Barry Sees No Need for New Taxation

Democratic State Senator David M. Barry of Manchester, incumbent in the Fourth Senatorial District, said today he is firmly opposed to the adoption of a state income tax.

Buttressing his stand by citing the state's healthy economy, Barry said a need does not exist for any new or increased taxation.

"Our industrial base has been growing steadily and there is every indication that it will continue to grow," he said.

The senator predicted that Connecticut will continue to attract industry because it has a favorable management - labor climate. He pointed out that the Connecticut Industrial Building Commission has placed nearly \$21 million in state-guaranteed mortgages to Connecticut industry during the past five years.

Calling the state's present tax structure "well balanced," Barry said the addition of a personal income tax would be detrimental to industrial growth.

He said that Connecticut's per capita income, the highest in the nation, has resulted particularly from the state's ability to provide these businesses with a desirable economic structure in which to expand and prosper.

TEST YOUR PARTNER BY DROPPING TRICK

By ALFRED SHEINWOLD

One way to test your partner's temper is to start a hand with the sure tricks and wind up with only eight. You get some interesting comments and may add to your vocabulary.

Opening lead - jack of spades.

When today's hand was played, South refused the first two spade tricks but won the third with dummy's ace. At this stage South had nine sure tricks: one spade, two hearts, two diamonds and four clubs.

Seeing no problem, South took the ace and king of clubs and gave up a club. East took the queen of clubs and his last spade and then led a heart to dummy's ace.

Too late, declarer saw that he could not get to his hand for the king of hearts. Dummy's queen took a diamond trick, and South was down one.

"The new seen you play so well," North remarked slyly. "You must have been taking lessons."

Could Avoid Complication

South could avoid this doubtful completion. After taking the ace of spades he should give up a club trick immediately. At the time the defenders can take one club and three spades.

Regardless of the return, South can get to his hand with a high club after taking dummy's ace of hearts. He then cashes the king of hearts, cashes any high club that may remain in his hand, and takes the rest of the hand.

Actually, an expert would take ten tricks. Expecting to lose the first club trick, South should lead the king of clubs from dummy for a finesse. As it happens, East has both the queen and jack of clubs, and South can capture them both by repeating the finesse.

Viet Protesters Pay Tax, Some Even Aid IRS Agents

WASHINGTON (AP) - Viet protesters who refused to pay income taxes voluntarily are turning out to be mostly cooperative in helping the government collect.

One fellow is letting the government keep his refunds of \$1,200.

The Internal Revenue Service said today it's had no real trouble collecting any of the taxes due, although it must attach some bank accounts and garnish some paychecks.

These procedures apparently satisfy the protesters that they're not paying involuntarily - because some even transfer bank accounts or provide information for the government's convenience in collecting.

The protesters mostly said they didn't want to freely contribute to U.S. costs of the war they oppose.

Some, however, owed nothing beyond what was paid through payroll deduction, some got refunds and others earned enough money to pay any taxes at all.

The IRS said not one court case has yet been filed to collect from a war protester.

Many deposited extra money in their savings and checking accounts where IRS agents could not touch it.

In June IRS attached more than \$30,000 from the bank accounts of the protesters. The money was returned to them for the third straight year she refused to pay part of her income tax in protest against military spending and Viet Nam.

Her name led a list of 360 persons in an April 14 newspaper ad which contained this statement: "We will refuse to pay our federal income taxes voluntarily."

IRS estimates that about 1,000 persons have publicly stated the same intention and as a matter of routine their tax returns will be audited. Through Sept. 1, checks had been run on 272 including 120 on the list published April 14.

Of the 120 on the published list, 86 owed additional tax, 23 had refunds and 11 owed nothing more.

IRS uncovered one protester who, because he hadn't listed his exemptions with his employer, had paid too much withholding tax since 1964.

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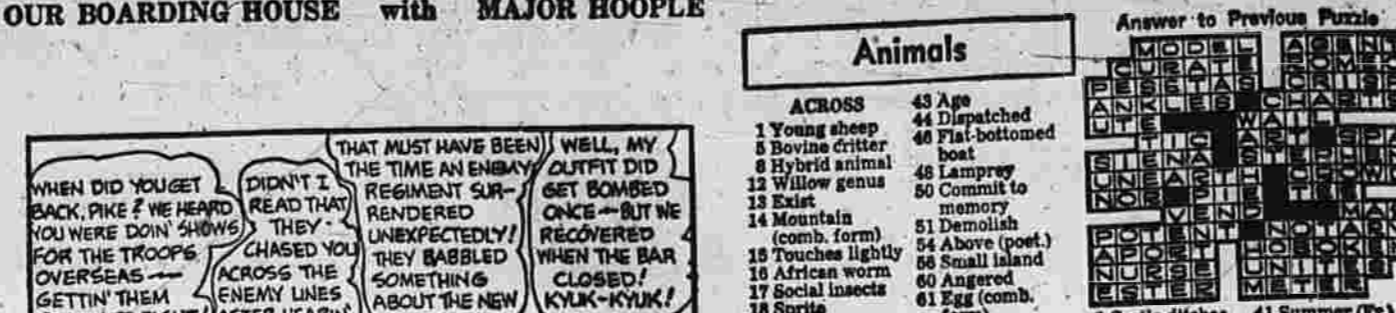

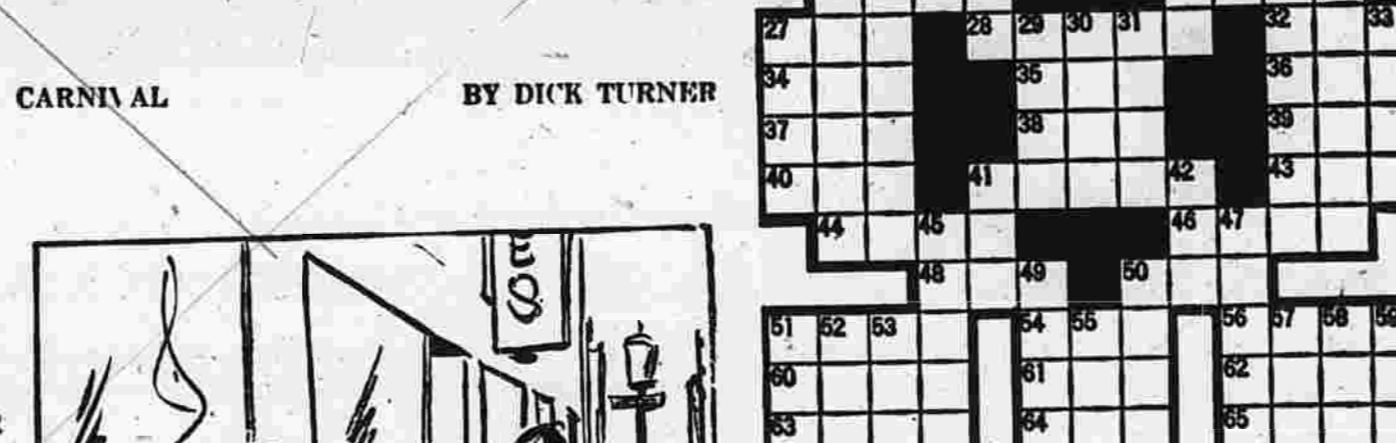

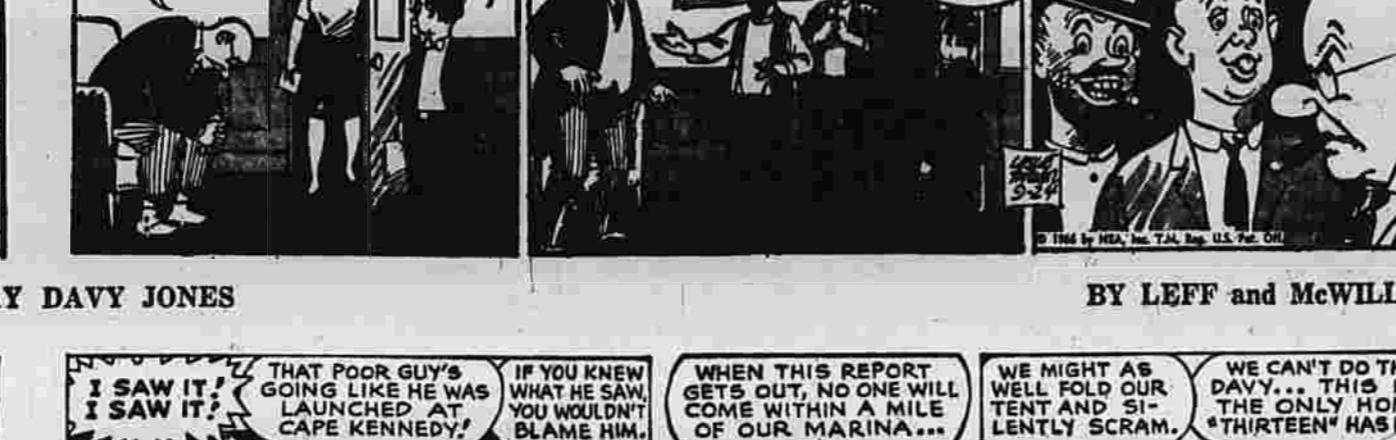

Bond Issue Revote Asked By Garside

GOP Town Director John Garside has backed a proposal by Republican Town Chairman Francis DellaFera that the Sept. 6 action of the board of directors, in approving a \$2.5 million Capital Improvements Bonds Issue, be rescinded and that the package be split. Mayor Francis Mahoney has turned the request down.

The Sept. 6 action was unanimous and Garside, in a statement issued today, explains that he voted reluctantly, "to insure badly needed school repairs."

He charges that "necessary repairs (to schools) have been deliberately swept under the rug, until the only solution is inclusion in a costly bond issue."

"I strongly support Republican Town Chairman Francis DellaFera's request that Mayor Mahoney call a special meeting to rescind the Board of Directors' action on Sept. 6 relating to the Capital Improvements Bond issue and that the Bond issue be split."

"Although I also voted for the package along with Director Stavitskiy, it is a matter of record that I did so reluctantly in order to insure badly needed school repairs. It is unfortunate that some of us were unable to attend the Aug. 23 discussion meeting due to vacations, and as the mayor had been previously notified I'm sure the meeting could have been rescheduled for full discussion. May I also remind the mayor that his attendance this year leaves much to be desired."

"It is regretful that our schools have been allowed to fall into their present state of disrepair and it is clear that necessary repairs have been deliberately swept under the rug until the only solution is inclusion in a costly Bond Issue. The Capital Improvement proposal package is a clear case of Democrat maneuvering to force the voters and taxpayers of Manchester to either vote against school improvement or accept items not necessarily needed at this time in order to obtain badly needed school repairs."

Manchester voters are again being by-passed by the Democratic majority and their right to express themselves on the merits of each item has been usurped by this package proposal. "I feel that it is imperative and in the best interest of Manchester that Mayor Mahoney reconsider his refusal and call a special meeting at the earliest opportunity to rescind the board's recent action and separate the items in the Capital Improvement Bond Issue."

Brooks Bros. Man Goes West

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — When it was announced that Herbert Brodtkin, who had produced the esteemed "Defenders" would take on a horse opera called "Shane," it occasioned a flurry of incredulous comment.

It is not only performers who get type-cast here, but producers, directors and writers as well. Brodtkin's reputation was built on "easterns—New York-made shows about professional men in Brooks Brothers suits who drink scotch and soda. It was almost unbelievable that he would try to shift over to the "they went that-away" side.

The truth is, however, that most of them don't try. David Dortort, producer of "Bonanza," is currently developing a new property for next year. It is another western, and where the Cartwright family of "Bonanza" get along happily together, the father and son in the upcoming one don't hit it off so well.

TV practitioners like Carl Reiner and Nat Hiken started in comedy—and stay in comedy. Ivan Tors, of "Flipper" and

"Daktari," has a corner on animal series.

A couple of seasons back a producer named Irwin Allen converted a movie he had made into a TV series, "Voyage to the Bottom of the Sea"—a fantasy about a supersubmarine that soon goes into its third season. Last year he followed with "Lost in Space," which also went well and gave Allen his special niche as TV's science fiction expert.

Allen this season is turning to the calendar as the source of new adventures. The series, on ABC, is called "Time Tunnel," and, among all the new shows, appears to be the only real novelty.

Allen's premise is that a group of scientists have created an electronic tunnel in which it is possible to move forward and backward in time. The magic machine is not quite foolproof, so when the first show is broadcast a week from Friday, we will find two intrepid scientists deposited on the liner Titanic as it moves majestically to a fate

they already know.

In the episode now being filmed, the adventurous scientists are set down in the Old West. On a set decorated with wigwams and Hollywood Indians, star James Darren was on his knees before an old Indian, begging him not to send his braves on the warpath.

It was Chief Sitting Bull, and Darren was trying to head off, of course, the massacre of General Custer's troops at Little Big Horn.

The show was able to use interestingly one historical fact. One show is set in the period of the great London plague, and researchers had found that, with death all around, a neighborhood of about 200 people survived intact. They built on that—and attributed their immunity to the fact that the "Time Tunnel" boys had arrived, carrying with them 1968 medicines and serums.

No one, of course, can predict how a series will look on the small screens or be received by the public. But "Time Tunnel," at least, has a fresh approach.

HOLLYWOOD AP — Kathy and nursing an all too real toothache, was in his undershirt, cooling off from a morning spent in Medieval knight's armor under the hot camera lights.

In Review: Show to Kill Time By

NEW YORK (AP) — It is highly probable that a large number of small children went to bed Thursday night under the impression that the American Revolution was won by a crack shot named Daniel Boone and his buddy, an Oxford-educated half-breed Cherokee named Mingo.

NBC's "Daniel Boone" took considerable dramatic license with a yarn about the Indian nations ready to unite at the urging of some underhanded British army officers to drive the settlers out of Kentucky.

This news was upsetting to Mingo, torn between his loyalty to "his people" and to his white brother, Daniel. He was imprisoned by the Indians for his own good, but happily there was a friendly squaw around to tip off Daniel about the plot and free Mingo. And together they foiled the scheme, the Redcoats retreated and presumably Washington was able to get ahead with the revolution.

"Daniel Boone" is not exactly a bad show, it's just a silly trite treatment. And any adult who voluntarily sits through an hour of such nonsense must really be trying to kill time.

"My Three Sons" on CBS is a situation comedy that has been around for so many successful seasons that one of the original sons outgrew his role and was

married out of the show. And Thursday night the writers got around to sending star Fred MacMurray back to the scenes of the boyhood—the little town in which he grew up and the girl whose initials he carved on the porch post.

The former girl friend turned out to be a shrill nag with a surly husband, whining kids and an untidy house.

It was a good thing MacMurray was around Thursday night. He has an ingratiating way that even makes TV cliches seem amusing.

A low-budget daytime show called "The Newlywed Game" moved quietly into ABC's schedule during the summer and has attained such popularity with afternoon audiences that it is currently providing stiff competition for the game-show champ in the ratings, "Password."

Its formula is simple and familiar. Four couples who have married recently are asked a series of questions designed to show how much the spouses

know about each other's likes and dislikes.

But the hidden gimmick that, perhaps accounts for the build-up of audience, may be the reaction of occasional couples who are losing the game. One young man in Thursday's show could not conceal his anger and dismay at his wife's answers and actually snarled at her on camera.

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For Jean Arthur Anything--Even TV

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Why did a successful movie director like Richard Quine become a television producer?
"Jean Arthur," he answers simply. "All they did was drop that name in front of me, and I fell to my knees. I had never known anybody that didn't love her on the screen, and I was a long-time fan myself."

"Also, television presented a challenge. Like a lot of people, I have been stupefied by what I saw on the home screen. I felt compelled to see if I could do any better."

The results on "The Jean Arthur Show" are not in yet. The reviews are what you might call mixed, some critics applauding the actress's return, some reporting that the vehicle was not up to her talents.

"I can understand how some of them felt. If I had been merely watching the show at home I might have been of the same opinion," said Quine. "But they were comparing her with the Jean Arthur who appeared opposite Gary Cooper, Jimmy Stewart and Ronald Colman."

Quine is a former MGM juvenile who still looks youthful in his mid-40s despite a recession of his blond locks. He retains a boyish enthusiasm for his work, but he admitted that he didn't know what he was getting into when he tackled television.

"It is a terrifying kind of involvement," he remarked. "It takes me a year to make a movie, from the start of the script to the final cutting and scoring. But in television we put out 23 minutes and 30 seconds of entertainment every week."

"I think we've done rather well. You can't accomplish what you can in features, but we have tried to maintain a standard. The only way to do it is by total dedication, and that is an exhausting process of belaboring

the writers to get them to provide the material we need."
Quine recently finished the multistar "Hotel" and has other movie projects under way. "Going back to features," he sighed, "will be like a vacation."
