Lynn Redgrave Britain's New Film Star Enjoys Unmarried Status

NEW YORK (AP) — At 26, Lynn Redgrave, Britain's newest film star, is a bachelor girl who still enjoys the freedom of living alone.

"There's no hurry," said Lynn, who is tall, jolly, and has lemon-gold hair, gray-blue eyes and a complexion as fair and delicate as sea foam.

"After all, if you get married at 20, you simply have millions of years to spend with the same person."

"Marriage was invented at a time when people didn't live very long. You felt you had a good run if you lived to be 40. But I won't feel I'm on the shelf if I'm unmarried at 30. On the other hand, I don't want to get married tomorrow, I will."

Lynn is a comparatively late bloomer among the famous Redgrave acting family which includes her father, Sir Michael; her mother, Rachel Kempton; her brother, Colin; and her sister, Vanessa, star of "Morgan."

At the ripe old age of eight she had only played the role of a shepherd in a school Nativity play. Her childhood dream world was built around pots and pans and horses. She yearned to be an equine.

"I had a pipe dream that led to pieces," she said. "I wanted to grow up and cook for rich people to earn enough money to finance my riding. But I came to realize that wouldn't work."

At 16 during a visit to Shakespeare's birthplace at Stratford-on-Avon where her parents were appearing, she was suddenly swept by an idealistic love of the theater. Almost religiously in its nature, the vision took over her life.

A new U.S. stamp with a two-fold patriotic purpose soon will be issued. The 5-cent commemorative will honor the American servicemen and mark the 25th anniversary of the Savings Bonds program. The stamp will have its first day of issuance on Oct. 26 at Sioux City, Iowa.

The stamp design, unveiled at a special White House ceremony by President Johnson, is based on a dramatic news photograph of the American flag flying in the breeze with the Statue of Liberty in the background. It will carry the poignant message: "We Appreciate Our Servicemen."

The idea for this stamp was conceived by students of North Junior High School in Sioux City, Iowa, who started a campaign of petitions to Postmaster General Lawrence P. O'Brien, Iowa, to have the students kicked off the campaign by pooling their pennies to rent a billboard in Sioux City. The billboard carried the message: "American Servicemen, We Appreciate You."

Maine Prison Shows Dilemma of Legality

AUGUSTA, Maine (AP) — At breakfast the young man in Room 307 is awakened and greets his day clothes. As he waits for breakfast to be brought, he peers through the barred window at the high fence and barbed wire and beyond to the green hills and trees.

He has gone over that fence three times and that's why he's in here. The only time he left his narrow cell in Augusta State Hospital's maximum security building was to be marched to the basement for his daily shave.

It's then that he may have his only contact with the 34 other inmates—psychotics and mental defectives.

The young man in Room 307, in the opinion of psychiatrists, is sane. Yet he may spend the rest of his life behind bars in the old brick and stone structure for the criminally insane.

Dr. William E. Schumacher, director of the Maine Bureau of Mental Health, says hospital psychiatrists believe that three men now in state institutions are not mentally ill and never have been.

But they've been confined because juries thought otherwise and found them innocent of various crimes by reason of mental disease or defect. In these cases, commitment to a mental institution is mandatory.

Counselor Takes West Point Tour

The superintendent of the Augusta State Hospital, Dr. John C. Patterson, says that of the 36 men in maximum security, one-third are well enough to be released immediately or in the near future.

But Schumacher says there's little hope they will ever be freed.

Between them and any eventual freedom lies a maze of legal procedure: Petitions, court hearings and bonds. On top of this, doctors must satisfy public opinion as to persons seeking release not only are sane, but are no longer hazards to society.

Assistant Atty. Gen. Courtland D. Perry, counsel to the Department of Mental Health and Corrections, says:

"A doctor's good conscience would be hard pressed to tell a court it is safe to release a patient with a promise he'll never do anything wrong on the outside."

2,875,000 in State

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Census Bureau has reported that the population of Connecticut on July 1 was 2,875,000.

The bureau also reported—and yet the criteria of criminality is applied in determining New York as the nation's most populous state, had increased its total by more than half a million persons.

Figures show that in the past 15 years or so, some 120 people found mentally ill have been put in institutions by the court. Only five have been freed.

"It's often true," Schumacher says, "that those found not guilty on a mental plea are far fewer than those judged criminally and put in prison."

A person "acquitted by reason of mental disease or mental defect is subject to a possible lifetime of confinement."

Besides, Schumacher says, a prison is a "far more normal" type of living than that in the maximum security unit.

Patterson says the criminally insane are without the protection of review panels or parole boards.

The maximum security unit, built in 1908, has only 37 tiny cubicles for the 36 men. They sleep eight bed down in the day room.



Jaycee's Contribution to Oak Grove Nature Center

The design is patterned after the town bridge—a type of construction prominent in Connecticut during the 18th century. It is the work of Clinton Hendrickson of 72 S. Hawthorne St., a member of the Lutz board of trustees. 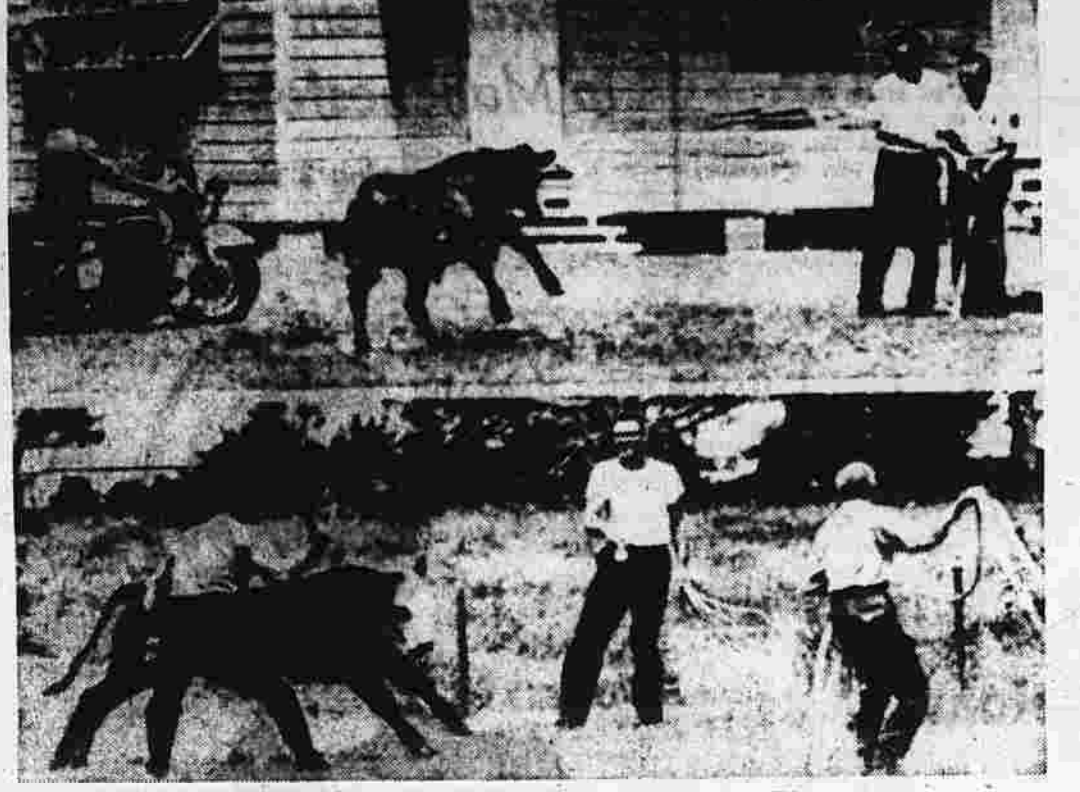

Muddy Water Best for Drinking

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — A crystal clear stream may be flowing water, but when it comes to drinking water, look for a nice muddy river.

That's the advice of Dr. Clarence Taft, an Ohio State University biologist who spent 36 years studying plants which sometimes give the purest water a terrible taste.

"Muddy water is good water," Dr. Taft said in an interview.

He explained that muddy water is not dirty, but it is rich in minerals. "The mud particles also absorb offending chemicals from the water. Add a few rapids or riffles light penetrates to help the plants grow. And low water really got a good water source, also is more likely to bring the small stream pools which bubble of the water in such shallow aerates it, removing by oxidation some of the offending chemicals which cause odors and bad taste.

Even foul smelling water can be purified so it's safe to drink. But nobody yet has figured out how to filter out the flavor imparted by some of the 30,000 forms of algae — though Dr. Taft admits — researchers have been for more than 60 years.

Well water doesn't have all the problems, though it might have a mineral taste picked up from underground rocks. The plants need light, water and food to grow.

"They grow best in stagnant of polluted water — and with increasing urbanization of the country, problems of algae to be picked up for processing into drinking water.

In Ohio, for instance, about half the population now depends on surface water for drinking water. A reservoir "turn over" will result from a cool period following a prolonged warm spell. Hot weather raises the water temperature. A little cooler lowers the temperature of the surface water, making it heavier than the warmer water on the bottom.

The bottom water then rises as the cooler surface water sinks.

And this in turn creates more algae problems. Bringing oxygen to the surface, algae growth of lakes and rivers are low. Part of this may be because low levels of lakes and rivers means less water to dilute the algae taste, Dr. Taft says.

Actor Rooney Unrecovered From Tragedy of Late Wife

One day, Dr. Taft suggests, it may become feasible for water treatment facilities to aerate water in addition to filtering it to eliminate bacteria.

A lot of the offending odors and tastes disappear when water is aerated or when it's percolated through sand — like a town's water from one sprinkling can to another or pouring it through a filter of pure sand.

This process takes hours, however, though presumably the day could arrive when algae taste would be such a problem water plants would have to add some sort of aeration or sand-filtration process to get rid of bad flavor.

Burglaries Up During August

The total number of burglaries for the month of August rose considerably compared to the number of burglaries in July and fewer persons were arrested in August as compared to the month before.

According to a monthly report released by Police Chief James Reardon, 46 burglaries were reported for last month, as compared to 32 in July. For such offenses, 10 persons were arrested in July as compared to four in August.

These burglaries include forcible entry, unlawful entry without the use of force and attempted forcible entry. The majority of these burglaries for August were in the forcible entry category, with 30 such incidents noted.

Arrests for drunkenness increased over 100 per cent in the month, with 72 persons arrested in August and seven in July. The number of persons arrested for disorderly conduct, though, dropped in the month, with 12 arrests made last month as compared to 20 arrests the previous month.

On motor vehicle violations, the number of persons arrested for speeding jumped from only two arrests in July to 10 in August.

Though the number of traffic accidents for last month was about the same as the previous month, the number of persons injured in these accidents was less. Seventy-three accidents were reported in August, with 73 in July, with 27 injuries logged in August as compared to 37 for August.

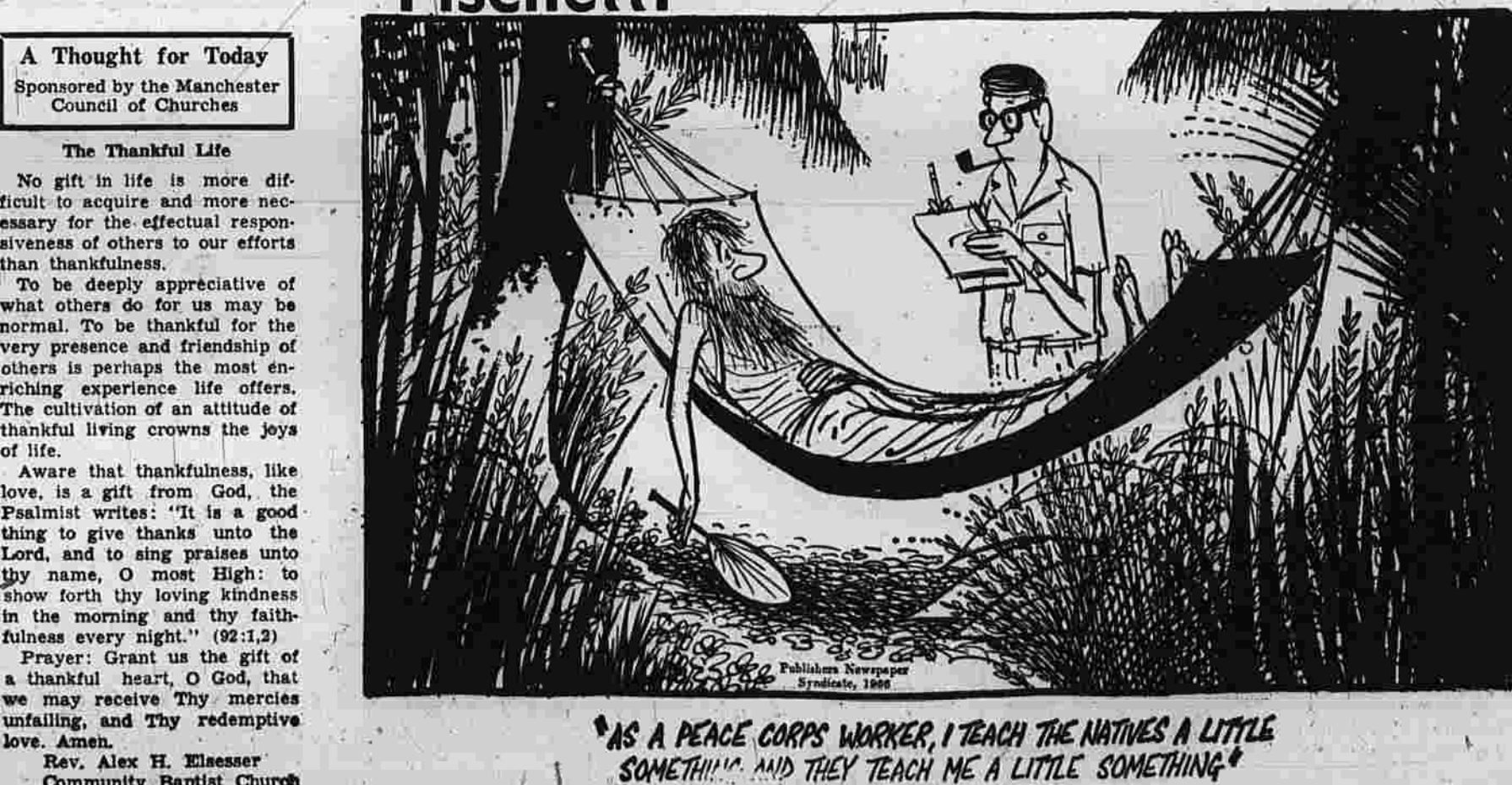

Ford Sets Pattern Of Auto Price Hike

DETROIT (AP) — Car buyers will dig deeper into their pockets when they buy a 1967 model.

Ford Motor Co. set the pattern Tuesday when it became the first U.S. auto firm to list new prices.

General Motors, Chrysler and American Motors were expected to follow suit.

The size of the price increase depended on your viewpoint.

Ford's official release said the increases averaged \$25 or about 1 1/2 per cent for the entire Ford line.

A comparison of price tags on 1966 and 1967 Ford Motor Co. products without regard for any factor but money showed the increase averaged \$13 or about 4 per cent.

The Ford announcement, which touched off Detroit's annual numbers game of trying to figure out auto price trends, was a complicated one.

The company made some items, optional on 1966 cars at extra cost, standard equipment this time. Most of them were in the safety field although a few did include costly items such as automatic transmissions.

Some of the 1966 standard items were made optional this time around.

That made it difficult to figure exactly how much more money the buyer will pay for a 1967 model, a virtual duplicate of his 1966's.

First Public Service Of New LSD 'Religion'

NEW YORK (AP) — In a strangely exotic service, Dr. Timothy Leary Tuesday night began the public celebration of what he considers the virtues of the controversial drug LSD. He called it a "psychedelic religious celebration."

Leary has been dismissed from Harvard University because of his experiments with drugs. He is appealing a federal sentence of 30 years and a \$50,000 fine for possession of unlicensed marijuana and is under indictment in Dutchess County, N.Y., for possessing LSD and marijuana at his headquarters in Milbrook.

Tuesday night Leary issued a call to "communion" to more than 2,000 persons crowded into a 1920s-rocco movie house on Manhattan's lower East Side which he calls the "Village Theatre Temple."

Although the new "religion" is based on the use of LSD — the hallucinatory drug — marijuana and peyote, none of the three were visible in the theater.

Leary, who calls himself the "guide" of the League for Spiritual Discovery which through the use of LSD he said he would take a court test of the constitutionality of using the three drugs in religious services.

Most of those at the service took the LSD.

Board Candidates Differ On Advisory Referendum

Republican and Democratic candidates for Manchester's Board of Directors differed sharply last night over a GOP proposal to incorporate advisory referendum powers into the town charter.

The pro and con arguments took place at Bowers School, during a "Meet The Candidates" meeting, conducted by the League of Women Voters.

Although the six Republican and six Democratic candidates discussed six pre-selected campaign issues, the advisory referendum proposal drew the most attention.

Last spring's controversial and bitter discussions over the proposed annexation of Hartford schools were not once mentioned last night, but they hovered in the background.

These discussions had Republicans to incorporate in their platform the "broadening of referendum power" proposal.

The Republican directors, in the spring, had asked that a townwide referendum be held on the basic question to serve as a guide to the Board of Education. The Democratic majority on the Board of Directors had refused the request, on the grounds that it was contrary to the town charter.

David Osgard, Republican, explained his party's position when he said last night, "I am concerned with the political stampede in the growth of government—national, state and local."

"Growing political machinery," he said, "is usurping the rights of the people. It is an expression of sentiment only, and would not bind nor usurp the authority of the Board of Directors."

"All power of elected officials is derived from the people," he said.

Old Anderson, incumbent Democrat, countered with his party's reasons for opposing the proposed charter change.

He said, "It would open the gates for small minorities and special interest groups to use town, too dependent on one big firm, to further their selfish purposes, and would make every . . . that it will pay you to buy all your food at PINEHURST . . ."

The psychiatrist, Dr. Harold A. Hancock and Robert C. Doherty, said Vennard is sufficiently sane to be aware of the nature of his crime, the penalty he faces, and to assist his lawyer, Atty. Wesley C. Gryk, in his defense.

Vennard is now in Hartford State Jail where he is being held without bond to await the brain wave test and his next court appearance.

Indicted for first degree murder by a Superior Court Grand Jury last month, he is accused of killing his mother with a cleaver hammer June 9 while she slept in the Vennard home at 154 Hollister St.

Mrs. Vennard was employed in the town assessor's office and was prominent in town Democratic politics.

Coroner Louis W. Schaefer of Hartford said last month that Vennard "admitted he struck his mother."

He was found by police at the scene of the killing in a dazed condition. The hammer was lying beside him. His mother was found unconscious on the living room sofa. She died a few hours later, in St. Francis hospital.

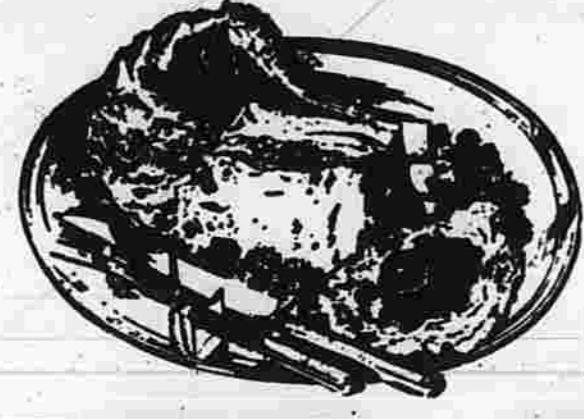

Board Now Asking 12 Rooms in School

The board of education will ask that the architect design a 12-room elementary school. This building is to have two kindergarten rooms, and to be expandable to 24 or more classrooms.

As the thinking goes now, the new building would house primary grades, kindergarten through Grade 3, and the present elementary school would contain Grades 4 through 6 until such time as the board of education decided to implement a middle school plan.

The decision to increase the initial capacity of the 12-room school from seven to 12 rooms and to design it for elementary grades came only at the end of a two-hour discussion Monday night between the board of education, the public building commission (PBC) and architect Robert L. Leland and Carl Hakekewelle of Mainfield Associates, the firm chosen this summer to draw preliminary plans of the school.

The town has already acquired land on which the school is to be built, between the North Rd. school and Tommy Lane. Educational specifications for the school were passed on to the PBC last fall. It was originally requested for occupancy this fall, with an addition in 1969.

The school board said that the target date is now some time in 1968 and that temporary room for overflow classes may have to be found next year. One kindergarten session meets at St. George's Church this year.

Educational specifications for the new building, suggesting a plant with greater physical flexibility than usual, remain the same, the school board said. The lack of flexibility in the present elementary school is one of the reasons Philip Ligouri, superintendent of schools, gave for asking that the new school be designed for elementary grades.

The present elementary school was necessary to go into a

workshop Saturday at 10 a.m. organization in 1966, saying that the seventh and eighth grades, being small, might have a second-rate education for a while after having the high school, and it might be costly. Ligouri agreed that this might be so, and said he saw no need to go on the middle school plan until the early seventies with two provisions: That the cafeteria-auditorium is added to the junior-senior high school as specified, thereby increasing its rated capacity to take care of increased enrollment, and that RI. 6 doesn't come along with a host of unknowns.

When the board of education members began to consider the possibility of having two elementary schools, one old and one new on adjacent land, all sorts of problems arose in the minds of board members. Elizabeth suggested housing primary grades in the new school, and intermediate grades probably Grade 4 through 6 at the old school, an idea subsequently adopted.

Fourteen persons were made voters at the voter-making session Monday night. Ten signed up with the Democrats; two with the Republicans, and two remained unaffiliated.

Powell Challengers Offer Modified Change of Rules

WASHINGTON (AP) — The revolt against Rep. Adam Clayton Powell has taken a new turn, aimed away from a head-on clash between Powell and his chief challenger, Rep. Sam M. Gibbons, D-Fla.

Thirteen Democrats on Powell's Education and Labor Committee have come up with a new set of rules changes that would leave Powell at least a greater appearance of power than Gibbons' original proposal.

The new approach was worked out Tuesday in a day-long series of meetings. It ended with a delegation of Powell's supporters in the House, including Rep. John H. Dent, D-Pa., berated some of the 13 signers when he learned of their action.

"What's he guilty of?" asked Dent, and gave his own answer. "I know he's guilty of being 'an ass' — what a piece of s---!"

But it was believed by some who spoke to him that he would go along in the end with at least the major proposed reforms.

The new plan would leave Powell in nominal charge of the committee's affairs but a majority of the 21 Democrats in the committee could override him on such key matters as scheduling.

Gov. Rockefeller, who signed the statement, was angered at what he regarded as a grandstand play by Gibbons in launching the revolt at this time, with Congress due to adjourn in a few weeks. Any rules adopted Thursday would be in effect only for the rest of the session.

Viet War's Pattern Changes As Night Veils the Country

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 (AP) — Night falls on Viet Nam and the whole war changes. The vast military machinery of the United States steps into a different gear.

Thousands of troops that moved aggressively through the jungles in daylight are now in the shadows of the night. Helicopters that whirred over paddies and valleys all day are now silent. Night warriors go into action. Special photo reconnaissance planes scan jungles and trails. Small patrols of the Viet Cong, Ambush squads, face blackened, pots in the darkness.

War changes for the Viet Cong, too. For them the night is an ally. Large areas of the countryside that in daytime are controlled by government troops are now in the hands of the Viet Cong. Guerrilla night fighting. Australian troops in Viet Nam have to accept discovery in daylight. When the Americans are in the jungle they stay before dawn, strike in force.

Viet Cong guides, finding their way through the black jungle with little oil lamps made from the old French perfume bottles, lead supply convoys along trails and streams denied to them in daylight.

The night paralyzes civilian life. Everything that moves is suspect. All country roads are closed. Even in the big cities the bright lights die quickly. Curfew enforces the street before midnight.

Residents of Saigon know in their sleep as the sounds of war roar over the city: night after night bombs and artillery shells crash onto suspected Viet Cong routes of the Viet Cong that lead to the very outskirts of the capital.

GIs have come to hate the night but they know they must learn to fight in it. A rough and many lessons must be learned.

A U.S. Marine company discovered this its first day in Viet Nam. Coming off carriers of the 7th fleet, the company continued to move after dark.

The jungle, dimly lit even at noon, turned inky black. The commander ordered the unit to turn around, regroup and return to the battalion base camp.

With each step Marines became tangled in thorny vines. Some men put pieces of fluorescent moss and fungus on their helmets so they could be seen by their comrades. Men who became separated thought they were lost and began shouting to make contact with their unit.


The desperate company commander risked switching on a few flashlight and moved to the head of the lost column. Each Marine grabbed the trail in front of him and the troops started off. It took three hours for them to attain 300 yards through the thicket.

They were lucky. The Viet Cong were not around.


Few American units go after the enemy at night. When they do their route has been carefully scouted and planned in the daytime.

Vietnamese army troops are even more reluctant to move at night. Senior American advisers in the Mekong River delta, for example, say that despite all advice the three Vietnamese divisions there never go out in the dark. The advisers believe the flat and open terrain favors nighttime assaults by large forces.

The delta offers a classic illustration of the way in which war has often been waged in Viet Nam.
