Dr. Lowe to Keynote Teachers Convention

Dr. Frederick W. Lowe Jr., president of Manchester Community College, will deliver the keynote address, "College for All: The Regional Community Colleges," at the 20th Convention of the Connecticut State Federation of Teachers Oct. 28.

ADD DR. LOWE

The CFT convention held annually on Teachers Convention Day, will be staged this year at Platt High School in Meriden, beginning at 9 a.m. Other educators who will lead workshops following Dr. Lowe's talk include Dr. Ellis D. Tooker, assistant superintendent of Hartford Schools; and Dr. James S. Naughton, a research consultant in the Connecticut State Department of Education. The workshops are "Automation and Its Implications for the Classroom Teacher," directed by Dr. Naughton; and "The Education of Socially and Emotionally Maladjusted Children," led by Dr. Tooker.

Dr. Lowe is well qualified to discuss the growing state system of two-year community colleges, having been appointed in 1963 as dean of Manchester Community College—the second

school of its kind in Connecticut.

He was named college president shortly after MCC became part of a statewide system last December under the Commission on Higher Education.

Early last spring, he was charged by the commission with establishing a branch of the college in Middletown and

overseeing its operation during the first year.

Known as the Middlesex College Center, the branch was dedicated Sept. 27, with an enrollment of 160 full-time and 150 part-time students.

Before coming to Manchester, Dr. Lowe was a professor of English and chairman of the English department at Glassboro State College in New Jersey. He had also taught English at Colgate University and Danbury State College.

He holds Ph.D. and M.A. degrees from Columbia University and earned his B.A. at Williams College.

He is a member of the Connecticut State Committee on Federal Relations in Matters Pertaining to Higher Education.

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'Bonanza' Is More Than a Western

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — There was no panic at Ponderosa two weeks ago when "Bonanza" failed to beat an opposing program for the first time in six years.

After all, the program was the three-hour "Bridge on the River Kwai," which cost Ford \$1,800,000 to present. The "Bonanza" bunch figured correctly that the Sunday night audience would return to the Chevrolet corral, since no sponsor could afford such a stipend on a regular basis.

"Bonanza" continued its winning ways last Sunday with a two-parter concerning Mormon polygamy, "The Pursued." The second half appears Sunday. It stars Dina Merrill and Eric Fleming, who was drowned last week on a Peruvian film location.

Two-parters — which are released overseas as movies — and occasional "name" guest stars are the only departures from the customary format of "Bonanza." The man who dictates these conditions is David Dortort, who created the series and has guided it as producer since its start.

His view of the show's success: "Bonanza" is more than a Western. It has a far greater range of story than other Westerns, yet it has enough of the elements to appeal to the Western buff."

But the compelling reason for continuing supremacy of "Bonanza" in the audience polls, Dortort admitted, is the surefire appeal of the leads: Lorne Greene, Dan Blocker and Michael Landon.

"The combination of actors is unique and successful," said the producer. "Each developed as a separate personality — Lorne as the father figure; Dan as the

hearty, solid older brother; Mike as the impetuous younger brother. The boys do a solid job. Each knows his own character and its limitations, and they won't let writers or directors go too far afield."

There was also another, intellectual brother, played by Pernell Roberts, who abandoned Ponderosa a season ago because of artistic differences. He has returned to Hollywood after a year's absence and is appearing in "The Virginian," "The Girl from U.N.C.L.E.," and other series. This has led to talk that he might go back to "Bonanza."

Dortort, a nervous, bespectacled man, disputed the possibility.

"Pernell caused a lot of problems on the show; he seemed to enjoy arguing for argument's sake," said the producer. "Still, I wanted him to stay, and for a long time I kept the door open for his return."

"But now we can do without him. The audience reaction after his departure was miniscule. We had our highest ratings last season, the first year without him."

THOMAS IN JAPAN

Danny Thomas will leave for Japan around Nov. 1 for a production of one of "The Danny Thomas Specials" scheduled by NBC. The director described the show as a "cross between a musical 'I Spy' and 'Madam Butterfly.'" Thomas' first show, "The Wonderful World of Burlesque III," will be televised Dec. 11.

Pat Boone in the Morningtime

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Starting Oct. 19, housewives will be able to find a new companion amid the plethora of soap operas and games shows of daytime television. His name: Pat Boone.

The all-American boy, now 32, will be offering a half-hour, late-morning variety show aimed at young married women. He adds that any older ladies, children or men who happen to be home at that hour are welcome to tune in.

"But the show's main appeal is for young adults," says Pat. "I offered several names as

side kick-announcer for the show, and NBC rejected them, saying I should have a younger personality. We hope to have a young-looking band and will aim for youthful guests as well."

To retain the youthful pattern, he expects to feature frequent appearances of his answer to the Lennon sisters; Cherry Boone, 12; Lindy Boone, 10; Debby Boone, 9; and Laury Boone, 8.

Why is he doing the show? "For two main reasons," he replied. "One is that it will give me a chance to stay at home for a change, instead of traveling all over the world for appearances."

"The second reason is that the show will allow me to do the things that I couldn't do before: To ad lib with guest stars and with the audience and to sing a lot of songs. I'll be doing three a day — that's 15 a week — whereas I used to sing three a week on my night show."

Boone started out in television as part of the Arthur Godfrey family 11 years ago. He had previously appeared on Ted Mack's Amateur Hour. The garulous redhead gave the boy a good education in audience

pleasing, and at 23 Boone was offered his own night show.

"Godfrey advised against it," Pat recalled. "He said I was too young to take on my own show and I should stay with him for a few more years before going out on my own. But I decided to take a chance."

"I as on for three years and could have stayed longer, but I decided to concentrate on movies. Bing Crosby and Colonel Parker, Elvis Presley's manager, both advised me to get off TV. They said that people wouldn't be willing to pay to see me if I continued playing for free on TV."

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A Review of Shows, From the Bottom Up

NEW YORK (AP) — This is the time of the year when a number of the broadcasting industry's publications send television writers lists of the new network series with requests that they tag their opinion of each as good, bad or indifferent. Later, these reports are broken up, added up, combined into assorted stories, most of which prove (a) that the critics think it's a pretty poor season and (b) critics' judgments are often contradictory and usually do not agree with popular judgments.

This reviewer, having worked down the list of 34 new shows, found it impossible to label more than a few shows as just plain "bad."

True, there was "The Tammy Grimes Show," quickly removed, and "The Green Hornet," and "It's About Time," all of which would be at the bottom of my list. However, it should be noted that "It's About Time" has recently been renewed for a second 13 weeks by its network.

More new shows were disappointing than bad — "The Jean Arthur Show" with its wretched silly scripts; "The Garry Moore Show" and "The Milton Berle Show" with their tired formats; "Fun, Buddy, Run" and "The Hero," which quickly became tiresome spoofs.

All the new westerns — "The Monroes," "The Road West," "Shane" and "Iron Horse" — are professionally produced, handsome and thoroughly predictable variations of one of television's standard themes.

Shows like "Star Trek" and "Time Tunnel," in the science-fiction mold are dazzling to watch, full of action — if that sort of thing is to your taste.

There are a number of situation comedies a cut above average — "Occasional Wife," "Family Affair," "Love on a

Rooftop" and "That Girl" among them. All are nice, pleasant, slick — but it is still hard to label any of them as "good," but "indifferent" is not right either.

"Stage 67," the only new anthology series is impossible to label at all since it consists of a collection of unrelated shows.

Shows like "The Rounders" and "The Pruitts of Southampton" are impossible to pin down, too, since some viewers will find them vastly amusing while others find them crashing bores.

The new season, then, is one that is full of expertise, theatrical values and yet, something seems to be lacking — excitement. Early audience samples indicated that audiences were ignoring many of the new and returning to old favorites. Reviewers — and viewers with whom this writer has been in contact — find many of the shows tedious and boring.

The trade paper Variety estimates that some two thirds of the 34 new series have already showed signs of ratings troubles. When the next Nielsen report is available next Monday, all networks will use it as an unusually early base for ordering up emergency replacements.
