

men and women. The lanes and hutumgs have been tied up. Gone, too, is the air of grace and timelessness that enchanted the outsider, from Marco Polo down to the lowliest country Peking, capital of the world's most populous nation, is a politi-

cal city. Its Mao-era buildings are new but dull. Apartment houses and stodgy government structures clash with the architecture of the ancient palaces and the secluded, tile-roofed houses of the past. Its magnificent wide avenues - an inheritance from imperial lights are dimmed except on
