Owners of large apple orchards rent thousands of honey bee colonies for the sole purpose of having pollen carried from one apple blossom to another. Worker honey bees possess dense body hairs that catch the pollen dust which is removed by comb-like structures on the legs and trans-ferred to pollen baskets on the hind legs. When a bee has a ry almost 100 per cent her and deposits the pollen into polen cells. Nectar, the sugary drop of sryup deep inside the flower, is sucked through a hollow tube called a proboscis and stored in a special "tank" inside the bee's body. This is partially converted into honey while in this storage tank and finally processed after the bee returns to the hive. Worker. bees stand in rows, each holding from its mouth a small bit of this nectar, while other workers furiously fan their wings to drive the moisture

from it. This is repeated many times util enough moisture is removed to give it the right consistency to become honey. One of the most fascinating aspects of the honey bee is her method of communicating with her sister workers. Of course, a bee cannot talk as we do, but she can and does give accurate information about sources of honey to other bees in the hive Bee keepers have long known that they had some method of communication and they had watched them doing strange little "dances" but had never

connected the two.

A German professor of soology, Dr. Karl von Frisch. made an exhaustive study of these dances. After years of patient observation and thousands of experiments, his conclusions finally published. He claimed that bees are capable measuring distances and pin ointing specific locations. By acing containers of sryup at varying distances from an obervation hive and daubing each e that visited the containers with different colored paint, he was able to identify and oberve these bees inside the hive. 



Governor John Dempsey, the central front figure for this regime, conceivably might have prevented some of the more unfortunate choices of running mates for himself, or have checked the political machine in its decline into bold cynicism about the exploitation of public power. But in order to do this inside his own political machine he would have had to exercise far more initiative and decisiveness than he has brought to his discharge of the potential responsibilities of being Governor. The momentums of such a 12 year old

regime are all, unfortunately, in the wrong direction. They are toward the continued pleasantries of inaction in office, the continued cynical insolence of a political machine which has begun consider itself a law unto itself, and toward a continued indifference to real public service and safety and indifference to common sense as well on the part of burgeoning entrenched departnental bureaucracies which increase the inconvenience and the danger to the public with every new system they install, every new highway complex they

Both the quality of what Connecticut now has and the element of time past and time future suggest that 1966 is a year for change .

We need a brand of politics which is a little less cynical about its own prerogatives and a little more concerned with doing something for the people. We need a brand of leadership which will upset and disturb a few bureaucratic and political complacencies. We need a leadership which will dare offer new patterns of thought and

The arguments for change are strong enough to suggest that the change be made now, in 1966, and not delayed until after the state has had another four years of declining quality in candidates and mounting callousness on the part of an entrenched political machine. Four more years would, on top of this dwindling 12, prove a very long time.

Dangers Of The Journey Because the bags of paint which were

thrown and which hit the President's automobile in Melbourne might have just as easily been bags of dynamite, the security for the President's route in his next stop, at Sydney, was drastically increased, with the result both the President himself and the huge crowds which had lined his route were deprived of the mutual pleasure of what has become his typical campaign behavior.

And once we all get involved in the problem of now to take some of the dollar sign out of our practice of our most elemental democracy—that of standing for office -we will inevitably move closer to principle and consistency.

There ought to be some kind of a real ceiling on campaign expenditures, along with some purification of the money for such expenditures. It ought to be made impossible for anybody to accomplish any naked buying of an office anywhere. It would have to be part of this that there would have to e legal limits not only on the time for campaigning, but on such things as the amount of television space, or newspaper advertising a candidate could do. The British have done rather well in such respects, and now manage to conduct their campaigns in such a short space of time that they seem almost no campaigns at all to our American tra-

We doubt that all Americans would want to go that far in the restraint of campaigning. But there ought to be some kind of middle road for us, and the passage of the present law, imperfect good effect of making us really start looking for that road.

Whatever their motives in making the campaign, and whatever the targets of their oratory, neither of them expects to be in the governor's chair next year. Choosing the occupant of that chair is the real business of this




