NY Times Supports Gengras

HARTFORD (AP)-The New York Times endorsed Republican gubernatorial challenger Clayton Gengras today for election in Connecticut Nov. 8, but backed most of the six incumbent Democrats in the congressional races.

The Times said "it is time for a change..." in calling for Gengras' election over Gov. John Dempsey. The newspapers said Dempsey "simply inherited the office when Abraham Ribicoff resigned to enter the Cabinet" in 1961.

The paper said Dempsey "has demonstrated that his chief talent is for offending no one." On patronage, "he has faithfully followed the recommendations of John Bailey, the Democratic Party's shrewd state boss." The newspaper said the "crit-

ical contest" among the con-gressional candidates is in the 4th District, where U.S. Rep. Donald J. Irwin "has shown courage on foreign affairs and civil liberties issues."







The Undercover Block To Peace Peace is going to be extraordinarily ifficult to design in Vietnam, else we might have had brighter chances of it ong before this.

And the main reason chances of peace in the future also seem dim is that it is difficult to see how either side, really, can give up any portion of its present hold on the political future of South When the problem is looked at from

this angle, it becomes difficult to imaine that President Johnson, even if he North Vietnamese and the Vietcong should come to formal acceptance of his offer for a joint withdrawal of military force, would find it possible to keep his side of that proposal. And the reason why we probably

would not feel free to accept even our own peace proposal if the enemy should surprise us by accepting it was expressed, clearly enough, by a South letnamese official who was talking to espondent Charles Mohr of the New York Times the other day. What this South Vietnamese official

was discussing was the trouble the South Vietnamese government would have dealing with the areas nominally under its own control if any formal peace should ever be decreed. He was talking about such govern-

ment-controlled areas when he said this: "Frankly, we are not strong enough on a purely political basis. They are organized and disciplined. The non-Communist nationalists are not-we do not have any large, well-organized political parties and we do not yet have unity. We cannot leave the Vietcong in exis-

In other words, this spokesman for the South Vietnamese government was saying that it will be disastrous for his government to have to take any kind of formal peace in Vietnam which might prevent it from carrying out its military effort to destroy the Victoria as it now exists inside the government lines.

This spokesman was also saying, of course, that the fate of South Vietnam must not, at this stage of affairs, be left to any free political decision of the people, because the Victoria would be sure to win that kind of contest. In summary, then, this spokesman

was saying that any kind of peace for Vietnam which is not preceded by the destruction of the Vietcong underground which exists inside the government lines will, no matter what its formal terms, be a peace which threatens to leave the Victoong in control of the future free politics of the country. It is this consideration which prompts doubt that President Johnson, even if the opposition formally complied with all his peace demands and conditions, could actually decide to withdraw American troops at any time in the predictable future. On the other hand, it would be even

more impossible for the Vietcong to relinquish, even if their own leadership or that from Hanoi agreed they would, that grass roots political strength it possesses even inside territory the government itself controls militarily. That is the deadlock underneath all

formal high level discussion of peace terms, It is the pessimism which says that peace might not be possible to make in Vietnam even if both sides should really want to make it.

The Center Is The Hope Congressman Charles Waltner, the minently decent Georgian who has resigned his nomination rather than support the segregationist candidate; Lester Maddox, for governor of his state, should be considered something of a egitimate authority on the problem on which his convictions have been so dramatically demonstrated.

In any case, we believe his analysis of what is meant by the phrase "black power" because it happens to be our own analysis as well.

Congressman Weltner, addressing the Woman's National Democratic Club in Washington the other day, discarded the gefinitions some of the users of the phrase "black power" have been offering for it. He did not accept their explanation that it is really "economic" or "political" power that they mean. "Call it what you may," he said, "its meaning is simply a call to violence." MONWEAL

There is no reason, either, to dispute his verdict that the excess violence generated by users of the "black power" slogan has been responsible for injuring the political cause of moderates in the South, and helping extreme segregationists such as Maddox when they go to the polls.

Congressman Weltner speaks for the moderate center which, North or South, and in many issues other than racial, stands for the hope of rational progress for civilization. Beset by the white supremacy, Birchite fanatics on one extreme, and by the nihilistic, anarchistic exponents of "black power" on the other extreme, the American center has to hold to its decency, its tolerance, even of extremes, and its own ove of country and of humanity if it is to bring itself and its country and the cause of man safely through the terrible challenge of our time. Either extremeis willing to destroy America in order to have a wild chance of creating the old or new kind of America which exists in its own distorted dream. The center must not only hold against both the extremes, but generate its own dynamics for moving forward toward the sane and decent solution of the problems the extremes would mangle.



The South School physical plant is completely inadequate to serve the growing population of the South End of Town Classroom space is so limited that all children in Grades IV, V. and VI are bused to the Washington School. This year it has become necessary to bus, some children from Grades I and III to other schools in the Manchester system. In spite of efforts to place children elsewhere, South School today has 50 per cent more children in attendance than the school was designed to

In Grade I alone, which is one of the most difficult classes to teach, there are 36 younger sters. This is a far cry from the 25 to 1 pupil, teacher ratio of which Manchester boasts. A grade II class is forced to hold its sessions in the cafer teria Each day classes are disrupted while desks are pushed aside and the cafeteria tables,

Due to lack of space, the hallway serves as a place of individual conferences and a place. for testing. The Dental Hygenist, Speech Therapist and Reading Consultant all must use the corridor when working with the children.
