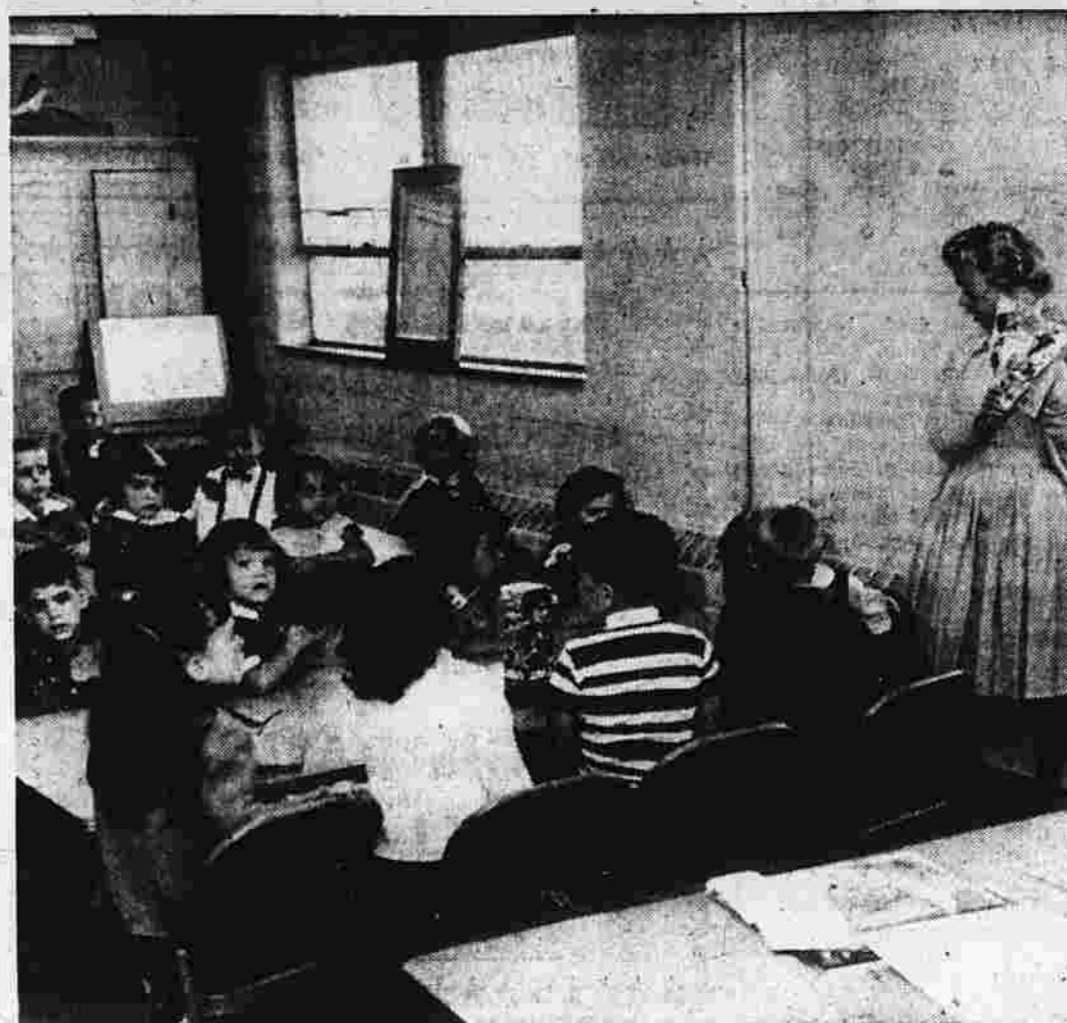

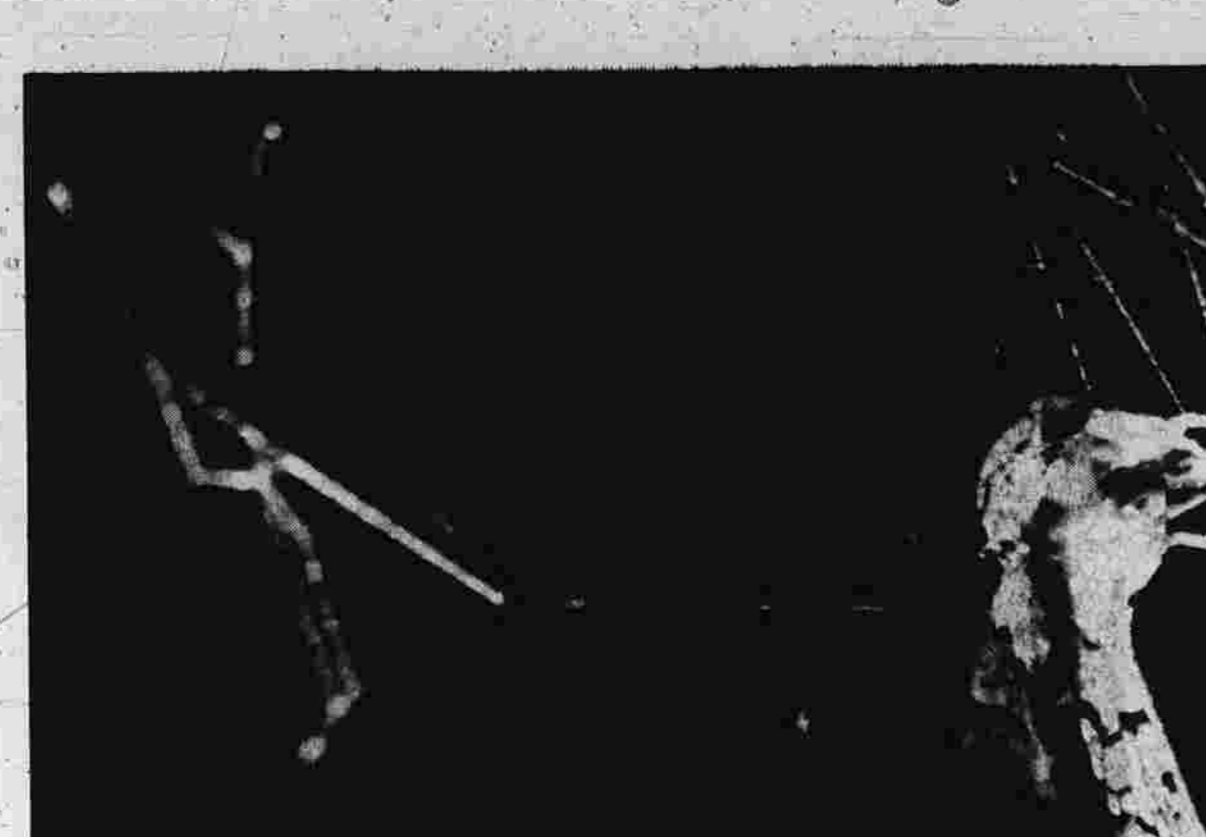

Coventry Intermediate School Funds Okayed at Town Meeting

At a town meeting last night, Coventry voters passed by a 245-72 margin an appropriation of \$1,450,000 for construction of the intermediate school.

William Miller, chairman of the school building committee (SBC) gave the report of the SBC and thanked the members of his committee, as well as member of town boards and commissions for their cooperation.

Architect Walter P. Crabtree II presented plans for the 96 room school, to be built on town-owned land between the existing high school and lower hall. The school will house about 890 students in Grades 4-8.

Donald Young, chairman of the board of education, stated that the school would be a space in the town. "We can vote not to do anything about it, but we can't build the school unless we vote for it."

Other orders of business last night all carried by a majority "aye" vote. A motion to authorize an issue of bonds for the school in an amount not exceeding \$1,450,000 to defray the appropriation for a new intermediate school was carried.

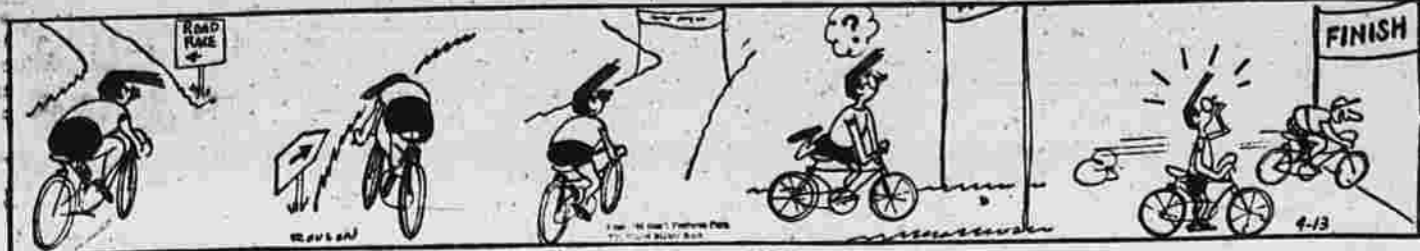
