**Soviets Hike Prices**

MOSCOW (AP) — Wholesale prices of Soviet heavy industrial products will be increased an average of 11 to 12 per cent to stimulate production of higher quality goods, the Soviet news agency Tass said today.

Tass said the increase, to become effective next summer, will be prepared to conform with new principles of economic planning set out by Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev at a meeting of the Central Committee a year ago.

A new approach increases the importance of profits as a criterion of the efficiency of the national economy.

**Talks in Laos**

VIENTIANE, Laos (AP) — Premier Souvanna Phouma flew to the royal capital of Luang Prabang today for talks with King Savang Vatthana over the current political crisis.

The crisis was caused by the National Assembly's rejection of the government's budget for the next fiscal year.

The government can resign or the king dissolve the assembly and order new elections within 90 days.

**Red Unity Urged**

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Poland's Communist party is continuing its efforts to unify the Red world at a high-level meeting of all parties despite a blunt rejection from Red China.

The meeting would establish a united front to aid North Viet Nam and "upset the hopes of U.S. ruling circles that feel free to extend the scale of war," the official party paper Trybuna said Thursday.

The paper said Soviet-Chinese unity is indispensable to a Communist victory in Viet Nam. It condemned Peking for breaking this unity.

**Chinese Suicides**

HONG KONG (AP) — A former Hong Kong film and opera star jumped to her death and a Canton editor killed himself with poison because of Red Guards persecution, non-Communist papers said today.

The papers said the suicides were reported by Chinese arriving from Canton. Numerous rivals have reported a wave of suicides sweeping China as a result of the terrorism and destruction by the young Red Guards.

The travelers from Canton claimed Miss Hung Sim-mui, 46, killed herself last Saturday at a Red Guard cut off her hair and led her through the streets of Canton, accusing her of "capitalistic living."

They also reported that Chung Mu, 55, deputy editor of Canton's Yang Hsin Evening News, jumped last week and swallowed poison in the bathroom of his home.

# Prison Escapee Evades Police In Canada Again

**LACURETTE, Que. (AP) — Escaped convict Andre Dugas, 24, shot his way out of a police trap Thursday night and disappeared into his friends' neighborhood.**

Lacurette, Quebec's most-wanted man, blasted his way out of another police trap last month at La Tuque, 200 miles north of Montreal.

He escaped from Montreal's St. Luc Hospital in June, was arrested by Royal Canadian Mounted Police in July and escaped from jail by hitting a jailer over the head with a lead pipe.

Dugas had been serving a four-year term for an \$11,000 credit union robbery when he was transferred to the hospital for treatment of an injured leg.

Police captured the three other men in the cottage after the gun battle. One of them was wounded, told police "Dugas got it worse than I did." Officers, who did not identify the wounded man, brought a police dog in in hopes of tracking down the apparently wounded escapee artist.

**Area Weather**

WINDSOR LOCKS (AP) — Morning fog and low cloudiness will give way to some sunshine in Connecticut today.

Temperatures in Connecticut are expected to average below normal. Cool throughout the period with little day to day change.

The normal high and low in the Hartford area is 66 and 46, in New Haven 69 and 49, and in Bridgeport 70 and 51.

Precipitation may total over 1/2 inch, occurring at the beginning and end of the period.

Dietrichen was sentenced yesterday morning to 360 days on a charge of breaking and entering, 360 days for a larceny charge, and 60 days for breaking and entering. The sentences were to run concurrently.

### In The Streets, In Voting Booths

The easy primary victory in Georgia for Lester G. Maddox, the candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor, who, in the words of one commentator, had nothing but his white supremacy issue going for him, is bad news.

Similarly, there is more and even more serious bad news ahead, if various political prognostications are to be respected, in the appearance of something called "white backlash" in upcoming elections all across the country.

If in response to what white people sometimes quite accurately and justly evaluate as neo-extremism among the Negro battlers for civil rights and basic position in the American society, the white people themselves begin to turn back toward racial extremism of their own—that is going to have a compounding effect on the amount of trouble this nation has to face and surmount if it is to live through its inevitable and necessary revolution on the race front.

There is little choice as to which is the more terrible thing in this fall of 1966—some contemptuous, "Marxist" Negro act of senseless violence or some white American going to the polls and casting a white vote.

Each thing interacts on the other. A Negro disorder in the streets can help the victory of a Lester Maddox in Georgia.

The victory of Lester Maddox in Georgia can help clinch the desperate argument, among some Negroes, that only violence on the streets has a chance of winning the battle they have to win.

A vote cast white in a Northern city or town can help persuade the Negroes that their hope of winning through reason and moderation blunted, they are inevitably going to turn toward more violent voices and more drastic codes of action.

There is only one difference between the two sides of such interacting stimuli toward a state of the nation in which all of us will be living a race war, and nothing else.

There is some difference in the time and opportunity these two divisions of American life have had to develop themselves into full, responsible inheritors of the processes and the privileges of a free country.

There is, therefore, more shame upon the one, when it compounds the tragedy of our time, than upon the other.

There should be, therefore, more legitimate hope for restraint and moderation for civilized conduct in the voting booth, to be specific—from the white side of the mutual problem.

It begins to look as if this nation might have only a very slim chance of reaching the kind of national political fashion that it would remain, afterward, a nation.

Both the ominous looking black panther, and the pointed rigidity of a white, judgmental section in the voting booth, operate only to decrease the slim chance we have.

Relief Riot. There were those who thought that it could never happen in the land which was famous for its steady habits. It did happen, Thursday last about 125 persons, led by state paid social workers and clergymen, attempted to break their way into the office of Welfare Commissioner Shaprio.

Let it be on the record that these rioters were the aged, the sick, the handicapped and with ten exploited exceptions they were not children. They were, from their actions, remarkably able bodied and some of them assuming leadership had never been on relief and never would be.

CARSON CITY, Nevada—In the campaign now being waged for governor of Nevada by Lt. Gov. Paul Laxalt lies the seeds of a new kind of Republicanism that could prove the salvation of the party.

Commissioner Shaprio says that within weeks Connecticut relievers will get more than any relievers in the nation. Considering the number of well paid jobs going begging for able bodied persons to demand more relief.

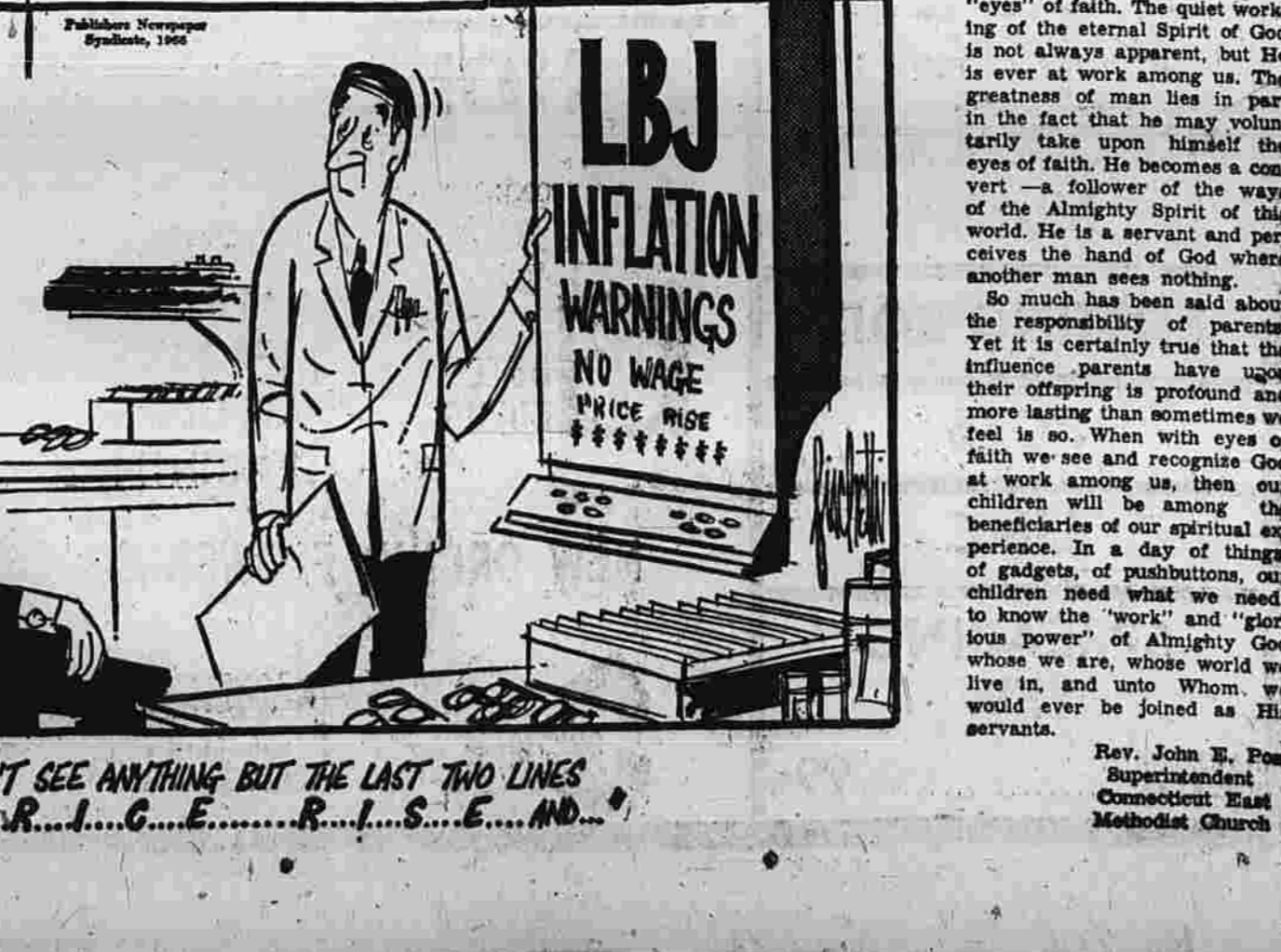

### Man Resembling Solberg Placed at Murder Scene

LITCHFIELD (AP)—A patrolman for the Metropolitan Water Bureau has testified that he saw a man resembling Harry Solberg get out of a car in front of the home of Mrs. Dorothy Thompson the afternoon she was brutally murdered.

William Flagg of East Hartford said he was driving past the Thompson home in Barkhamsted between 1:30 and 1:40 p.m. on June 15, 1965, when he saw the man.

Flagg testified at the Solberg murder trial Thursday that the car matched the police description of Solberg's car.

Dr. Lincoln Opper, a pathologist who examined Mrs. Thompson's body at Charlotte Hungerford Hospital in Torrington, said that she died early in the afternoon.

Solberg, 30, of Hartland, has been charged with first degree murder in connection with the hanging, stabbing, bludgeoning slaying of Mrs. Thompson, 30, was withdrawn after Solberg was accused of the slaying.

Dr. Owen Murphy of Sims called to the scene the afternoon after the murder, testified that he spoke to the older Mrs. Thompson for about 15 minutes that night.

"She was very effusive, full of joy, happiness," he said.

Murphy said he was told by the woman that she was happy because "she did some service for the Lord." She did not say what the service was, Murphy testified.

He said the older Mrs. Thompson was "confused and spoke in a choppy manner that was not understandable."

Earlier, in describing the cause of death, Murphy had testified "the blood was an afterthought by a person who thinks very rapidly and compulsively."

A neighbor of the Thompsons, Mrs. Carol Stadler, testified that she was afraid of her mother-in-law, Opper and Murphy disagreed as to the exact cause of death.

Murphy said, "It was a fractured skull that killed her." Opper testified "the blood was quite fluid and dark without any clots and this usually means asphyxiation."

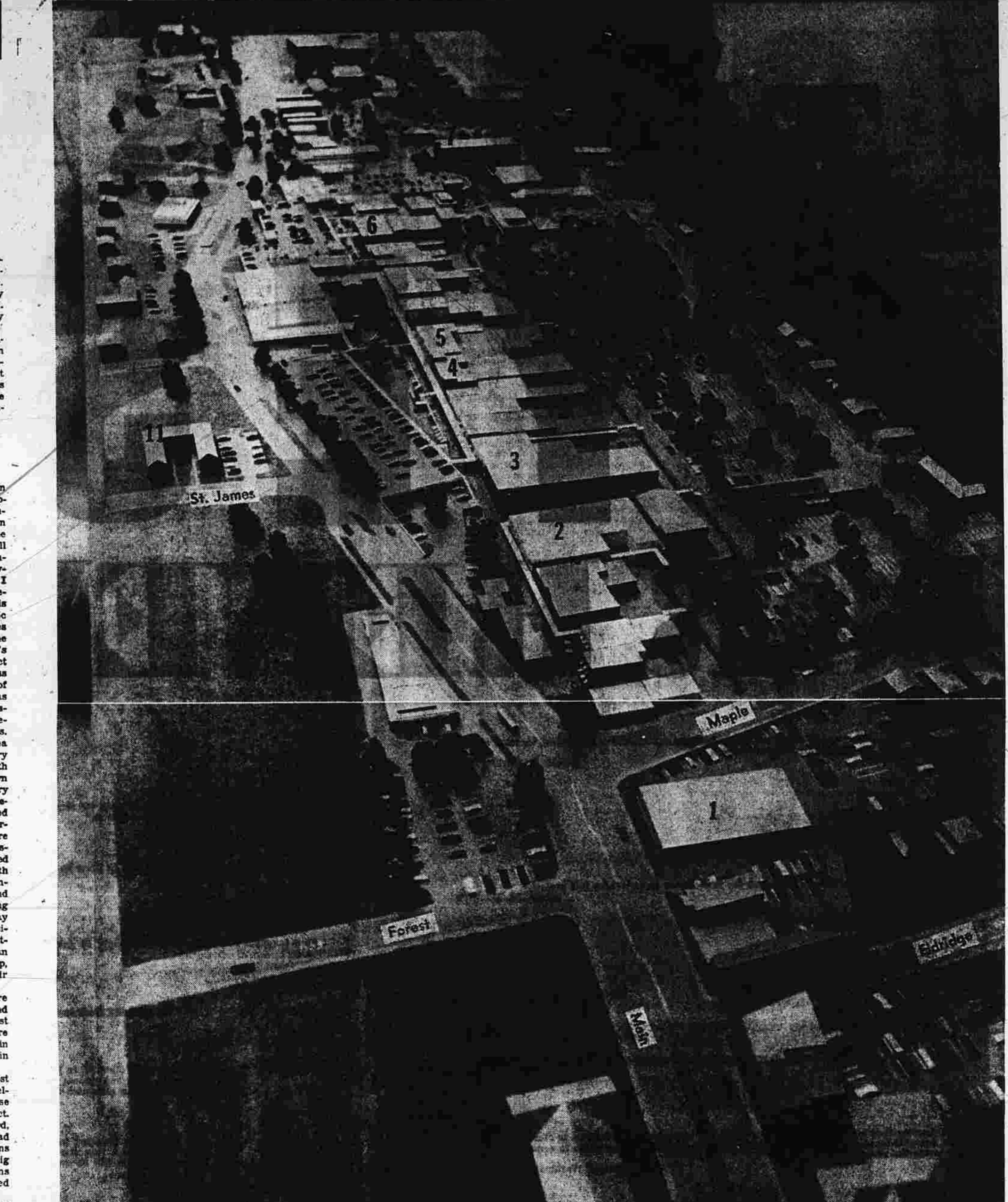

The first official meeting of the Boys' Leaders Club was held in order to elect officers and discuss organizational matters.

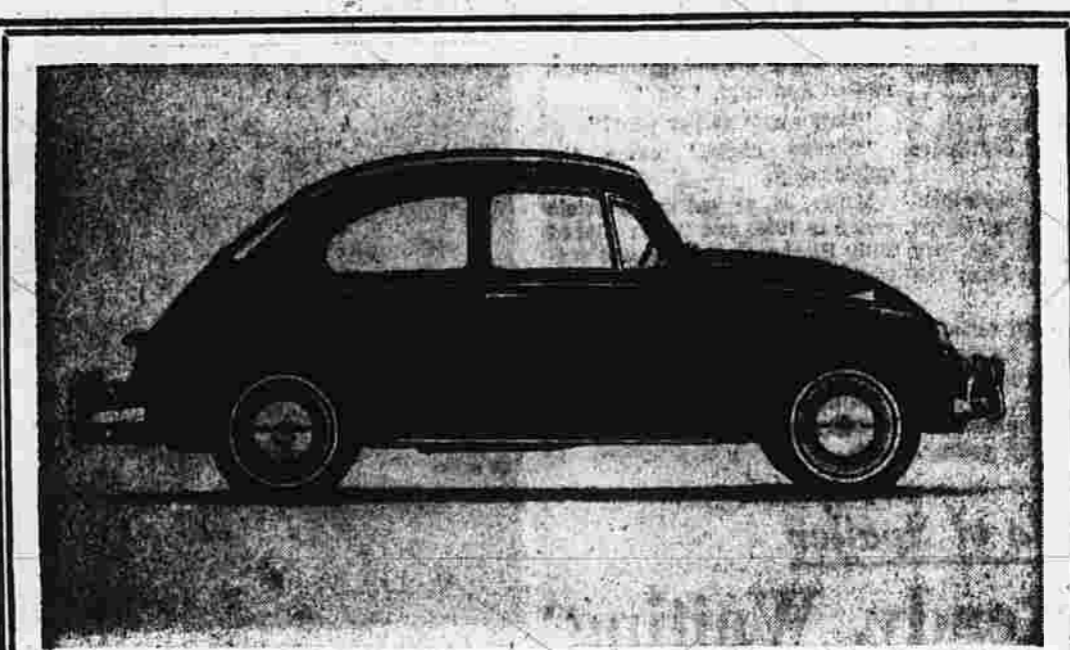
