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### Shipping Backlog Serious in Saigon

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — A shipping backlog, cut to near zero only a few months ago, has again become serious, according to U.S. officials here waiting to be unloaded at this key port, U.S. officials and shipping sources said today.

These experts blamed the situation largely on feeding between the Army, the Agency for International Development and mismanagement.

The situation can be cured only by firm action at a high level in Washington to make the

about 70 freighters moored off Yung Tau, near the mouth of the Saigon River, and another dozen anchored at waiting in the river near Saigon. Other ships are being held as far away as Manila and Yokohama.

They estimated the average waiting period about 30 days.

While waiting, crews of the merchant ships draw double pay, nearly 200 a month for an average seaman. But one U.S. government maritime official said it has become difficult to recruit enough men for ships bound for Viet Nam.

This, he said, is because the seamen had to stay aboard their ships so long while in Viet Nam, often under conditions of extreme heat and discomfort. Until recently the merchant seamen were not allowed shore leave.

My esteemed friend Warren Storey Smith claims the only way to make this piece intelligible on first hearing is to show silent movies with it and disagree for the variation in which the Don tries to instruct Sancho in the ideas and ideals of knight-errantry.

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### Press Spokesmen Criticize Proposed Crime News Ban

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Washington (AP) — Three leading press spokesmen have roundly criticized proposals by an American Bar Association study group that limits be put on what police and lawyers may publicly about pending criminal cases.

The report, prepared by the American Society of Newspaper Editors, said that the proposed ban would be a "serious, if not a constitutional assault on freedom of the press, and also on the constitutional guarantee of free speech."

Robert C. Nelson and J. Edward Murray of the American Society of Newspaper Editors, Portland, Ore., executive editor of the Oregonian, said the study group's proposal would "voluntarily exercise restraint in the reporting of criminal news coverage by new laws or through expanded use of the courts' contempt powers."

"That's an excellent suggestion," said Genras, "but the whole focus of our campaign has been the Lindsay and Chaffee approach. We want to pick up the independents."

He was referring to successful campaigns by two Republicans in Democratic strongholds — those by Mayor John V. Lindsay of New York and Gov. John Chafee of Rhode Island.

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### Vernon Town to Discuss Refuse With Ellington Officials

The board of representatives will hold an informal meeting with Ellington officials tonight. The meeting will follow the regular board meeting which starts at 7:30 p.m. in the administration building. The officials will discuss the exchanging of facilities of the two towns. Ellington is in the process of opening a land-fill refuse area and Vernon is with out such an area of its own. Ellington, in turn, would like to have a Vernon's filtration plant facilities.

Vernon now has a three-year contract with a landowner in Ashford where the refuse is being taken. The contract will be terminated until July of next year and the landowner will not revoke it.

The opening of the land-fill area in Ellington has been held temporarily, while a suit is pending against the town and the two men who propose to operate the area.

Ellington selection are still interested in discussing the matter with Vernon officials to see if they would be interested in entering into an agreement next July.

There are only three items scheduled on the regular agenda of the board for tonight's meeting. A letter of resignation from Walter E. Campbell as an alternate to the zoning board, will be read and Mayor Thomas McChesler will recommend the appointment of Donald B. Lovgren of Windsor Rd. to fill the vacancy.

The board will also be asked to pass a resolution to approve payment of unpaid taxes on the Wright property, amounting to \$800. This amount would be charged to the contingency fund.

The town purchased the property which is in the rear of the town hall, some time ago in the hopes that it might provide more parking area. The house on the property has already been torn down.

A Safety Program starts at increasing traffic awareness and reducing accidents among elementary school youngsters in Vernon. The program is being sponsored by the school department and Nathan Hale chapter of the Boy Scouts.

On Tuesday, all of the elementary schools in town will be presented with a red pennant flag to raise on the school flag staff beneath the American flag and the children will receive brochures explaining the program.

The pennants will fly each day throughout the school year and the program will be in effect 24 hours a day, seven days a week until the last day of school in June.

Any school in which no student is involved in an accident will receive a gold shield to add to the pennant and a certificate to be displayed in the school. When a student-involved accident does occur, however, the red pennant will be lowered and placed inside the school for a period of 30 days.

Accident records, kept by the Vernon police department will determine whether an accident has involved a student in the schools. Reports of these accidents will, in turn, be given to the school involved and to the teachers who will have an opportunity to review the facts with the students in the hope that further accidents will be prevented.

The program was originated by the Greater Hartford Chapter of the American Red Cross several years ago and it is reported it has had tremendous effect on the children in the communities where it is presently used. The students take great pride in keeping the red pennant flying and the parents, in passing the schools, can tell how the safety program is progressing.

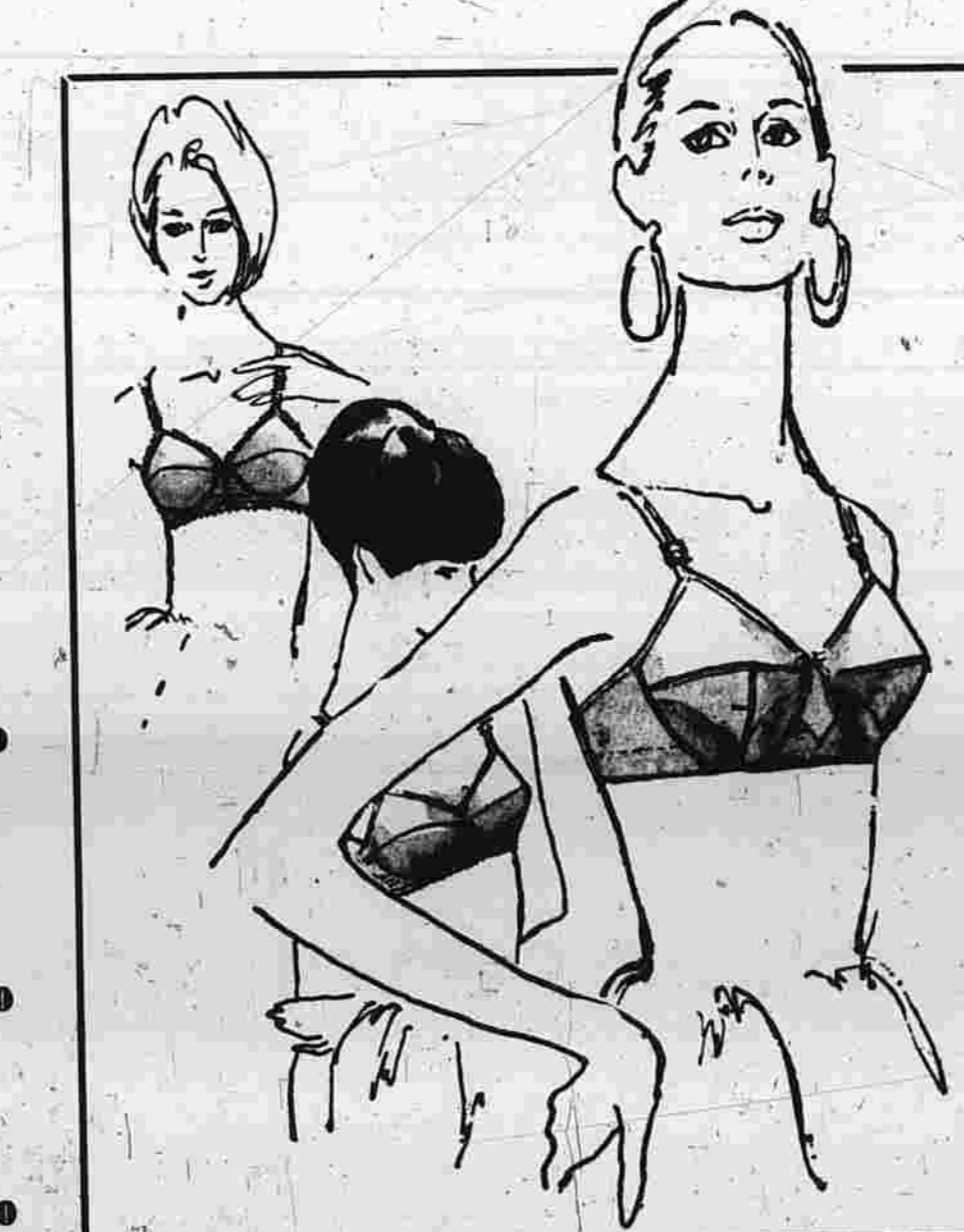

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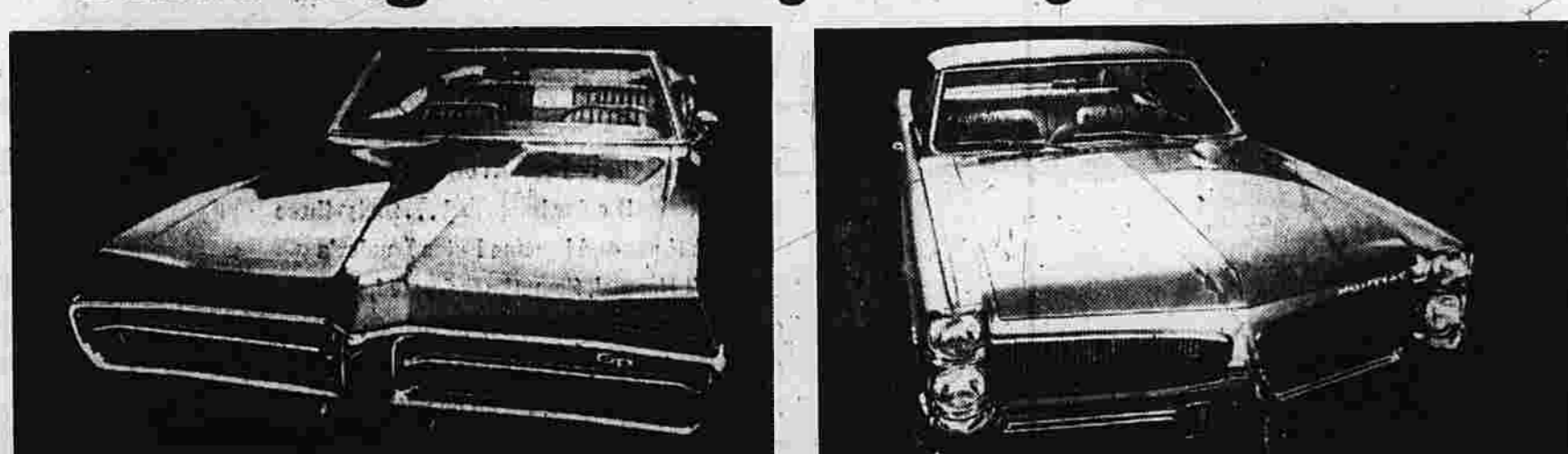

Events in World

Another Nation

MASERU, Basutoland (AP)—Africa gets its second new nation within a week at one minute past midnight tonight as Basutoland, a British enclave surrounded by South Africa, becomes independent Lesotho.

Last Friday Botswana, formerly Bechuanaland, became the first black-ruled country to border white-ruled South Africa. Princess Marina, Duchess of Kent, is representing her niece, Queen Elizabeth II at the independence ceremonies, as she did at Botswana. Representatives of 45 countries began arriving at this hilly capital over the weekend for the ceremonies.

Independence for Basutoland leaves nearby Swaziland, slated for independence in 1968, and rebellious Rhodesia, the last British territories in Africa. Basutoland has been a British protectorate since 1868.

Like Botswana it intends to remain within the British Commonwealth and hopes to foster friendly relations with the segregationist government in South Africa.

Hess Cost Talks

BERLIN (AP)—The United States, Britain, France and the Soviet Union may begin talks on ways to cut the cost to the West German government of keeping Rudolf Hess in the huge Spandau Prison complex.

The one-time deputy Fuehrer, now 72, is serving a life sentence imposed by the 1948 Nuremberg war crimes tribunal. The last of Spandau's other six inmates—former Hitler youth leader Baldur von Schirach and Nazi Armaments Minister Albert Speer—were released Friday after completing 20-year sentences.

The four World War II veterans jointly administer and guard the prison, which was built to hold 650 men. An authoritative Western source said the Soviet Union rejected two Western proposals to pardon Hess on humanitarian grounds but did agree to review arrangements at the prison.

Hijackers En Route

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, (AP)—The 43 passengers who boarded an Argentine airliner for a 1,700-mile flight to Rio Gallegos last Wednesday were still on their way today.

Eighteen of the passengers hijacked the plane in flight and forced its crew to land on a race track on Britain's Falkland Islands, off the coast of Argentina, to dramatize Argentina's claim to the bleak islands.

The hijackers were seized by British authorities, and Argentine authorities said they would be tried. The Argentine navy transport Bahia Buen Suceso picked up the hijackers and the rest of the passengers Sunday. Its destination was not given.

The five-man crew of the Aerolineas Argentinas DC6 stayed behind to fly it back to the mainland.

Not After Job

BONN, Germany (AP)—Former Chancellor Konrad Adenauer is plugging Eugen Gerstenmaier, president of the Bundestag, to replace Chancellor Ludwig Erhard, but Gerstenmaier says he is not after Erhard's job.

Adenauer, 81, has long been critical of Erhard as a politician, even though Erhard served nearly 15 years under him as minister of economics. Uncertainty over West Germany's role in Atlantic defense and internal economic troubles has brought Erhard under heavy political fire recently.

Interviewed by the Sunday newspaper Welt Am Sonntag, Adenauer said he had endorsed Gerstenmaier "weeks ago." Gerstenmaier was quoted in an interview last week as saying he was loyal to Erhard but that in some cases loyalty to country should take precedence over loyalty to an individual. He said later that he was not after Erhard's job.

In a recorded television interview Sunday, the former chancellor also criticized U.S. policy in Europe because it is often "based on false assumptions." He said Americans "see their greatest danger in Asia and I say that the greatest danger for the United States lies in Europe, and partly in Russian Asia."

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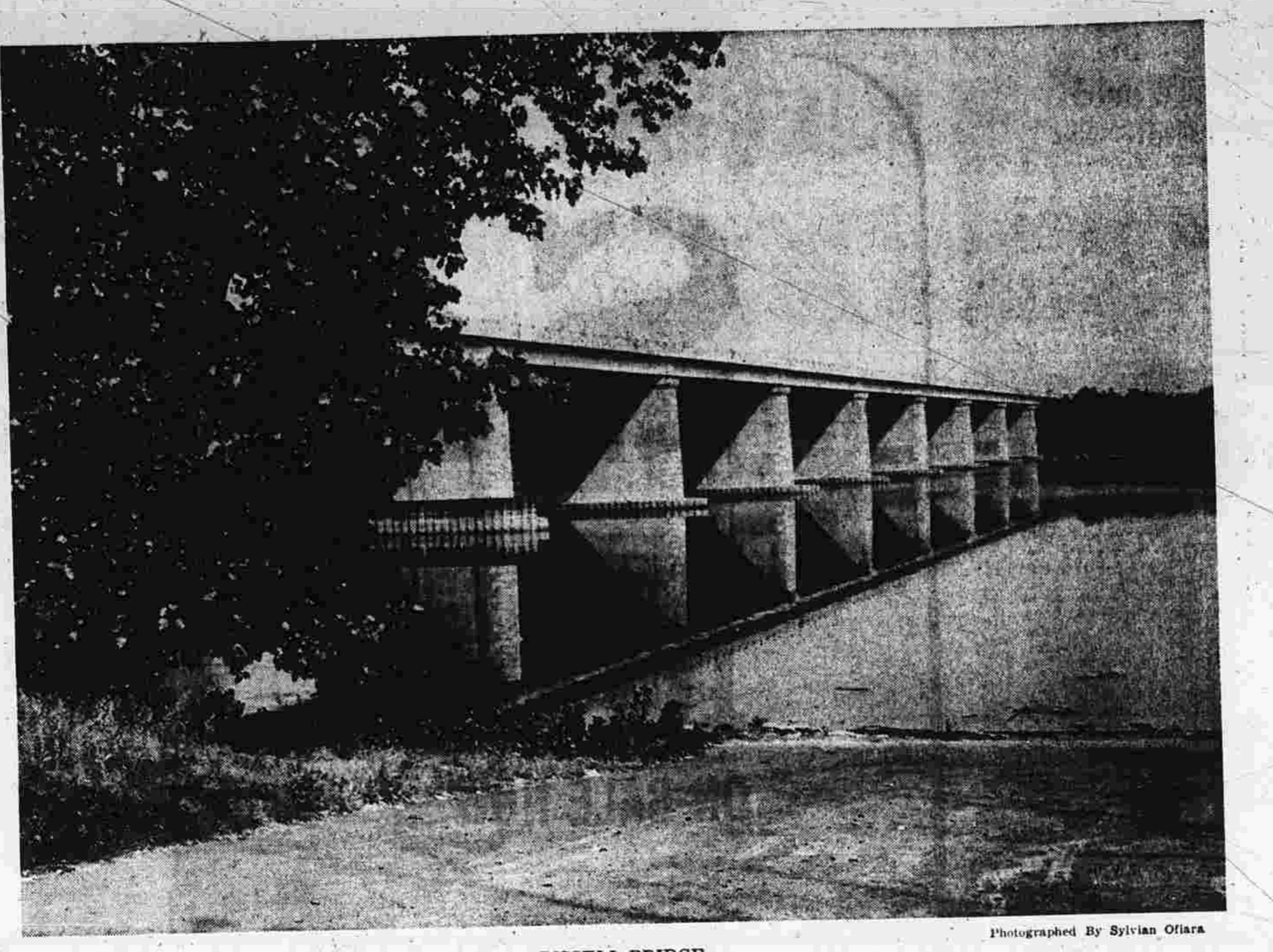

Another class for 12 women will start today at Crestfield.



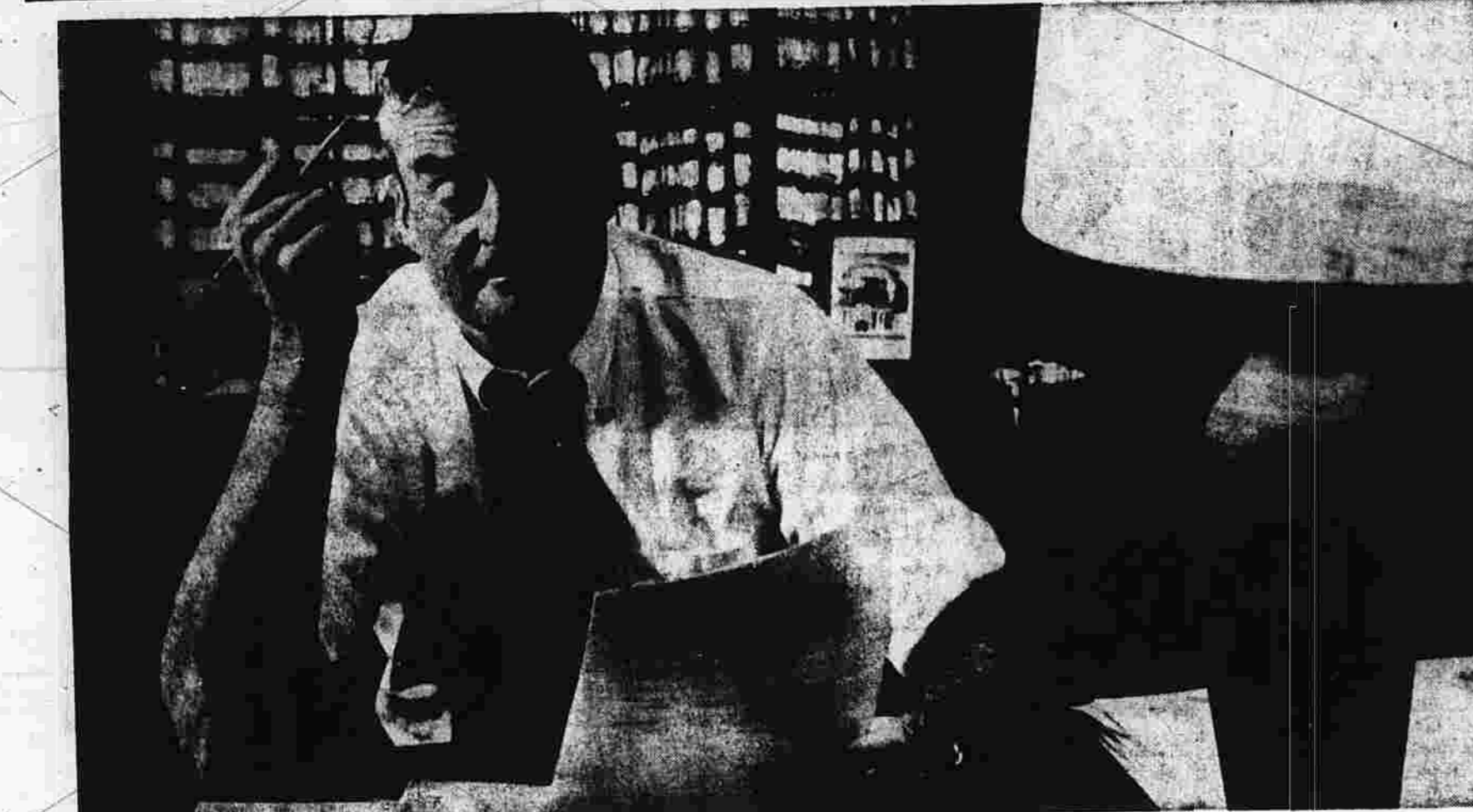

### Conventry Study Group to Investigate Sewage Problem in Town

Plans are under way in Conventry to form a study group to investigate the sewage problem in the town. The group will be charged with finding the best long range plan for handling sewage with an urban renewal program.

The board of selectmen met Thursday night with the planning and zoning commission, and this was recommended in the recently-completed 701 Master Plan of the town. Whether this is the best way to incorporate a sewage system, however, remains for investigation.

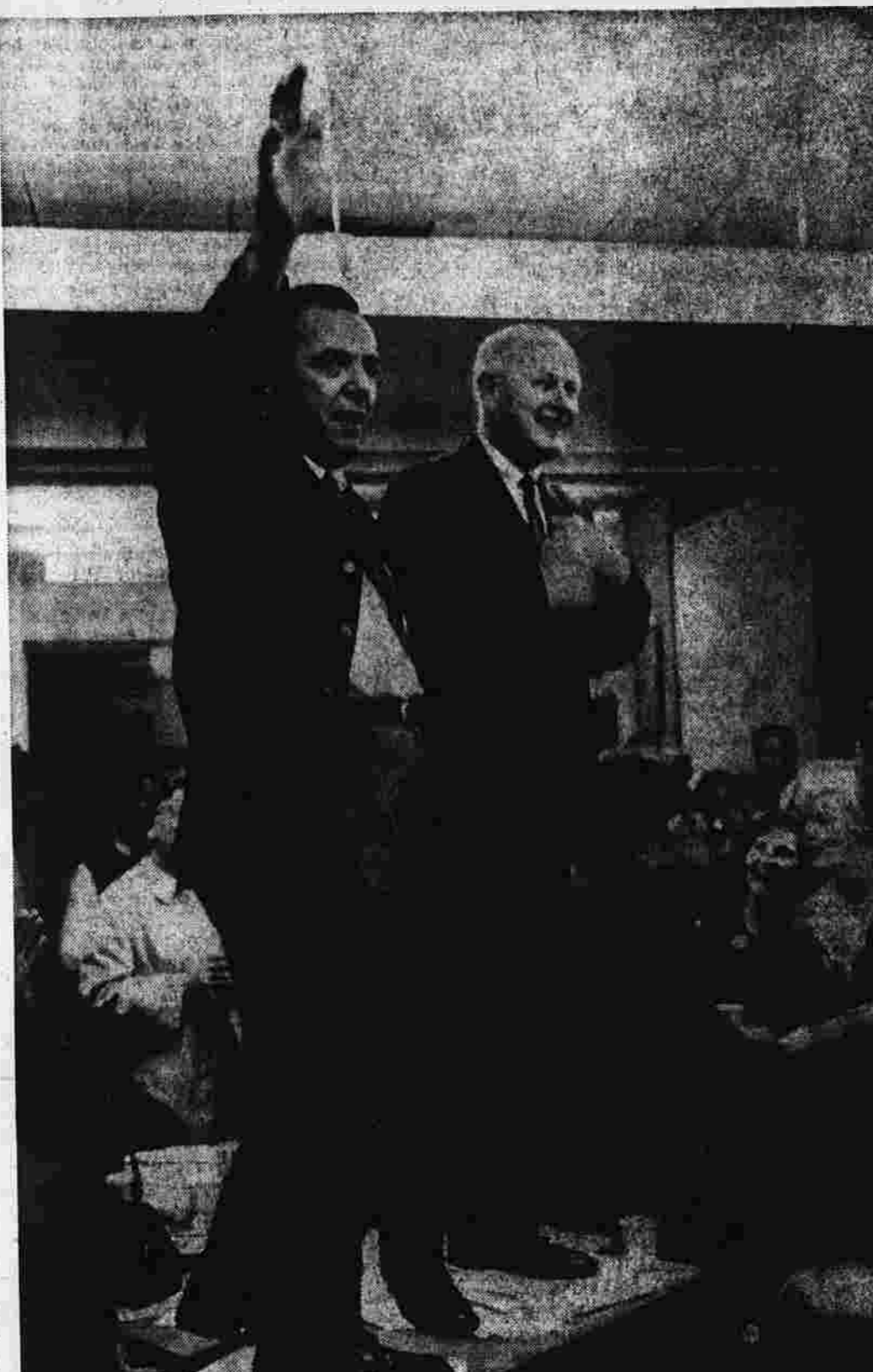
