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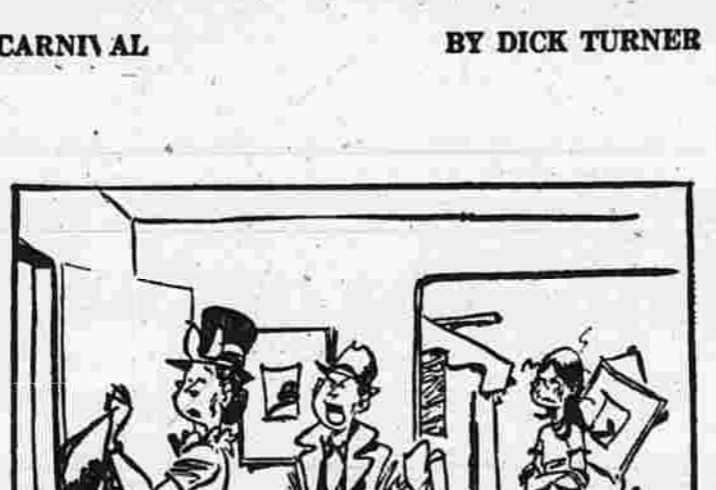
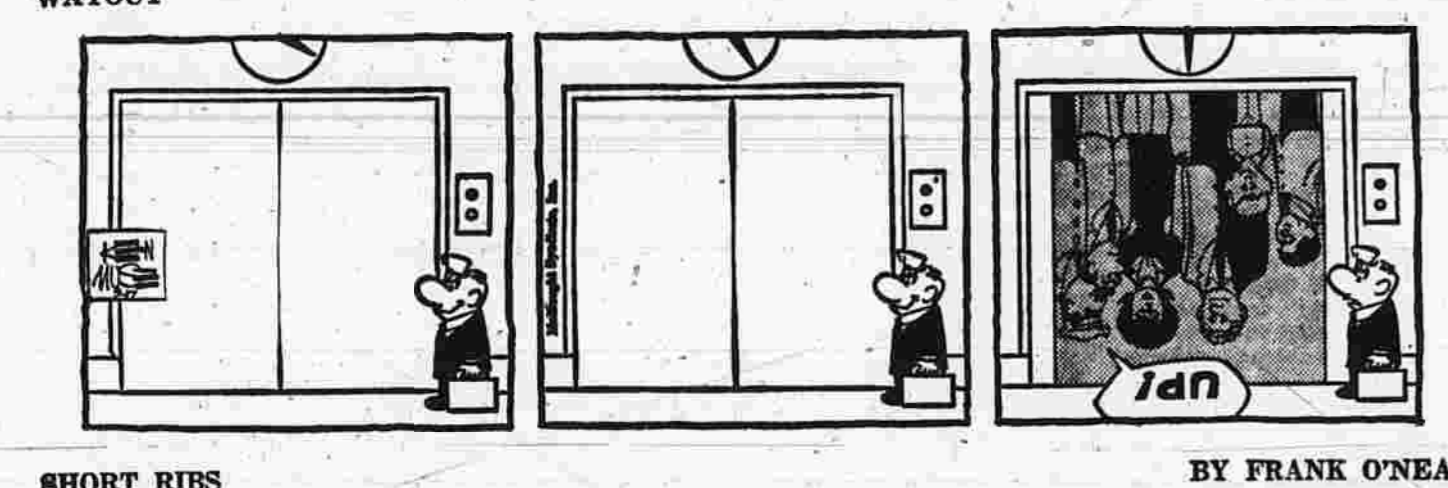

### Blue Cross Paid \$50,057 To Hospital for Medicare

Connecticut Blue Cross has the 30 hospitals represented by disbursed more than \$50,057 in Connecticut Blue Cross; the federal funds to Manchester Memorial Hospital during the first two months of Medicare, according to Anthony J. Suchy, Blue Cross vice president of finance.

Connecticut Blue Cross is authorized by the Social Security Administration to disburse up to \$4 million per month as fiscal intermediary for Medicare. Payments are made to the 30 hospitals in the state for which Connecticut Blue Cross acts as fiscal intermediary.

Since Medicare started July 1, Blue Cross has received notification of 9,437 hospital admissions; of this number, 5,477 persons have been discharged, with hospitals being reimbursed for their care, Suchy said.

Added to Medicare payments has been \$590,000 in current financing, allotted by Blue Cross to 18 Connecticut hospitals. These funds, allocated on request, provide hospitals with reimbursement for services as they are being administered to the patients.

## Joey Bishop Joining Late Night Talkers

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Joey Bishop sat down, a soft drink in his hand and a Boy Scout uniform on his back, and like a scoutmaster patiently lecturing a patrol leader who doesn't quite know what the situation is, talked about what is wrong with late-night television.

"Television had like a golden opportunity," he said. "But showing movies became an easy way to fill air time. The format became stale. Now there's not even a host."

Movies late in the evening don't make as much money as they used to, he said, so networks are turning more attention to live programs.

Bishop was taking a break on the set of "Who's Minding the Mint?" a Columbia movie he expects to finish this month. The uniform, which can give him a more forlorn look than he usually wears on stage, is one costume he wears in the comedy about a robbery.

When Bishop finishes the movie and some night club commitments, he'll begin preparing to become the host of an 11:30 to 2 o'clock talk and variety show on ABC five nights a week. It will be taped in Hollywood for showing at 11:30 p.m., the same time it will be shown in New York.

Bishop will be no stranger to late talk shows. He credits his appearances on Jack Paar's programs with getting him on the road to his present prosperity. Paar often entrusted the show to Bishop when he was out of town.

Late-night movies have robbed television of the chance for experimentation and creativeness that live programming permits, Bishop said. He is not

committed to specific persons or formats for his own show and has only a general idea of what he'll try to do.

"Suppose on an hour-and-a-half show an eight-minute experiment doesn't work. What is the harm? It's not like a series where if it's no good it's too late because there are already eight shows in the can."

"There's no harm in saying, 'You'll never see that on this show again.'"

He talked about "the added luxury of doing the show five nights a week. If something doesn't go over, you'll know about it the next morning."

Bishop believes late-night shows are essential to introduce audiences to new personalities.

"There are no break-in dates on television except late-night shows," he said. A prime-time entertainment program requires a polished performance by a seasoned worker, he added.

Bishop's show is unnamed, unstaffed and largely unplanned at this point. And he's not telling what he will do to counter the talk shows of the other networks.

In November, Bishop will start looking for a production staff. "I need bright, creative, imaginative new people," he said. "They're not hard to find. You don't see them because there's no showcase for them."

### SEARCHING FOR LIFE

The possibilities of life elsewhere in the universe will be explored in a one-hour program next month on ABC. The program, "We Are Not Alone," is based on the book of that title by Walter Sullivan, science editor of the New York Times. Sullivan and leading scientists will discuss work being done to find other life in the universe.

When Muzzy Marcellino, music director of "Art Linkletter's House Party" on the CBS Television Network, toured the country with Ted Florito's band years ago as singer and guitarist, another young vocalist in the outfit was Betty Grable.

## Matt Dillon Has Deep Blue Eyes

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Color set viewers will be able to recognize for the first time tonight that Matt Dillon's eyes are deep blue and Kitty's hair is orange-red.

The beginning of the 12th season of "Gunsmoke" brings the CBS Western to the home screen in color for the first time. But viewers won't be seeing any splashes of char- treuse and fuchsia, or any other bright colors, for that matter. That's the dictum of Philip Leacock, who has been guiding the destiny of the long-run series.

Says the producer: "When it was announced that we were going to color, some of the people on the show said we could now repaint all the sets brilliant colors, put bright green curtains in the Long Branch saloon and new dresses on the girls. I said no."

"Oh, maybe the Long Branch is a bit brighter, but otherwise Dodge City will look pretty much the same. It would be easy to lose the dusty atmosphere on the town by going wild on color. But we'd also be de-

stroying the essential quality of the show."

Leacock is a jealous guardian of "Gunsmoke's" success, and his stars now appreciate his efforts. That wasn't always true. When he took over the show three years ago, the performers eyed him with suspicion.

After all, what right had he, an Englishman, to assume command on a basically American saga?

"We had some clashes at first," admitted Leacock, discussing his relationships with James Arness, Amanda Blake and Milburn Stone. "These people care so much about the show and their characters that they are suspicious of anyone who might want to tamper with them. I had to prove to them that I cared just as much as they did."

After a dozen years it can be rugged going to maintain enthusiasm for a series, but Leacock manages. A long-time director, he knows how to stimulate an actor's interest.

"I often go for young writers and directors," he explained. "They approach a show like 'Gunsmoke' with new ideas and

viewpoints, and their vitality infects the actors. We sometimes have guest stars, not merely for name value — our best shows are those involving the 'family.' The addition of top-notch performers puts the regulars on their toes and they provide better performances."

How much longer can "Gunsmoke" last?

"That's entirely up to the actors," Leacock remarked. "It can probably continue as long as they are willing to stay."

### THE SOUND OF RODGERS

Richard Rodgers will write the score for the musical version of George Bernard Shaw's "Androcles and the Lion." The 90-minute version of the play will be presented by NBC next season. Rodgers is also doing the score for "Saturday Night," a film NBC is preparing on how Saturday night is celebrated around the world.

Dawn Wells of "Gilligan's Island" on the CBS Television Network recited parts of Thornton Wilder's play "Our Town" to win a Miss Nevada beauty crown.

### LIFE WITH IVAN

The Soviet Union has given permission to ABC to film an hour-long program about the everyday life of a Russian family. The program, titled "Ivan Ivanovich," will be shown next February and will be repeated. ABC News plans to use a middle-class family living in a city outside Moscow.

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### King of the Road Turns to Television

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Roger Miller, composer of "You Can't Roller Skate in a Buffalo Herd" and "My Uncle Used to Love Me But She Died," may very well be just what television has needed for a long time: A new variety star with style and personality all his own. Miller, whose NBC half-hour show will be a candidate for public approval in the new season, is a tall, sleepy-eyed Texan with a southwestern drawl that would make LBJ green with envy. He has built-in hatred of the cliché answer. Ask him about his upcoming show, and instead of telling you about the great guys he's working with, he'll murmur something about it being "something like swimming — if you panic you drown." "The Roger Miller Show" will be the only really novel excursion into variety on television in the season that starts in a couple of weeks. All in all, there will be 10 programs weekly on the three networks that fall into the variety category — and three of them, "The Ed Sullivan Show," "The Red Skelton Show" and "The Lawrence Welk Show" have been around almost as long as television itself. Variety is a standard item in TV entertainment, and one that sometimes has a life expectancy greater than the ordinary comedy or action-adventure series. It often takes a little longer to establish a variety show than, say, a "Hogan's Heroes" or a "Bewitched" that jumps fast onto the golden Nielsen list. Even a show with an established star like "The Dean Martin Show" was a slow start.

returns to CBS after a two-season absence. Thus Miller will be the only real "new face" that TV talks about so much but uses so infrequently. And he arrived at a time when many of the established shows are showing the bones of their format: The predictable mix of comedy, song, and golf players exhibiting swings on Sullivan's show; the predictable laughing breakup of guest stars in sketches with Red Skelton; the predictable "spot" with the kitchen stool and new sweater on "The Andy Williams Show." No one can tell now what kind of television personality Miller will show. It is a vast distance between being a guest star singing his own songs and acting as host to guest stars, making them look good — and singing other people's music. And most of all, it is hard to tell how a show competing with "The Lucy Show" will make out, since Miss Ball's television road is marked by the graves of series that died for lack of audiences. "There are some things that I just won't worry about," Miller reflected. "I always say 'Rome wasn't built in Alaska.'" It is even hard to predict what his show will look like. Miller himself says the set will consist of "two trees and a picture of my uncle," and, for a change from turtle-neck sweaters and bright-colored slacks, he'll specialize in "hip boots and hairnets." With a couple of exceptions like Jack Jones and Liberace, he said he'll try to find guests who aren't the eternal travelers on the variety circuit. Miller, not yet 30, has made a fortune with his music — composing many hits, of which the biggest has been "King of the Road," and as a recording star. "I was born on a remote farm near a remote town in a remote section of a state (Texas)," Miller said. "I had an eighth grade education. I was totally frustrated and totally ambitious and I just wanted to be somebody. I thought I could do it by being an entertainer." If he's lucky and doesn't try too hard, his show might turn out to be the sleeper of the season.

There will also be two other new variety shows this season. Milton Berle is coming back on ABC in what he promises will be a revue. Garry Moore
