Filter Report

WASHINGTON (AP) -Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, chairman of the Senate Commerce Committee, urged the Federal Trade Commission today to investigate a cancer researcher's report that certain filter cigarettes have more tar and nicotine than the same brands' nonfilter cigarettes.

Magnuson noted in statement a report made public by Dr. George E. Moore, director of New York's State's Cancer Research Center.

Moore's report, Magnuson said, singled out Pall Mall and Chesterfields. He reported in his tests that Pall Mall filters vielded milligrams of tar, Pall Mall nonfilters, 32.7; Chesterfield filters 27.6 milligrams, plain Chesterfields 27.0 milligrams.

Magnuson had introduced legislation to require cigarette packages and advertisements to state tar and nicotine contents.
