South Korean Welcome Greatest of LBJ Tour

President Leaves Car For 'Mixing'

SEOUL, South Korea (AP)—Crowds estimated to number two million turned out to welcome President Johnson today in the biggest, wildest reception of his Far East tour. Throngs broke down metal fences, swarmed around police, and clung to rooftops for a glimpse of the man hailed in a typical banner as the "Great Texas Giant."

The outpouring obviously pleased him and at a state dinner tonight Johnson promised the United States would come again to the defense of South Korea "if aggression—God forbid—should occur once more."

This nation—born by war with the Communists 16 years ago—is the President's last stop on his seven-nation tour around the eastern rim of Communist China. The crowd in Seoul was the friendliest of the trip.

There wasn't a sign of the kind of anti-U.S. sentiment that marred otherwise warm and at times boisterous welcomes in other nations on the tour.

The President responded by popping out of his car half a dozen times to mix with the confetti and flag-waving throng. Once he climbed down a roadside embankment to a muddy rice paddy to inspect newly harvested rice. An aide used rice stalks to wipe the soggy gray dirt from Johnson's shoes.

Facing massed crowds estimated by police at 200,000 in City Hall Square, the President voiced concern for the safety of those who pushed, shoved and trampled each other in an effort to get a better view. He urged courtesy and caution "so we don't hurt anyone."

Children caught in the crush were escorted weeping to the sidelines.

Harking back to the Korean War in which 84,246 Americans died, Johnson said he was standing on "hallowed ground."

"I have come to express our gratitude for the brave and generous help you are giving to our common ally, Viet Nam—both on the battlefield and in rebuilding the countryside. This is the act of a nation that understands

In Waterbury 'Crushing' Crowd Greets Kennedy

WATERBURY (AP)—There had considered the Waterbury was elation in the Connecticut Democratic camp today after a gathering estimated as high as 50,000 persons—Sen. Robert F. Kennedy that drew crushing crowds here and in New Haven.

The New York Democrat arrived on a New England swing an hour behind schedule at Tweed-New Haven Airport Sunday night, then went to a rally at a New Haven hotel and spoke from a hotel balcony to a large crowd in Waterbury.

Everywhere the Kennedy popularity was in evidence as he moved through cheering, shouting enthusiasts who reached out for a handshake or just to touch him.

As he entered a jammed hotel lobby in Waterbury, the crowd pressed in and at least one woman tried to grab a hank of his hair for a souvenir.

"I'm delighted I got into the hotel alive," Kennedy remarked as he began his speech.

Kennedy made his talk from the same balcony where his late brother, President John F. Kennedy, drew a huge crowd in the 1960 presidential campaign.

"John Kennedy had a love affair with Waterbury and the people of Waterbury," Senator Kennedy said.

Gengras, during a televised debate broadcast by WTRF-TV, asked his election opponent whether he would have accepted Attilio Frassinelli as nominee for lieutenant governor "if you'd known he hadn't paid his property taxes for five and a half years."

Dempsey did not respond, though Gengras put the query twice.

Frassinelli, currently the commissioner of consumer protection in Dempsey's administration, paid his taxes in Stafford

3 Americans Flee Brazil Political Plot

RICHARDSON, Tex. (AP)—An ex-Marine says he flew to a remote mountain airport and posed as a cattle buyer to pluck three imprisoned Americans from the Brazilian jungles.

Alan A. Hulsey said the code signal for the Americans to elude their guard and race to his rented plane was the phrase: "Going to Rio."

Hulsey's account, contained in a copyrighted story in today's Dallas Morning News, was the latest disclosure in a tale of intrigue involving the "007" diamond and a South American general's aborted play for political power.

Freed and brought back to their homes after nine months of detention in Brazil were Joseph A. Truhill, 47, of the Dallas suburb of Richardson; Joseph McCutcheon, 36, and Sam Sexton Jr., 41, both of Fort Smith, Ark.

Truhill said Sunday at his home that all three were convicted of smuggling charges in Brazil trumped up by Gen. Rio Grandino Krusel, former chief of Brazil's federal security police.

Hulsey, 41, owner of a Dallas greeting card company, said he and Truhill were friends. He

State Camp Believed Target

Arsenal Seized, 20 Held In Right-Wing Bomb Plot

NEW YORK (AP)—Police say they have arrested 20 members of the super-secret, right-wing Minutemen organization, seizing tons of ammunition and weapons and breaking up what they called a plot to blow up three private camps in New York State, New Jersey and Connecticut.

In lightning pre-dawn raids Sunday in Queens, Westchester County, on Long Island, and at Syracuse, more than a hundred state, county and local police went into action. They said they confiscated arsenals that included mortars, bazookas, ma-

chine guns, semiautomatic rifles, homemade bombs, machetes, crossbows, garroting nooses, and a million rounds of ammunition.

The raids were announced by Queens Dist. Atty. Nat H. Hentel. He would not disclose the identity of the target camps, but added that the Minutemen group is dedicated to destroying "Communist, left-wing and liberal" installations of any kind.

Hentel said the camps were slated for destruction Sunday, a few days after the start of the hunting season.

Six of the men, all dressed in hunting garb, were seized in a Queens diner. Officers said guns, ammunition and bombs were found in the car of one of them. Another man was arrested in his Katonah, Westchester County home.

Hentel charged the men with

conspiracy to commit arson and most received additional charges of violation of the anti-weapons law and unlawful assembly.

During an investigation which began last January, police said they learned the following about the minutemen:

That they tried to infiltrate the Army Reserve's 11th Special Forces—the "Green Berets"—at Miller Field, Staten Island, to learn guerrilla tactics.

That members of the group distributed racist literature in Queens, purporting to be from Negro extremists and urging Negroes to "kill white devils."

That field maneuvers were held in Suffolk County and in the vicinity of Ellenville.

Sharp Increase Noted In Cong Desertions

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Vietnamese officials today announced a sharp rise in Viet Cong desertions to the South Vietnamese side. They reported 2,062 defectors from the Communist cause in October, the third highest month this year.

The announcement came on the eve of South Viet Nam's National Day which will be celebrated with a big parade that will include 800 former Viet Cong in the line of march.

The war itself lapsed back into a lull after sharp weekend clashes. Only small ground actions were reported and monsoon rains again reduced U.S. air raids over North Viet Nam.

Viet Cong guerrillas shot down a U.S. C-123 cargo plane today in the dense jungles of the "iron triangle" 23 miles northwest of Saigon. The plane's three-man crew was rescued unhurt by Air Force helicopters.

B-52 bombers from Guam made two raids Sunday night over South Viet Nam.

One wave of the bombers struck for the second straight day in the central highlands near the Cambodian border. The bombers hit at suspected base camps and staging areas of the North Vietnamese regulars who launched five assaults Saturday against units of the U.S. 4th Infantry Division and then vanished in the elephant grass and jungle growth.

The raid was in support of Operation Paul Revere 4, taking place 46 miles southwest of Kontum City.

The other B-52s raided Communist troop concentrations 20 miles west of Quang Ngai City near the central coast.

In Hanoi, President Ho Chi

Minh repeated that North Viet Nam will continue to fight until its peace terms are met. Hanoi's official news agency said Ho reiterated his stand in a reported interview for a French publication.

In Saigon, South Viet Nam's military rulers headed by Premier Nguyen Cao Ky formally opened Independence Palace as the nation's seat of government.

Ky and his staff will have offices on one floor of the palace, which is situated in a 20-acre park in the heart of the capital.

Chief of state Nguyen Van Thieu will occupy another floor and the third will house government

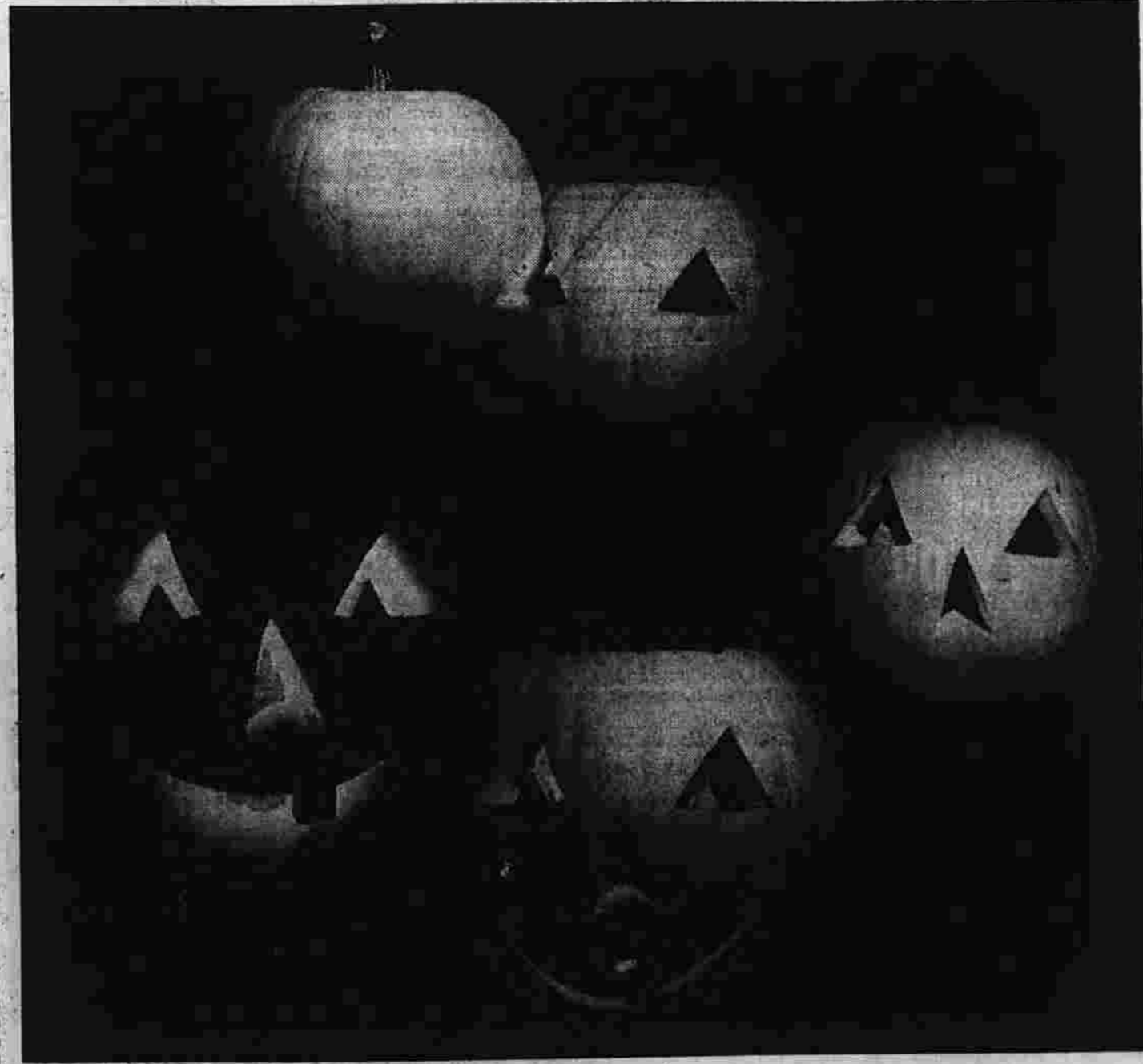
Trooper Hurt; Cruiser Forced Off Route I-84

Chinese Test Cited

India Urges UN Ban On N-Weapon Spread

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—India reacted today to Communist China's test of a nuclear weapon with a declaration that all countries, nuclear and non-nuclear alike, must adhere to a treaty to ban the spread of nuclear weapons.

In a speech before the General Assembly's 121-nation main political committee, Indian delegate V. C. Trivedi referred to Peking's test of "an intermediate range guided missile with a nuclear weapon."

He said the test was an example of how the nuclear powers themselves were proliferating nuclear weapons and added:

"When we talk of the dangers of the arms race, therefore, we face the dangers of the most titanic proportions. It is here that proliferation of nuclear weapons has its most catastrophic consequences."

The only way to deal with the situation, he said, is to place in any treaty "an acceptable balance of mutual responsibilities and obligations of nuclear and nonnuclear weapons powers."

He asserted that a treaty to ban further spread of nuclear weapons "is not an end to itself, but a means to an end, namely, the achievement of general and complete disarmament, and more particularly, nuclear disarmament."

He said his country believes measures to prohibit the spread

of nuclear weapons "should be coupled with, or followed by, tangible steps to halt the nuclear arms race and to limit, reduce and eliminate the stocks of nuclear weapons and means of their delivery."

GH Puyat, a Philippine delegate, referred to the Peking test as "the gravest setback" to efforts to reach agreement to a treaty.

"It was an arrogant rebut to our appeal to all states to refrain from any action which

Brown, Reagan Condemn Speech By Carmichael

BIRMINGHAM, Calif. (AP)—Both Gov. Edmund G. Brown and his Republican opponent, Ronald Reagan, have denounced Sen. Barry Goldwater's "to hell with the draft" speech at the University of California.

The Democratic governor said Sunday the speech by Carmichael, a principal "black power" advocate, was part of a plot by ultraright elements to split him in the coming state elections by fostering "white backlash."

Reagan said on the CBS "Face the Nation" television program that Carmichael's speech "demonstrated the need for government to turn to more responsible elements in the Negro community for leadership."

Carmichael, 26, leader of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee said at the Berkeley campus "black power" rally Sunday: "The only way to stop the war in Viet Nam is for young Americans to 'say to hell with the draft.'"
