Plane Crash Kills Two; 6 in State Die on Roads

NEW HAVEN (AP)—A man and his wife were killed in a plane crash and traffic accidents claimed six lives, three of them pedestrians in Connecticut during the weekend.

The bodies lifted from the wreckage of the plane that crashed Sunday night were identified as Theodore V. Steller, 40, of Monroe and his wife Claire, 37.

The one-engine blue and white craft was on its way from the Bridgeport Municipal Airport to Ansonia Airport, a distance of less than 15 miles, when something went wrong shortly before 10 o'clock.

The motor apparently quit, four hours before the plane crash, a since Frederick Hine, on whose farm the plane crashed, said he heard no engine noise. "All I heard was a thud," Steller, who ran a rubbish collection firm in Monroe, bought the plane recently, a relative said.

Nixon Visit, Debate Weekend Highlights

HARTFORD (AP)—A visit by former vice president Richard M. Nixon, another debate by the gubernatorial candidates and a "poor people's convention" were highlights of Connecticut's weekend political scene.

Nixon made a speech in New London Saturday afternoon before a large crowd of people. He was accompanied by his wife, Pat, and a number of other family members.

Another "Johnson Congress" is elected, "there will be an American in which the majority of Americans—not just those who are poor—will have their rent paid by the federal government; in which all Americans will have a guaranteed income paid by the government, whether they work or not; in which decisions about what will be taught in our schools will be made in Washington; and in which cities will be planned, not by local communities, but by bureaucrats in Washington."

Nixon said, "A vote for Johnson's Congress in November is a vote for an economic recession in 1967."

A man whose wife and two sons were killed in Friday's "black glacier" told the coroner to record a verdict of "buried alive" by the National Coal Board.

The board, which runs Britain's state-owned mines, has been accused of neglect in allowing the giant slag heap to grow to the point where it collapsed.

NY Times Supports Gengras

HARTFORD (AP)—The New York Times endorsed Republican gubernatorial challenger Clayton Gengras today for election in Connecticut Nov. 8, but backed most of the six incumbent Democrats in the congressional races.

The Times said "it is time for a change..." in calling for Gengras' election over Gov. John Dempsey. The newspapers said Dempsey "simply inherited the office when Abraham Ribicoff resigned to enter the Cabinet" in 1961.

The paper said Dempsey "has demonstrated that his chief talent is for offending no one." On patronage, "he has faithfully followed the recommendations of John Bailey, the Democratic Party's shrewd state boss."

The newspaper said the "critical contest" among the congressional candidates is in the 4th District, where U.S. Rep. Donald J. Irwin "has shown courage on foreign affairs and civil liberties issues."

Also winning endorsement were Congressmen Emilio Q. Daddario in the 1st District, William L. St. Onge in the 2nd and John S. Monagan in the 5th.

In the 8th District the Times recommended the election of Republican Thomas J. Meskill on the grounds that the record of Rep. Bernard F. Grabowski "remains undistinguished."

The Times position in the 3rd District was not clear. "Rep. Robert N. Giallomo, whom we have endorsed in the past," the paper said, "completed a rather disappointing record in this Congress. We note particularly his vote against the administration's home rule bill for the District of Columbia, his votes on both sides of the rent subsidy issue, and his opposition to a long-term foreign aid authorization."

The GOP candidate challenging Giallomo is Tell Stelio Salmona.

Johnson Urges Allies To Show Viet Unity

War Far from Over Westmoreland Says

MANILA (AP)—The U.S. commander in Viet Nam told the Manila summit conference today the war is "far from over" and he will need more troops in the days ahead, but President Johnson said a display of unity by the allies here should provide new fuel for the cause of peace.

"Let the bullets of the world know that when they do attack their neighbors, the friends of their neighbors will be there to resist," the President said in this first day of meetings among the leaders of nations fighting Communists in Viet Nam.

Johnson was the last speaker of the day. His remarks came after Gen. William C. Westmoreland, the U.S. commander, reported to the leaders that allied forces are increasingly effective in battling the Communists.

Westmoreland said troop morale was high. "The troops are the finest ever fielded; they understand the conflict and appreciate their complex role as both fighters and builders."

The session in which Westmoreland and the President spoke was closed to the public, but their remarks were given to newsmen later by U.S. spokesmen. White House press secretary Bill D. Moyers gave the account of Johnson's remarks. Johnson summed up what he portrayed as the four main points:

Manila Police Rout Small Protest Group

MANILA (AP)—Police fired shots into the air tonight, in the vicinity of the hotel where President Johnson is staying, to break up about 2,000 students demonstrating against U.S. policies on Viet Nam.

The clash outside the entrance lasted only a few minutes but the demonstration was continued a short distance away. It was then that police fired about six shots into the air to scatter them.

The noise of the demonstration could easily be heard inside the hotel lobby and the floors above.

Martha Raye in Viet Nam Noted Comedienne In Serious Role

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Comedienne Martha Raye, a front-line trouper for 24 years, changed her routine last week. She donned fatigues and worked for two days in an Army field dispensary, cleaning wounds, changing bandages and comforting GIs wounded in a Mekong Delta battle.

The twangy-voiced brunette, who has gone from outpost to tiny outpost throughout Viet Nam to entertain American servicemen, sang, danced and ribbed the men of two Army aviation helicopter companies stationed in the Mekong Delta town of Soc Trang.

The next morning, the chopper pilots and their crews delivered Vietnamese soldiers to the paddy fields and marshlands of the delta to charge the entrenched Viet Cong. As the first helicopters settled into the landing zones, they were met by intense fire. The landing zones were in the stronghold of a Viet Cong battalion.

Additional troops were brought in, and in the battle that followed four American helicopters were shot down and 20 were damaged. American casualties began arriving by 8 a.m. at the small Soc Trang dispensary.

Miss Raye, a former nurse, arrived about the same time, dressed in Army fatigues and volunteering for duty.

"She worked all day—until 9 that night—doing everything she could," one corpsman said. "One of the first things she did was donate a pint of blood to a badly wounded sergeant. Then it was hour after hour of scrubbing and preparing the wounded for surgery, helping the surgeons, changing bandages, and cheering up men awaiting evacuation to field hospitals in Vung Tau or Saigon."

Miss Raye's show did not go on that night. The next morning she was back at the hospital in her stained fatigues, helping the one doctor and eight corpsmen care for the patients.

Tanker Burning Out of Control Off Louisiana

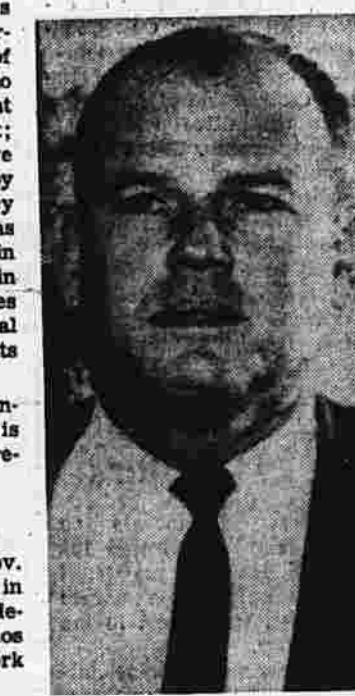
MORGAN CITY, La. (AP)—Flames raged out of control through an oil and gasoline-laden tanker 60 miles south-west of here today, forcing the crew to abandon ship. The Coast Guard said seven of the 40 crewmen are missing.

The Gulf Stag, a 572-foot vessel, was setting and believed sinking at midmorning. Another tanker, the Atlantic Prestige, picked up the Gulf Stag's captain and many of the crewmen.

The Gulf Stag's master, whose name was not available, said he believed all his crewmen had abandoned ship. He said seven crewmen are missing.

A Coast Guard helicopter took three badly-burned crewmen to a Morgan City hospital. A doctor at the hospital said the trio suffered second-degree burns.

THE WAY I HEARD IT

"La Sonnambula," a three-act opera by Bellini, is scheduled next for opera fans in the area. Even though it is a month away, I've already begun to get giddy about it, just as I did about "Turkmen" last season, a work by the same composer.

Actually, Bellini has long been out of style, so his opera is quite recently omitted from opera guides. The last time I saw it was in the days of Lily Pons, and hadn't done it before that since the days of Marcella Sembrich in 1906.

It has always been a starring vehicle for a coloratura soprano and was still her forte when she was in the title role, which means The Sleepwalker (female). The plot, as with all the Bellini operas, is mixed up and thoroughly contrived. The libretto is by Felice Romani. Popular since its premiere in 1831 until about a century ago, the music is overly sweet for my taste, but you may like it; it's certainly easy to listen to.

Others, taken to Jacksonville, Fla. last fall, ate an acre of weeds in Florida. Scientists hope the insects can do the job of a herbicide and thus minimize potential hazard to fish and wildlife.

Master Spy's Escape Embarrasses Wilson

LONDON (AP)—A political storm descended on Prime Minister Harold Wilson today over the escape of double agent George Blake, a spy who fled from a London jail where he was serving the longest sentence in modern English history. The Daily Sketch reported that Blake, 44, had been spirited out of Britain within hours of his escape from Wormwood Scrubs Prison. Conservative legislators served notice they will seek to censure the government for failing to keep Blake under closer watch. Blake escaped in 1948 to 49 years as the most dangerous spy of the postwar years, he was kept without special security in a jail from which eight escapees already had been freed this year. The Daily Sketch reported that Blake escaped from British jails after a prison guard failed to follow a demand for a key to a cell. Blake was seen by a prison guard in a second-story window on a secondary landing, apparently with some loot which has not been traced, dropped into an exercise yard and climbed a rope ladder over the 30-foot prison wall. Police believe a car was waiting by the wall for him. The plotters left only two real clues.

U.S. Seeking Agreement On Swapping Prisoners

MANILA (AP)—The United States is asking the Manila summit conference to make a bid for some agreement to swap prisoners with Communist North Viet Nam, it was learned today. The United States wants to include such a bid in its meeting's final statement, to be signed at the weekend Tuesday. Officials in Washington believe North Viet Nam is holding more than 100 Americans. North Viet Nam has sparred all attempts to talk about the question of war prisoners caught in a third party. The International Red Cross has tried without success to get Hanoi to allow Red Cross representatives to see the Americans held prisoner in the North. Although a hard liner toward Nam, Premier Nguyen Cao Ky of South Viet Nam has shown a sympathetic attitude toward possible exchange to free American fliers from Red captivity. The Saigon government has custody of most North Viet names captured in the ground fighting. The only North Vietnamese the United States is known to hold are 18 sailors picked up in international waters after their PT boats were sunk in action. Hanoi has paraded captured U. S. pilots through the streets of the capital to whip up public anger at American air raids. North Viet Nam has threatened a number of times to try them as war criminals but has not gone through with it. Agreement by the North Vietnamese to negotiate on the question of war prisoners caught in a third party. It might also open the way to freedom for other Americans captured by the Viet Cong in South Viet Nam.

There is no reason, either, to dispute his verdict that the excess violence generated by users of the "black power" slogan has been responsible for injuring the political cause of moderate in the South and helping extreme segregationists such as Maddox when they go to the polls.

Congressman Welton speaks for the moderate center which North, South, and in many issues other than racial, stands for the hope of rational progress for civilization. Beaten by the ultra-segregationist, Ehrlich fanaticism on one extreme, and by the nihilistic, anarchistic exponents of "black power" on the other extreme, the American center has to hold to its decency, its tolerance, even of extremes, and its own love of country and of humanity if it is to bring itself and its country into the cause of man safely through the terrible challenge of our time. Either extreme is willing to destroy America in order to have a wild chance of creating the old or new kind of America which exist in its own distorted dream. The center must not only hold against both the dynamics, but generate its own dynamic for modernity, Ehrlich fanaticism and decent solution of the problems the extremes would manage.

Playing Chess With Castro A seven-man chess team from the United States is scheduled to compete in the 17th Chess Olympiad even though the event, sponsored by the International Chess Federation, is being held in Havana, Cuba.

The State Department, keeping a straight face over the fact that this is the first time it has permitted any cultural group permission to visit Castro Cuba, pretends that its only hesitancy about the matter was one of wanting to make sure that the journey would be one made by legitimate chess players.

When the problem is looked at from this angle, it becomes difficult to imagine that President Johnson, even if the North Vietnamese and the Vietcong should come to formal acceptance of his offer for a joint withdrawal of military forces, would find it possible to keep his side of that proposal.

And the reason why we probably would not feel free to accept even our own proposals if the extremes were surprised by accepting it was expressed, clearly enough, by a South Vietnamese official who was talking to correspondent Charles Mohr of the New York Times the other day.

What this South Vietnamese official was discussing was the trouble the South Vietnamese government would have dealing with the areas nominally under its own control if any formal peace should ever be decreed.

He was talking of such government-controlled areas when he said this: "Frankly, we are not strong enough now to compete with the Communists as a supply of political troops. The area is organized and disciplined. The non-Communist nationalists are not—we do not have any large, well-organized political parties and we do not yet have unity. We cannot leave the Vietcong in existence."

In other words, this spokesman for the South Vietnamese government was saying that it will be disastrous for his government to have to take any kind of formal peace in Vietnam which might prevent it from carrying out its military efforts to destroy the Vietcong as it now exists inside the government lines.

This spokesman was also saying, of course, that the Vietcong would not stand up at this stage of affairs, be left to any free political decision of the people, because the Vietcong would be sure to win that kind of contest.

In summary, then, this spokesman was saying that any kind of peace for Vietnam which is not preceded by the destruction of the Vietcong, and which exists inside the government lines will, no matter what its formal terms, be a peace which threatens to leave the Vietcong in control of the future politics of the country. It is this consideration which prompts doubt that President Johnson, even if the opposition formally complied with all his peace demands and conditions, could actually decide to withdraw American troops at any time in the predictable future.

On the other hand, it would be even more impossible for the Vietcong to relinquish, even if their own leadership or that from Hanoi agreed they would, that great moral political strength they possess even inside territory the government itself controls militarily.

That is the deadlock underneath all formal high level discussions of peace terms. It is the pessimism which says that peace might not be possible to make in Vietnam even if both sides should really want to make it.

The Center in the Hope Congressman Charles Welton, the eminently decent Georgian who has resigned his nomination rather than support the segregationist candidate, Lester Maddox, for governor of his state, should be considered something of a legitimate authority on the problem on which his convictions have been so dramatically demonstrated.

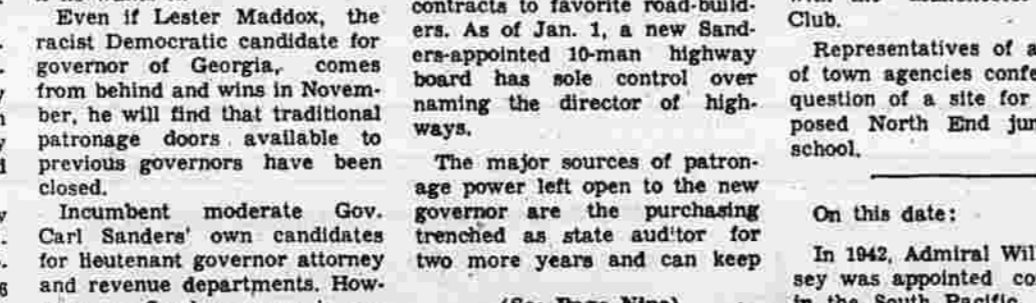

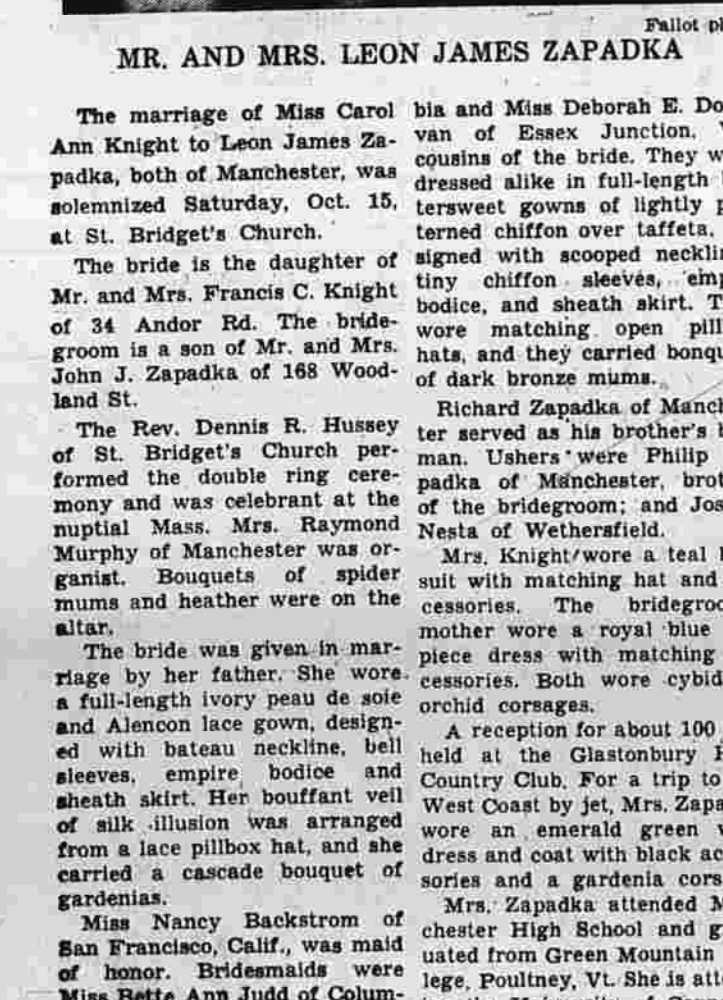

Tolland County \$43,500 Set For Farmers

Through the efforts of a cost-sharing assistance program, Tolland county farmers have been allocated \$43,500 for cooperating in the 1967 Agricultural Conservation Program, according to Joseph Szege, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Tolland County Committee.

Program funds are allocated primarily on the basis of conservation needs. Up to 10 per cent of the funds are expected to be reserved for such uses as increased treatment of conservation problems on farms where one has not yet been undertaken. In recent years most of the county's funds have been used to help farmers carry out such practices as permanent cover to protect soil from wind and water erosion, farm ponds as a means of protecting vegetative cover to make use of the land practical.

The funds have also been used for improving an established vegetative cover for soil or water shed protection, establishing temporary cover for winter protection from erosion, timber stand improvement and planting trees for forestry purposes.

Overall goals for the program for 1967 in Tolland County are to emphasize solutions to conservation problems which improve the appearance of farm land, as well as protect the resources of the farm and the community.

Szege points out that producers on about 100 county farms are using the program each year in bolstering the nation's supply of meat, food, fiber and timber requirements for the future. Over a period of five years the program has been reaching about 40 per cent of the county's total farms.

As in previous years, farm-related committees will administer the 1967 program with technical assistance from state and federal agencies in coordination with work plans of local soil and water conservation districts. Further information regarding the program is available at the Tolland County office, the Agricultural Center, Rt. 20.

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Simplicity Marks Byrd's Final Rites

WINCHESTER, Va. (AP) — With the same simplicity that marked his life, Harry Flood Byrd was buried beneath a simple brick and yellow marble tombstone Saturday.

Vice President and Mrs. Hubert H. Humphrey headed the list of dignitaries who came to pay their last respects to the man who set the course of Virginia politics for 48 years — 27 of them as the voice of fiscal conservatism in the U.S. Senate.

Secretary of the Treasury Henry Fowler was President Johnson's personal representative. Numerous senators and congressmen, Virginia Gov. Mills E. Godwin Jr. and five Virginia governors stood by the Byrd family beside the grave here.

During the 20-minute ceremony at Christ Episcopal Church the casket stood almost stark in the soft light. The only decorations were two small vases of white flowers at the rear.

There were no eulogies at the church, nor at the 10-minute graveside service that followed. From the church, the procession moved up a hill to Mt. Heron Cemetery.

At Mt. Heron, in the Byrd family plot, where his wife and daughter also lie, the former senator was buried.
