DETROIT (AP) — Chrysler Corp. cut back its announced increase in prices today as Ford competitive with General Motors. Even with the revised figures, the average General Motors increase of a car was still lower than that of its two main competitors. The revised Chrysler like averaged out at \$64, now revised Chrysler and Ford 1967 prices stacked up against comparable GM offerings: Chevrolet Impala, 2-door hardtop, original \$27,499; revised \$27,499. Ford Galaxie 500, 2-door hardtop, original \$27,700; revised \$27,700.

Vernon Town Officials to Discuss Law on Sewer Tie-in Costs

A proposed ordinance setting sewer tie-in costs and rules will be discussed by town officials at a meeting tonight at 7 o'clock at the administration building.

A sanitary sewer line from the new Vernon Junior High school to the filtration plant has just been completed.

The tie-in costs were discussed at a meeting of the board of representatives tonight, and it was decided once a charge has been set, the cost will not be reduced for those who decide to tie-in at a later date.

The proposals made at tonight's meeting will be presented to the board of representatives, and if approved will go to a public hearing and then action will be taken to put the ordinance into effect.

Stated to be at the meeting tonight are Mayor Thomas McCusker, Richard Lombardi, town engineer, Jay Ellinger, director of administration; representatives from the town of Vernon, including Robert Baum, town councilman, and members of the sewer advisory commission.

Assessor Edgar Belleville reminds all veterans that Sept. 30 is the last day for filing homestead discharges with the town clerk in order to receive the \$1,000 veteran's tax exemption.

Any discharges filed after the month of March will be subject to a penalty. A petition should be applied to the grand list of October 1, 1967. Veterans who served with the territorial forces of Viet Nam, after December 31, 1965, or in naval or air force supportive action in the Republic of Vietnam, after this date and the Dominican Republic after April 27, 1965, are now eligible for the exemption.

The veteran's administration has notified the assessor's office that it will no longer send the disability rating slips, as it has in previous years. The rating slips are being mailed directly to the veterans with the instructions to give them to the assessor.

Any veteran receiving a slip should also have his discharge record. Any veteran having a disability of 10 per cent or more, who has not yet received a slip, should contact the assessor's office.

Most bridge players have the mistaken notion that the best opening lead is from a suit headed by A-K-Q, K-Q-J or Q-J-10. However, an uncomfortable opening lead, but comfort and safety, is to lead a suit headed by A-K-Q, K-Q-J or Q-J-10.

ELJEM SPEAKING from LUTZ JUNIOR MUSEUM

During this past summer the groundwork has been laid for many exciting things at the Oak Grove Nature Center. A second trail identified by blue markers is now ready to be explored. A trail guide listing the points of special interest along the trail will be available at the museum by the middle of October.

Autumn is a wonderful time of year at the Nature Center. Brilliant splashes of red, orange and yellow leaves make the woods come alive in an excitingly different way. The crimson reflections of the red maples in the pond give it a warm, almost fiery glow. The sounds are different, too—the full thud of acorns and the scurrying sound of squirrels busily gathering nuts for the coming winter. Gone is the tapping of the flicker, but the bluejay and crow are still heard loud and clear. The cicadas are now silent but the air is filled with the cricket's cheery song. Even the sound of the stream is more urgent as it knows that fall is here.

Those who take a walk in the Nature Center this fall will see a different kind of activity at the point where the pond and the stream meet. It is here that the Jaycees of Manchester are constructing a bridge for safe and easy access to the other side of the nature area. This is not going to be just another bridge. It is going to be an experience! Clinton Hendrickson, who designed it, expressed his reasons for the design in this way:

"By cutting steps into the banks leading down to the stream, a small and sturdy bridge would suffice for a safe crossing. Why not do this? It can't be done this way because we are dreaming. We are dreaming of a child, perhaps eight years old, coming onto this place in summertime a few years hence. Let's try to see with his eyes as he comes upon a leafy bend in the trail where a few steps lead down to a — what?"

"Here is an expanse of weathered shingles and melon-kernel boards surrounding a mysterious darkness. A glimpse of timber, hand-worked. A haunted house? No—too long. A tunnel? No—sun is leaking \$765,000 Bond Issue for a new In. This plank floor shows water below. A bridge? All this wood—I know! A covered bridge, like the pictures of olden times. Our young ventures moves down the few steps onto the approach deck at a pace remarkably deliberate for one of his age. He peers ahead into the coolness then moves into the shadowy inside. If you will call up certain of your childhood memories, you can, in your mind's eye, be this child as he experiences the bridge. These big timbers, strong, warm, roughly smooth, strange marks all over this thick floor. Creaky, ghostly. Something fitting in overhead darkness. Cool! Here's light—a window. Boy! I'm up high. How far down the brook is Out there a duck in the cattails! So blue in the sky. The clouds are like sailing ships. I could climb these slanting chunks of wood. Gee, this wonderful day.

"Of course, on some other day our venture will learn that this covered bridge is patterned after one still standing where it can be seen near Westchester where Connecticut Rt. 16 crosses the Salmon River. And not only its form will be from out of the past—many of its timbers and all of its siding once allied curing Connecticut shade-grown tobacco. As to authenticity—its structure will illustrate the town lattice system so widely used after 1840 in Connecticut. Now perhaps it is clear why we cannot have just a low foot-bridge or even a high steel bridge. We are building an adventure."

This footbridge will provide a walkway to complete a trail circling the pond and afford a viewing station overlooking the pond. The external appearance

Campaign Aide To Take Test In Percy Probe

Daley said another Percy worker, Tully Friedman, 24, had taken a lie detector test at his own request and passed it.

Daley emphasized that neither man are suspects in the Sept. 18 slaying of the 21-year-old woman.

Daley called for a bushy-haired young man seen with Valerie and her twin sister, Sharon, on a train some 30 hours before the slaying to identify himself.

Daley said if the young man does not come forward, Sharon will be asked to help artists create a drawing of him.

A 9 a.m. to noon voter-making session will be held in the town clerk's office in Monday's town elections. Eligible applicants must have reached the age of 21 since Sept. 1 or must have resided in Manchester for at least six months. In addition, they must be U.S. citizens.

On Nov. 8, in the state elections, the voters will have two other questions to decide—a \$765,000 Bond Issue for a new Gardner-Spring St. School, and a \$2.5 million Capital Improvements Bond Issue.

A company spokesman said the money would be used to help pay for expansion programs during the coming year, including additional land and buildings.

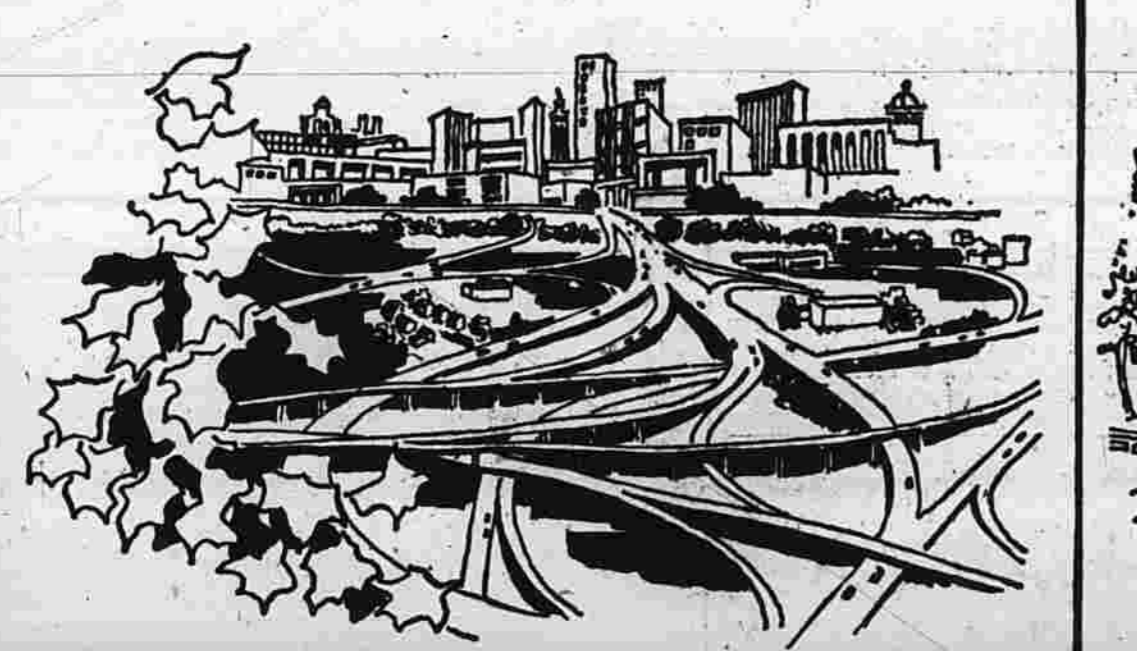

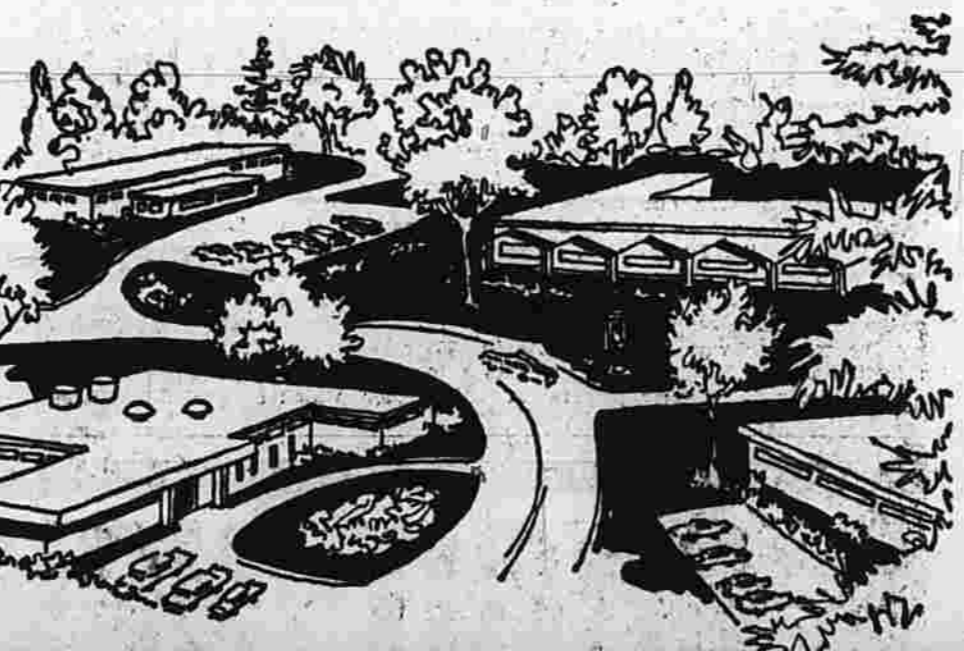

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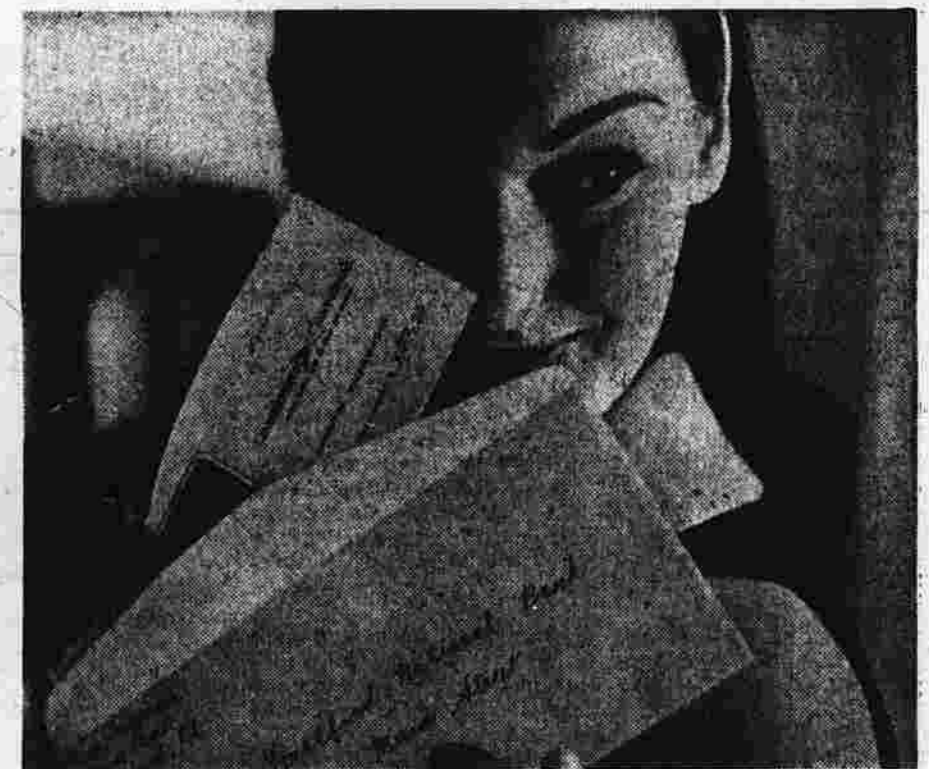

Rights 'Violated'
Woman Admits Killing Child, But Goes Free

NEW YORK (AP)—All the state had against Jean Powe was her own admission that she had killed her 4-year-old son because he soiled his bed. That confession was not enough. Mrs. Powe, 24, was free today after a Brooklyn judge ruled police had failed to inform her of her rights before she confessed — a violation of the Supreme Court Justice Michael Kern after he announced her release Monday.

"Don't thank me," Kern replied. "Thank the United States Supreme Court. You killed the child and you should go to jail."

Buy the plea was withdrawn after the intervention of a Legal Aid Society lawyer. The grounds were that Mrs. Powe had not been advised of her alternatives.

"Thank you," she told Supreme Court Justice Michael Kern after he announced her release Monday.

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High-Speed Tubes Possible Spectacular Changes Coming for Railroads

NEW YORK (AP)—A few years ago they looked like something puffing through a Grandma Moses painting, but now the railroads talk of data processing, jets, radar and 300-mile-an-hour passenger tubes.

The big long-haul lines are sopping up the red ink that had split all over their balance sheets, and billions of dollars are marked for spending on the short-haul passenger lines.

New or greatly expanded rapid transit lines will be built in at least 15 of the nation's largest cities by 1980. Some are already under construction, the largest of them in the San Francisco area.

For years the railroads complained about losing money. And the passengers complained about the service on everything from rapid transit systems to transcontinental lines.

Now the talking seems to be over, and money is being appropriated by business and governments. In the next decade or more Washington Air Brake Co. estimates Canadian and United States cities will spend more than \$6 billion.

So much research has recently gone into this old business of railroads that spectacular changes are bound to come in the next few decades.

All this has come about while the rail's big competitors: Trucks, automobiles, highways were expanding. Into the picture meanwhile, came a big new competitor, the airlines.

Whether because of poor administration or because of the competition, the rails went on the downhill fast. The New York Central lost \$100 million in 1964, and the Pennsylvania and New York Central lost an estimated \$80 million in the same year.

Passengers became a liability on some lines, and the passengers knew it. Long-distance travelers took to airplanes. They reached their destination faster, more dramatically and even less expensively.

Commuters and other look to the highways. The federal government appropriated billions for new roads, and Detroit helped fill them with production processing, jets, radar and 300-mile-an-hour passenger tubes.

The big railroads admitted they were inefficient. Where one line's facilities duplicated that of another they tried to merge. Where they couldn't compete for passengers they dropped them.

Roads often were clogged and blue smog veils hovered over some highways. Traffic jams became routine. Cities complained they couldn't accommodate their growing populations, even without their automobiles.

While everyone was trying to match transportation facilities to the needs of the population, itself, was changing. The move from rural areas to urban and suburban addresses speeded up. Metropolitan areas spread into each other, making the old congestion become an even bigger headache.

The commuter, the rapid transit rider, the frequent traveler between cities, complained more loudly than ever. New administrative units that transcended political boundaries, such as the longer distance, the Department of Commerce and the Pennsylvania and New York Central, were set up. Meetings with jet trains for the vacuum tube train, air cushion vehicle, and train drawn by magnets.

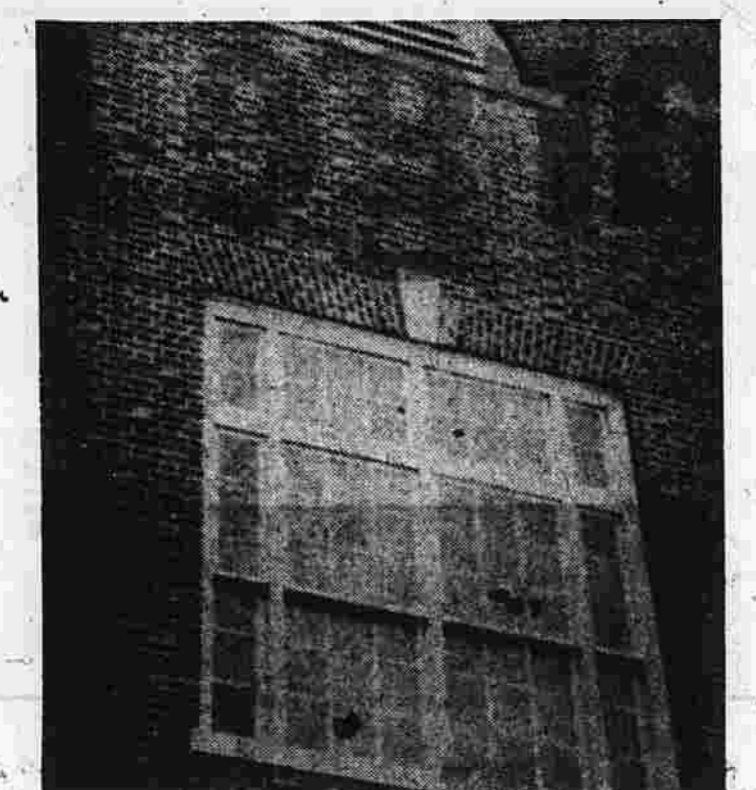

For the twins' sisters, Laura, 9, and Stella, 8, and their parents, Mr. and Mrs. D.C. Freeman, each day provides a new experience, approached, they say, with a wonderful new spirit.

"The whole attitude in this house has changed, as you might imagine," said a smiling Mrs. Freeman.

The Freeman twins underwent surgery Nov. 5, 1964, when six doctors performed a transplant, giving Mary one of Nancy's kidneys.

Doctors said Mary's kidneys were too small to function properly.

"It was the only chance for Mary's survival," said Mrs. Freeman in an interview. "These was almost no chance of causing Nancy any harm."

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will buy some properties and demolish the building on them.

Some of the land will remain in public ownership indefinitely. It will be some streets and walkways and similar public facilities. Probably a greater percentage of the 144 acres will become public land than at present.

Most of the land the agency buys and clears will be sold to private developers who will build on it according to restrictions and time limits set by the redevelopment agency.

Thus it will become tax-producing property again. Renewal officials, however, see a loss in this respect, however, of \$1,800,000 in assessed value.

The agency proposes to acquire properties the total assessments for which is now \$2,800,000. During the period when the land stands vacant, it will be assessed for tax purposes at only \$1,000,000.

This loss, however, is offset by the expectation that new private investment in real estate will be made within the area. The agency estimates that new investment of \$8,250,000 as the minimum to be expected. An investment of that amount would result in new assessed value of \$5,840,000.

The agency has determined that a more reasonable figure for new real estate investment would be \$11,125,000, producing new assessed value of \$8,010,000.

The "loss" then of \$1,800,000 in assessed value can be called a loss only if the Downtown Renewal fails completely to bring forth new real estate investment, an incredible possibility in view of the high stake downtown property owners and merchants have in the renewal project.

The one clear cost to the town's taxpayers is the \$2,000,000 bond issue and the interest which will have to be paid on that bond issue. That is about \$2,800,000—the out-of-pocket investment which the voters are being asked to make in the town's future.

And even that expenditure brings certain guaranteed benefits which do not depend on anyone's faith in renewal.

It provides, for instance, for the widening and extension of Cottage St. to afford a second north-south road, a goal which before renewal seemed unattainable.

It provides also for the widening of Spruce St. which will probably never come to pass without renewal. It provides for widening Maple St. It provides for making Main St. passable without eliminating convenient parking.

It provides for correcting the messy traffic situation at the Center.

It provides more land for Benet Junior High School and Nathan Hale School. It provides for resolving a raft of utilities problems which would have to be tackled over the years piecemeal.

Basically the cost of renewal is simple to describe. The cost is small.

Fire The Best

We are not so sure, on the basis of latest developments, that there is any great gap between managing television and managing baseball after all.

A Sharp Needle

Republican gubernatorial nominee Clayton Genras is proving an unorthodox campaigner, which will do no harm. In New Haven last week he went out of his way to laud Democratic Mayor Richard Lee for doing a "fine job" in the area of redevelopment, schools, and housing. There was a touch of Machiavellian intent in the Genras move because Lee, who is clearly the most skilled mayor in the state, has a lukewarm relationship with Governor Dempsey. No doubt the stems from Mayor Lee's concept of government, which is oriented toward far more activism than is espoused by Governor Dempsey, but whatever the cause, Genras was trying to widen the breach.

Furthermore, the GOP candidate was on very solid ground, and he obviously was hoping to pick up a few Lee voters. Mayor Lee is probably the most capable Democratic politician in the state aside from Senator Abraham Ribicoff. He could easily fill Senator Dodd's seat in the Senate if Dodd resigns following the Senate hearings, and there are not a few Democrats who would like to see Lee approach the problem of governing the state.

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Connecticut Yankee

We begin to be afraid that all the spotlight attention being given to campaign contributions and expenses, and reports thereon, is going to have a most unfortunate effect on this 1968 state campaign.

If this kind of scrutiny continues, several comfortable and traditional fictions are going to be exposed.

And if these fictions can't be used any more, we can't quite see how any campaign will ever manage to limp toward its finish.

One of the fictions which is most useful in the business of accounting for party campaign funds is the fiction which says that certain generous cash amounts have been donated by this or that individual—often an office holder if the donation is to the party in power—often a party worker if the donation is to the party still on the outside.

As some of the Republican snipers at this fiction has begun pointing out, very early in the reporting of the contributions, the Democratic jobholders or their relatives threaten to add up to more than the salary the jobholders in question get from their position on the state payroll.

The Republican sniping takes the disdign attitude that all these reported contributions are legitimate gifts out of the financial resources of the people listed. In reality, however, no one really believes that such specific individuals are really being that generous. The suspicion is that their names are being used as a cover to provide a legal cover for the funneling into the party coffers of money obtained from some other source—either from some private business or even criminal activities which loves which ever party it is very much, or from some source which is paying off for past or present favors.

This year, with the spotlight playing around money and the year for real sympathy with those poor people who are being listed in donations as contributors above their own actual finances.

In past years the normal extent of such gifts was the use of a name.

The more comfortable and traditional fiction being threatened by this campaign's impolite attention to the issue of campaign funds is the usual pretense that the two parties actually report anything like the total amount of money they actually spend on a campaign.

Normally and traditionally, the parties will report as much as can be legally accounted for through the use of all available fictional contributors and the listing of all legitimate and verifiable expenditures.

When the parties and candidates report such formal figures, everybody starts playing the guessing game—trying to guess how much the parties or candidates really did spend.

In past campaigns, the usual guess as to actual expenditures, including those of non-treacherous cash, has run about double the amount formally reported.

We doubt that either Connecticut party really wants to change this convenient custom for the present campaign. But if they don't stop playing around with the campaign funds issue, they'll queer the whole game for each other.

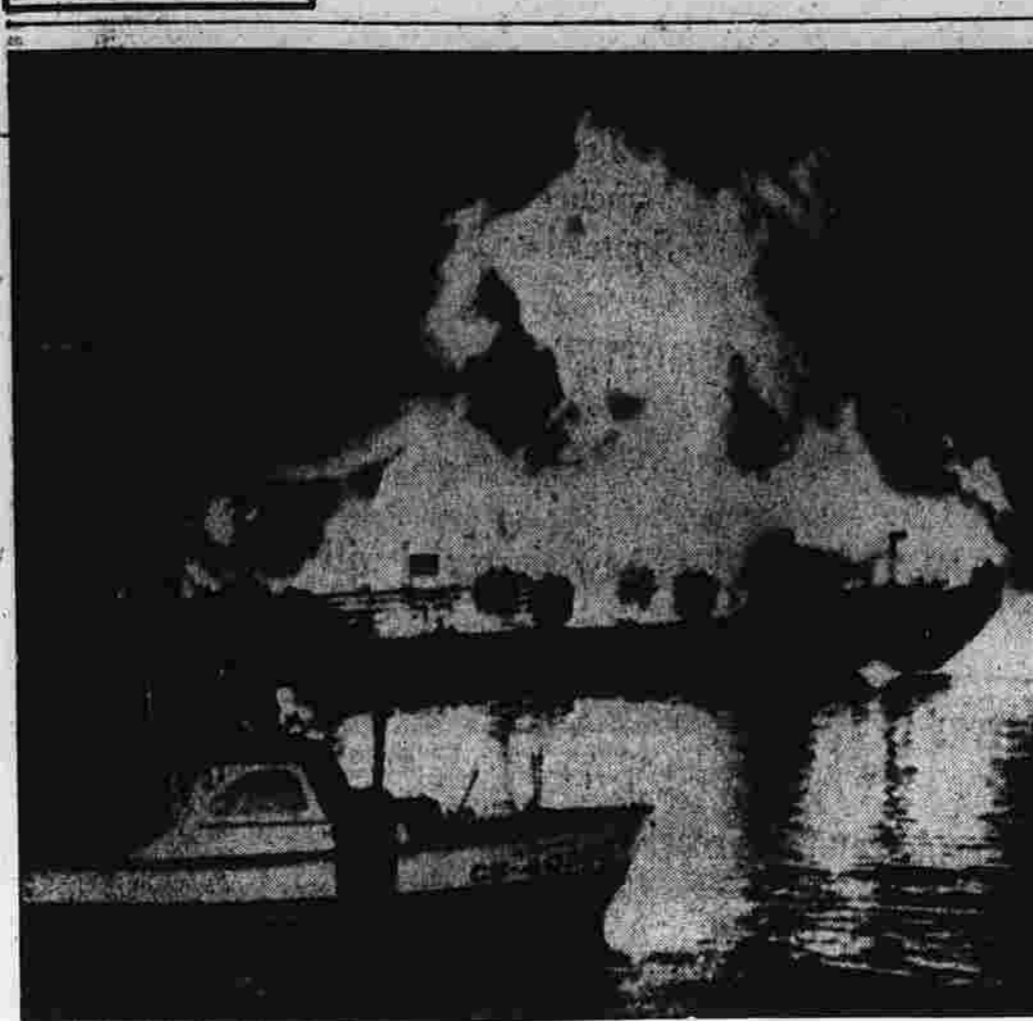
