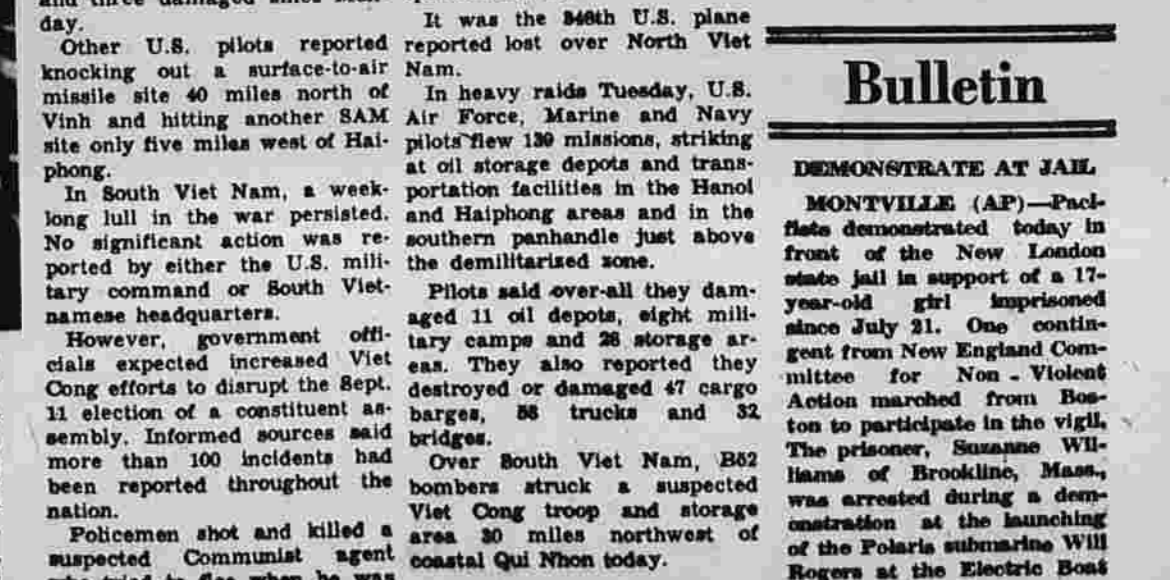

Hurricane's Movements Thwart Seeding Attempt

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Hurricane Faith roared in the open ocean today on a path that denied scientists another extensive and delicate attempt to disperse her. Faith veered sharply to the east and slipped into the target area for seeding, scientists hailed plans of Project Stormfury to tame her wild 120-mile-an-hour winds by bombarding her with silver iodide crystals. Forecasters continued to predict a northwesterly or northerly course for the season's sixth tropical storm. That would mean that anxious scientists will have to wait for another hurricane to carry out the plan. Advisories throughout Tuesday at 11 p.m. Hurricane Faith center was located by reconnaissance aircraft about 430 miles east of Cape Kennedy, Fla. However, she posed no danger to the missile complex at Cape Kennedy. "She is too far out in the ocean and is not heading toward the Cape," Forecasters Raymond Kraft said. Her main threat was to small craft along the South Atlantic Coast, around Bermuda and the northern Bahamas. Mariners in those areas were warned not to venture far from shore. Besides a 120-mile-an-hour wind, Faith carried early rain in the form of a heavy rain band 400 miles long. The seeding experiment was touch-and-go until Faith established a definite path. After she had zig-zagged east of the Bahamas for three days, Faith spun to the west and fell 50 miles short from the edge of the safe zone. The same zone was a huge area north of Puerto Rico and east of the Bahamas. There, scientists said, the storm would be at least 36 hours away from land just in case she did not integrate as hoped. The multimillion-dollar project is based on the assumption that silver iodide will drain heat and moisture from a hurricane, draining it of its strength.

Running, Bike Riding Seen Heart Attack Preventatives
DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — Perhaps the best way to avert a heart attack — or to survive one — is to run miles each day. That's the opinion of a 51-year-old heart specialist who practices what he preaches. He says that physical inactivity is related to coronary trouble. But I believe that it is," he said. He adds that one reason why American women suffer fewer heart attacks than their white-collar husbands is possibly that they are much more active doing housework and looking after children. Dr. Chapman, who smokes an occasional filter cigarette, is a professor of medicine at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School at Dallas. He is immediate past president of the American Heart Association. Dr. Chapman has been running regularly for 13 years, and he plans to continue indefinitely. He makes the point that such exercise must be done daily or at least four or five times a week to be effective. "Heavy exercise taken sporadically, or only once in a while, could do more harm than good" by sudden overloads on a flabby heart. The key, then, to treating a heart attack patient is what he calls "carefully graduated activity." After a patient is able to get out of bed, Dr. Chapman has him walk a mile or two a day. This is stepped up to slow running or jogging a mile in the morning and a mile in the evening. If all goes well, the patient gets into the routine in time of running, walking or riding a bicycle four or five miles a day. "The important thing is a program of sensible stress on the circulatory system." He said he began thinking about a possible correlation between inactivity and heart trouble when he learned that the death rate in the United States from coronary problems is five or six times what it is in Sweden, where people are considerably more active. His thinking was spurred on by a study he read of in London, which said conductors on the double-deck buses have significantly less heart trouble

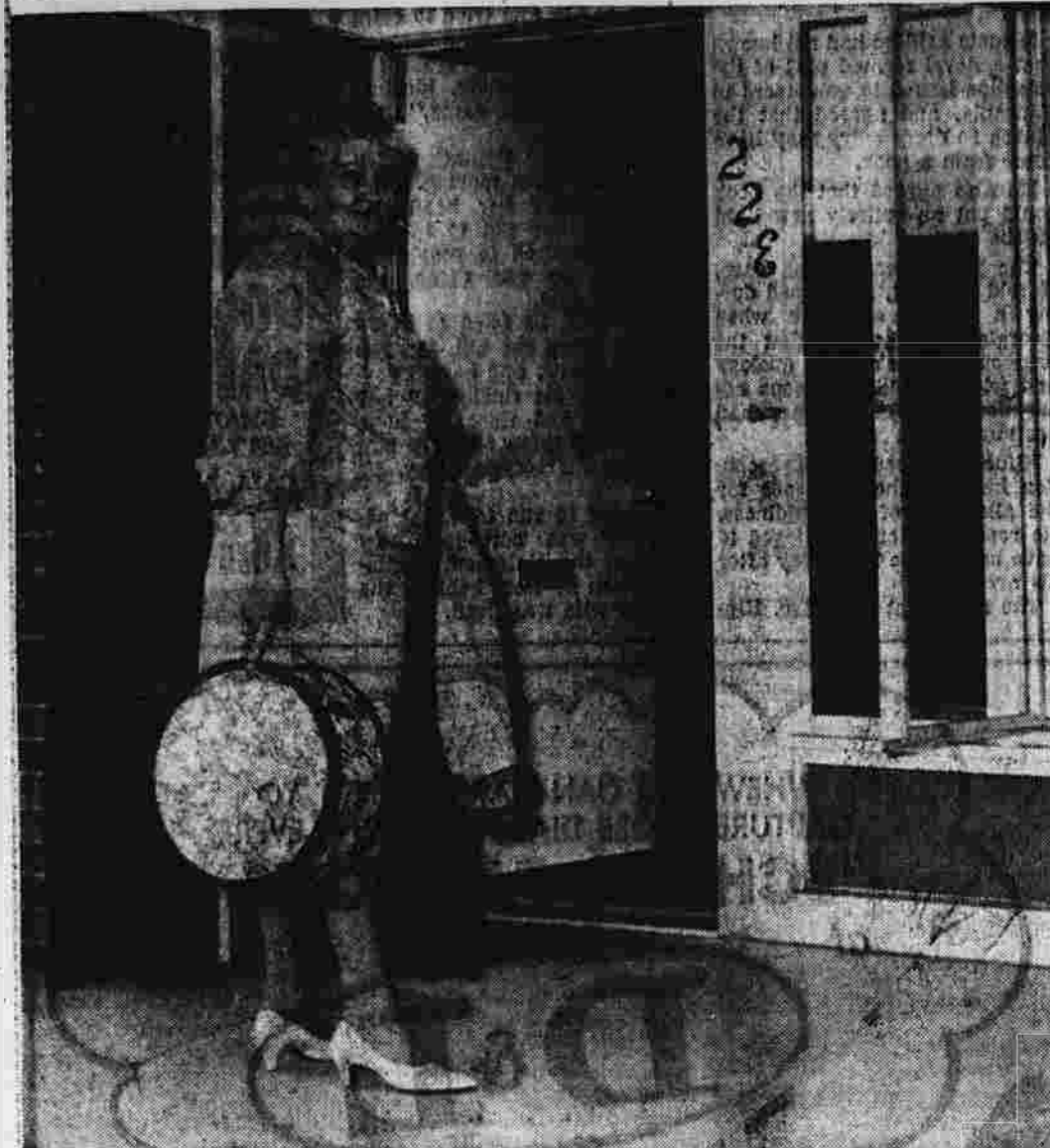

 most highly efficient citizen army on
 earth."

These are all excerpts from Defense
 Secretary Robert S. McNamara's recent
 discussion of his proposition for having
 the Army take in and "salvage" some
 100,000 young Americans a year who
 are now rejected because of physical or
 educational deficiencies.
 This is obviously a well-intentioned
 program.
 But it was a very fortunate circum-
 stance, we should say, that Defense
 Secretary McNamara, rather early in
 his discussion, did establish the fact that
 he was talking about "human beings."
 Otherwise, one might have deduced,
 from the context, that he was talking
 about accumulations of isotopes, or
 cylinder heads, or bags of sand.

Some Croquet Whole World Over
 The first venture into international
 croquet happens to have ended in a
 smashing defeat for the Long Island
 challengers who went over and con-
 fronted some British players on their
 own lawn. But, as one so often ob-
 serves in such matters, it was not the
 victory or defeat which mattered so
 much. What mattered was the way the
 game was played.

In that respect, it was a satisfactory
 encounter, which might have been
 judged worthy of, and equal to, the tra-
 ditional and somewhat of the game
 as it used to be played, here in Manches-
 ter, in those famous encounters in the
 lot behind Gibson's Garage, on the south
 corner of Summit St. and East Middle
 Turnpike, and alongside the Spruce St.
 Firehouse.

As it was in these famous playing
 fields of Manchester, so was it over on
 the lawns of England the other day.
 The pattern of nasty croquet is prac-
 tically the same, the whole world over.
 First, of course, there is the imposition,
 by the home team, of some court rules
 which are fantastically different from
 those which obtain anywhere else.

Second, once the strange laws have
 been imposed, there is nevertheless con-
 tinual but always infinitely polite dispu-
 tation over the application of such rules
 to each individual situation as it pre-
 sents itself in the course of play.

Third, there is an occasional reliance
 on kibitzers. Those of us who happened
 to watch a bit of the matches in Brit-
 ain on television the other night realized
 that we were never, in our playing ex-
 perience, ever called upon to face
 kibitzers of such formidable jowl and
 devastating tongue as the monster the
 British had on the sidelines to give the
 American players a continual inferiority
 complex.

Generally speaking, however, the
 match over in Britain seemed well up to
 the standard of those which used to be
 staged right here in Manchester. To
 tell the truth, there isn't much in the
 way of competition device which one top
 notch croquet player can tell another
 anywhere.

If there was one disappointment in
 this first internationalization of the
 game, it was that all of the players
 seemed still wedded to the old-style two-
 handed straddle-the-ball grip which
 ought always to have a parasol being
 held over it. Those of us who have spent
 our lifetimes trying to propagate the
 superior test and excitement and skills
 of the one-handed grip, with the ball
 played off the left foot, are still a long
 way from home.

The Big Handshake

Shaking hands like a pro doesn't
 sound difficult, but it is an art born of
 experience.
 E. Clayton Gengras, who has become
 just plain Clay in his quest for the
 governor's chair, has now reversed his
 field and from all reports is mastering
 the tricky business of extending the
 hand with gusto.

At the start, there were reports that
 the Gengras palm-grabbing technique
 was pretty halfhearted—one political writ-
 er even reported it in terms of a disas-
 ter—but now the Gengras campaign
 seems to be rolling in this department.
 too.

The Republican candidate is up
 against the handshake of them all in
 Governor John Dempsey. When the af-
 fable governor enters a room or an of-
 fice, the mere flick of an eyelid is
 taken as a gesture of recognition, and
 before the individual can say Tipperary,
 his hand is firmly and pleasantly en-
 cased in the governor's hand. That's
 really all there is to it, but it takes
 a certain amount of practice. — MIDDLE-
 TOWN PRESS

WASHINGTON — Sen. Robert F. Kennedy and his closest political lieutenants are now deeply mulling over a decision to campaign for the Democratic nomination on the New York state and perhaps of the entire nation.
 That decision is whether to say yes or no to a confidential request by Frank O'Connor, who soon will become the Democratic nominee for Governor, that Kennedy brother-in-law and chief political aide Stephen Smith become O'Connor's campaign manager.
 Although both sides are mum, the request has been pending for nearly two weeks. Implicitly, it is nothing less than O'Connor's asking the entire well-oiled Kennedy political apparatus to handle his campaign against Republican Gov. Nelson Rockefeller's third term bid. If O'Connor were elected Governor in a Kennedy-run campaign, the Senator then would be assured of a trustworthy ally in Albany, come what may in national politics.
 Smith has informed the O'Connor camp there can be no decision until the state Democratic convention in Buffalo next Wednesday and Thursday (Sept. 7 and 8) officially nominates O'Connor. Yet the odds must be rated as something less than 50-50 that the answer will be yes.
 If Smith does decline the request, and O'Connor goes on to beat Rockefeller without Kennedy's maximum help, the bifurcation of New York Democrats into Kennedy and O'Connor poles will be certain. A separate O'Connor pole in New York would give no little pleasure to both President Johnson and Vice President Humphrey.
 This is clearly not what O'Connor wants. Although Kennedy would have preferred stopping O'Connor for the nomination had he found a candidate capable of doing it, O'Connor sought to close old wounds on Friday, Aug. 19, on that day he telephoned Kennedy and requested Smith's services as campaign manager.
 The result was a conference over cocktails in a private apartment of the Waldorf Towers in Manhattan the evening of Tuesday, August 23. Present for Kennedy were Smith and William Van Den Heuvel, a Kennedy intimate. O'Connor was there accompanied by his key staff and producer — playwright Dore Schary, co-chairman of his Citizens' Committee.
 O'Connor and Smith had a pleasant five-minute chat. O'Connor then left while the others got down to the hard business at hand.
 It was soon made clear that O'Connor's staff wanted not only Steve Smith as campaign manager but the whole Kennedy operation. They talked about getting the speechwriting talents of William Huddell and Milton Gwirtzman, longtime Kennedy operatives. They wanted to renege on the Manhattan advertising firm of Papert, Koenig, Lois, Inc., which has close ties to the 1964 Senate campaign.
 The response from Smith and Van Den Heuvel was not encouraging, though not a definite refusal. They commented that it would not be proper for the Senator to intervene with the advertising firm. They asserted that Huddell and Gwirtzman

statement was taken out of the context in which it was given. And I have testified before two congressional hearings to that effect."

In his formal statement, Sylvester said the public affairs policy of the Department of Defense as it relates to Vietnam is based on two principles:

1. The safety of our fighting forces, which, of course, relates directly to the safeguarding of information of value to the enemy.

Convict Hess May Become Last Nazi in Spandau Jail

BERLIN (AP) — Each day, in which he always was in Rudolf Hess knows he is 24 treated, even the encyclopedias, hours closer to the end of September and the day when he may become the sole inmate of the cavernous Spandau jail.

It is not freed or moved, he will be the last Nazi held captive in the 19th century military prison built for 600 men.

At 72, Hess no longer is the darkly handsome deputy leader of Adolf Hitler who studied with the Nazis to the pinnacles of power in Germany in the 1930s. He has become an old man with 26 years imprisonment behind him, dating from the day he made his startling 1941 flight to Nazi-occupied Scotland. Von Schirach wears No. 1 stamped on both knees and the back of his brown corduroy prison uniform. Speer is No. 6, Hess No. 7. Klaus von Schirach, the eldest of four sons of the late Von Schirach and his now divorced wife, knows of no plans his father has made for freedom.

Speer is expected to resume his career as an architect. He has tried to keep his name in the field while in prison. His son, Albert Jr., is a well-known figure in the Protestant church. His father had gained a reputation before becoming a top Nazi. At they have 20 years, their three live exactly according to a schedule, watched over by a permanent staff of guards, examined regularly by four-power doctors and cooked for by a permanent staff of workers alternately with food made available by U.S., British, French or Soviet authorities.

Each of the men has a small single cell with a wooden door, a small window high in one wall. Spare furniture includes a bed, a table, a chair and a lavatory.

Said one source who has seen Hess recently and who saw him in a small window high in one wall. "If he got out, at his age, after all this time in prison, with about 150 friends and relatives of the four nations rotate monthly to guard it."

"They wanted Hess executed at Nuremberg. After great wartime suffering, the Russians are unlikely to forgive and forget in the case of a man who was a top Hitler aide."

One authoritative source gave this description of Hess today: "Hess gives the appearance of being listless as he has for years, and is especially a loner, although he has had two younger men go out of their way to help Hess, for example, making his bed or reacting to clean his cell when he does not feel well."

There have been times when he lay moaning in his cell, due to real or imagined stomach troubles, but that has ceased. "He is about 6 feet tall, but stooped, weighs about 160 pounds, still has the dark bushy eyebrows and a deep-set, piercing blue eyes that were perhaps his best known physical characteristics. He has a thin nose slightly. His hair is iron gray. Like Von Schirach and Speer, he speaks English, but not so well as the other two. Vernon: Geer Firm Awarded Police Radio Contract

The contract for servicing the Vernon Police Department radio equipment has been awarded to Geer Electronics of Manchester. Geer's was one of two bids received.

The other bid was from Motorola. Bids were opened Tuesday morning in the office of director of administration, Jay Killinger.

The specifications were put out on a 10-month basis and a 13-month basis.

Geer bid \$1,800 for the 10-month proposal and \$1,440 for the 13-month, and Motorola, \$1,440 for the ten and \$1,700 for the twelve. The contract was awarded for the 10-month period.

The 10-month contract was decided upon so its termination would come at the end of the fiscal year, June 30. It will be in effect as of Sept. 1.

Killinger said the proposal is a straight service agreement for the maintenance of the present equipment which would include supplying of any needed parts during the term of the contract in effect and will also include the changeover of equipment into the new police cruisers which are on order and due to arrive within the next few weeks.

The department has seven cruisers. The contract will also include servicing the equipment at the base station, the portable equipment, the walkie-talkies used by the patrolmen, and the other electronic equipment on the cruisers such as the emergency lights and the siren.

The original proposal made by Geer was for a three-year contract which would include the installation of new equipment. Most of the radios are about 10 years old, according to Police Chief George Trapp.

Trapp said about \$1,800 was spent during the past fiscal year for servicing the equipment and in the past two years, about \$3,200.

Killinger noted the installation of the new equipment by the contractor would pose many problems at the end of the contract period. The equipment would belong to Geer and not to the town and if the contract arrangement in getting rid of scrap should turn out unsatisfactory, the town would end up having to purchase seven new radios and pay to have them installed.

Also involved in the decision not to purchase the new equipment was the fact that some of the cost has been paid by the civil defense. The new contract was based on recommendations made by Chief Trapp.

Farm Prices Up
WASHINGTON (AP)—Farm product prices increased by 2 per cent between mid-July and mid-August, reports the Agriculture Department.

The price rise was led by beans in the prices of hogs, wholesale milk, eggs and cattle, although sharply lower prices for corn, soybeans and cotton partly offset the gains, the department said Tuesday.

The latest report put current farm prices 9 per cent above the August 1965 level.

The department also said that the level of prices paid by farmers for goods and services used in production and family living climbed one-third of one per cent during the same period to a new high—August 4 per cent over comparable 1965 figures.

Parcel Post Hike
WASHINGTON (AP)—The House has passed and sent to President Johnson a bill that would increase rates and package sizes for parcel post.

Packages now are limited to 20 pounds and 72 inches in combined length and girth for first-class offices 100 miles or more apart.

The new bill provides that by next July 1 the weight limit would go to 25 pounds, a year later to 30 and on July 1, 1969, to 40 pounds. The measurement limit would be increased to 78 inches in 1970 and to 84 inches in 1971.

At smaller post offices, the present limits of 10 pounds and 100 inches would be retained.

The new bill also would put into effect by next July 1 rate increases averaging about eight cents a parcel.

Javits, Kuchel Confident GOP Will Be Strengthened

WASHINGTON (AP)—Two GOP senators expressed confidence today that Republican moderates will increase their party strength as a result of the November election.

Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., and Thomas H. Kuchel, R-Calif., said in separate interviews they do not believe the outlook is quite as gloomy as it was painted in a report of the Council of Republican Organizations.

The CRO, representing 10 progressive organizations, said Tuesday night that with things going as they are Barry Goldwater might be right in predicting that party conservatives will control the 1968 GOP convention, just as they did in 1964.

The CRO said that moderates are leaders, lack financing and are being silenced by party "unity" efforts on the part of National Chairman Ray C. Bliss and Richard M. Nixon, the 1960 GOP presidential nominee who may try again.

"We are just coming on the season when something can be done to restore moderate control of the party," Javits said. He added that the necessary preliminary to this "is to elect to the state legislature some Republicans moderates to the state race."

At Gettysburg, Pa., former President Dwight D. Eisenhower spent a half an hour Tuesday discussing domestic and foreign issues with GOP candidates.

Among those who attended the brief seminar were Howard W. Baker Jr., Tennessee senatorial nominee; Sen. Robert P. Griffin, seeking an elective term in Michigan, and state Sen. Dewey Bartlett, nominee for governor in Oklahoma.

"The Republican party will start winning elections again when it faces up to the problems of the 20th Century and advocates sensible solutions that appeal to the majority of Americans," he said.

"The party certainly has room for genuine conservatives but it has no room for reactionaries who oppose every single attempt to solve the problems of the people."

The CRO said conservatives already have started "national promotion" for Ronald Reagan, GOP candidate for governor in California, as a potential 1968 presidential nominee. Kuchel has yet to say whether he is inclined to support Reagan in his state race.

Missile-Minded Schriever Retiring from Air Force

WASHINGTON (AP)—Gen. Bernard A. Schriever, who staked his Air Force career on the belief that missiles rather than bombers were the weapons of the future, retires today.

A special review and a flyby of 19 aircraft were scheduled in his honor.

The success of Schriever's fight for missiles, begun when he was an obscure colonel in the early 1960s, is reflected in the Air Force's Command, the multibillion dollar research program he has headed since 1958.

It also is reflected in the rocket-like rise in rank that brought Schriever from colonel to four-star general in seven years.

Until 1962, Schriever recalled recently, "I had been more interested in big bombers as a deterrent force. Then the picture changed, with smaller pay, less prestige, and more responsibility."

Once he became sold on missiles, Schriever campaigned for them so persistently that, one friend recalls, the Pentagon brass "thought Ben was insane."

But in 1964, when the Air Force unveiled plans to do as a civilian, Schriever was named to a research and development center on the West Coast.

Funny Cannon Scaring Birds, But People Too

MILLINGTON, N.J. (AP) — A funny looking scarecrow that goes boom every 15 minutes of the day and night does a pretty good job scaring birds and deer — but people, they're another story.

Residents of this town have had about enough of a two-foot-long cannon used by farmer Philip Barry to chase wild life from his fields.

"The dogs bark all night," one said, "the chickens get so some people lie awake waiting for the damn thing to go boom — just lying waiting for the other shoe to drop."

And go boom it does. The cannon is timed to boom automatically every 15 minutes.

In the daytime, the cannon is located near a cornfield to scare away blackbirds. At night, it's moved to a tomato and melon patch to frighten herds of deer that had fed there regularly until April 15 — the day it was installed.

The Passaic Township Committee has issued Barry a warning to "cease the operation" of your noise-making device," but he has ignored it so far.

The farmer says he was given permission to use the cannon from the New Jersey Division of Wild Fish and Game after an inspector visited his field, shook his head and said, "You've got problems."

Barry told of experiments in the past with strawman scarecrows, scarecrows that clip together and strings of flapping multicolored flags. He said none worked.

Then he hit on the cannon.

The cannon is operated with carbonated water and nitrate which build up pressure and fire off the device periodically.

Tight Money Market Slows Single-Family Construction

The existing tight mortgage-money market has apparently caught up with the construction of single-family homes in Manchester.

The town building department issued only three permits last month for that construction, compared to seven permits of the same type in August of last year.

Contractors and developers are faced with the difficulty of financing the construction of single-family homes, and are holding back until the situation eases.

Single-family-residence construction in Manchester is actually ahead of last year for the eight-month period ending today. The slowdown started only this month.

A total of 76 permits have been issued in 1966 to date, compared to 65 for the corresponding period last year.

The year 1965 wound up with 115 permits issued for the single-family dwellings. Unless the mortgage market eases, the total for this year may be less.

An average of 12 permits a month were issued during September, October, November and December of last year.

In 1964, permits were issued for 111 single-family dwellings; in 1963, for 132; in 1962, for 71; in 1961, for 119; and in 1960, for 189.

The 1950's produced a great

building boom in Manchester, with permits for that type construction averaging 230 to 250 per year.
