FRENCH EXPERT WINS WITH MISSING DEUCE

By ALFRED SHENWOLD

Since all articles this week are devoted to the importance of desec, we must tell the story of the game that was played.

There, the time, a few years ago, the scene, a Parisian bridge club; and the cast of characters included the late Marcel Peeters in the East seat.

Opening lead—four of hearts. West led the four of hearts, and Peeters took the first three tricks with the jack, ace and king of hearts. He then shifted to the deuce of spades.

Declarer hadn't paid very close attention to the spots, and if he noticed that the deuce of hearts had not appeared, he probably thought it was still in the West hand. South did notice that East had not led a fourth heart.

This seemed to mean that East was out of hearts. In that case South could assure the contract by finessing through West for the queen of clubs. It would be fatal to respect this finesse if West had Q-x-x of clubs. It would be "safe" to try the finesse if East had the queen, because then South would lose only one club and three hearts.

So South cashed the ace of clubs and set up an ace of hearts to defeat the contract. Peeters applied with "I almost lost this trick by arranging my cards so carefully."

South nodded bitterly. He knew he would have made the contract if East had taken his four hearts. There would be no reason for the "safety play" in clubs, and he would have lost only four heart tricks.

Daily Question

Partner opens with one club, and the next player passes. You hold: Spades, J-10-4; Hearts, 8-7-4; Diamonds, J-8-7-4; Clubs, 7-4.

What do you say?

Answer: Pass. In most bidding systems you are allowed to pass the opening bid of one club. Don't dream of responding to a non-forcing bid when you have only two jacks.

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Barry Favors Expansion of Loan Program

State Sen. David M. Barry of Manchester warned today that "unless Connecticut's new college loan program is expanded almost immediately, thousands of the state's qualified students may soon be deprived of benefits."

Barry, the Democratic incumbent, running for re-election from the 6th Senatorial District, said, "An emergency situation has arisen because, although the full impact of the program will not be felt for at least three to four years, the lending limit has almost been reached already."

He said that, when the Foundation for Financial Assistance to Higher Education was created last year, it was authorized to underwrite only \$8 million in student loans.

"Since banks and other financial agencies began making state-guaranteed loans last June," Barry said, "they have handed out \$7,736,000 to 6,675 state residents attending universities, colleges, and nursing, business and technical schools."

Under the loan program, students from families with adjusted incomes of up to \$15,000 a year may borrow on liberal terms, as much as \$1500 each school year for their college or school expense.

When the student satisfaction-by-completes-a-college-program, the state pays 10 per cent of that portion of his loan that has been applied to tuition and academic fees.

Moreover, the state may pay, at its discretion, an additional 10 per cent where such action is justified by financial need, outstanding achievement, or the student's ability to obtain a higher education.

Barry said, "This program is today that they are threatened with the loss of their educational opportunities because of financial assistance being lacking."

### Stopped During Walks, Yale Professor Rebels

NEW HAVEN (AP) — Yale law professor Charles A. Reich says he has been stopped nine times in recent years for no good reason during his walks at night. He says he finds it offensive and humiliating, and has come to the conclusion that police questioning carries with it the danger of any unthought, unreviewable authority.

Reich says he is bothered by the instrument of malice, revenge, and even crime. "What happens," he asks, "when the person stopped is a Negro, or poor, or frightened? What affronts to dignity occur? Each says police should not stop and question anyone unless they have reason to believe a crime has been committed, or is about to be committed."

Reich says police should identify themselves and explain why they are stopping a person. And he has been asked to produce identification to explain where he is going, and where he has come from.

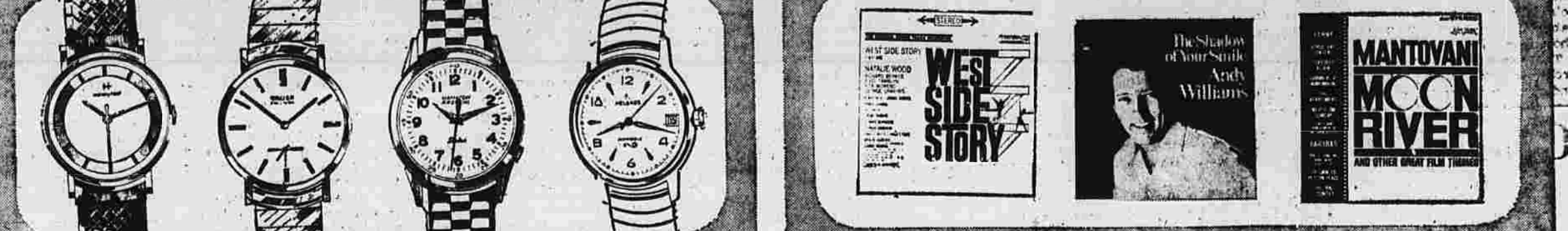

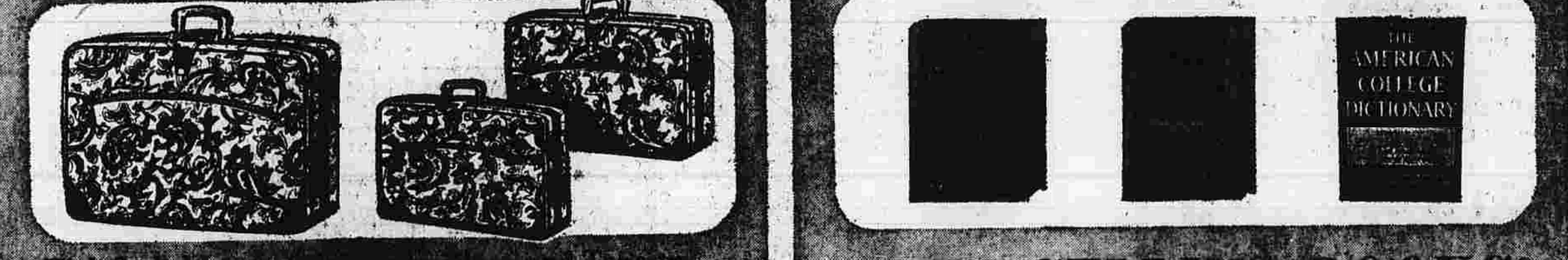

# Vauxhall Plant Boating World Tour Wayne Family Fulfills Dreams of Adventure

**LITON, England (AP)**—Production was resumed today at General Motors' big Vauxhall car plant under an uneasy truce reached after violent demonstrations against the plant's American management.

As management and union stewards prepared for negotiations, a company spokesman said: "As far as we can see, everybody seems to have turned up for work and the assembly lines are running. But we cannot say how long this will last. Violence broke out at the Liton plant Tuesday after the workers complained that the plant's paint shop was dirty. Police moved against some 2,000 idle workers when they tried to storm the factory's executive office shooting for center of the 'bloody American' management and demanding Vauxhall be nationalized. The plant is operated by a subsidiary of the U.S. General Motors Corp.

The workers insisted on payment for time lost in the paint shop dispute they were told the company refused to negotiate under duress.

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"Things will happen and they will be terrible," a Western diplomat has overheard saying to a colleague. "Don't ask me why I feel that way. I just do."

One could pile on the pessimism. It would be in consistent character for the way President Johnson has managed the war in Vietnam so far for him to follow the American elections and his trip to Asia with the invasion of North Vietnam.

And if Americans want to feel blue, all we have to do is read again Corroborated Roosevelt's statement that the United Nations, "hardly anyone here believes" the United States thesis that North Vietnam has committed an act of aggression.

How did we ever get so far from the world, or the world ever get so far from us?

More important, how did the United Nations, which waged the successful police action against aggression in Korea, which halted flaming war in which pacified the Congo and Cyprus, ever allow itself to be reduced to impotence in Vietnam? There is one sad, sorry answer to that question. It is that the United States, which was an essential leader in all these other collective security actions, chose a different, unilateral policy for Vietnam.

The dismay and apprehension at the United Nations are justified. As that organization nears its 21st birthday next Monday, its most loyal members are all little ones, and do not include, except for Britain, the great nations who were originally its founders.

**Darkness At The UN**

These are dark, gloomy days at the United Nations, formal headquarters of mankind's ineffectual resolve to rid itself of the scourge of war.

The main reason is that war is in being, and that it is those who wage it, and those who support it, who are the ones who are to be judged or restrained, and it goes on about the fighting of it.

The pessimists at the United Nations cannot see this process ending of its own accord.

"They see it continuing until it engulfs the whole world."

There have been, this week, two expressions of their pessimism.

One of them came from a sharp anti-American speech delivered in the General Assembly by Huot Sambath, chief delegate to the United Nations for the neutralist, non-aligned, group of Cambodia, which has been the victim of Vietnam's aggression and sometimes spoliage for bombing.

The Cambodian diplomat accused the United States of turning a deaf ear to the condemnation of world opinion for our escalation of the war in Vietnam, and said this:

"That this policy of force will lead to a world war cannot be doubted, and at the present rate of escalation we can even conceive of this session of the Assembly as being the last for our organization."

This neutral Asian diplomat referred to our presence in Vietnam as an "invasion" and he wanted the United States to call on the United Nations to end its "aggression" and evacuate its forces.

Such the pessimism with regard to the United Nations, and the criticism of the United States, as they joined together in the speech of this Cambodian diplomat.

Cambodia, however, is no particular friend of ours. If Cambodia is alone in such blame of us, in such despair for the United Nations, it may not matter too much.

We turn, however, from the speech by the Cambodian to a dispatch to the Christian Science Monitor from Marie Perot, its special correspondent at the United Nations.

"There is a deep uneasiness suffusing the United Nations," he wrote the other day. "It is a product of hopelessness and fear."

"Hopelessness reflects the anticipation that the complex might be overcome by events which the UN will be unable to prevent. And that produces fear."

"There is alarming talk that often spread like wildfire. . . . Some Eastern European delegations, for example, are convinced that President Johnson is just waiting for the elections to be over to order the invasion of North Vietnam. . . ."

"The Soviets are said to be preparing to reverse the harrowing experience of the Cuban confrontation. According to this view, it will be this time to tell the Americans that they have gone too far. They will warn that unless the American troops are withdrawn from the territory of their ally, they will take measures that will lead to war. . . ."

"The likelihood of something terrible happening is being entertained not only by the malignants but also by some American allies in Europe. . . ."

"There is no question that the war in Vietnam is very unpopular. It brings to mind among many here the image of a strong man beating a child. . . ."

"Resentment, no matter what the official statements, there are few diplomats here who approve of the way the United States is fighting the Vietnam war. . . . Diplomats recall Secretary General U Thant's definition of the Vietnam war as one of the most barbarous in history. . . ."

"All this is likely to create little support for the United States or for its thesis, that North Vietnam has committed an act of aggression."

Paisley Released

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) — The Rev. Ian Paisley, leader of Northern Ireland's Protestant extremists, was released from Belfast jail today after serving a three-month term for retaining to keep the peace.

He told a crowd of about 100 outside the jail to come back Thursday morning at 9 o'clock for a real good Protestant rally on the steps of the prison.

Paisley's breakfast club has only about 3,000 members but he has much wider support among other Ulstermen who fear the increasing influence of Roman Catholicism.

After a riot when his Protestant supporters marched through a Catholic section of the city and staged demonstrations outside the annual assembly of the Irish Presbyterian Church, Paisley was fined and ordered to put up a two-year peace bond. He refused to put up the bond and was jailed. His supporters paid the \$4 fine.

Guards Reviewed TOKYO (AP) — Chinese Communist party Chairman Mao Tse-tung reviewed 1.2 million youthful Red Guards — the innocents behind China's "cultural revolution" — in a pointed rebuttal Tuesday to Soviet bloc criticism of the movement.

The cheering youths lined a 17-mile route to Peking's Gate of Heavenly Peace Square to salute the 72-year-old Mao and his No. 2 man, Defense Minister Lin Biao, the New China News Agency reported.

The report made no mention of any speeches. Mao, hairless and in military uniform, was described as looking "very fit."

Tower Robbed LONDON (AP) — The Tower of London, the ancient depository of Britain's crown jewels, was robbed Tuesday night of \$7,000. Charles Mahadeo, 31, a government clerk, told police he and three other men entered the office in the Lambeth Tower, knocked him semiconscious and made off with the day's take from tourists.

The priceless crown jewels are kept in a supposedly thief-proof vault in the Wakefield Tower.

Liners in Port SOUTHAMPTON, England (AP) — The transatlantic liners Queen Elizabeth and the France were among 12 big ships unable to berth here today because of a strike by tug crews.

The 88,000-ton Queen Elizabeth headed for Cherbourg, the France went to Le Havre. Their passengers were expected by channel ferries later today.

Stranded at Southampton were 900 passengers due to seal on a Mediterranean cruise.

NO COLLEGE FIRE DRILLS SANTA FE, N.M. (AP) — The New Mexico attorney general has issued an opinion which says that laws requiring fire drills at public and private schools do not apply to colleges. The opinion said the law "imposes clearly that the legislature was dealing with a particular class of schools, all below the college or university level."

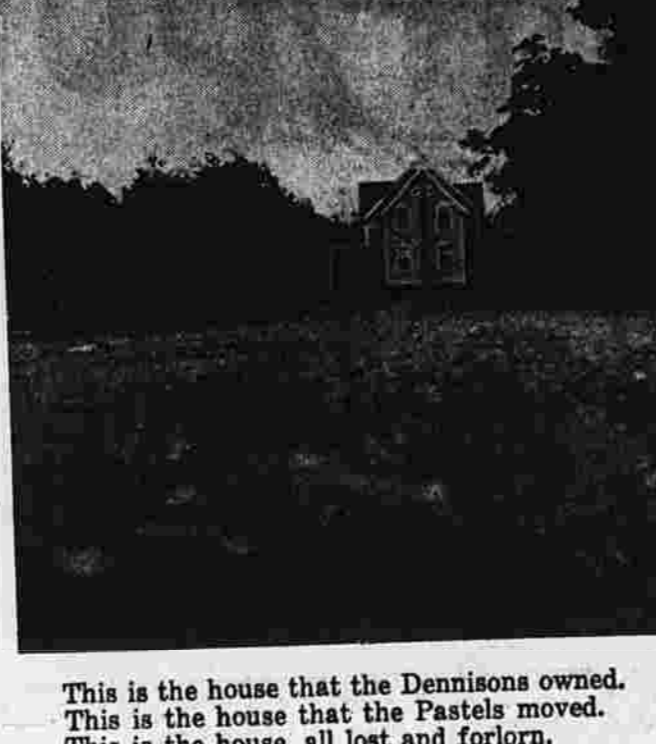

WASHINGTON (AP) — haven't cleared initial screening. There's at least one man in the United States who is glad he is bald: Stephen N. Shulman, new chairman of the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission. At 33, Shulman is one of the youngest agency chiefs in Washington, and he is just as happy to look older. I realize I can't eliminate that — I've got a tiny agency, but I can try to be a catalyst that brings together the resources, like I can."
