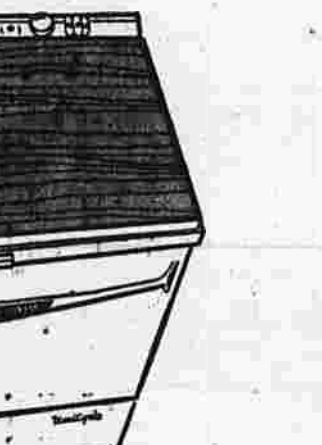

Chrysler Earnings Are Low

NEW YORK (AP) — Chrysler Corp., the nation's third largest auto maker, reported lower third quarter earnings for 1966 than for the same period last year.

Chrysler said third quarter earnings totaled \$6.6 million or 14 cents a share compared with \$18 million or 40 cents a share in the same period last year.

For the nine months, Chrysler said net earnings were \$22.4 million or \$2.72 a share compared with \$23.4 million or \$2.84 in the same nine months of 1965.

Chrysler follows General Motors, the leading auto maker, by two days in announcing lower profits. GM said Tuesday its third-quarter net income totaled \$29.5 million or 40 cents a common share, down from \$28.8 million or 91 cents per share a year earlier.

**Two Private Plans Offered on Schools**

Two residents have come forward with somewhat similar proposals to ease the tax burden for school construction at least temporarily.

Mrs. Virginia Butterfield, finance member, and Robert Thornton, an active observer of town affairs, have suggested that bonds be issued to the high school to house elementary grades for a while, thereby eliminating the time being the building of a second elementary school.

In another proposal, Thornton has suggested that the high school cafeteria-auditorium addition be eliminated altogether, and that the elementary school alone be built, with Grade 7 moving into its existing rooms at the high school, including the double classroom, which can again be used for a dining area.

After listening to figures on the elementary school at the public hearing Monday, Thornton says he now feels that it would be less expensive to build the elementary school at the high school, including the double classroom, which can again be used for a dining area.

Figures presented at the hearing indicated that the cost of the elementary school at the high school would go beyond its borrowing capacity if the two projects were built in addition to the high school as has been asked for the fall of 1967, with 15 sections and core facilities for 24, for the fall of 1968. The finance board is considering both of those ways to raise taxes about 6.6 mills.

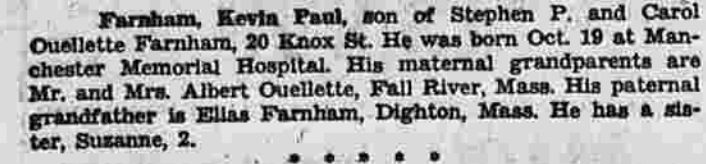

North Vietnamese Shun Manila Peace Conference

TOKYO (AP) — North Viet Nam today described the Manila summit conference as a "war council and stopped just short of officially rejecting the latest allied peace bid to end the Viet Nam war.

"The 'peaceful solution' proposed by the United States at the Manila conference," said Nhan Dan, organ of the North Vietnamese Communist party, "is still more cynical and laudable than the 'conditions' which the United States had earlier put to the Vietnamese people and which had been categorically rejected by the latter."

The official Hanoi newspaper did not refer specifically to the allied offer to withdraw all foreign troops six months after North Viet Nam withdraws its forces and aid from South Viet Nam.

But Peking's New China News Agency called it part of a U.S. "peace talks plot" and a representative of the Viet Cong in Hanoi said the Viet Cong "will carry on their just struggle against the Vietnamese people."

The United States was the manager while the rest were only clowns who lived on U.S. dollars and acted upon U.S. orders."

The New China News Agency called the troop withdrawal offer "a bribe and a blackmail and a shameful humbug with the aim of pushing the scheme of holding talks by inducement and asking the Vietnamese people to surrender to the U.S. aggressors outright."

Peking said the conference's declaration on peace and progress in Asia and the Pacific meant, in effect, putting the region, including China, "under the control of U.S. imperialism 100 per cent."

In an interview in a Cairo newspaper, Lee Kuan Yew, a representative of the Viet Cong's National Liberation Front, charged the Manila meeting's purpose was to bring more nations into the war.

Manila sources said Indonesia, Japan and India fit the requirements of the allied leaders.

The Hanoi comment was signed by "a commentator," which usually means a ranking Communist official.

It declared: "If the United States stops its aggression and withdraws all its troops from Viet Nam, peace will be restored immediately. If the United States continues its aggression while professing as its purpose the bringing of peace, the Vietnamese people will carry on their just struggle against the Vietnamese people."

"We would never consider the question of peace talks so long as the United States is escalating and widening its war front against the Vietnamese people," the statement declared.

Yale Democrats Defy Orders of State Leaders

HARTFORD (AP) — The Yale Young Democrats has defied the Young Democrat state organization by refusing to endorse incumbent Sen. Robert N. Giannino, a candidate for re-election in the Third District.

Connecticut Young Democrat President Gerald Sullivan, a Stamford lawyer, told the group before a meeting Wednesday that if it failed to endorse Giannino, its charter would be revoked.

However, the undergraduate group voted 242 against a motion to endorse Giannino.

A motion to endorse Yale History Professor Robert N. Cook, running as a peace candidate for the Third District seat on the American Independent Movement ticket, failed in a vote.

Answering Sullivan, the Yale group passed a resolution asserting its "right and duty to support those candidates whom it feels best exemplify the highest principles of the Democratic Party."

New Satellite Orbiting Site Above the Pacific Planned for 'Lani Bird'

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — A shiny new communications satellite whirled about the earth today and the Comsat Corp. hopes late this week to install it permanently over the Pacific Ocean as the first commercial space communications link between North America and the Far East.

The Pacific is preferred, and the Atlantic would be selected only if the initial orbital course was greatly different from that planned. Officials said the early figures indicate the path is favorable to place the satellite over the Pacific.

If so, a ground signal will trigger a kick motor aboard the satellite Saturday night when it reaches the high point of its looping orbit the sixth time. Firing of the motor is intended to position the satellite so that it will remain stationary over the Pacific.

Wednesday night's launching was "a textbook exercise," said Dr. Joseph Charney, president of the Communications Satellite Corp. Comsat paid the National Aeronautics and Space Administration \$3.57 million to host the satellite.

Preliminary tracking data indicated the payload, made by Hughes Aircraft Corp., was in an initial path ranging from about 200 to 23,000 miles above the earth.

Charney said the first benefit of the satellite would be improved phone service between the U.S. mainland and Hawaii. Stations in the other countries will be operating in a few weeks.

Comsat officials said nearly all of Lani Bird's 480 channels had been committed to commercial carriers and to government agencies such as the Defense Department and NASA.

The space agency plans to use the satellite for communicating with moon-bound Apollo astronauts.

Officials said there was a possibility that within a few months Viet Nam battlefield scenes might be broadcast live to U.S. via the satellite.

Comsat, a U.S. corporation, is manager of the \$3-million International Telecommunications Satellite Consortium (INTELSAT). Another Comsat satellite is to be orbited Nov. 23.

Eyewitness on the Oriskany Many Victims Slept On, Unaware of Explosions

EDITOR'S NOTE — Freelance photographer James H. Pickrell, 30, of Wilmington, Ohio, was the only civilian aboard the U.S. aircraft carrier Oriskany Wednesday morning when fire broke out, taking the lives of 43 men. Here is Pickrell's eyewitness report.

ABOARD THE ORISKANY, South China Sea (delayed) (AP) — Ugly flames belched from the flight deck of this 42,000-ton carrier just after dawn Wednesday, we thought there was nothing to worry about.

Only a few wisps of smoke had appeared after a hollow explosion two decks below us. The men were moving with no great rush to man the fire hoses; there had been similar flash fires before.

But the great belch of flame was a startling indication that this was worse, much worse, than anything else previously aboard the huge carrier. Within minutes we knew just how bad.

The Oriskany was prowling on wet down a bomb load within three minutes of the start of a fire, otherwise they will be endangered. The whole lot could blow up and take everyone with it.

There were mostly pilots sleeping in this forward part of the great carrier. 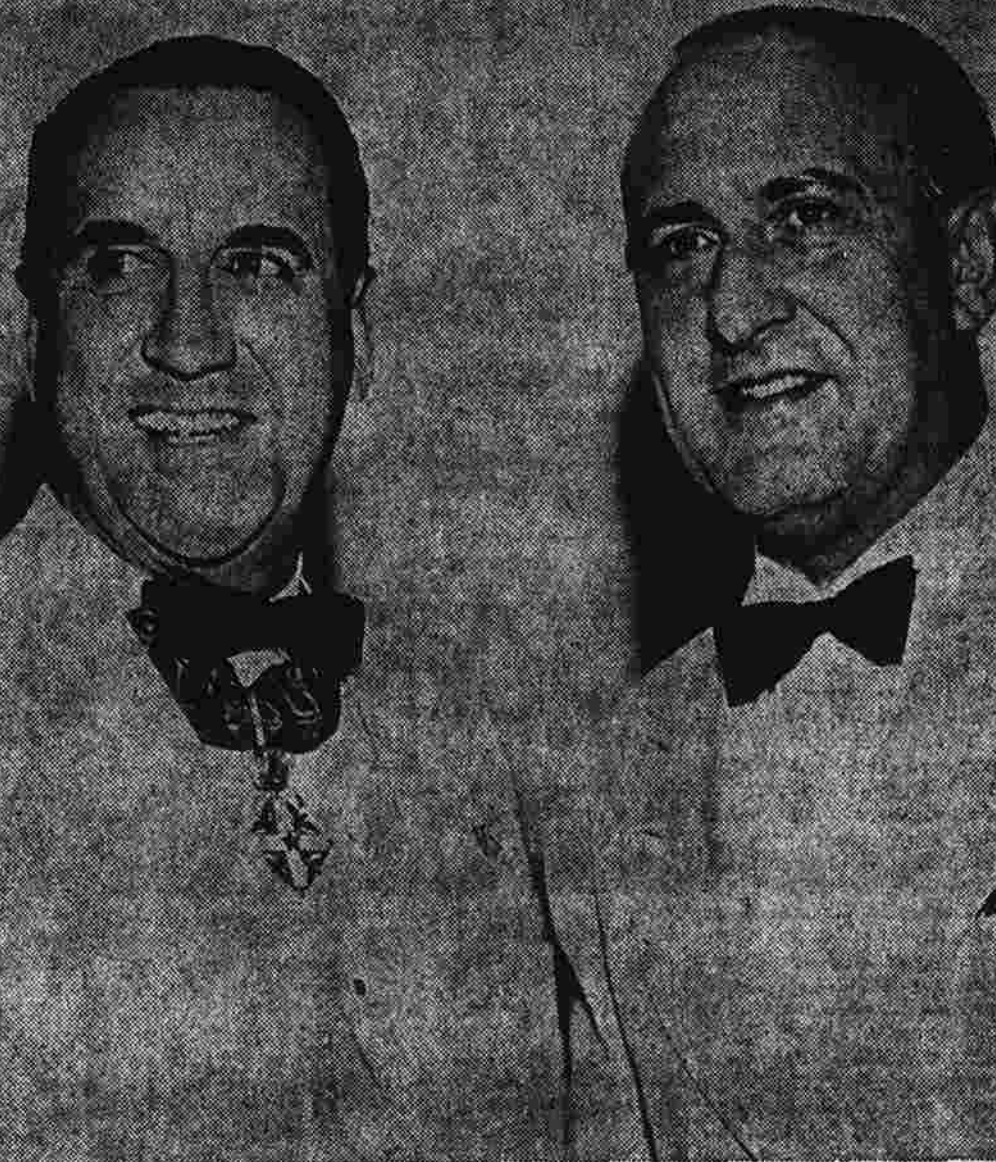

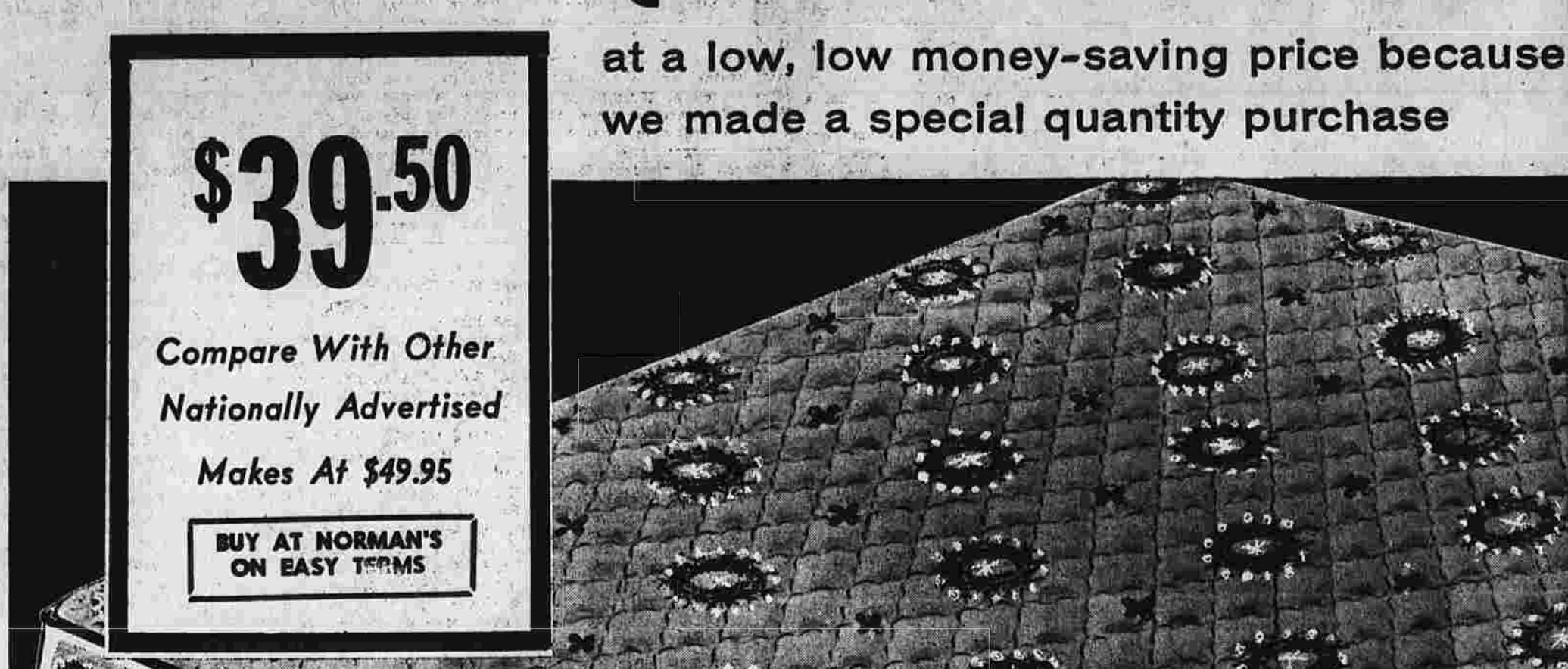

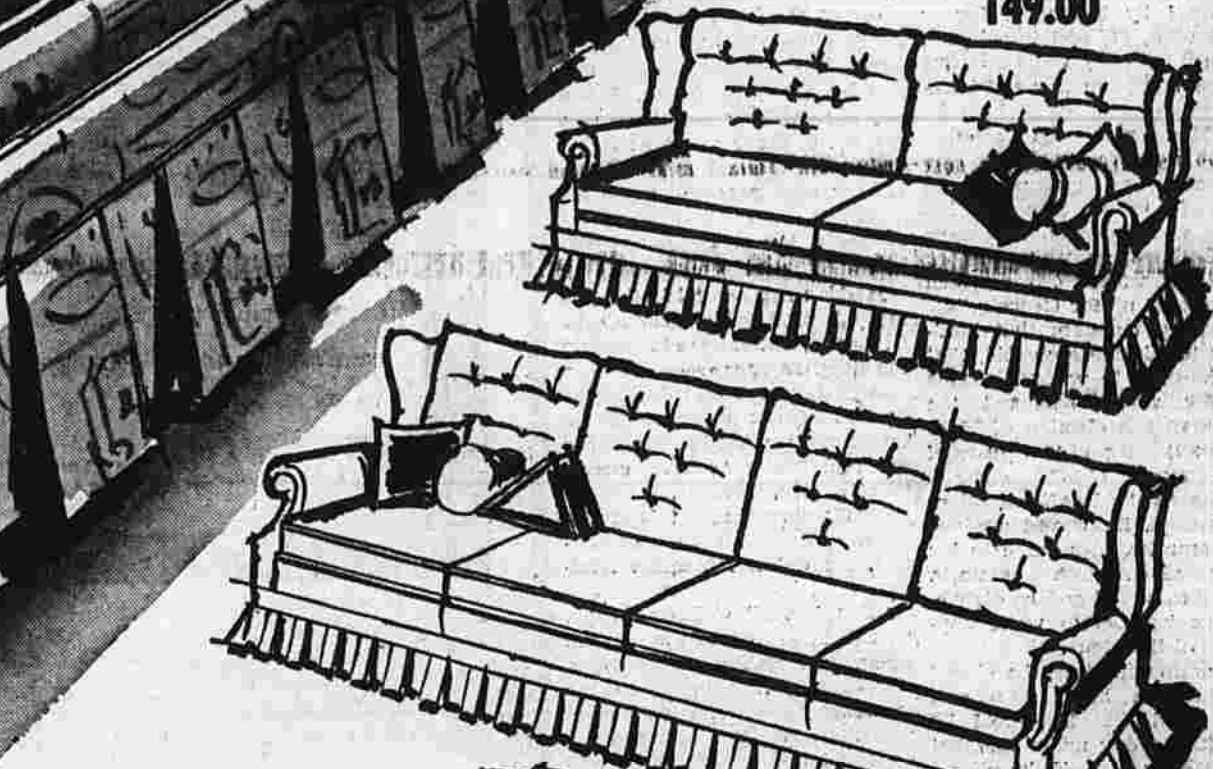

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 3 1/2 cups flour
- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon ginger
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon allspice

Cream together shortening, sugar, molasses and egg. Sift flour and spices and mix only until blended. Chill. Form into 1/4-inch balls and roll in sugar. Bake in ungreased cookie sheet. Flatten to one-quarter-inch thickness by pressing with sugar coated bottom of glass. Bake in 375-degree oven about 10 minutes. Cool. Decorate with orange icing. Store in tightly covered container. This recipe makes about three dozen cookies.

**Orange Icing**

- 1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar
- 4 teaspoons orange juice

Mix sugar and juice together until smooth. Place in decorating tube and make cut faces and jack-o-lanterns on cookies. For a brighter orange, add yellow and red food coloring to the icing.

- 1/2 cup water
- 10 cups cider
- 2 cinnamon sticks
- 2 whole cloves
- 4 tablespoons brown sugar

Peel of one lemon cut in spiral. Bring all ingredients to boil and simmer 20 minutes. Strain. Mock Chow Mein

Architectural drawings, plans and a scale model were displayed and commented on by Richard Quinn, of the firm of Russell, Gibson and Von Dohlin, architect for the project.

Mayor James Thrope said the purpose of holding the public hearing was to inform the public on what has been done to date on the project. He noted that the architect had drawn the preliminary plans and presented them to the public building commission who in turn presented them to the council.

Suggestions and changes had been made by both groups recently as last week and if the project is approved at the referendum, additional changes may be made, the mayor said.

Noting that the prime consideration entertained by the officials was not the outside of the structure but the inside facilities, the mayor said that the interior design is based on requirements of the different agencies of the town and the police department.

"The public building commission asked the architect for the most economical space to meet the requirements," Mayor Thrope said.

**4 Stories Planned**

Quinn, in explaining the sketches of the building, noted that while the building will be virtually two and a half stories, actually three stories, the building will be a two-story structure with a mezzanine level on the first floor. The mezzanine level will be used for a lobby and a waiting room. The second floor will be used for a council chamber. This area will also have a two-story ceiling.

Other areas included in the first floor level will be a mezzanine level, a waiting room, a town clerk's office, assessor's office, tax collector's office and conference room.

Quinn noted that interior walls are not load bearing walls and therefore flexible for possible future expansion.

On the upper level, facilities for the health and welfare department including an extension of the waiting room and office space has been included. Facilities for the building department and engineering department are flexible in area and also located on the second level.

A multi-purpose area, office space for the planning and zoning commission, zoning board of appeals and public building commission complete the second floor.

The police department would be located on the lower level, while the health and welfare department would be located on the upper level.

Mrs. Joanne Kilgore questioned if the building would be air conditioned and contain a cell area and a lounge for use by the town.

### LaBonne Backs Gengras Youth Corps Proposal

George T. LaBonne of Glastonbury, GOP candidate for state senator from the 4th Senatorial District, today backed a proposal, made by E. Clayton Gengras, that a Connecticut Youth Corps be established. Such a corps, he states, would check "an increasing problem" among today's teenagers and would train those of that age group to perform certain essential tasks, thus freeing full-time workers for more essential tasks.

LaBonne's statement follows:

"Increasing crime rate and youth have been linked closely in recent years. This is indeed unfortunate because today's teenager is probably taking more than his fair share of the blame. On the other hand, it is true that we do have an increasing problem in this age group, partly because of the accessibility of automobiles and other means of transport, and also because of a lack of preoccupation with an absorbing interest or activity.

"When I attended high school, a large percentage of students found it necessary to work after school to help out the family. In fact, it was common practice for those over age 16 to be dismissed one period early to enable them to work. Greatly improved economic conditions have changed all of this and this change has not always been for the better.

"An absorbing interest seems to be the ingredient necessary to check this ever-increasing problem. This is one of the reasons Clayton Gengras' suggestion for a Connecticut Youth Corps makes sense. In addition to keeping many teen-agers busy, the program will also yield other benefits.

"For example, the program would train our youth for government service. Realizing that the state is its own second largest employer and still growing, it is obvious that our need for trained workers will become critical. During the training period, these Youth Corps members would also perform certain essential tasks freeing our present full-time workers for more important duties.

"I also have a need to involve our youth in an early way in the world of politics. Having served within the framework of government, it is logical to expect many of our future state officers to receive their behind-the-scenes basic training as members of the Youth Corps. We need the enthusiastic involvement of citizens if we are to provide government at its best. What better way to initiate that involvement than at the teen-age level? It has been said many times that Connecticut youth is the greatest natural resource. I believe this and I'm depressed about seeing it wasted. Let's provide for our current and reduce many of our current problems, by giving our youth responsibility now."

### Events In Capital

#### Channels for Aid

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. aid to Africa is to be channeled more through world and regional organizations rather than sent directly to individual countries, say government officials.

The State Department acknowledged Wednesday after months of silence that President Johnson has approved a new aid policy for Africa which also aims at increasing the number of trained Africans and developing effective communication systems for the continent.

No increase is foreseen in the current \$500-million annual rate of aid.

The policy is based on a report prepared last summer by the U.S. ambassador to Ethiopia, Edward M. Korry.

The plan includes recommendations to the World Bank that it take a more coordinated approach to financing some African projects. It continues the U.S. policy of not trying to replace former colonial powers, which Washington believes have a primary responsibility in assisting Africa.

### Test For Mothers

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Public Health Service says it has developed a simple test to determine whether expectant mothers are immune to German measles.

The disease is a serious danger to women in early pregnancy because it can lead to blindness, deafness, heart disease or brain involvement in the unborn baby.

Dr. Harry M. Meyer Jr. of the National Institute of Health told the American Academy of Pediatrics in Chicago today that the test is simple, speedy, sensitive and reliable.

He said it should soon be routinely available in hospitals, health departments and other laboratories. Doctors caring for expectant mothers exposed to the disease could quickly learn if they are immune.

When German measles vaccine becomes commercially available, the test could be used to determine if they need the vaccine, said the health service.
