

In San Francisco Negro Youth's Death Touches Off Rioting

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — At least three automobiles were damaged in a riot that broke out in San Francisco Tuesday night after the shooting of a 16-year-old Negro youth by police.

Police closed off a 12-square block area at Hunters Point, which is in the southeastern part of San Francisco and is a Negro neighborhood. The shooting occurred at 10:30 p.m. Tuesday in the area of the intersection of 16th and Divisadero streets.

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Marines Bomb in Error; Friendly Viet Village Hit

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Two U.S. Marine planes veered about 3,000 yards from their strike zone and dropped 500-pound bombs by error yesterday on a friendly Montagnard village. The explosions killed 45 persons and wounded 16.

The village was Hon Ba, in northern Quang Nam Province, where American Marines were campaigning in Operation Prairie to check the inflow of North Vietnamese troops across the old demilitarized zone blanketing the frontier.

The U.S. command also directed that American troops have launched four new search-and-destroy operations and are operating in the Mekong Delta. The first time in the Viet strike zone and dropped 500-pound bombs by error yesterday on a friendly Montagnard village.

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Air Strike Postponed, Rescheduled

NEW YORK (AP)—With a 10 p.m. deadline for negotiations continuing amid reports of progress, the AFL-CIO Transport Workers Union today postponed a down strike against American Airlines and rescheduled it for 6:45 p.m. EDT.

At 8 a.m., just 45 minutes before the walkout against the nation's second largest domestic airline was to have begun, a union spokesman announced that the strike was being postponed for 12 hours "in view of progress."

The American announced that all flights would operate normally as talks continued. At 7:30 a.m., only for South Vietnamese.

Only light contact with the enemy was reported in the four new operations, which were launched earlier this month but were postponed until today.

The strike scheduled for 6:45 p.m. today in view of the progress being made in negotiations and in the public interest.

The TWU represents 17,000 employees, but a strike would have shut down the entire American Airlines system of 45,000 employees.

Soon after the union announced that negotiations were continuing and that round of small-arm ammunition, 800 mortar rounds, 7,000 grenades, 160 rockets, 4,000 anti-tank mines, 20,000 demolition charges and other explosives.

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Dominican Republic In Hurricane's Path

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP)—A hurricane is expected to be raised during the week of Sept. 28-30, a killer day.

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2,000-Mile Trip Mexican Youth Hides In Jet's Wheel Well

MEXICO CITY (AP)—A 17-year-old Mexican stowaway was home safe in Queretaro today after a 2,000-mile flight from Colombia in the wheel compartment of a jet airliner.

"It was really scared part of the time," said Francisco Cuevas Garcia, "but I made it, and that's what I wanted to do—get home as quickly as possible."

Francisco said he got home sick after six months in Colombia but didn't have the money to take a plane back to Mexico. Doctors would have taken too long to work his way home on a freighter—the way he went to Colombia.

A source close to the reported hijackers said 17 men and their women leader "took the islands." But this was not immediately confirmed.

The hijacking was confirmed by government sources and officials of the state-owned Aerolineas Argentinas airline. They said a communique would be issued later.

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Plane Hijacked Over Britain's Falkland Islands

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP)—A group of Argentine extremists, reported to be led by a woman, hijacked a passenger plane with 44 persons aboard and forced it to land in the British-owned Falkland Islands in the South Atlantic today. The aim apparently was to reassert Argentina's claim over the islands.



### Stamps In the News

Four paintings, full of tradition and folklore, appear on stamps just issued by the Republic of China, reports the World Wide Philatelic Agency. The stamps depict the following: Flaming on a Snowy Day, Winter in the Mountains, Snowscape, Magpies. Each stamp is multi-colored and captures the harmonious colors of the originals. All the paintings are of the Golden Age (700-1600 A.D.). They represent collections of many emperors and form part of the treasure now housed in the Chunghsin Museum. The Chinese Nationalist government started this series of stamps in 1960 to introduce the beauty and splendor of early Chinese culture. Previous issues illustrated paintings entitled: Two Horses and Groom, Two Riders, Flowers and Birds, Man and Horse, and a group of figures. In 1962 paintings of ancient emperors Li-Shih-min, Chao Kwang-yin, Cheng Khan and Chu Yuan-Chang appeared. ### New Haven's Trustees Welcome New Aid

GREENWICH (AP)—The trustees of the bankrupt New Haven Railroad have welcomed a long-term plan to improve commuter service with government aid, but warn that it must not obscure the need for immediate assistance. The governors of New York and Connecticut gave strong support Tuesday to a plan calling for an \$80 million modernization program — with \$63 million coming from the federal government and \$14 million from Connecticut and New York. ### Andover Town Dump Among Items In Meeting

The annual town meeting scheduled for next Monday in the Town Hall at 8 p.m. calls for action on 14 items and 5 of these relate to the Andover disposal area and the changes required by State law from an open-face operation to a sanitary land fill method.

The meeting will take action on a proposed contract with the town of Bolton to use the disposal area for a five-year period. Also, an appropriation of \$30,000 is requested for the purchase of a bulldozer and other equipment. An additional appropriation of \$10,000 is requested for current operation of the area due to changing over to a modified land fill operation. The meeting will be asked to set up a committee to study the new requirements. Authority to issue notes to meet the appropriations requested will be sought.

Other items in the warning include the hearing and acceptance of the annual report to elect three members to the Memorial Day Committee and to see if the sign post for public notices at the Town Hall be discontinued.

The meeting will consider the purchase of a 70-acre tract of land adjacent to the town school, which has been proposed and designated as a future town center and has also been a part of the open space area under consideration. If acquired by the town by outright purchase there would be no limitation as to its use. If acquired with state and federal assistance the use of it would be more or less restricted to open space purposes of conservation and recreation. Total purchase price would be \$14,000 with \$15,000 to be appropriated.

The only other item, other than "any other business," to come up is to hear a report of the conservation commission on the possibility of the town selling a 15-acre tract of land on Bear Swamp Rd., located at the Andover-Coverly town line.

**Manchester: Past Places, People**

**Wickham Park and Its Donors**  
The Wickham Estate became Wickham Park when, in 1900, by bequest of Charles H. and Edith M. Wickham, their 140-acre property "The Pines" was made a public park. It was their gift to the residents of Manchester and East Hartford.

The park has been developed and administered under the trusteeship of the Hartford National Bank with three commissioners from each town serving as advisors. Clifton Griswold, Matthew Moriarty and Bruce Watkins are the present commissioners from Manchester.

Better than reading about the park, one should make a leisurely visit to see the extensive views, the landscaping, the separated but well planned play and picnic areas and the Oriental Garden and to sense the size of the park and its beauty.

The park is a short distance west to the Howell Cheney Regional Technical School on Rt. 14 toward Burrhead. There are two driveways leading into the park: the most eastern goes east the Oriental Garden and the second, main drive, places a large garage behind the place where the Wickham mansion, built in 1800, once stood.

**Cliff Remains**  
A Loc Sabbe site at the top of the hill was built by the Wickhams in 1927 as a place for informal visits. Their friends and family. Even now there are sturdy chairs on the porch and a large parking area is behind it.

Inside the cabin during the summer months and on weekends until the end of October, an attendant is on duty to explain the privileges of the park, and a replica of a tea house and a replica of a tea house and a replica of a tea house.

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### An Extreme In Politics

Nervous Republicans everywhere, and cynical Americans in general, have for some time been quite sure that President Lyndon B. Johnson would, some time before the November election, come up with some gimmick designed to protect his administration, and Democratic candidates, from the potential harm because of the issue of the war in Vietnam.

Now the gimmick appears in the open. The President, toward the end of October, will be making a showy journey to the Philippines with the announced purpose of conferring with our Asian allies in order to promote the prospects for peace in Vietnam.

Until there is proof otherwise, this has to be labeled a political, not a diplomatic journey.

It has to be considered, as Republican leadership in Congress has already suggested, as the way President Johnson has chosen to do his campaigning for the November congressional elections.

It might happen, by some fortuitous accident, by one of those developments in history which takes place just because people find themselves in a certain situation and then feel forced to try to do something to justify their being there, that some actual progress toward peace could result from this journey.

There is a better chance of such accidental benefit from the journey, we would wager, than there is chance that it will have its desired political result.

The American people have already demonstrated, in their primary voting, that although they are disturbed over Vietnam and ever and ever and ever hopelessly divided in their opinion as to the rightness and wisdom of our conduct there, they nevertheless shrink from putting any clear voting verdict against the war and the American role in it on the record.

On the basis of the way the voting has gone in the primaries, the American voters on Nov. 5 seem likely to make Vietnam our main reason for voting against the Johnson administration.

We suspect the President was safer on the Vietnam issue than he himself has been calculating.

But now, on top of their uneasiness about the war itself, and the President's conduct of it, the people of America are being offered a summit example of open politicking with the honor of this nation and the lives of its sons.

They may vote against that, because their own uncontrollable visceral reaction compels them to.

To keep whatever chance of peaceful, honorable solution there may be to the problem of Vietnam clean and open is more important than any small change upward in the percentage of vote cast for Democratic candidates on Nov. 5.

Good Advice, Anywhere  
The California Public Utility Commission has done an amazing thing.

In denying a plea by the Southern Pacific Railroad to abandon its famed overnight train, the Lark, between Los Angeles and San Francisco, the commission suggested to the railroad that it make a greater effort to attract passengers.

Now, this is advice that is highly prescient for no other reason than it makes sense.

Anyone who has ridden on a train in the public business, or even in the private, to notice that methods of dissuading passengers from ever doing it again have ranged from simple failure to provide first-class service to heights of passenger inconvenience and discomfort that approach sheer genius.

Admittedly, the railroads have been riding rough financial roads, and the problems they face are many and big. But one cause of steady dwindling passenger business that they often fail to mention is that in many, many instances passengers have been practically invited to stay off trains.

Even the most dedicated train buff becomes discouraged when he finds that a train can no longer take him where he wants to go—at least not without hardy adventures rivaling those encountered by Christopher Columbus.

Lincoln, Neb.—As the most Republican state, Nebraska ought to be the last place for the Johnson administration to send its treasure and its heroes to reverse the normal tide of an off-year Congressional election.

The surprising fact, moreover, is that the Democrats have a pretty good case for their last push before the congressional out here, Rep. Clair Callan, is regarded as a cinch for re-election in a district that, until the Goldwater debacle of 1964, had been a solid Republican district for almost three decades. The Republicans don't concede Callan his seat, of course, but they are writing on the wall. "Callan has entrenched himself all too well," a top Republican strategist privately told us. "He'll win."

Callan, in other words, has provided voters in the first district with the same kind of "service" that freshmen Democrats all over the nation, pushed and prodded by Washington, have been giving their new constituencies.

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## Viet Villages Live On Despite Shells, Napalm

LINH HOI, Viet Nam (AP)—her stomach, threw a mat over this is the way life goes in the village caught in the vortex of war.

Artillery shells burst among the filthy hatched huts of Linh Hoi. Napalm seared through coconut trees and corn.

Far below the splintering shrapnel, in a deep earth bunker, the sounds of a newborn baby's first cries, briefly drowned out the holocaust overhead.

The aged village midwives ceremoniously dug a hole for the placenta, nodding to each other wisely. This baby would live already were 30 feet below ground.

The hours moved on. In normal times, the good spirits might well take note and coax the newborn child to manhood through the barriers of disease and malnutrition that kill half the peasant Vietnamese before now and walk back to her village.

But these were not normal times. War had become part of the disease of Viet Nam. Within 24 hours the sleeping baby awakened and choked on vomit seeping down in the bunker. The midwives, the neighbors and the visitors who had crowded into the and aircraft first came over, swarmed out into the bright light above.

Men of the U.S. 1st Cavalry Division (Altnobile) had swept through the village once without locating a soul. Now they were systematically burning the houses to the ground. They were amazed as hundreds of women, children and old men poured from the ground.

The mother and her baby stayed below.

Much later that day Lt. Jasper Campesi of Chicago, leading his platoon around the edge of Linh Hoi, saw the party. The mother, probably 18 years old, was "kinds holding herself in," said Campesi.

An old man, a conical straw hat perched on his head, was tenderly clutching the naked baby. Its tiny fists were clenched instinctively over its eyes to close out the light.

Campesi beckoned to one of his men. They put the young mother in a string hammock and tied it under a long bamboo pole. They placed the baby on

The fate of the baby was now in the hands of the spirits. Just a few hundred yards away, a young man was dying, punctured by shell fragments and bullets probably in the earlier that day. A member of the local Viet Cong militia there were just too force now he was home with his family to die.

His wife wept uncontrollably on the earth floor beside his crude bed. Two young children were in her arms, another child pointed to the sky.

The mother was making him weep, she was saying, "But we can't leave here." "Are you kidding? These people are tough, they don't need our help. I bet she could get right here. So let us have him."

The wife and mother refused.

They told an interpreter, "Just let us take him across the river to bury him at the pagoda. He was born here, he has died here. So let us have him."

Campesi shook his head.

"This place gets me down, let's move on," he called to his platoon.

The troops started taking sides, but the argument was resolved simply enough. The radio failed and they couldn't get more helicopters anyway.

The mother was pulling at Campesi's trouser leg. The fear had left her eyes. There seemed to be arrogance there now, sharpened by what looked like scorn at the bickering and indecision of the troops. She pointed back at her smoldering village.

"Take me back" she was saying. The little old man had picked up the pink-skinned baby and was walking away. Campesi and another soldier hoisted the pole, with the mother slung underneath, to their shoulders.



WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Republicans discount the impact of President Johnson's pre-election trip to the Manila summit conference of leaders of nations battling Communist forces in Viet Nam.

"The gap between the reforms carried out by the Saigon government still remains embarrassingly large," he said. "I urge the President to clarify his objectives and to make sure they are attainable, and not to raise expectations that cannot be fulfilled."


### Sukkos Festival Starts Tonight



Sallis took issue Wednesday night with Mayers' having raised the question of "moral issue" being involved.

"It is inconceivable that an elected official could resort to such smear and innuendo," he said.

UN Council To Discuss Thant Role

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The U.N. Security Council at a meeting today was expected to discuss proposals of Secretary-General U Thant of Burma to continue as secretary-general or to resign.

The 15-nation council scheduled a private meeting to approve its annual report to the General Assembly. But a council member said he was sure the group would talk about the matter of the secretary-general today.

Thant's present five-year term expires Nov. 3. He has said he would remain on the job until the end of the year. Unless he can be prevailed on to take another five-year term, the Security Council — and particularly the United States and the Soviet Union — must agree on a successor before the General Assembly can fill the post.

Soviet Ambassador Nikolai T. Fedorenko is president of the council this month, and other council members said it was he who proposed that the council postpone the meeting if he had scheduled two weeks ago. Fedorenko reportedly said then that Thant should be given more time to think about his future.

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Viet Casualties High

Worst Week Yet For U.S. Troops

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — U.S. forces suffered more casualties in South Viet Nam last week than in any week of the war, the U. S. command announced today.

The highest number of American casualties exceeded 500 in the week ending last Sunday, the U. S. command said.

The previous highest number of American casualties during the week ending last Sunday was 425, the U. S. command said.

The strength of U. S. armed forces in the country increased to 315,000, the U. S. command said, just 2,000 less than the strength of the regular South Vietnamese forces.

Estimated enemy strength in South Viet Nam reported eight men killed and 28 wounded. The week before there were three killed and 18 wounded.

Other allied forces in Viet Nam reported eight men killed and 28 wounded. The week before there were three killed and 18 wounded.

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
