should not be made until all alternatives are completely investigated. Even if the park is the only site, it is not a good site and it never can be. Town officials charged with the responsibility of finding a location for the school, and those responsible for protecting the town's assets—as who is not

Thus far the park site is the only one being given any support. Two others are being explored, but neither is attractive at first glance. One is the south end of Memorial Field, which might, serve the purpose. It may not be ideally located within the district now served by the school.

Another is a parcel of rough terrain north of Hemlock St. and east of the railroad tracks.

A separate alternative, rejected by school officials for various reasons, is to discontinue the school entirely and split up the school district. This may be as undesirable as the school officials claim, but it may bear re-examination.
