The Dizzying Gamble"

When Pope Paul VI, on Tuesday, observed the first anniversary of his historic appeal to the United Nations, he himself seemed almost of two minds as he discussed the world peace situation a year later.

"Our cry for peace," he said, at one moment during his appearance before 150,000 in St. Peter's Square in Rome, "must ring out again from a sorrowful heart, for during the past year the conditions which make peace possible have not improved."

This was the blue note. Later, however, Pope Pius said this: "We must observe how in spite of everything the idea of peace is growing in the consciousness, if not always in the activity, of the contemporary

less attention is being paid to a equivocal propaganda that aims at exploiting peace for various ends other than an order founded on respect for the rights of the human person and of free peoples; so it is that the ultimate persuasion is growing that true and lasting peace cannot be based on the power of deadly weapons or on the static tension

of opposing ideologies." Pope Paul, at New York a year ago, said three main things. "Let peace," he said, "reign in the world. Never again war, never again. No more rivalry, contention, oppression and

egoism-no more." He called the United Nations "the obligatory path of modern civilization and of world peace." And he took religion out of the cold

war, by giving the survival of mankind priority over the demands of ideology. We think, that in each of these three approaches a year ago, Pope Paul planted more seed and persuasion in the thoughts of mankind than has yet shown in the actions of mankind.

It is true that, as he himself admits, the surface picture has not improved. To the contrary, indeed, the United States is waging a bigger war than ever. But even while belligerents do this they do it only with an increased awareness of its eventual dead end futility.

The current in the thought of mankind has been turning, in the past year, more and more to the ultimate cynicism with war as a possible instrument of human decision, more and more to the United Nations, however neglected and maligned, as a necessity, not merely an option, and more and more to the realization that there cannot be any such thing as a "holy war."

The surface violence increases; the inner realization of the only kind of truth by which mankind can keep life itself deepens and spreads and, we hope strengthens toward the day when it may take ever some influence on our outward actions, as individuals, as na-

We are with the Pope in his mixture of logical despair and necessary hope. Who cannot be with him, really? Who does not know that, as he says, we are in the very midst of a "dizzying gamble with the fate of mankind?"

The Manila Conference has now been in existence, as a proposal, for several days, and still nobody seems to have any authoritative idea of what it is supposed to do. The only decisive thing which has happened so far is that the date for the Conference has been moved back from Oct. 18 to Oct. 24. This brings it closer to the American elections on Nov. 8, and could, with a little strategic meandering around Asia after the Conference itself is over, achieve at least one obvious Conference objective-that of having President Johnson be in the midst of dramatic war and peace posturing abroad just before the people of the United States go to the polls for Congressional elections.

This seems, in prospect, one of the boldest and most heartless political gimmicks ever employed from the White House. Everybody will forgive it, needless to say, if it proves to have something in it more solid than the meaningless fluff which was the only eventual residue of the famous holiday peace offensive, or the dramatic Honohulu Conference.

#### A Flicker Of Hope?

The town election was only Monday but one already begins to notice change in the air, precious signs of revival of common sense.

It is always amazing, whenever the simple yellow blinker system is given a trial, how smoothly the traffic moves, how the most efficient use of traffic opportunity by the particular flow of traffic. whatever it happens to be at any moment, is so easily achieved.

Of course, this never impresses anybody except the motorists themselves. The traffic experts operate on the consistent and uncontestable theory, that if they can find some way of making the traffic pile itself up, then they have lemonstrated the need for some accompanying technique for letting it dribble off. The traffic stop light is the perfect instrument for the creation of the problem which it itself will then pretend

Anyway, thanks to something that happened somewhere this week, there has been sensible traffic at Depot Square, at the North end of Main St., ever since Monday.

Perhaps the experience at the North end of Main St. will somehow persuade our traffic authorities that the new plot against the public which has just appeared at the South end of Main St. should be limited to the yellow blinker system on which it, so far, has been operating. That is good. It is also

But we are not really of very good cheer. We fear what we think may be the inevitable, in which the three great traffic light monstrosities, the one at the Center, and the others now at each end, will make it impossible to get out of either end of Main St., or even get there, for that matter.
