GE Accord Held Victory for LBJ

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson and 11 labor unions appear to have emerged the victors in a new contract settlement with General Electric Co. that forestalled a strike by 125,000 workers.

Labor Department declared the settlement fraudulent. The conference board of the 60,000-member electrical workers union met in New York Sunday and is expected to ratify the contract. The other unions will work out local plans and in most cases submit the contract to a vote of their members.

Union spokesmen said the new General Electric contract includes an average of 28 cents per hour in wage increases over the next three years, plus cost-of-living increases up to a maximum of 10 cents an hour in two annual steps, improved insurance, pensions, vacations and a ninth holiday.

Doctors Enroll In Psychiatric Course at MMH

Five town and area physicians will be among those participating in an eight-week psychiatric education course at Manchester Memorial Hospital starting Monday.

The physicians participating in this advanced course have already completed the prerequisite of a ten-week basic course on "General Psychiatric Problems of Private Practice." They are, from Manchester, Dr. Richard M. Demko, Dr. Robert R. Keeney, Dr. John V. Prignano, and Dr. John C. Wright; and Marjorie Purnell from Rockville.

The program is one of three being presented throughout Connecticut by the Connecticut Academy of General Practice and the Connecticut Branch of the American Psychiatric Association as part of a five-year Psychiatric Education Project financed through a long-term grant from the National Institute of Mental Health.

The eight-week course will cover a depth analysis of the psychiatric problems of practice encountered by family doctors and other non-psychiatric physicians.

The course marks the beginning of the second year of the program. In all, 25 courses were presented last year with over 200 Connecticut family doctors, internists, pediatricians and general surgeons participating. According to Dr. Eric E. Stietzel of Norwalk, president of the Connecticut Academy of General Practice, the project is the first of its kind in the United States to blanket an entire state and the majority of its primary physicians.

Reports must not exceed 750 words, typed double spaced on 8 1/2 by 11 white paper. Student's full name, home and school address, and English teacher's signature must be on the stapled report cover sheet only. The theme must be original in all respects. Exact quotes may be included if exact source is given in a footnote reference. The student's and teacher's signatures on the cover sheet attest to the originality of the composition.

No award will be made if the report exceeds 750 words. HS Gets Rights To Heart Pump

A heart augmentation pump for use in emergency treatment of heart attack victims has recently been acquired by Hamilton Standard from an Illinois firm.

The agreement includes Hamilton's acquisition of all technical, marketing and patent rights, and seventeen prototype pumps currently being evaluated at various medical centers in the U.S., Canada and Europe.

The hydraulically operated device is designed to assist surgeons and cardiologists in treating persons suffering heart attacks. The device can be quickly attached by minor surgery to the two thigh arteries, and relieves the workload on the heart by augmenting natural pumping action.

Hamilton Standard plans to produce the pumps and market them to physicians, hospitals and other medical institutions. The system's pressure pulse generator pumps blood by the reciprocating action of a jet aircraft-type hydraulic piston and valve. An electronic computer, measuring blood pressure, heart electrical signals (EKG) and other physiological conditions, automatically synchronizes the pumping action of the heart and augmentation system.

## Nielsens: Old Shows Are Better

NEW YORK (AP) — This season's television audience likes best the established series of past years and old movies, often at the expense of a lot of new shows.

This seems evident with the publication of the first significant Nielsen ratings of the current season Monday which covered the viewing choices during the two weeks ending Sept. 5 when the three networks were all broadcasting their new shows and old shows with fresh material.

The new list, projected from a national audience sample of some 1,200 homes, gives some strong clues about reception of new shows although it is considered by the industry to be a preliminary report. The Nielsen report which networks and sponsors will consider to be critical will come early in November, after audiences have built new viewing habits after sampling all network wares.

ABC's "Rat Patrol," is the only new series to make the top 10, which pretty well establishes it as a hit. Three others — CBS' "Family Affair," ABC's "Felon Squad" and NBC's "Occasional Wife" — got into the top 20 list.

But 25 of 34 new series were in the lower half of a list of 90 shows, and 19 of these built ratings which, if unimproved later, makes them logical candidates for midseason replacement.

Among the shows receiving particularly unimpressive receptions were ABC's "Stage 67," "Hansel," "Hawk" and "Milton Berle Show," CBS' "Garry Moore Show" and NBC's "Hero," "Hey, Landford" and "Roger Miller Show."

Network television's current infatuation with feature movies is understandable. There are currently five two-hour blocks devoted to movie reruns during the week — and all five built up powerful Nielsen scores that landed them among the top 25 shows. ABC's broadcast of "Bridge on the River Kwai"

and Lowe will be presented tonight on ABC from 9:30 to 11 p.m. Others in the cast are Peter Falk, Finlay Currie and Marilyn Mason.

was a blockbuster that occupied the network's usual two-hour movie spot and then some, led the hit parade of all shows.

Most shows that were popular last season continued their winning ways, although "Batman" appears to have lost some of its appeal, dropping from a top 10 spot last season to 24th on the new list. "Gilligan's Island" and "I've Got a Secret" are both in new time spots this season and seem to have gotten lost in the shuffle, but "Gomer Pyle," also switched, continues to be a strong attraction.

NBC led in the two week averages with a rating of 18.4, followed by CBS with 18.1 and

ABC, 17.9. Each Nielsen rating point represents about 1.1 million viewers so with margins for error, it adds up to a tight race.

"Rat Patrol" which is filmed in Spain and has had little routine exploitation is a real sleeper. A story about an allied patrol of World War II fighting Germany's Afrika Corps, Monday night's episode was entirely shot in a desert location. It was the story of the strong, brave and handsome American sergeant and the good-guy German officer escaping together in heavy chains from a band of native slave-traders. Plenty of action and very interesting scenic backgrounds.

## Review: Blind Date

NEW YORK (AP) — When ABC's "Tammy Grimes Show" was in obvious distress from its first program, ABC quickly removed it from its Thursday night schedule — and replaced it with a show that is infinitely worse.

It is "The Dating Game," an extension of a silly daytime show. It was obviously an emergency replacement — so much so, in fact, that the host constantly forgets and wishes the contestants "good morning."

The "game" is to produce a pretty single girl who, after posing a series of fantastic questions to three bachelors she cannot see, picks the fellow with whom she would like a date.

The opening show last week proved to be such a clutter of inanities that this reviewer postponed reviewing it until after a second show. But Thursday night things seemed even worse.

The first contestant was a blonde model who was asked to pick, sight unseen, one of the bachelors — singer Bobby Rydell who happens to be on another ABC series, actor Paul Petersen who used to be on an ABC series and a non-professional.

Both actors got in their plugs about current activities. Then they floundered through answers to questions like, "What would you do to make a sad goldfish happy?" and "If you were frozen solid for 100 years, what would be the first thing you wanted when you thawed out?"

Anyway, she picked Petersen, and off they ran to collect their date — a day in San Francisco and the day's receipts from a local candy store.

The second girl — who asked the boys to explain their "politics about kissing" — chose actor Les Majors but not until he

had received plugs for his ABC show. They won a dinner with some bullfighters in Houston, just what any girl would dream about.

The half hour seems a shabby misuse of valuable evening air time.

Later in the evening on the same network in a new series, "Hawk," a well-acted, handsomely produced, fast-moving police action show currently in ratings troubles from competition by CBS' broadcasts of feature movies.

Thursday night's episode, about a million-dollar securities theft, was well-knit and very interesting.

## Lucille Ball Warming to Travel

NEW YORK (AP) — Lucille Ball, the television star and corporation president has a new enthusiasm — travel.

"In fact," said the red-haired actress, "if this should be my

last year in the series, what I'd really like to do next is a few specials a year, made in various places all over the world, that showed them through my eyes. The idea has been running through her mind for some time but it all fell together last May when she went to England and shot "Lucy in London" in 10 days.

The comedienne is spending a week in New York, drumming up interest in her special, to be seen on CBS Oct. 24, but also looking at the East's brilliant foliage, taking in a few Broadway shows and, doubtless, talking Desilu business with network heads.

"I always like to go some place special in May, just as I like to come to New York now," she said. "First I thought it would be fun to make a show in Paris, but we couldn't get Zero Mostel and another star we wanted for it. So I said let's go to England and do something there instead."

What the "something" finally amounted to is a day in London — "and it covers all the things I'd want to do there myself as a tourist, and believe me, there's

a lot of Lucille Ball in Lucy Carmichael."

But the real star of the show, in spite of the presence of Anthony Newley, is a young man nobody ever sees on the screen, an Egyptian named Fouad Said, who now makes his headquarters in Hollywood but flies all over the world with a miniature film studio fitted into a pint-sized bus.

Said, Lucy said, was the fellow who did all the location shots in Hong Kong of NBC's "I Spy". He just rolls out marvelous stuff without effort in all weather and under all conditions, the sort of things that it would take the studios forever to do.

She appeared genuinely un-concerned that a new series, "Rat Patrol," which is part of her own series' Monday-night competition, had outpointed "The Lucy Show" in the new Nielsen ratings.

"Good luck to them," she said. "I've had 15 good years in television and surely there's room for plenty of shows. I hope they do well — as long as my shows stays in the top 10 too, which it did."
