In Ruby Retrial Prosecutor Will Seek Death Penalty Again

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Dist. Atty. Henry Wade says the state will seek the death penalty again for Jack Ruby, whose conviction for killing accused presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald was set aside Wednesday.

Wade, in Dallas, was chief prosecutor in the trial ending there March 14, 1964, with a state court jury assessing Ruby, 55, a death sentence.

The court, the highest in Texas for criminal matters, ruled that Ruby did not get a fair trial. It reversed the conviction and ordered a new trial, to be held outside Dallas County.

CHE Presents Budget Plans

HARTFORD (AP) — A proposed budget of \$209.7 million for Connecticut's higher education programs was presented Wednesday to the State Commission for Higher Education.

The decision also states the verdict was reversible because the former Dallas night club operator will go free within months if he is allowed to plead guilty to a charge of murder without malice.

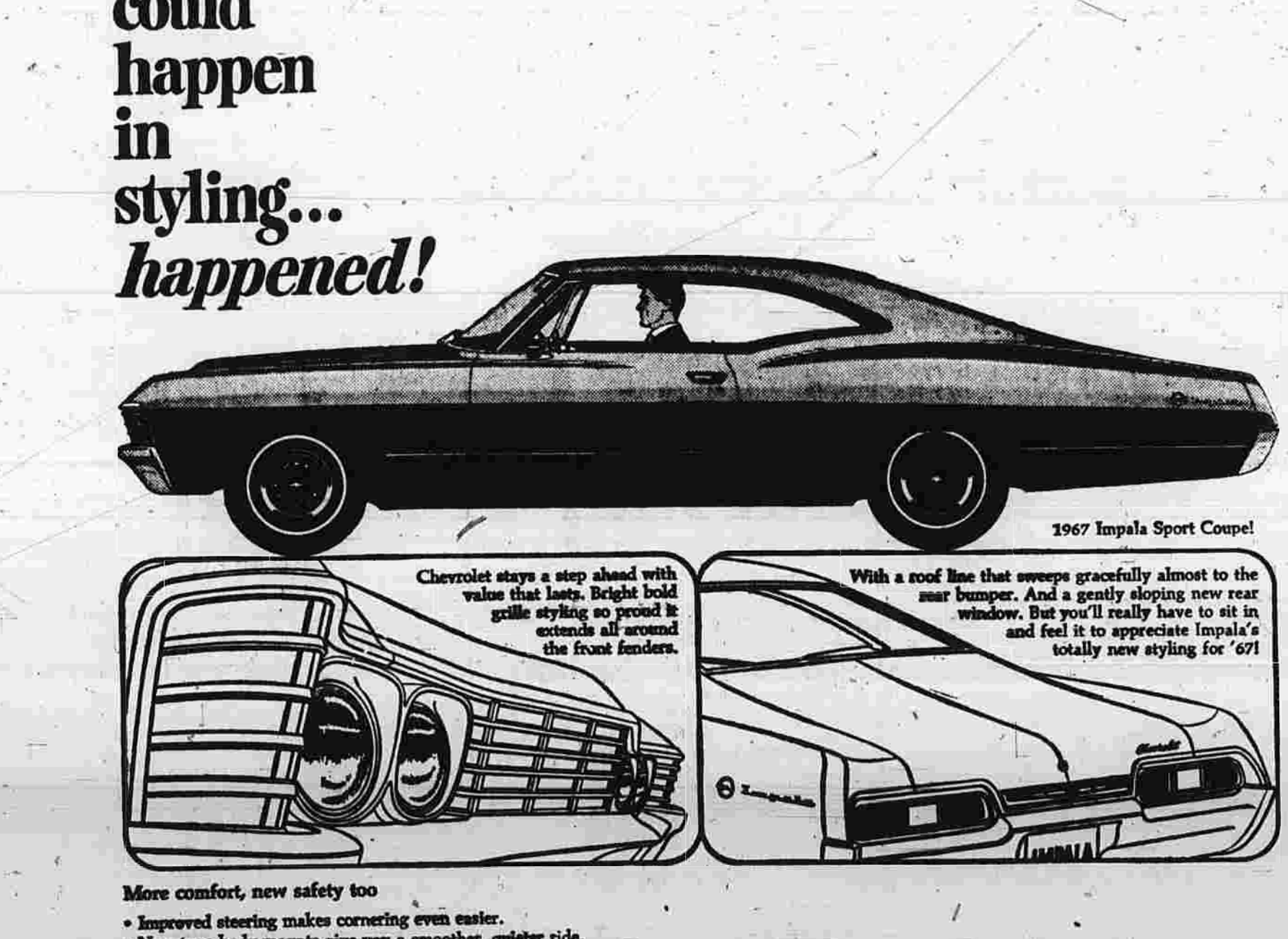

Military Chiefs Ponder Viet Waterway Assault

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — U.S. military leaders are considering a new assault campaign to deny the Viet Cong use of the river highways of South Viet Nam's Mekong Delta.

There has been no final decision, but one could result from Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara's visit to Viet Nam next week.

Planning has been under way for some time.

The river campaign would go far beyond the small-boat patrolling of delta waterways about half a dozen barracks which the U.S. Navy has long been conducting under "Operation Sea Garden."

It would involve launching special assault units, probably U.S. Army infantry, from Navy barracks ships stationed off the mouths of the delta's principal rivers.

"We want to deny use of the rivers to the Viet Cong and we hope to spread out and control the river banks," said one high-ranking officer.

Working in secrecy, the U.S. Navy is developing a new type of assault craft to carry the assault units to the river banks, using perhaps two bar-

Georgia Democrats Pick Substitute for Welter

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Peace Patrols Suggested Senate 'Doves' Applaud Viet Bombing Suspension

WASHINGTON (AP) — A halt in U. S. bombing aimed at restoring a neutral zone between North and South Viet Nam brought Senatorial proposals today for expanded international patrols to limit the war.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk said in New York Wednesday that air attacks on the eastern part of the buffer area had been suspended. The White House previously described this as an effort to permit the International Control Commission to investigate alleged violations of the area.

In Saigon, reliable sources reported U. S. and Vietnamese planes halted bombing of a 24-mile-square area of the demilitarized zone to days ago so military commission teams could carry out inspections.

"We would like to see that some fully demilitarized again," Rusk said. "If the North Vietnamese will stop using the zone for a purpose for which it was not intended."

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield was joined by Sen. J.W. Fulbright, D-Ark., chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, in applauding this action. Both have opposed escalation of the war.

The two Democrats proposed in separate interviews that control commission patrols be beefed up and their operations expanded to cover South Viet Nam's borders with Cambodia and Laos.

"It is quite possible that if the International Control Commission were given sufficient personnel and its responsibilities strengthened so that it could become effective toward limiting the war and opening the way to peace negotiations," Mansfield said.

Fulbright said he didn't want to raise any false hopes of what might be accomplished, but he favored expanding the patrols. The International Control Commission is an agency with legitimate standing in Viet Nam and anything we can do toward

South Windsor Compromise Law Is Sought In Refund of Permit Fees

A motion to establish a policy that no refunds be allowed of fees for permits or licenses paid to the town was withdrawn pending consultation with the town attorney and town manager on a "compromise measure" at last night's council meeting.

In discussion of the item, divergent opinions were expressed by council members. The matter was placed on the agenda at the request of councilman John J. Egan Jr. In July the council authorized the refund of \$1,111 to Mr. and Mrs. Paul LaFrance.

The LaFrances had paid this sum for a building permit for a 60-bed convalescent home to be built on Main St. In requesting the return of the fee, LaFrance said nothing had been done on the property, and he had decided not to continue with the project due to a change in zoning regulations.

At the time the refund was voted on, town attorney Donald Wank advised the council that if the request was passed it would be setting a precedent which might cause trouble in the future.

Council authorization is necessary before any refund from the building department can be made.

Councilman Egan commented on the motion that the town manager, in a memorandum to the council, had indicated his support of the motion.

Egan urged positive action on the matter in order to avoid future problems of this kind.

Mayor Opposed

Mayor James Throve spoke in opposition to the motion and noted that he had been under the impression that the consensus of the council had been to investigate what other towns policies were on permit refunds.

To this end, he had made inquiries of the policy in Hartford and was informed that neither the town council or town government administration had any policy on refunds. However, the building department of Hartford had a policy that if a permit was issued to erect or finish a job, if such a project was not carried out, the fee is refunded.

Under this policy, if the cost of the work when completed is less than originally estimated, some portion of the permit fee is refundable. If the cost is greater than estimated, an additional charge is levied.

The mayor referred to the memo by the town manager, then noted that little if any effort on the financial structure of the town was realized by refunds of this type.

He continued that when a person applies for a permit to do a particular job and the fee is set based on an estimate of what it will cost the town to administer inspections and issue certificates of inspections in relation to this construction, "the Building department should determine if any money has actually been expended by the town on engineering or other considerations in relation to the fee paid."

Therefore, if no funds have been expended and a permit is not utilized, the mayor is of the opinion that such fees should be returned.

Mr. Egan said there is no provision in the charter stipulating that a refund be made in any case. He noted that the town manager has recommended that the council establish a policy of granting refunds on permits.

Egan continued that if a policy is established no concern or consideration would be afforded individual cases and the council would not be faced with complaints or having to make the decision on whether an individual case warranted the return of the fee.

Councilman Howard Fitts commented that a problem might be created with administrative details with reference to different town departments which issue licenses and permits—for example the town clerk's office which issues dog licenses and marriage licenses, etc.

Noting that all other licenses have a fixed fee, Mayor Throve said building permits are related directly to the cost of the building project for which it is issued and the fee charged for a permit is predicated on this consideration.

Councilman Daniel P. Cavanaugh suggested that a policy be established by which a nominal amount or percent of the total fee be paid at the time a decision on whether individual cases merited refunds.

Miss Hazel Lutz Named Burton's Woman of Year

Miss Hazel P. Lutz, founder of the Lutz Junior Museum and retired art supervisor for the Manchester school system, yesterday was nominated for Burton's Woman of the Year by representatives of 38 women's organizations at a luncheon meeting at Cava's Restaurant. She will be honored officially Wednesday, Nov. 9 at 9 a.m. at ceremonies at Burton's.

Art supervisor for 33 years until retiring in 1961, Miss Lutz founded the Lutz Junior Museum in 1953 in conjunction with the Manchester PTA Council. She helped expand the art program in Manchester schools, initiating many student art programs which earned a citation from the state in 1956.

In 1960 Miss Lutz received the Manchester Chamber of Commerce Award for outstanding devotion to the community.

A graduate of Williamson State College, Miss Lutz received a B. S. degree from Boston University in 1953 in conjunction with a regular elementary school teacher.

She taught a seventh and eighth grade class at William Hall School, Willington, serving as principal at the same time. After finding that she enjoyed teaching art, she returned to the Boston University art department and took courses in enameling, woodworking, metalcraft, all kinds of painting, sculpture, drawing, drama, costume, textile design and interior decorating. She later took courses at Boothbay and the New York School of Interior Design.

Through her work as art director, she initiated several programs, including Lutz Museum. She also initiated a fine arts program in cooperation with the PTA Council. During World War II, she was director of the Hartford County 4-H victory gardens. One group of the helped organize through her position as art director was the Manchester Educational Association.

In 1956 the art program in Manchester was chosen as the most outstanding one in Connecticut and was the subject of a television show. Miss Lutz herself received the Eastern Arts Association certificate of service.

In December of 1961 a portrait of Miss Lutz was unveiled near the entrance of the museum bearing her name. Since her retirement, she has been an active volunteer at the museum at least one of two days a week and arranges the art exhibits for them. She also plans art classes at the museum and arranges a program for the high school seniors conducting the classes.

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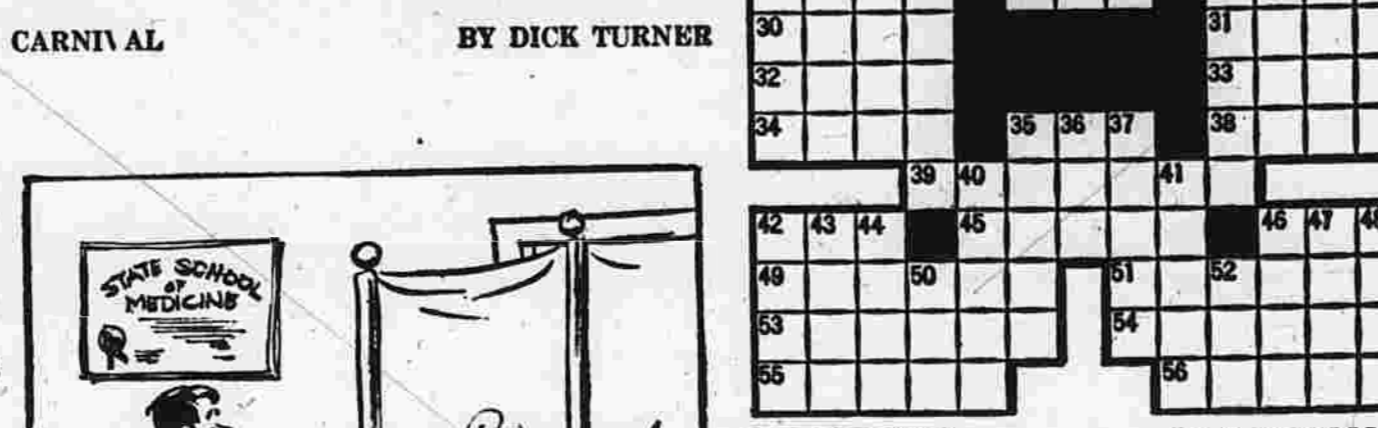
