DON'T BE HASTY IN TAKING TRICK

Everybody knows about the hold-up play. You have a sure trick in the long suit led by the opponents, and you try to win your trick as long as you can. The only problem is to recognize that play when it wears a beard.

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**Space Chatter Data Straining Computers**

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—Unless swifter traffic handling methods are developed, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration may soon be unable to cope with the increasing amount of scientific chatter pouring to earth from America's orbiting satellites.

"We will not continue to be able to indefinitely handle the data rates from all of these satellites with yesterday's techniques," said Dr. George H. Ludwig, chief of the information processing division at Goddard Space Flight Center.

"It's a question of resources and the problem is just beginning to come to a head."

"We're on the verge of not being able to keep up with the data," Ludwig said.

Ludwig is responsible for channeling a continuing avalanche of information from some 33 orbiting unmanned spacecraft to scientists analyzing results and technicians who must keep each satellite operating properly.

Statisticians at Goddard calculate his division wades through enough data each week to produce six 20-volume sets of encyclopedias, processing 50 miles of tape shipped to Goddard from seven tracking stations.

The satellites include Orbiting Geophysical Observatories, a shuttlebug Nimbus weather satellite; sun-studying Orbiting Solar Observatories; and a number of Explorer satellites probing scientific phenomena from wide-ranging outposts in space.

"The most serious problem," Ludwig said in an interview, "is we need to do something about getting instructions to the computer and getting information out of the computer to the man that's ready to interpret it."

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**South Korea Assured**

WASHINGTON (AP)—The State Department has moved to assure the South Korean government that the United States has no plans to reduce its forces in that country.

Press officer Robert J. McCloskey denied Tuesday that there were any such plans when asked about reports from Seoul that South Korea has asked for clarification of congressional suggestions for reducing American forces in Korea.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The State Department says an incident in which U.S. planes fired on a self-defense on vessels in the Gulf of Tonkin may have been the basis for a Communist Chinese charge that U.S. planes had attacked Chinese merchant ships.

State Department press officer Robert J. McCloskey said Tuesday the Chinese charged their boats were attacked on Aug. 26, the same day U.S. officials in Saigon reported an incident involving North Vietnamese EP boats.

McCloskey said that while making an identification passes over fast-moving vessels in the Gulf of Tonkin the U.S. planes were fired upon.

"They returned the fire and according to pilots' reports one vessel was sunk," he said.

### Lung Disease Rated Fast Growing Ailment

**HEALTH SERVICE NOTE**—The fast-growing chronic disease in the United States today is emphysema, a lung disease. At the moment scientists know practically nothing about its basic cause or cause or how to reverse its effects. But the light goes on. The following is the first in a four-part series dealing with this disease.

**NEW YORK (AP)**—A young resident doctor at Bellevue Hospital stood at the bedside of a frail man in his early 60s who was obviously fighting for every breath.

"Look," said the doctor. "Here's the pinnacle of distress—and this poor guy is typical of severe cases of this kind of disease. They act like they just finished the four-minute mile run every minute of their lives."

He referred to respiratory failure—a virtual shut-off of breathing power that can be brought on by an insidious but potentially devastating and potentially lethal lung disease called emphysema.

Emphysema—pronounced em-fih-see-muh—is rated by the U.S. Public Health Service as the fastest growing crippling disease in the United States today—constituting a public health menace of potentially epidemic proportions unless somehow checked.

The malady, basic cause or cause of which remain unknown, is characterized by a so far irreversible destruction of lung tissue. This results in abnormal distention of the sponge-like lung, a loss of its wondrous elasticity, and an entrapment of life-sustaining air within it.

There's also obstruction of certain airway tubes—with the overall result that many victims can have frequent and extreme difficulty in exhaling, and even mild cases can occasionally have such difficulty upon exertion.

While the cause remains to be pinpointed, the Public Health Service, and many private physicians, contend tobacco smoking—especially cigarette smoking—and air pollution are, at the least, among the aggravating factors. Even sportsmen for the tobacco industry concede smoking may be an aggravant—but they challenge any contention it's a proven cause.

The Health Service says the malady has bedeviled man since ancient Greek and Roman days, yet it is a new disease in that only in recent years has it been properly defined; distinguished from other killers with names such as emphysema, which it has been confused; and at least a start made towards a

that even among the best names, going back to work presents a problem for this reason:

"Many of these patients are just aging—their mean age is about 61. And that's really too old for rugged around the clock, such as that a great number of the men nearby who at that particular time had been engaged in one of those jobs."

Among emphysema sufferers there are also the walking wounded.

"They are victims who come periodically to Bellevue's 10-year-old outpatient clinic for emphysema patients—one of the first of a few of such special clinics in the country.

About 25 patients—mostly men—had assembled in a waiting room, representative of 200 patients who come at least once monthly for a check.

Excepting a pale, thin man who holds his head with one hand, they look, to a casual observer, like a group of normal, middle-aged folks who are waiting, say, in a dentist's office.

"They don't look too bad, but it's only because they're sitting down and expending no effort," says Dr. Anne Davis, clinic director. "You have to see them on exertion. Most of them cannot climb a flight of stairs without becoming breathless; many have trouble walking a single block. Only a very small number are able to work—and then only at sedentary jobs."

And what is life like under such circumstances?

"These patients are anxious all the time," said another Bellevue doctor. "They've constantly frightened of being caught short of breath."

To help prevent such episodes—or control them—patients are given hand-operated nebulizers, a kind of squirt gun for shooting medicine down their windpipes to open up blocked bronchial tubes. 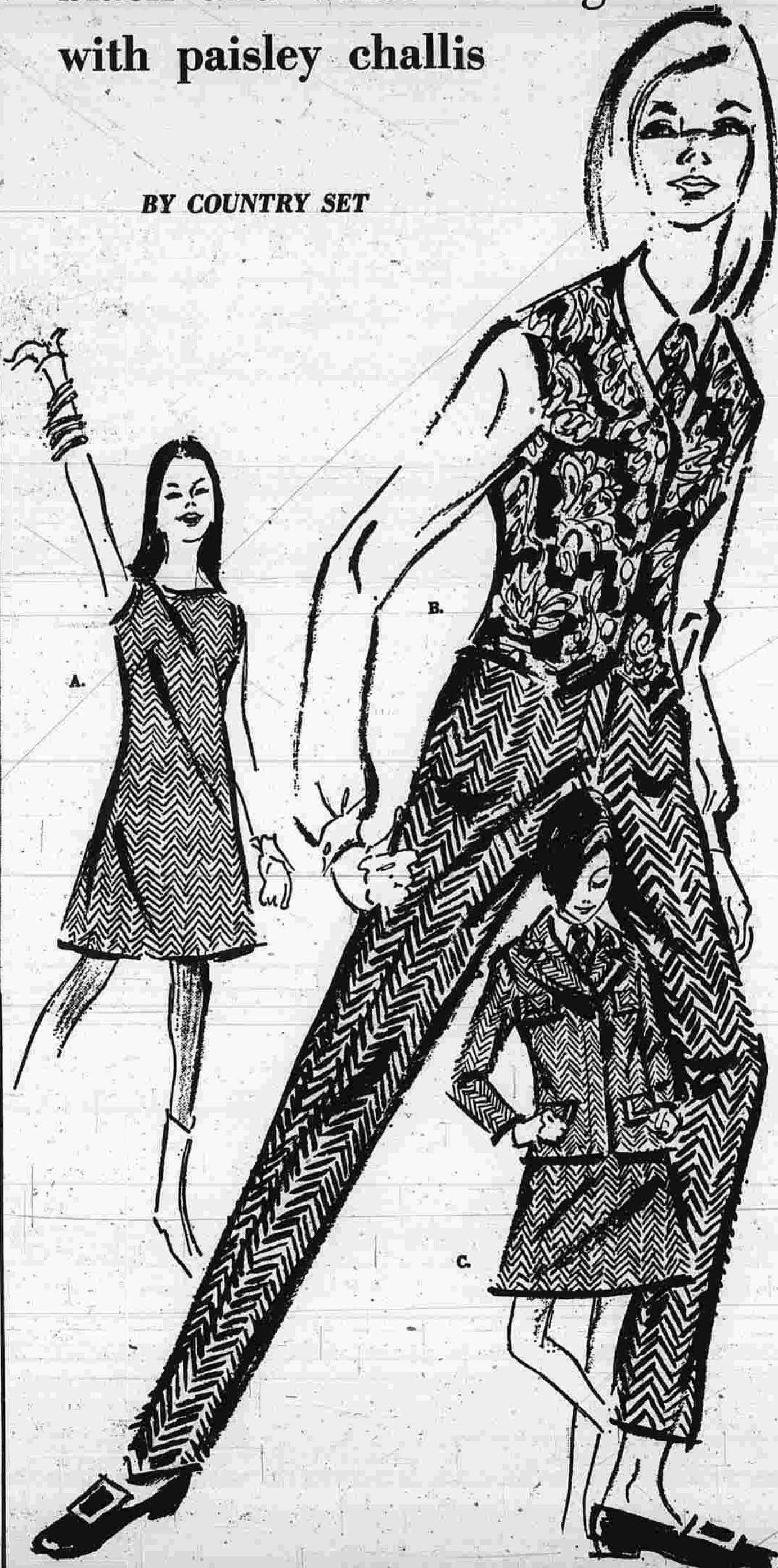

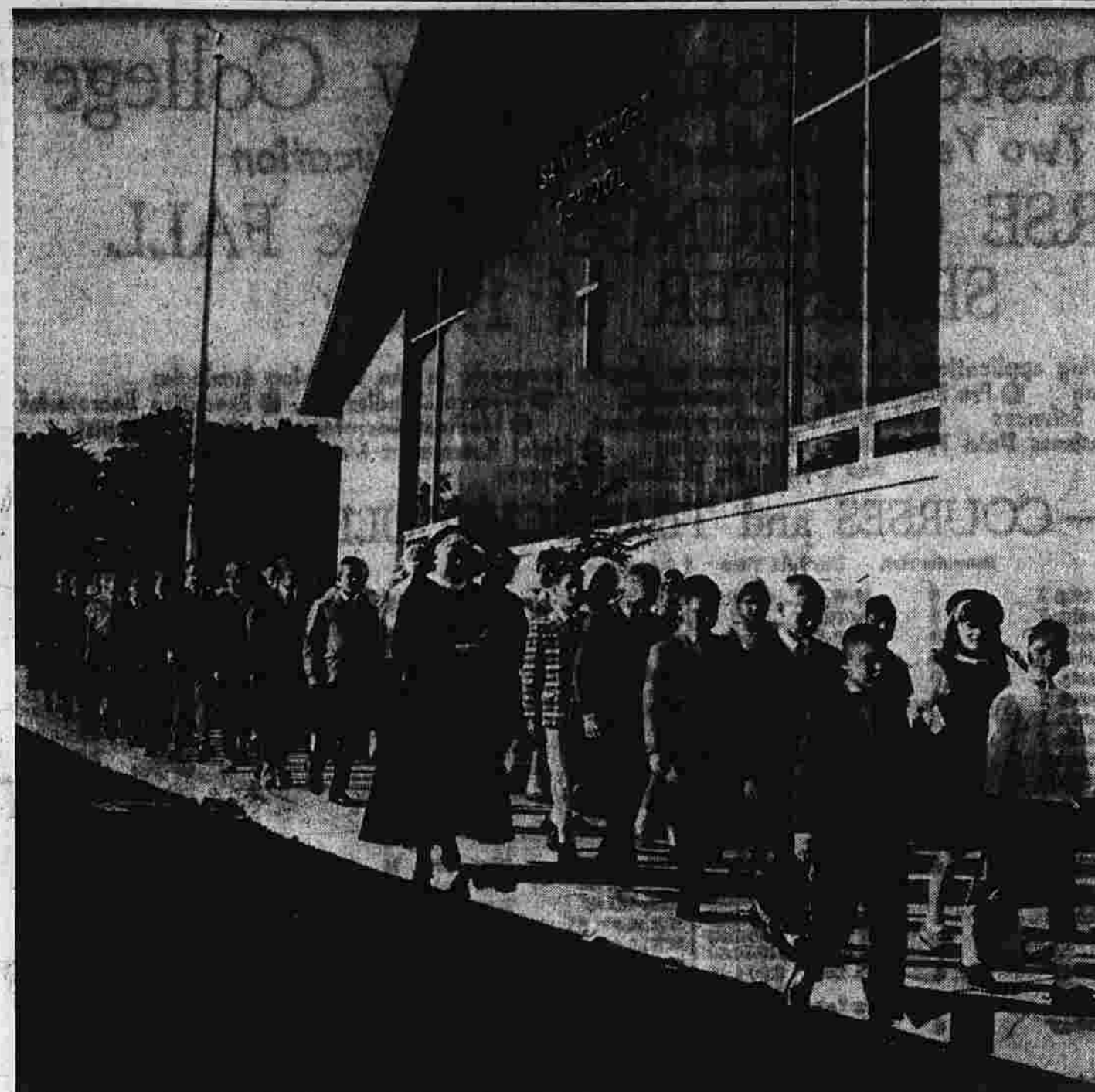

### It's Back to Books Today and Tomorrow

It was "back to the books" today for Manchester parochial school students as fall classes began, following pre-school Masses at St. James' and St. Bartholomew elementary schools, at Assumption and brand-new St. Bridget Junior High, and at East Catholic High School.

Classes also began at Cheney Tech, with the school filled to its 840 capacity.

Tomorrow, some 10,000 youngsters enrolled in the public schools will troop back to the classrooms to begin the fall year on leave from Boston University.

The student total is verily about the same as last year.

Locally, the pupils will be added to several of the 15 elementary schools. A minimum of two and a maximum of three pupils will be placed in a class.

About 25 teachers will be involved in the project, in addition to the project "team," a group of seven Manchester teachers and four from Hartford who received special training during a month-long summer workshop held in West Hartford.

The team yesterday held a special orientation session during which they briefed the classroom teachers on the project.

In addition to Project Concern, there are several other special programs planned and planned for Manchester this year, including a \$101,000 grant State Board of Education to provide vocational training paid for by federal and state funds, are West Hartford, \$119,000 for Project III, an expanded program of aid to disadvantaged pupils. They will receive special help in reading, math and study skills.

LAGOS, Nigeria (AP) — Two lieutenants provided by members of a consulative group of countries aiding Nigeria, Africa's most populous land, are on a collision course that may shatter Nigeria's unity. The antagonists are Lt. Col. Yakubu Gowon, at 31 one of the world's youngest heads of state, from Washington about Nigeria, and Lt. Col. Chukwuemeka Odumegwu Ojukwu, 32, military governor of Nigeria's eastern region.

The comedian, who lived in Forest Hills, Queens, as survived by his wife Mary.

Or that, at least, is what the headlines of our time seem to keep telling us... If anyone can evolve a better, more appealing, more hope-permitting analysis of our conduct, now is the time for it to be brought forward.

Some Rebellion? The name of the gathering was second annual Conference of Religious, Philosophical and Ethic Nonconformists.

As befitted a gathering with such a name, it was served the latest approved and most frequently reiterated conformity in oratory.

This gathering could settle back and purr contentedly, sure of what it was hearing, well insured against any new or daring or upsetting interpretation of our human condition in 1966, when it found that one of its opening speakers, a distinguished professor of philosophy, was delivering, once again, the bit about how the individual is losing his touch and choice in our modern world of big government, big business, big everything.

As it was delivered, it sounded very serious and very shocking and very true, how the individual's power and function of deciding what is right and wrong, of weighing the issues of our time by moral standards we find within ourselves rather than in some organized consensus or in the fat accomplish of some all powerful government—how the individual thus grows functionless, powerless, and more and more lacking both in moral sense and in moral will.

We buy this, and are shocked by it, and agree with it, every time the speech is delivered, which seems to happen before some nonconformist group almost every week.

But gradually a sense of distrust and skepticism has been developing. This thing is getting said much too often to be totally true. We think we begin looking for signs of individual determination of moral issues—and of individual muscle which dares offer such individual determination up against the supposed verdict of the various "organizational structures" which so obviously do dominate most of our living.

Let's see now, which is it which is really the problem of our time—the steady advance of conformity and regimentation—or the business of imposing some kind of sense and order on the judgments of all those strange characters in our midst who refuse to go along with the consensus? Which is it we have, a sickening conformity or a rebellion of the sick?

A Senseless Par For Violence We are so naive, so behind our own times, that we keep reaching for the U.S. Interior Department is studying the feasibility of fish ladders as a means of getting ahead over the dams of utility firms. If it is determined that the upper reaches of the river can support normal spawning of the species, the Federal Power Commission that four power companies be required to build ladders, or passageways, designed to enable the fish to surmount the dams. The total cost would run to about \$10 million according to a Wall Street Journal report. Nor would this be unusual; since 1953, some 78 of the 86 dam-building licenses issued by the FPC have required fish passage systems.

But the efficiency of such systems is highly questionable according to many utility executives with experience in the field. The fish ladder—a stairway of water pools leading to the dam—has had limited effectiveness in supporting normal runs, whether of shad or salmon.

Even where the fish have been transported by truck or tramway to upstream areas their spawning behavior has been irregular—perhaps because water flow conditions have not been suitable.

Anytime the experience of the Holyoke Water Power Co. should be of value to any study of how to get migrating shad past a dam. The company reached the problem at some length about 15 years ago, coming up with a system by which the shad were to rise reacting to water pressure through an inclined water-filled pipe and into the river behind the dam. In practice, however, the system proved less effective than the fish-lift which has been used for several years now, during which time the trend of shad traffic at Holyoke has been decidedly upward.

Making rivers attractive to migrating fish has always been of particular interest to sportsmen—and to utilities like the Holyoke Water Power Co. which grows its power from the turbines before the federal government began applying pressure. The increasing attention of the FPC may prove helpful also in the cleaning up of polluted waters—SPRINGFIELD UNION

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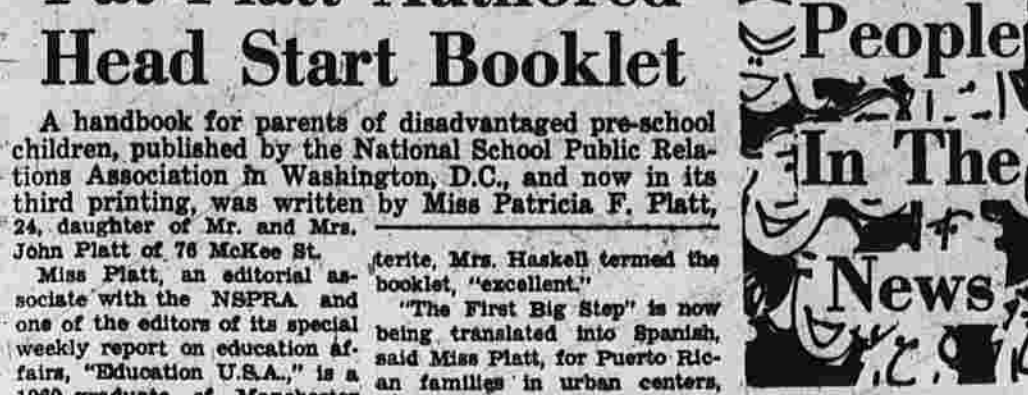

Board Puts Issue Of School to Vote

The board of directors, in record time last night and with no discussion, unanimously authorized a \$975,000 bond issue for the construction of a new elementary school off Dartmouth Rd., to service the southeast end of town.

The action is subject to the voters' approval at a Nov. 8 referendum. The unanimous vote was 8 to 0. Republican Director Harold A. Turkington is on vacation.

Preliminary plans for the proposed school, drawn by town architect Richard Mankey, show a 10-room facility, expandable to 20 rooms in the future.

The cafeteria, auditorium-gymnasium, library and health suite are all designed to accommodate students of a 20-room school.

In a one-hour public hearing preceding the board's action, two speakers, without actually mentioning "busing" by word, resurrected the controversial issue of last spring.

Frank Lupien of 21 Sunset St., independent candidate for the board of education, asked, "Will the new school be used for Manchester children alone, or will it be used also for guests?"

"I agree that a need exists for a new school there," Lupien said, "but, only for Manchester."

"What is the guarantee," he asked, "that outsiders will not use the school in the future?"

Beldon Schaffer, chairman of the school board replied, "Present plans call for its use exclusively by Manchester students, based on the needs of the town. I can make no guarantee now of the future."

Bailia Pagan of 288 McKee St. disagreed with Schaffer. He said, "Our schools are no longer being built for Manchester children. Outsiders will show the future."

Lupien and Pagan were the only ones expressing any opposition to the proposed school.

Speaking in favor were Schaffer, Atty. Herbert Phelon, a GOP candidate for the board of education; Edward Weiss of 323 Spring St.; Mrs. Raymond Peracchio of 330 Spring St.; Eugene Montany of 280 Ferguson Rd. and John Teigen of 53 Hillcrest Rd.

Optional Party Lever For Voters This Fall

Manchester voters will have three options when they vote in the Oct. 3 town elections and in the Nov. 8 state elections.

The choices involve the function of the party levers, changed when the new Connecticut Constitution was adopted.

The first option is to vote a straight party ticket, by pulling one party lever and leaving it up.

The second is to vote a split ticket. This would be accomplished by first pulling one party lever and then turning up the pointers over the candidates to vote for.

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Now the herd is back with the government. Herders get \$300 a month free meat, sick pay, free housing for their families, and life insurance. They're among the best-off Eskimos in Canada.

The project costs taxpayers about \$60,000 a year, but Johansson says it should be self-supporting in five years.

"We want to build the herd to about 30,000. This would produce 600 tons of meat a year, enough to help nearby Eskimos. We could even export it."

Reindeer meat resembles extremely lean beef. It is already a staple in the diet of most residents of the region.

This reindeer grass over 7,000 square miles from Reindeer Station to the Anderson River 200 miles east, and then back to the Arctic coast.

Each spring the herders move the herd up gradually from the barrens, where they feed on lichen during the winter, to a tundra plain, New Haven 73 and 84, and here, after they have summered, about 500 are slaughtered.

### Full Observance Required Of New Uniform Time Law

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government — at least partly because of confusion — may take it easy this year in acting against errant cities that fail to fully observe the new uniform daylight saving time law.

But next year, President Johnson signed the new Uniform Time Act of 1966, which is to end many years of confusion resulting from the semi-annual time-changing that took place on different dates in thousands of communities.

The law fixed the daylight saving time period from the last Sunday in April to the last Sunday in October. The switchover to the new system is to be in two phases.

In the first phase all communities wishing to observe daylight saving time must do so for the full time period. That started last April.

The second phase, to become effective next April, requires that entire states must either observe or not observe the faster time. Unlike this year — and past years — there can be no partial observance of daylight saving time in any state.

The legislation also gave the Interstate Commerce Commission authority to enforce the law.

There is little or no likelihood that Verwoerd's successor will modify the Nationalist government's apartheid policies, which have the backing of the majority of the country's 3.3 million whites. There are 10 million blacks in South Africa.

Police so far have not released any information on their interrogation of Dimitri Tsafendas, a white parliamentary messenger they identified as the man who plunged a knife into Verwoerd's heart and neck as the 64-year-old prime minister sat at his desk in Parliament.

But Tsafendas' coworkers said he was obsessed with the high cost of living which he said especially penalized South Africa's "poor whites," mostly manual workers on the lower income scale.

He reportedly told his colleagues that the government was doing too much for the coloreds—people of mixed blood—and neglecting the poor whites. He also reportedly said he could not make ends meet on his monthly salary of \$160.

A native of Portuguese Mozambique of Greek descent, he is about 45 and reportedly unmarried. He had been a parliamentary messenger for only a few weeks. Although Verwoerd was the architect of South Africa, there was no indication that the killer was associated with any political organization.

Strig G. J. Jouber, chief of criminal investigation, said only one man was being held in the slaying of the prime minister and no further arrests were planned at present.

The assassination came just two days before Verwoerd's 65th birthday. The killer, wearing the black and green uniform of a parliamentary messenger, knifed Verwoerd repeatedly as the prime minister sat awaiting the start of a parliamentary session.

Frank Waring, minister of forestry and tourism, rushed to Verwoerd's aid. The assassin thrust at him with the knife, ripping his trousers.

J. C. Geryling, a Nationalist party member, went to Verwoerd's assistance. With other members, they wrestled Tsafendas to the floor and held him down until police arrived.

Police originally identified Tsafendas as Dimitri Tsafendas, but newspapers later reported that the spelling on his identity card was Tsafendas.

Paul Van Der Merwe, the government's whip in Parliament, said Tsafendas became a parliamentary messenger in August. He said Tsafendas returned from abroad several years ago and worked for a government corporation in Cape Town and for the Maritime Diamond Corp.

"His friends said he always carried a Bible with him in the messenger room, where he worked. They said he often asked people to interpret for him a quotation from 2 Kings: 23:18, 5, which says: 'And she said unto them, thus saith the Lord God of Israel, I will bring evil upon this place and upon the inhabitants thereof, even all the words of the book which the king of Judah had read.'"

Van Der Merwe said Tsafendas was educated at Middleburg, 80 miles east of Johannesburg, and speaks eight languages fluently, including English and Afrikaans.

Police took him to a hospital for X-rays today and declined to comment on reports that he received a broken nose and jaw while being subdued by the
