### Democrats Adopt 17-Point Platform

A 17-point platform unanimously adopted by the Democratic Party of Manchester at its annual convention today sets out the party's goals for the next two years.

The platform, which was adopted by a vote of 100 to 0, covers a wide range of issues, including education, public health, safety, and welfare.

Both parties support urban renewal and North End redevelopment. The Democrats specifically support the construction of additional federally financed housing for the elderly in neighborhoods, "such as the North End."

Both parties support the construction of a school to replace the 40-year-old Lincoln School, the proposed new elementary school in the Spring-Gardner St. area, and the expansion of Manchester Community College.

The Republicans stress that greater attention be given to students in a college preparatory program. They urge new programs to provide additional instructional and advisory attention to such students.

The Democrats pledge to continue to support legislation which increases state aid to education so that property taxes may be mitigated.

They also stress the initiation of a cooperative program between the recreation and school departments "to utilize school buildings after school hours and in the afternoon and evening hours."

### Change in Policy Issued To Groups Renting Schools

New school building rental of the facility, the custodian is to report the number of hours he worked and manages in the building if any business manager of the board. The user is then to be billed accordingly.

Provisions of the contract state that if the building is used after 11 p.m., there will be an additional charge of \$3.25 per hour or part thereof for each custodian plus an added rental charge.

Sale or consumption of refreshments in the auditorium or gymnasium is prohibited, as well as smoking in any other than a lobby or designated area.

Any additions to the electric system of any school facility must be made by a licensed electrician who must provide a signed statement with the building superintendent prior to any such alteration must be returned to the original contractor upon completion of the work.

No maintenance or spirituous liquors are to be consumed on the premises.

Any extra custodial work including supervision of custodians when necessary; either prior to or after any school activity, shall be paid at the prevailing rates for such services.

An additional charge of \$3 for the use of such equipment requires the presence of an operator, he will be paid at the rate of \$2 per hour.

In the event the cafeteria kitchen is to be utilized, a meeting of the school cafeteria staff must be on duty and to be paid at prevailing rates.

Board policy states that fees may be waived by the superintendent in proper cases and directly and principally concerned with youth or any group or organization, including religious or non-religious organizations, having a substantial interest in the town, under the direction of one or more adults who are responsible for these activities.

In the board policy as amended, reservations for government use is to be made through the superintendent of schools or his agent, the business manager.

However, if the desired facilities are already reserved by another organization, cancellation of such a reservation will not be required. Alternate dates or alternate facilities may be suggested by the administration for use by a governmental group.

10 Days Notice Needed

Applications for use of public school facilities must be received at least 10 days in advance and submitted on the newly designed forms.

If approved, one copy of the application is returned to the applicant with a contract covering use of the facilities, a copy of the application is forwarded to the head maintenance man and a third copy is filed in the business manager's office.

The head maintenance man in turn sends the application copy to the custodian of the building to be used after use.

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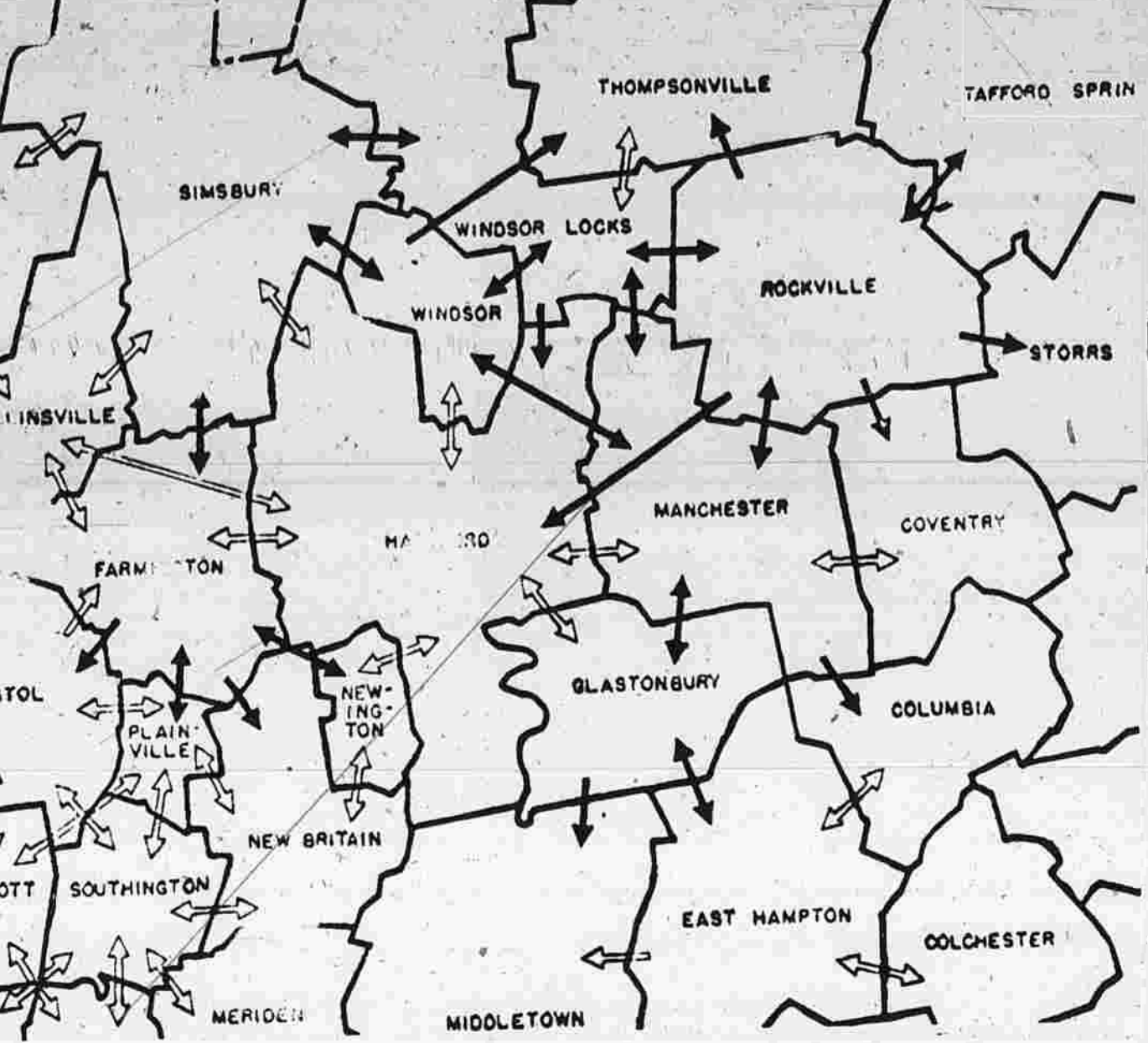
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### SNET Aims Area Toll Free Plan

### Tolland Kindergarten Study Vetted, But Wing Plans Approved

The board of education vetted the proposal for a kindergarten study committee by a 3-2 vote last night and approved the blueprints of the proposed 16-room arts and science wing of the new high school.

In other actions, they disapproved the sale of magazines by high school children to raise money for a long-term practice in Tolland schools, and announced modifications in school uniforms in some subdivisions.

The board hired a secretary for the high school and discussed bus transportation and rubbish removal problems.

Superintendent of schools Robert Briarton listed some of the items included in a list of additional equipment for the high school, and an NDEA grant for hiring an additional guidance counselor.

The board approved the blueprints for the 16-room addition, and the architect will draw up the specifications and advertise for bids today. The closing date for acceptance of the bids was set for Oct. 6, with a possible one-week extension if necessary.

Briarton had reviewed the prints since Thursday and could see nothing wrong in them.

When the bids are accepted the high school building committee will call a town meeting to authorize the awarding of the contract.

The wing is being constructed on a separate basis from the present school. A definite possibility exists that the completed school, including the proposed wing could be built by two different building companies.

The wing will include a lecture room which will slope six steps toward a stage located in the front. The room will seat about 90 persons, and has no center aisle. Access to the room is by two doors located on either side at the front with two side aisles running to the rear of the hall. A greenhouse is also included in the print.

Board member Preston Hard recommended the Board form a kindergarten study committee to report back to the board by Dec. 1. His motion was immediately seconded by board member Kenneth Kaynor.

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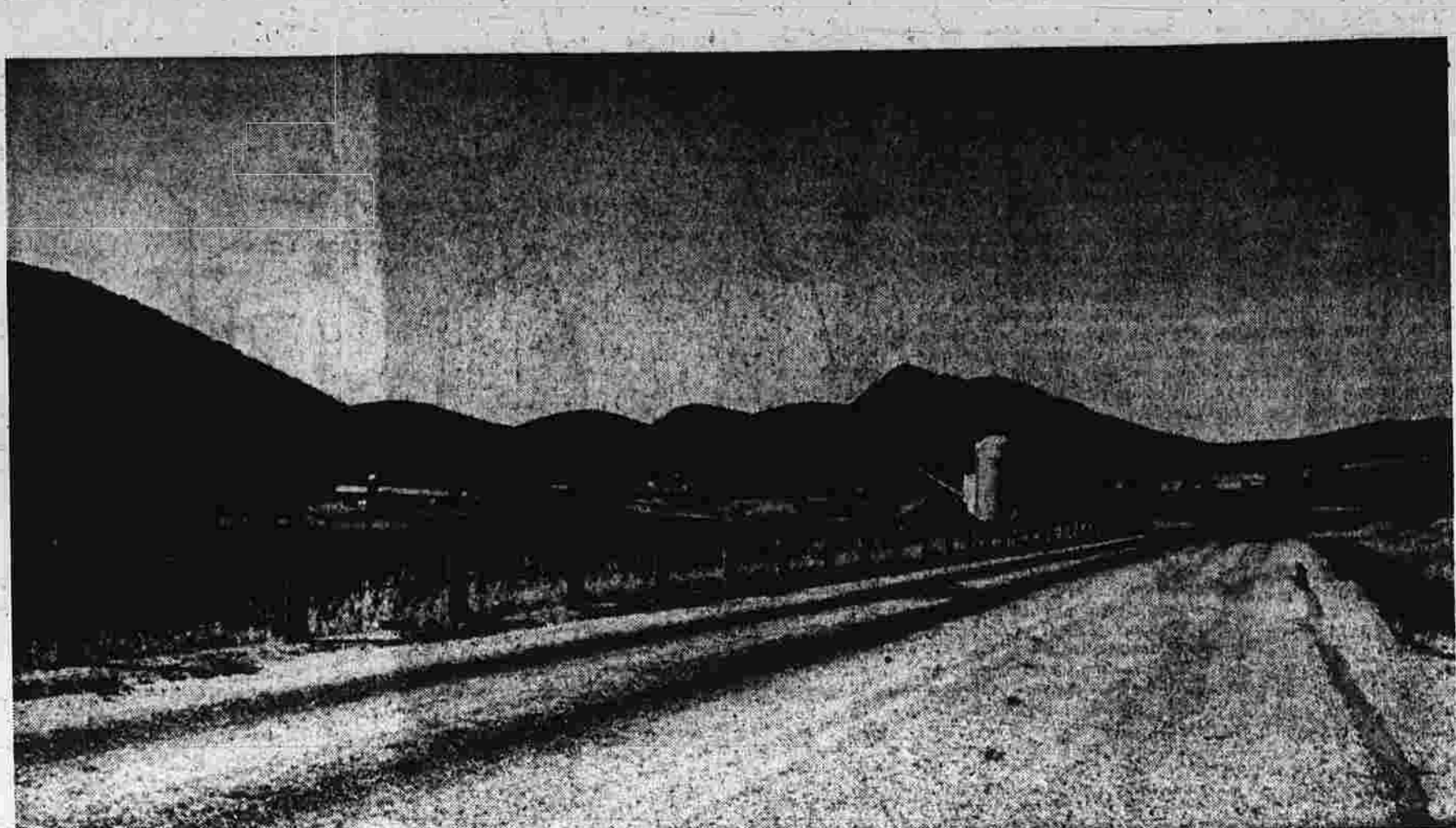

"It is my firm belief," he went on, "that the dazzling success and rate of development which has characterized the field in the last few decades cannot be maintained in the future unless a flow of new ideas based on the discovery of new biological phenomena occurs."

For such things as cancer, mental illness, cardiovascular diseases and the degeneration of age, Dr. Chain visualizes none of the brighter hopes often voiced by other scientists. One reason for his relative pessimism, Dr. Chain says, is his belief that such problems are not going to yield to great subsidies of public money or "bulldozer organizational" methods.

To crack such frontiers, in his opinion, requires the arrival of the Rutherford genius, like "the Curries, the Rutherfords, the Einsteins, the Niels Bohrs and many others" whose accomplishments were in the background for such a thing as the crash program creation of the atomic bomb.

"In the biological field these geniuses have not yet appeared, and we are still waiting for them," said Dr. Chain. "Strangely enough, he doesn't seem to think even our Great Society can produce geniuses on order."

# Hot Water Blues

The best advice to fishermen during mid-summer months is to "go deep."

But how deep is deep? And why?

Since fish don't measure their living levels in terms of feet, why should fishermen ask the fishing expert at Macy's to go deep? Instead, they suggest gauge the proper depths by the factors that govern the fish.

The stratification of lakes mystifies most but the most learned. Reduced to the essentials, stratification merely means that large waters warm in three different levels of oxygen and temperature.

The top area, called the epilimnion, warms up first. The middle layer, called the thermocline, is a mixture of temperatures fish can tolerate plus a favorable level of oxygen.

Below this lies the hypolimnion, a cool region that is deficient in oxygen.

Obviously, then, the place to fish is the epilimnion.

The quickest way to pinpoint the epilimnion is to use a fisherman's thermometer. Lower it away and methodically read readings at five-minute intervals.

When a sudden difference in the decrease of temperature is noted, you've reached the favored region. When the drop in temperature noticeably slows, you're in the epilimnion.

This scientific approach to fishing seems foolproof, but it does cost money. The epilimnion is a three-way deal with Cleveland, Ohio, and the Lake Erie fishing industry.
