, plus the usual radios in rings, TV sets in brief cases and poison-gas compacts.

In line with the current rush to peacock hues, the show's guns will be color-coordinated to match the star's clothes.

One agent, Victor French, who played the fellow who was always hiding in clocks and other tight places, dropped out of the show for a continuing part in a new series, "The Hero." He will be replaced by Agent 13, a comedian named Dave Ketchum, whose specialty is surveillance from the interiors of

Navy, are the Gemini 11 astronauts. They will attempt to perform the quickest rendezvous and docking experiment of the Project Gemini series when they try to catch and link-up with the Agena 11 target vehicle approximately one hour and 30 minutes after blast-off of the Gemini 11 capsule.

The history of China from the 1930's to the present will be traced in a two-part series, "War in China" and "The Fall of China" on CBS' "The Twentieth Century" next month.

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
