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Viet Nam War Fades As Campaign Issue

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Viet Nam War, once considered likely to become a key issue in the fall's congressional campaign, appears to have faded as a subject of partisan contention in election day approaches.

An Associated Press survey of campaign issues indicates most candidates in most races support the war and the administration's basic policies.

Differences are largely a matter of degree or relate to peripheral aspects such as what Republicans charge is a "creeping withdrawal" in administration pronouncements about the war.

In a number of cases where the war has played a role in the campaign, the survey showed differences between candidates are blurred.

Still, the survey shows, more than three dozen Senate and House candidates are trying to win with so-called "peace platform" despite the generally poor showing by war opponents in primaries.

Of these candidates, the ones given the best chance for election are those who already hold office. Most challengers face still uphill fights.

Six Democratic House members who have been leaders among congressional advocates of de-escalation in Viet Nam appear likely at this point to be re-elected in heavily Democratic districts. Rep. George E. Brown Jr., Philip Burton supporter,

Control System Problems Will Delay Apollo Launch

CAPT. KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — Problems with the Apollo spacecraft have ruled out the possibility of launching it into orbit this year with a three-man crew.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration had hoped to move the launch forward into December from its originally planned "first quarter of 1967."

However, the problems make a launching this year impossible, NASA sources reported.

The troubles involve Apollo's environmental control system, which is designed to provide life support for the three astronauts for up to 14 days.

Several parts must be replaced in an oxygen regulator and a water heating system. Modifications also are being made to other equipment.

The spacecraft already is three weeks late reaching the pad, with no estimate when it can be delivered. Once on the pad at least 40 days of trouble-free checkout will be required. 20 launches in Manchester, Bol.

Pilots for the Apollo 1 mission will be Air Force Lt. Col. Virgil I. Grissom and Edward H. White II and Navy Lt. Cmdr. Roger B. Chaffee. They are bringing out all systems of the craft, forerunner of the vehicle that is to transport U.S. astronauts to the moon.

Vernon Option Signed in Bid To Build Courthouse

Lester Baum, chairman of the Redevelopment Commission, yesterday afternoon signed a short-term option for the entire redevelopment area.

The option, to be signed by the First Hartford Realty, was necessary in order to give that firm an opportunity to bid on building the courthouse.

Bids for the courthouse, Baum said, will be closed today. The state will choose the low bidder on the basis of price and the building of the building.

The original price was set at \$389,000 but this has been negotiated down because of the desire to have the courthouse located in the renewal project.

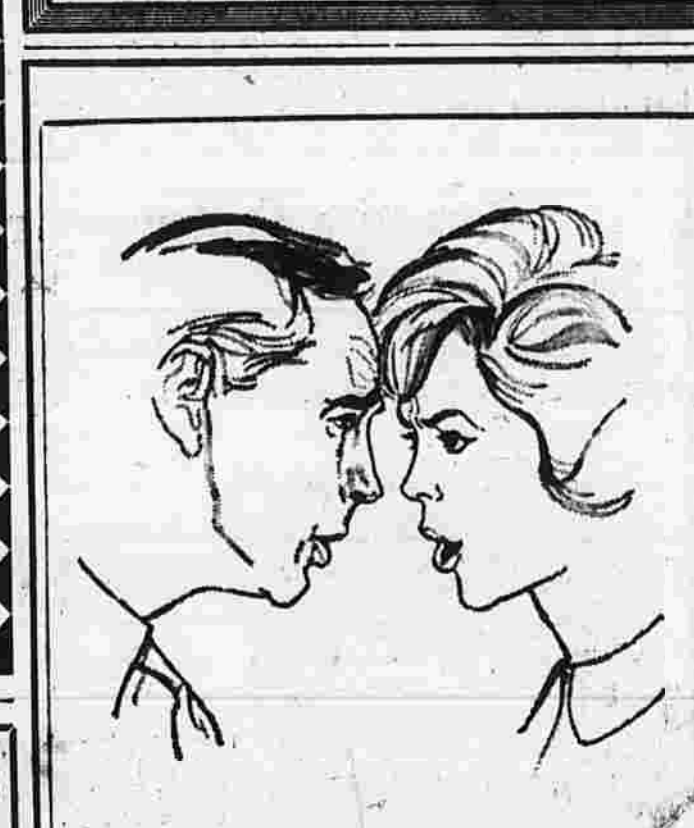

Still Flunking The Test

The first successful explosion of an atomic bomb was a test to mankind. And the responsible leaders and governments of mankind have been flunking this test ever since.

To follow a realistic interpretation of the test the invention of the bomb really meant, mankind would have been as straight as an arrow, as a sword, as a spear, as a lance, as a spear, as a lance, as a spear...

Next, after Russia had made its own bomb, the United States, Britain and France tried to organize an executive committee, whose members would be the only ones to have the bomb from then on, and who, in evidence of their sense of responsibility to the health of the world, would agree among themselves not to do any more testing of their bombs out in the atmosphere.

Next, naturally enough, nations not invited to let the United States, Britain and France be the only nations in the world with atomic weapons went ahead with testing of their own in the atmosphere.

Actually, history is being very patient with us all. It keeps making us fresh chances to admit it to our thinking and honor it in our policy. We are able to see, with suitable periods of mercy, the mistakes in between, each of the steps which France and Communist China take toward the capacity to wage long-range nuclear war, just like us. It is really a slow motion warning we are being given.

But there is still no indication that we are any closer to passing the test, from only one way to keep everybody from having the bomb and being potentially ready to use it.

Toward The Truth At Last
 A few days ago one academic figure who had been serving as consultant to the Air Force in its evaluation of flying saucer reports displayed public signs of lazeury. He was no longer sure he con-

ferred, that there was nothing to all the reports that have been made. Whether the history of the previous reports precipitated his replacement or whether his replacement stimulated his herey, the Air Force has in fact engaged a new consultant expert, and at this time it has engaged the world university.

The University of Colorado will undertake, under Air Force sponsorship, a new study of unidentified flying objects. The university study will have for its scientific director Dr. Edward U. Condon, professor of physics and former head of the National Bureau of Standards.

Such impressive scientific auspices will not, however, have too much influence on the realities confronting the study. If it wants to be believed, it will come with the conviction that vehicles such as the saucers have been in our atmosphere.

We cannot, for the life of us, believe that anybody elsewhere in the universe is in the habit of necessary to include too much scientific speculation or skepticism regarding the observed passage by or through their atmosphere of any set of unidentified flying objects here on earth have launched into infinite "journeying out among the various star systems, just as a carload of people would of our efforts to hit the moon or probe Venus. We assume that beings out there, wherever and whatever they are, would be too much concerned to recognize that if they can send space ships to the rest of the universe, somebody in that universe would some day be sending ships in their direction. We are, we can be sure, the only people in the universe who hesitate to concede to others the accomplishments we claim for ourselves.

It is going to take a 15 month study by the scientific experts at this great university. But it is at least good to know that, slow and uncertain though we are, we are going to get the truth at last. This is a much more wonderful and exciting universe than we earthlings have yet realized.

North School Timetable
 To the Editor,
 The need for a new school in the South School district was first discussed four years ago by the Board of Education and a serious preparation for the planning of the school began two years ago. This was one full year before the Hartford Board of Education approved the plan. There is no relationship in these facts. The present of a new school in the South School area is due to the continuing growth in population in the area. At present many students in this area are being bused to nearby schools in town and South School is overcrowded. This solution of sending children to other schools is expensive. When the test is given on a Saturday, the school may charge an additional fee up to \$1 for special administrative costs of testing on a non-school day. If a student is unable to play the testing fee, it will be paid by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) at the request of the school.

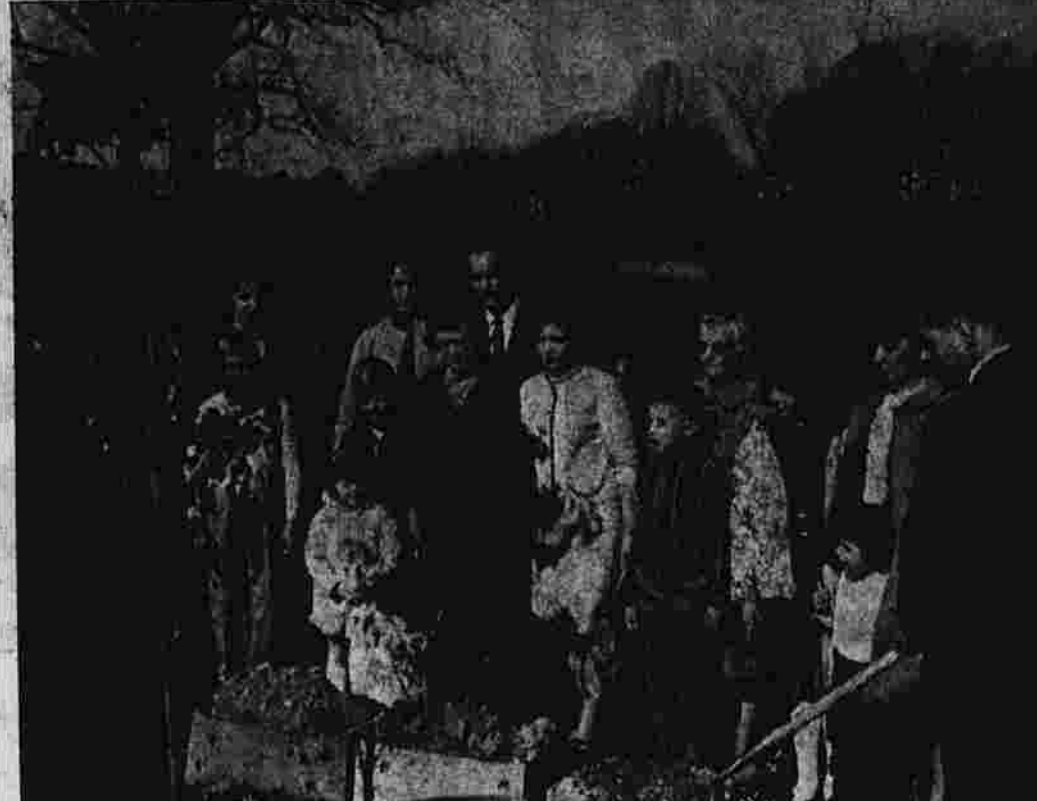

Subsidization Proposed For Auto Junk Handling

Federal subsidies for persons who deal with junk cars was one of the suggestions made at a meeting of officials who discussed the problem of junked autos in Connecticut. The idea was put forth by a Hartford city official. Glennon R. Mayo, director of the Department of License and Inspection for Hartford, said the problem of junked and abandoned motor vehicles in the area is extremely acute. He spoke to about 100 members of the Connecticut Federation of Planning and Zoning Agencies at its annual fall meeting held at Will's Steak House last night.

Dr. John B. Burlew, director of the Connecticut Research Commission, another of the three panel members who spoke to the federation, said that junk yards should be cultivated and not eliminated. In many towns, zoning agencies refuse to create zones for abandoned car graveyards and the car hulks and empty lots, he said. The third panel member, Joseph M. Dearborn, planning director of Bridgeport, said it costs about 400 cars a day are junked and abandoned in Connecticut. On the national scale, about 7 million cars become junk yearly, and 4 million new ones are put on the road. Dearborn said the problem comes also with built-in obsolescence. He said a car is made to last for about five years.

Two Years of Free College Not Far Off, Says Dr. Lowe

Dr. Frederick W. Lowe Jr., president of Manchester Community College, today predicted that the time is not far off when all American youth will be getting two years of free college education. 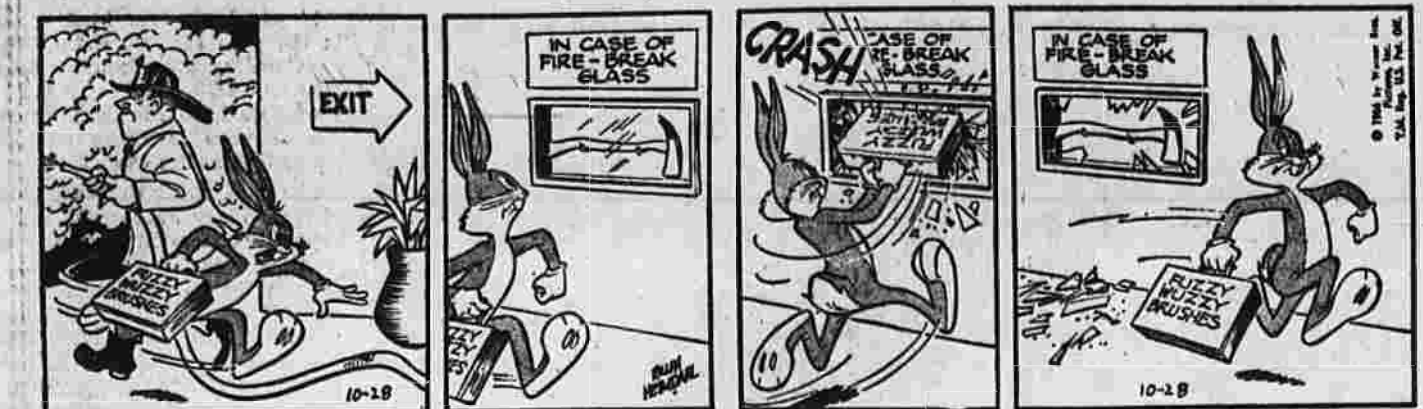

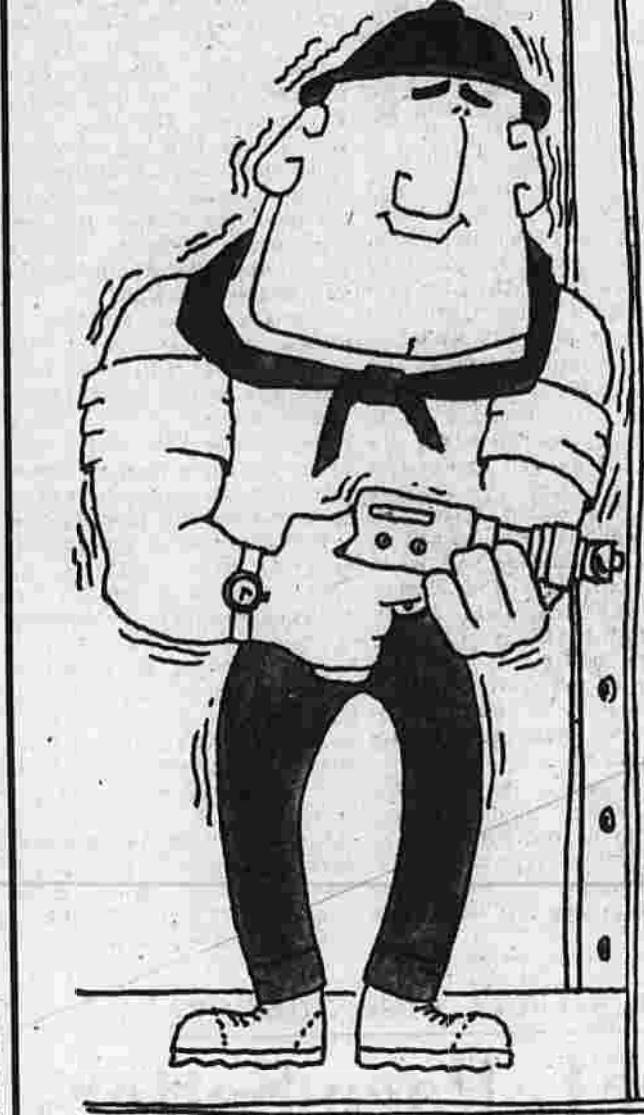

Earthquake Hits Greece, Toll Unsure. AGRINION, Greece (AP)—A rattling earthquake rolled through central Greece at dawn today, killing one person and seriously injuring 11 others. Police expected the casualty toll to rise. They were unable to communicate with several towns and villages because of landslides. In Uppsala, Sweden, seismologist Markus Baath said the quake was recorded at 5.8 on the Richter scale of 9.

New Indication Pope May Travel To Viet Later. VATICAN CITY (AP)—Recent trips to Saigon by papal aides fanned speculation today that Pope Paul VI may yet travel to Viet Nam to press his case for peace. Vatican observers said, however, that such a trip was not expected to materialize until next spring — then only if the circumstances were right. One key circumstance, they added, would be if the talks were imminent or already started, giving the pontiff an opportunity to speak to all Vietnamese groups. Pope Paul consistently has referred to the Vietnamese people as a whole without distinction.

New Threat Of Marches In Chicago

CHICAGO (AP)—The threat of more open housing marches has developed after the release of a confidential Chicago report scolding Chicago leaders for "foot-dragging" in implementing an open-housing agreement. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. said Friday, "If the agreement is not being implemented, we will have no alternative but to resume demonstrations. It we resume demonstrations, Cleere would have to be one of the communities where we would march." King, however, said he had not had a chance to review the report circulated among members of the Chicago Freedom Movement, a federation of local civil rights groups. "I haven't concluded that there is foot-dragging," said King. The open housing agreement was reached Aug. 21 by King, other civil rights leaders and housing leaders. The agreement called for an end to alleged housing discrimination against Negroes. King called a moratorium on marches after the agreement was reached, but the Congress of Racial Equality led a demonstration in Chicago, Sept. 4. Violence during the demonstration was quelled by 2,700 National Guardsmen and police. The confidential report, revealed to the Associated Press, accused four governmental agencies of failing to live up to the open housing agreement. A Freedom Movement source named King of political backstabbing and organizational problems along with "administrative incompetence." The alleged "foot-dragging" was criticized by James W. Cook, president of the Illinois Bell Telephone Co., who heads the open housing agreement, has said the task is not easy. "It cannot be done overnight," Cook said. He said his group was not an "enforcement agency," but a "forum where interested persons can meet and discuss problems."

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Coming in waves through jungle and elephant grass, North Vietnamese army regulars pounced on untried troops of the U.S. 4th Infantry Division today and reports indicated the enemy attacks bloodied the Americans badly in their first taste of combat. The attacks, near the Cambodian border 200 miles north of Saigon, were the first reported in weeks in which North Vietnamese regulars were engaged. The last attacks by North Vietnamese came about three weeks ago against U.S. Marines south of the demilitarized zone. In the Viet Nam, North Vietnamese guns downed three U.S. helicopters, one of them a medical evacuation craft that had just picked up American wounded. The troops of the 4th Division came to Viet Nam in August and September from Ft. Lewis, Wash. The division has one brigade based at the ammunition dump near Saigon and another at a Viet Cong attack Friday night with grenades, automatic weapons and mortar attacks. One mortar round hit an ammunition storage pad, a U.S. spokesman said. The mortar attacks of the 4th Division set up a base camp near Pleiku in the central highlands. The North Vietnamese launched five attacks against these division units in the highlands Friday night and Sunday. A U.S. spokesman said that the infantrymen's casualties are moderate, indicating they were hit severely. Allied officials do not specify their own battle casualties in numbers for reasons of security. Three companies — or about 600 men — of the 4th were hit in a mortar attack on Sept. 8 to 10 miles west and northwest of Plei Djereng Special Forces camp.
