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Many Names Add Lustre For '68 Race

Republicans cut almost off the heavy Democratic majorities in Congress today, posing a question mark over the future of President Johnson's "Great Society" programs.

They also rocked up spectacular individual victories across the nation, including a smashing gubernatorial triumph for ex-Gov. Ronald Reagan in California.

All told, they had scored a net gain of seven in governorships, making the lineup 24 to 24, with two races unsettled.

Returns from Tuesday's election showed that the GOP studied with portents for the GOP presidential convention in 1968.

While Reagan was inundating Democratic Gov. Edmund G. Brown in the Golden Gate State, a new GOP star was rising in Illinois, a moderate who unseated Democratic Sen. Paul Douglas, old warhorse of liberalism.

The name of Gov. George Romney of Michigan became increasingly a name to conjure with in GOP presidential speculation.

He won a third term in a breeze, flying coastals apparently made of sturdy broad cloth.

Abroad that vehicle, Republican Sen. Robert P. Griffin and much of the party's state state swept in also.

As for Congress, where the Democrats had ruled 386 to 140 in the House and 67 to 32 in the Senate, the count today was: Democrats elected 344 and Republicans 152.

Thus the Republicans went somewhat better the average (See Page Sixteen)

Gemini 12 Shot Off 24 Hours

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The National Aeronautics and Space Administration announced that there was no change to correct the problem in time to hold to Thursday's launch schedule.

There was no immediate reaction on the delay from the astronauts, Navy Capt. James Lovell Jr. and Air Force Maj. Edwin E. Aldrin Jr.

The space agency rescheduled Gemini 12 for Friday afternoon. An Atlas is to boost an Agena target satellite on Oct. 21 at 2:15 p.m. EST, with the Titan 2 to take off at 3:55 p.m.

Another autopilot had given trouble Tuesday and forced a 24-hour postponement. It was replaced, and the new package was being checked out today when blockhouse crews noted that one of its three gyroscopes apparently was not spinning properly.

The trouble was traced to an electric device designed to detect the spin rate of the gyro. It was not certain immediately of being operated on the package or its ground support equipment that receives information from the detection column.

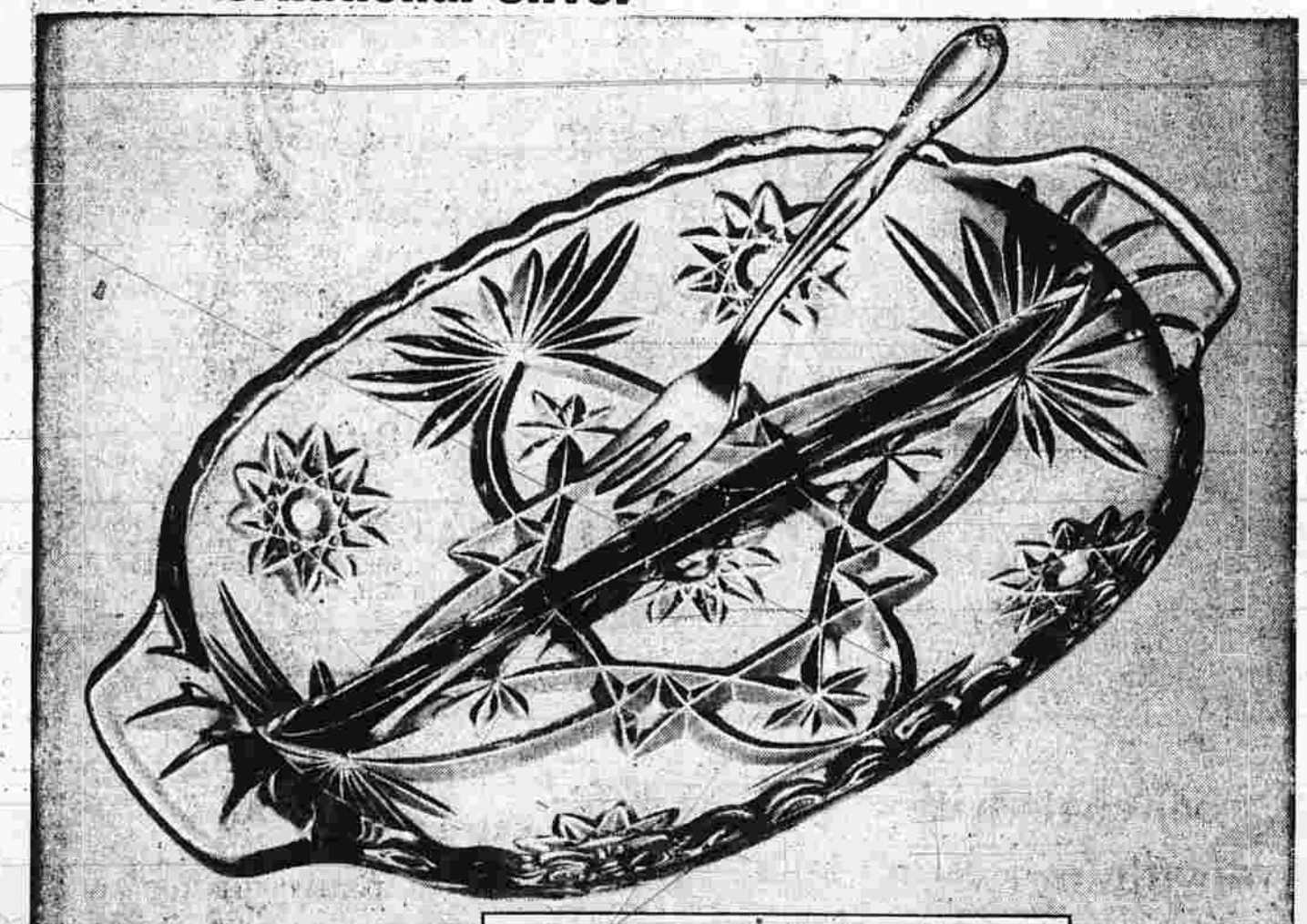

Accident Victim Vows To Have Normal Life

BOSTON (AP) — New England Vignettes: Joan Pellegrini is a slender, 24-year-old honey blonde who vows she'll be back on her feet soon, out of the hospital and doing all the things she did before her accident.

Walling, almost everything. "You know," she said, "one thing that hit me most was the realization I wouldn't be able to go swimming with artificial legs. But I guess I can go to the beach in slacks."

Joan transferred from City Hospital in her native Quincy, Mass., to Lament Shattuck Hospital in Boston two weeks ago to start extensive rehabilitation exercises and be fitted for artificial limbs, which Joan says she has had in Maine that election district.

Does Santa Claus Foot Tab For Those Trading Stamps?

NEW YORK (AP) — For every entry he passes out to customers in a certain sales contest, the owners of a gasoline station pays two cents to his supplier.

It costs the grocer about two cents on each \$1 of sales to supply you with trading stamps. Put another way, the grocer pays \$2.40 for the stamps needed to fill a certain stamp book.

Is it possible, then, that these costs won't, in turn, be added to your bill? The trading stamp companies and those who use them say these gifts are really free, and that they add nothing to your bill.

Who pays them? Is there really a Santa Claus in all this? The usual answer is that, yes, there is a Santa Claus. It is voluntary expense and, presumably, promotional scheme, so the theory goes, provide so much added volume to a store that they pay for themselves.

The needed increase might be about 15 or 20 per cent, depending on the savings or the supply of stamps that keeps people saving, pasting, clipping, redeeming.

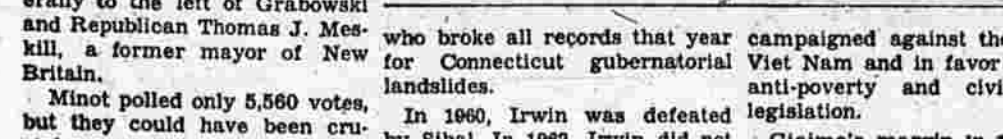
Meskill Surprise Winner In 6th District Contest

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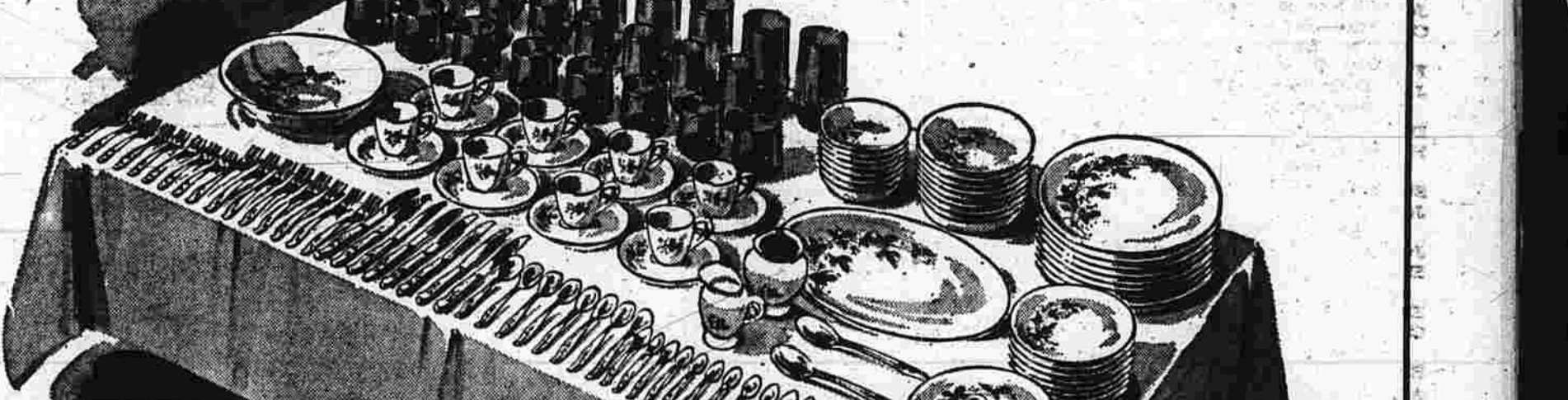

Hebron Hometown Gives Vote To Fellows

Despite his defeat in the 52nd Assembly District race, Republican Douglas M. Fellows of Hebron received a 199-vote plurality over State Representative-elect William O'Neill of East Hampton in balloting here yesterday.

Fellows carried Hebron 555-398 and also received pluralities in Columbia and Marlborough. However, he trailed far behind O'Neill in the latter's home town of East Hampton.

A total of 1,288 of Hebron's registered voters, about 75 per cent, cast ballots yesterday.

In the other state races, Hebron voted as follows:

Governor — E. Clayton Genegans and John L. Gerardo, 509; and John N. Dempsey and Attilio R. Frassinelli, 480; secretary of state — Ella T. Grasso, Democrat, 518; and Republican Phyllis A. Shulman, 473; treasurer, Republican James Tyler Patterson Jr., 520; and Democrat Gerald A. Lamb, 470; comptroller, Republican Thomas C. Mayers, 467; and Democrat Louis I. Gladstone, 475; attorney general, Republican William D. Graham, 503; and Harvey M. Mulvey, Democrat, 473.

In the 2nd Congressional District contest, William L. St. Dupre, Democrat, received 498 votes to Republican Joseph H. Goldberg's 452. Daniel R. Tarasewich, the Veterans Party challenger, received 426.

In the race for Tolland County Sheriff, Republican Paul Sweeney polled 619 while Nicholas Paynik, the Democratic challenger, received 426.

In the 35th Senatorial District, Republican Andrew Repko received 48 votes and Charles S. Warren, Democrat, received 480.

Hebron's fight of probate election was not contested. Clifford R. Wright was endorsed by both parties and polled a total vote of 872.

Both incumbent registrars of voters were re-elected. Aaron Field, Democrat, polled 430 votes and Republican Emery N. Taylor received 348.

Justices of the peace elected are: Democrat Ralph E. Boyington, Russell Anderson, Joseph Fili, Joseph Kearns, G. Earl Porter, and Democrat Robert Blaisell and Wayne Miller; Republicans — Walms Taylor, Marion Fooks, John Hooker, Robert Caffazzo, Harry Kirkham, Harvey Desruisseaux and Charles Barnes; and Democrat Robert A. Woodard.

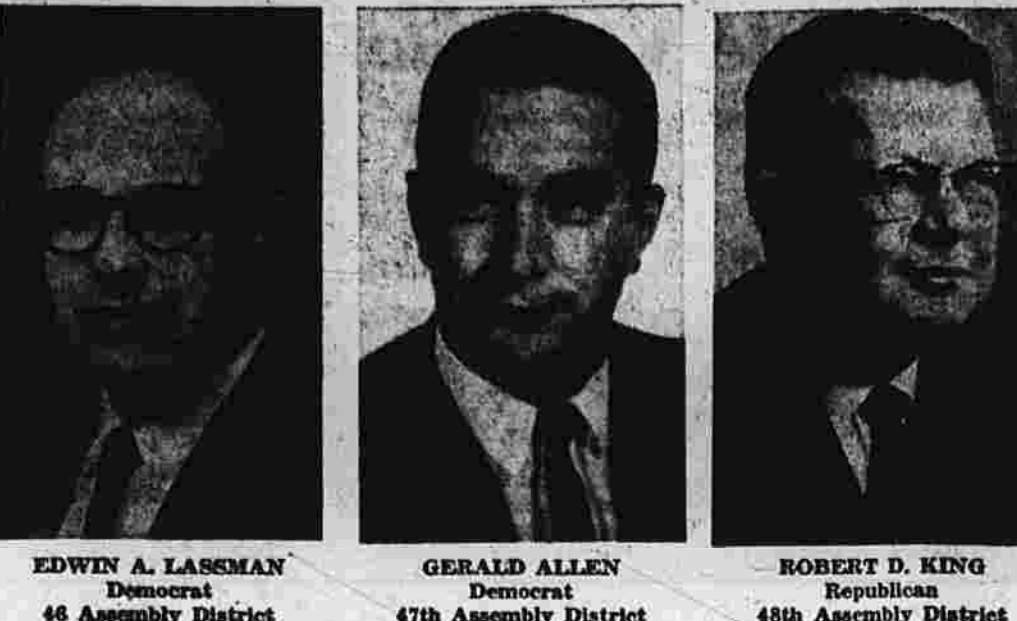

Democrats Retain Three Seats, GOP Pared, in Area Districts

In races for seats in the newly redistricted General Assembly yesterday Democrats in area towns numerically held their own and Republicans lost their strong foothold.

The 13 towns in the five districts — 51, 52, 46, 47 and 48 — until reappointment were represented by 20 legislators. In the last session of the General Assembly 17 of them were Republican and 3 were Democrats.

There will still be three Democrats from the five districts this session, but because of reapportionment, only two longer, polled 3 votes.

The 46th District of South Windsor and East Windsor, formerly represented by three Republicans and one Democrat, is now represented by a single Democrat, Edwin A. Lasmann of South Windsor, who defeated former Republican legislator G. Warren Westbrook of South Windsor, 3,819 to 3,786.

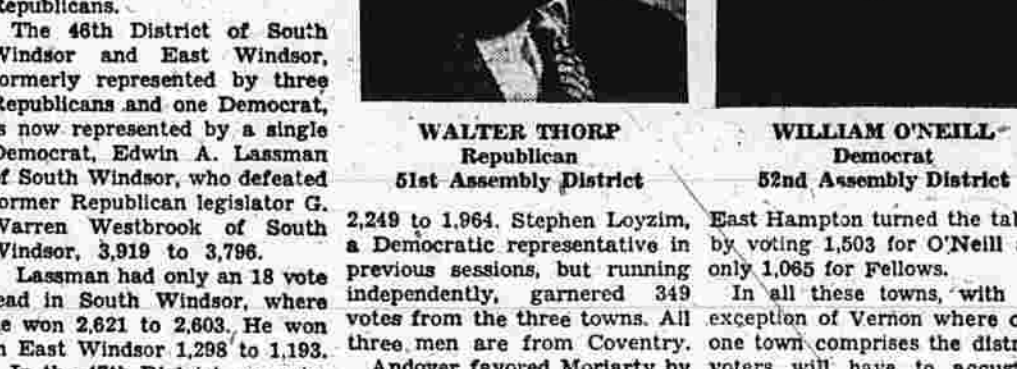
Lasmann had only an 18 vote lead in South Windsor, where he won 2,621 to 2,603. He won in East Windsor 1,298 to 1,183.

In the 47th District, comprising Vernon only, the two former seats, both held by Democrats, were reduced to one and won by Gerald Allen, a Democrat, over Republican John Grant in a close vote — 3,821 to 3,712.

The three towns in the 48th District, Tolland, Ellington and Somers, formerly represented by two Republicans and one Democrat, are now represented by one, Robert D. King, who won over Democrat John Burrows 3,360 to 2,959. Both men are from Tolland, where the vote was very close, 1,100 to 1,042.

In Ellington King won 1,244 to 1,093 and in Somers, 1,016 to 824.

The three towns in the 51st District, Andover, Bolton and Coventry, were represented by four Republicans in the last legislature. They now have one Republican, former representative Walter Thorp, who defeated Democrat Robert Moriarty

2,249 to 1,964. Stephen Lozmin, a Democratic representative in previous sessions, but running independently, garnered 349 votes from the three towns. All three men are from Coventry.

Andover favored Moriarty by four votes, giving him 367 votes to Thorp's 363. Lozmin received 12. Bolton gave Thorp 729, Moriarty 498 and Lozmin 29.

Coventry gave Thorp 1,157, Moriarty 1,099 and Lozmin 308.

The 52nd District, comprising Columbia, Hebron, Marlborough and East Hampton, changed its stripes completely, due to the vote by the largest town of East Hampton, which went Democratic. The other three towns went Republican, but Democrat William O'Neill of East Hampton carried the district, beating former Republican representative Douglas Fellows of Hebron 5,682 to 2,745.

The four towns were represented in the last session by five Republicans. They are now represented by one Democrat, Albert S. Williams of Hebron.

Columbia went for Fellows 630 to 506 for O'Neill. Hebron went for Fellows 585 to 396. Marlborough went for Moriarty 160 to 170 degrees.

South Windsor Democrats Score With Slim Margin

South Windsor voted Democratic in yesterday's election but returns show a slim lead despite a plurality of 873 registrations over the Republicans.

The referendum question included on the ballot for the new town hall was approved by a vote of 2,115 to 1,525.

In the congressional race, Democratic incumbent Congressman Emilio G. Paddaro received 2,736 votes as opposed to GOP candidate John Bonee who received 2,479.

Edwin A. Lasmann, Democrat, defeated the incumbent G. Warren Westbrook for the office of state representative by 18 votes in South Windsor. Lasmann received 2,621 votes to Westbrook's 2,603. The East and Windsor figures are 1,298, Lasmann and 1,183 for Westbrook.

The approval of the referendum question for a new town hall paves the way for the construction of a \$700,000 building to replace the present town hall on Main St.

The new structure will be located in the Wapping Center area between Sullivan Ave. and Ellington Rd., adjacent to the Wapping Community Church.

Of contemporary design, the building will house town official offices and will include council chambers as well as a police department.

Royal Genegans, GOP town committee chairman, said in commenting on the election returns that the town result, "I think this election is a tribute to the fine corps of Republican workers."

He added, "Though we are disappointed the incumbent Republican candidate G. Warren Westbrook, state representative, was not returned to office, I view the results of the election with definite optimism in that despite an overwhelming lead in registration of some 573 voters, the Republican party produced a plurality vote for the GOP gubernatorial candidate."

 verbal arms, two reassuring assurances
 that the Secretary of Defense is a hu-
 man being, after all.

First, there was the obvious pride he
 displayed when he boasted that he him-
 self had once attended the California
 university which now stands as the last
 word in radical rowdiness. Oh, what a
 radical he must have been!

Second, there need be little doubt
 that he was throwing all the computers
 in the world right out of the window
 when he told his hecklers "I'm still
 tougher than you are." That was not a
 pronouncement of calculus married to
 electronics, but an emanation of an ap-
 parently intense visceral disturbance.
 Even more reassuringly, he was "shout-
 ing" into the teeth of some 200 riotous
 undergraduates, who were shouting
 in Connecticut rowdiness, and it makes
 obvious cheerful sense for the welfare
 of the state itself to wish him well
 in his new term.

The reservation this newspaper made
 during the campaign itself were not,
 however, taken so lightly they can be
 forgotten. We do not congratulate the
 state upon the election of every mem-
 ber of the Democratic state ticket,
 however, any more than we congratu-
 late the state upon the prospect of four
 more years of control of the political
 machine by the Democratic state political
 machine.

The adoption of the constitutional
 amendment providing for the election
 of one unit of the party nominations
 for Governor and Lieutenant Govern-
 or should have been this time, and should
 be in the future, a special mandate for
 special care in selecting the lesser half
 of the nomination.

A critical look at the way the state
 has been doing its election business has
 long overdue. An election result in
 the Democratic state machine can be
 interpreted as an endorsement of itself
 and its past operations, and which guar-
 anty against any challenging opposition
 in the new legislature, is obviously
 a result which postpones the day
 for any serious evaluations of the per-
 formance and manipulations of state
 departments.

 were not happy.

In Manchester, the new system of

 trict had the curious effect of produc-
 ing the defeat of the two Democratic
 candidates who had most experience
 and future in the House at Hartford.

There is every reason for tribute to
 the energetic campaigning of the two
 successful Republican nominees for the
 Assembly, Donald Genovese and Robert
 Stavitsky. But why, if the political re-
 stricting rates were to decree that
 Manchester elect one Democrat to be
 their colleague, could it not have been
 either Paul Groobert or Steve Cavan-
 gnan?

There were no clouds of any kind,
 however, on the way Senator David
 Barry ran in Manchester. He showed
 obvious personal appeal, and he has
 previously demonstrated ability in town
 and legislative office.

Finally, it was good news for every-
 body that the voters of Manchester re-
 sisted the apparent temptation of
 backslash instinct, and voted the new
 South End school bond issue by a de-
 cise margin.

New Gas Gauge

Much has been written about the
 lowly American automobile and how
 it can be made a safer machine. Much

But what attention has been given to
 that little needle in the dashboard
 known as the gas gauge?

Evidently not enough, judging by the

But, just having the driver keep an
 eye on his gas gauge isn't enough;
 now car thieves are looking too, and
 with good reason.

Somewhere, with all the streamlining
 of dashboards and the padding of same,
 the gas gauge got changed on a lot of
 "stealers" cars. Now, the gauge read-
 ing "freezes" at the exact reading it
 gave you while you were driving along,
 after you park your car and take the
 key from the ignition switch.

 unattended lot. And person bent on ob-
 taining free transportation just "for
 kicks" or perhaps to pull a robbery.

All this person has to do is peek in
 through locked windows at gas gauges,
 choose one that's nearly full so he
 won't have to risk stopping at a serv-
 ice station right away, and he's in busi-
 ness. In business, that is, if he has mas-
 tered the subtle art of forcing en-
 trance to a locked car with little or no
 physical evidence of the act, and knows
 how to jump ignition wiring to start
 the engine.

Thus the question: What happened to
 the old fashioned gas gauge which sim-
 ply sank slowly back to "empty" when
 the motor was shut off? Perhaps it
 wasn't such a bad "old gauge" after
 all. — NEW HAVEN REGISTER

'Little Guy' Confused; Votes Over, So What?

 WASHINGTON (AP) — The
 little guy felt like a dope today.
 He was all steamed up about
 the elections — the shouting,
 the speeches, the parades, the
 diva predictions, and all those
 characters on television.

Then what happened? Not
 much, well, maybe, it did mean
 something. The Republicans
 made some progress. They
 picked up some seats in Con-
 gress and some governorships.

The irony of this was that they
 didn't last much longer as a
 party. And when the returns
 were in, all that business about
 white backlash, inflation and
 the war in Viet Nam hadn't
 seemed to mean much.

The Democrats went into the
 election in control of Congress
 with a majority in House and
 Senate. When it was over, they
 still had control.

The Republicans just cut
 down the majority a bit. In an
 off-year congressional election
 like this one it's just par for the
 course for the minority party to
 pick up some seats.

The little guy didn't have to
 be a professor to remember the
 Republicans have been a minor-
 ity party, and the Democrats
 have been running Congress,
 ever since 1952, with two excep-
 tions.

There was a time, back in the
 1920s, when Republicans and
 Democrats looked pretty much
 like twins. They were both con-
 servative, and when Franklin
 D. Roosevelt ran for the presi-
 dency in 1932, in the depres-
 sion, he was even talking about
 "cutting down government
 spending."

What puzzled the little guy
 was why, in all of Roosevelt's
 years, the Republicans didn't
 learn anything from him.

The little guy didn't even
 think the Republicans learned
 anything from Dwight D. Eisen-
 hower, the only Republican to
 win the presidency since 1932.

He not only embraced the
 New Deal programs but he put
 an end to the party's isolationism.

They gave Eisenhower a Re-
 publican-run Congress in 1952
 but snatched it away from him
 in 1954 — an off-year election —
 and while they were re-electing
 Eisenhower overwhelmingly in
 1956, they put Congress in the
 hands of the Democrats.

Robert Stavitsky, successful
 candidates for the State
 Legislature, credited much of
 his success to the Republican
 pick of his presidential candi-
 date, the most conservative
 party leader in this century —
 Sen. Barry Goldwater. He got
 drowned in the election.

The little guy thought the
 country needs two parties but
 he wondered: How long can a
 guy, or a party, keep on getting
 clobbered and still breathe?

NEW YORK (AP)— The

Thefts of Autos, Burglaries Rise During October

The number of auto thefts in Manchester increased sharply in October, and an increase from September also was noted in burglaries and larcenies.

The monthly report by the Police Department shows that one auto theft in September, but six in October.

Thefts over the value of \$50 remained the same, with 12 each month. Nineteen burglaries resulting from forcible entry were recorded in September, while 22 occurred in October.

Unlawful entries without the use of force jumped from four in September to six in October. Larcenies under \$50 in value rose from 26 in September to 31 in October.

Arrests for these offenses decreased slightly, with eight in September and six in October. The number of persons arrested for other offenses, including drunkenness, disorderly conduct, violation of liquor laws and offenses against the family and children, was the same for the two months, 36.

An increase was recorded in arrests for violation of liquor laws, with two in September, and four in October. Arrests for drunkenness and disorderly conduct also showed a slight increase, with 18 in September and 24 last month.

Decreases were recorded in arrests for fraud, with 187 in September and 185 in October. Offenses against the family and children and driving while under the influence of intoxicants.

An average of more than three motor vehicle accidents a day took place in October. For the month, 118 car accidents were investigated by police, and 28 persons were injured as a result. Last year in October, 95 accidents were reported but the number of injuries was somewhat higher with 30 persons hurt.

The planters are valued at \$750 each. Trees and benches on the planters were provided by the Chamber. The town moved the planters to their present location, and the Manchester Garden Club planted ground cover for them.

Last year Allied Casting donated 12 planters for Main St., plus eight planters for the Parkside. Four of the trees in these planters have died and will be replaced with Kwansan cherry trees, according to Dr. Smith.

The Chamber will provide trees for the new planters. "We are very grateful to Allied Casting for their generous contribution of 22 tree planters to help beautify Manchester," Dr. Smith said. "This is a genuine indication of Allied Casting's interest in our community."

resentment against Negro violence — was a factor, results were mixed.

Republican Claude Kirk Jr., a Jacksonville investment banker, put Florida in Republican hands for the first time since 1872, after accusing his Democratic opponent, Mayor Robert King High of Miami, of favoring Negroes.

In California, Reagan apparently repaid tens of thousands of votes because of riots in San Francisco, Oakland and the Watts section of Los Angeles.

But moderates won in Arkansas and Maryland.

Winthrop Rockefeller took Arkansas for the GOP for the first time since 1872 by defeating Democrat Jim Johnson, a staunch segregationist.

Republican Spiro T. Agnew won a birthday victory in Maryland — he's 48 today — over Democrat George P. Mahoney, who alienated party liberals by campaigning with the slogan "Your home is your castle — protect it."

New York stayed in Republican hands when Nelson A. Rockefeller won a third term in a four-sided race.

In all, 35 governorships were up for grabs.

Twenty-one went to Republicans and 10 to Democrats.

In the other four races, Republicans were leading in two and Democrats in two.

Republican Howard H. (Bo) Callaway held an uncertain lead in the Georgia governor's race over Democrat segregationist Lester G. Maddox. A write-in campaign for moderate, John A. Armatrude, could throw the decision into the state legislature since Georgia law requires the winner to get a majority of the votes cast for election.

Besides Reagan, Romney, the Rockefeller brothers, Kirk and Agnew, Republican winners were:

- In Minnesota, Harold LeVander over Gov. Karl F. Rojava, seeking his second four-year term.
- In Arizona, Jack Williams, mayor of Phoenix, over Democrat George Samuel P. Goldard.
- In Colorado, Gov. John A. Love over Democrat L. G. Gov. Robert L. Knous.
- In Idaho, State Sen. Don Samuelson over Democrat State Sen. Cecil Andrus and two other candidates.
- In Massachusetts, Gov. John A. Volpe won re-election, defeating Democrat Edward J. McCormack, nephew of U.S. House Speaker John W. McCormack.
- In Nebraska, newcomer Norbert T. Tiemann over Democrat L. G. Gov. Philip C. Sorenson, brother of Theodore Sorenson, who was a top aide to President John F. Kennedy.
- In Nevada, Lt. Gov. Paul Laxalt, son of a Basque sheepherder, over incumbent Gov. Grant Sawyer, who was making an unprecedented third-term bid.
- In New Mexico, underdog David F. Cargo downed Democrat T. E. (Gene) Lusk.
- In Ohio, Gov. James A. Rhodes over young Democrat Frazier Reams Jr.
- In Oklahoma, Tulsa oilman Dewey Bartlett beat President Moore, former national commander of the American Legion.
- In Oregon, Tom McCall over Robert Straub, Democratic state treasurer.
- In Pennsylvania, Lt. Gov. Raymond P. Shafer over industrialist Milton J. Shapp, maverick Democrat.
- In Rhode Island, Gov. John H. Chafee won a third term by defeating Horace Hobbs.
- In South Dakota, Gov. Nils A. Bos won re-election over Robert Chamberlain.
- In Wisconsin, Gov. Warren P. Knowles won another term.

South Windsor Burke Easy Winner In Senatorial Race

Harry S. Burke, five-term member of the State House of Representatives, yesterday won the new Third Senatorial District seat in the upper house of the Legislature by a comfortable, 4,190-vote margin over his closest opponent.

Final, unofficial returns from East Hartford, South Windsor and East Windsor, the towns that comprise the district, gave the victorious Democrat 14,866 votes against 10,676 for Republican Paul E. Britt.

Low candidate in the race was Independent Joseph Paquette, who polled 140 votes. All three candidates live in East Hartford.

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Legislature's New Look Reflects Democratic Win

HARTFORD (AP)—The effects of reapportionment and the Democratic victory for the Legislature in the November election are reflected in the new look of the two-to-one majority in the House, formerly a Republican stronghold.

It was the first election in modern times that gave the Democrats solid control of both chambers.

There had been speculation that redistricting the Senate would give the Republicans a better chance in the upper chamber. But 20 Democrats were elected to 11 Republicans, giving the Democrats two more senators than before.

It had been generally conceded that a Democratic majority could be expected in the House, where for the first time Connecticut's cities and suburbs have representation in proportion to their population. But the actual Democratic showing exceeded many of the predictions — 118 seats to 68 for the GOP, an overwhelming majority of exactly two to one.

The old House of 224 members had 182 Republicans to 111 Democrats.

Rural areas lost representation by the dozens in the reapportionment, but were made up by a Constitutional Convention and approved by the voters at a referendum last year, while the urban areas gained, despite the loss of seats.

A special federal court, in accordance with the U.S. Supreme Court's one-man-one-vote ruling, since the general election, formally failed to act on reapportionment in 1964, the court nullified the legislative action that year. Tuesday's General Assembly election was the first since 1962.

The results of the election indicate the beginning of a new era in Connecticut government, presumably one in which urban problems will predominate and incumbents were re-elected. Small-town legislators will have incumbents were re-elected.

Light Ground Battles Reported in Viet Nam

SARCON, South Viet Nam in Tay Ninh Sept. 14. Most of the fighting was reported across Viet Nam today, but American infantry men turned up a rich body in Communist arms and supplies in Tay Ninh Province, the scene of almost a week of hard fighting near the Cambodian border.

U.S. 1st Division infantrymen Tuesday's battlefields uncovered a tunnel complex that had been part of a regimental command post. In it they found a "massive array" of supplies and equipment and 40 bodies, while nearby they uncovered a mine factory with 400 claymore-type mines.

In another tunnel complex the men of the "Big Red One" found eight submachine guns, 11 machine pistols, 2,000 hand grenades, 1,000 rifle grenades, and large quantities of ponchos, ammunition pouches and other equipment.

The U.S. military command said 200 enemy have been killed by ground fire and air strikes since Operation Attleboro began

Operation Attleboro, near the coast about 300 miles northeast of Saigon, the 1st Brigade of the 30th Airborne Division and, commander of American forces in Viet Nam, sent congratulations to the units taking part in the continuing operation.

As the ground action slackened, U.S. planes flew 132 multiple missions against North Viet Nam Tuesday and 451 single-plane sorties in the south, while the Vietnamese air force reported 243 sorties.

The American air attacks included four on targets in areas around Hanoi, Hanoi, Dien Bien Phu and North and South Viet Nam. One 1521 strike was reported today, North Viet Nam. Prospect Ave. Scene, Study in Contrasts

It seemed last night as if all state political activity was centered in the vicinity of Asylum and Prospect Avenues in Hartford and West Hartford—at the homes of two winners and one loser.

At the Governor's mansion, where Gov. John Dempsey welcomed a host of well-wishers, and on Asylum Ave. in Hartford, where First District Cong. Emilio Q. Daddario held open houses for a stream of visitors, everyone was sipping and munching and talking and laughing.

But at the Genras mansion on the West Hartford side of Prospect Ave., just two short blocks north of the Governor's Mansion, the house was quiet and almost empty, although people came and went offering their condolences.

In fact, that was the main difference between the Dempsey and Genras homes — people came and stayed at Governor's Mansion — they came and left fast at the Genras mansion.

"He was overheard saying to a friend, 'I wanted to win this one very badly.'"

Angola Rebel Activity Shows Sharp Increase

LEBON, Portugal (AP) — Rebel activity has sharply increased in Angola, Portugal's richest African territory, with a three-pronged attack on the land border. The calm, which set in after Portugal quashed the rebellion of 1964, has been broken by the sound of mortars on the Zambezi frontier, the chatter of machine guns in the northern enclave of Cabinda, and by more frequent ambushes in the unruly north.

Portugal, which exerts control over chunks of Africa 23 times the size of the mother country, has named a tough 46-year-old lieutenant colonel to take charge. Camilo R. Vas, who in 1961 commanded an infantry regiment of Portugal's 40,000 Angola troops, takes office as governor this month. He served five years in Viga, the kernel province of rebel resistance.

Vas will be directly responsible for the fortunes of Angola, an area that yields oil, diamonds, coffee, sugar, tobacco and cotton.

Vas's toughest military problem lies in the eastern part of Angola, a wedge of rolling hills of the Congo area and small brush jutting into Zambia. Defense Minister Gomes de Araujo announced last month that Portuguese troops and artillery were being sent to the border after the opening of "a third front."

"Rebel hunting is more difficult than in the north," an officer recently returned from the area explains. "They attack the population in small bands of about 50 and can retreat to a sanctuary in three directions."

Japanese Economy Booming
NEW YORK (AP) — Two decades ago, Japan was a defeated nation. Its industry was bankrupt, its spirit crushed, its people despairing of the future.

When they do speak of the subject, they express an almost embarrassing gratitude to the United States for aid, equipment and technology with which they have reconstructed their country.

Its steel mills, most of which have been built since the war, must import iron ore from Australia. Even fuel for the mills must be imported.

How can they do it? First, American technology has been used abundantly. But technology would be worthless if the raw materials couldn't be shipped to Japan.

To close that gap, the Japanese shipbuilding industry now makes ships of a size nobody dreamed possible a decade ago.

Tadayoshi Yamada, head of international trade of Yawata Steel Co., Japan's largest, says distance isn't a problem any more.

Yamada claims that by finding the highest grade iron ore — 65 to 70 per cent pure — and carrying it in ships with a capacity of 75,000 to 80,000 tons, the cost of transportation becomes almost minimal.

Manchester Gets New South School

By WILLIAM OBE

Manchester's long history of providing new schools when they are needed was upheld again at the polls yesterday. The referendum question on the Globe Hollow school passed by a substantial margin, 8,818 to 5,707 with every one of the town's seven voting districts solidly favoring the \$770,000 bond issue to build the school.

In fact, the referendum question, — the only one on the machines — ran percentage-wise considerably ahead of the voting in the gubernatorial race. The school received 80 per cent of the votes cast on the question, or 3 yes votes for every 2 opposed.

However, the 14,525 voters who considered the question totaled just about 4,000 less than the 18,510 who balloted for Gov. John Dempsey or E. Clayton Congress. In that contest, Dempsey took the town, but with only 53 per cent of the total vote — 7 per cent less than the school's victory margin.

The fact that 4,000 persons who voted for Governor and pulled the referendum levers, of course, leads one to the conclusion that many either forgot the school question or were indifferent toward it.

Local political observers came to the same kind of conclusion following the Oct. 3 town election when some 3,000 persons failed to cast ballots on the Downtown Renewal question, which lost by a slim margin.

Following the general election last month, second-guessers criticized proponents for not being on hand at polling places to remind townspeople to vote on the question.

Profiting by that experience, South School PTA members, who worked hard for the passage of "Globe Hollow" were stationed at the various voting districts yesterday passing out reminders.

The voting totals in each district, with yes votes first, were as follows:

District 1, Wadwell School, 1-202-060; District 2, Community Y, 1-434-956; District 3, Buckley School, 1-148-921; District 4, Highland Park School, 947-522; District 5, Nathan Hale School, 1-222-922; District 6, West Side Rec., 1-433-922; and District 7, Verplanck School, 1-237-924.

Since every district favored building the school by a comfortable margin, pre-election fears that "backlash" in the Hartford voting issue might defeat the referendum proved unfounded.

That there was some backlash, however, seems apparent by comparing the margin to the voting when the Robertson and Highland Park-Keeney St. Schools additions were approved a couple of years ago.

In November 1963 the electorate gave the nod to the

Highland Park-Keeney additions by about 2-1, and the following May approved a \$478,000 bond issue for Robertson by 3-1.

Gemini Gets Green Light

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — After two frustrating delays because of a faulty autopilot system in the astronaut's Titan 2 rocket, the Gemini 12 mission today received a green light to blast off Friday on the final flight in the Gemini series. Technicians checked and rechecked a new autopilot throughout the night and pronounced it in fine working order this morning. The National Aeronautics and Space Administration reported all launching preparations were progressing smoothly. Favorable weather was forecast for launch time. Meanwhile, Navy Capt. James A. Lovell Jr. and Air Force Maj. Edwin E. Aldrin Jr. continued to practice key phases of their four-day flight in a spacecraft simulator and to bone up on their complex flight plan. The doubleheader Gemini 12 launching is scheduled to start at 2:08 p.m. EST Friday when an Atlas rocket bursts an Agena target. Gemini 12 is to set sail at 3:46 p.m. Lovell and Aldrin were frustrated on two earlier launching dates — Wednesday and today — by troubles with the autopilot system which is needed to steer the Titan 2 on a true course during the vital six minutes the rocket operates. The problems were associated with a secondary system which would operate automatically if the primary autopilot failed. (See Page Twenty)

Scientists Go South To Observe Eclipse

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — Five planeloads of U.S. scientists are making final preparations for flights over the south Atlantic to observe a total eclipse of the sun Saturday. In a dress rehearsal Wednesday, three converted C-141 cargo jets took off from Buenos Aires and joined planes from Rio de Janeiro and Porto Alegre, Brazil, over the ocean. The plane will serve as flying laboratories Saturday. Scientists study the sun during the brief period when the moon blocks its blinding light. With cameras, photometers, infrared rays, ultraviolet light and much other equipment, the scientists plan to measure radiation, polarization, brightness, infrared bands, corona intensity and other solar and lunar information. The Buenos Aires plane — from the Space Science Laboratory, Albuquerque, N.M., and from laboratories at Los Alamos, N.M., and Livermore, Calif. — will meet over the Atlantic off the Brazilian port of Rio Grande do Sul, then all five planes will wing out southeast following the total eclipse and turning due east to a point nearly south of Montevideo, Uruguay. There, they will check location against the sun and return to Buenos Aires with data, statistics and pictures that will take months to analyze. Dr. William Ogle of Los Alamos, titular chief of the air-borne scientific experiment on the mystery of solar behavior, is hoping that cloud patterns and weather will permit top results. "There are a lot of things we don't know about the sun," said Ogle. "Perhaps if we are lucky we'll get some clue to some of the many mysteries," Robertson said. The converted cargo craft, hump-backed with equipment and refitted with optical glass windows instead of the metal plexiglass, will carry more than 100 specialists, each oxygen mask in case the weaker glass windows shatter and air pressure in the plane suddenly drops. The fleet of aircraft is only one part of the study. Rockets fired into the total eclipse path will be up from a site 10 miles south of Rio Grande do Sul. Pinney Already Under Fire After State GOP's Rout

HARTFORD (AP) — Republican State Chairman A. Searle Pinney survived the election defeat of 1965, but can he survive what has been called the "catastrophe" of 1966? A few cries for Pinney's head are already being raised in the wake of Tuesday's monumental Democratic victory and agonizing reappraisals are going on in GOP circles throughout the state. The defeated gubernatorial candidate, Clayton Gengras, is also getting a share of the criticism. Peter P. Mariani of Groton, who many thought last spring would be the party's choice for governor, compared the plight of the Connecticut GOP with Republican gains in other states and said that "the situation is more than serious. It is catastrophic." Mariani disclaimed any ambition of becoming state chairman himself, however. Pinney, who has been chairman for five years, wasn't talking. And Gengras's role in the post-election GOP was not immediately apparent. Emma Lincoln, the GOP town chairman in New London, sounded the first public call for Pinney's ouster. Saying that "one of us has to eat crow," Mrs. Lincoln said Wednesday that Pinney "looked us out on a limb." "We worked hard for you and your hand-picked candidate lost everything," she said. A group of 17 Wallingford Republicans sent Pinney a telegram urging him to step down. But State Central Committee chairman George Graesser of Wallingford sent a telegram of his own disclaiming the statement by the 17 and promising that the town committee would discuss the matter thoroughly before taking a formal position. Meanwhile, George Brown, town chairman of New Haven, put the blame on Gengras. "Montana conceded that Gengras 'did a lot of campaigning,"

Non-Poison Tear Gas Used on U.S. Patrol

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — An ambush patrol of the U.S. 1st Infantry Division was attacked today by Viet Cong using a nonpoisonous type of tear gas, a spokesman said. The Viet Cong attack came in the first known firing of gas by the Communists in the Viet Nam war. However, South Vietnamese authorities alleged in September 1965 that the Viet Cong used nausea-inducing gas grenades. The allied forces have used nonlethal types in certain instances for nearly two years. The Viet Cong attack came in Tay Ninh Province of War Zone C, a battleground area centered 65 miles northwest of Saigon, where Americans have reported more than 800 enemy dead in a week of hard fighting against the Viet Cong's 9th Division. The patrol had settled into its ambush pattern in matted swamp and jungle five miles northeast of Suoi Dau. No firefight followed and no injuries were reported. The spokesman said the Americans donned gas masks, which are standard combat equipment at the explosion of the first grenade. The troops were believed to number about 30. About 1,500 gas grenades were found among 19,000 grenades uncovered in an industrial sweeping an enemy regimental command and supply complex Wednesday. Ground action in the area. (See Page Four)

National GOP Advances Serious Threat to LBJ

WASHINGTON (AP) — The rolling impact of a midterm Republican breakthrough offered a fresh threat today not only to President Johnson's legislative program but possibly to his reelection in 1968. While the GOP was surging to above-average House gains in Tuesday's nonpresidential year election, it also was netting from the Democrats eight governor offices. This cemented Republican chief executives into political power bases in at least 25 states which will cast 250 electoral votes two years from now—39, in excess of the 270 needed to elect a president. RADIOACTIVITY RELEASED WASHINGTON (AP)—The State Department acknowledged today that a small amount of radioactivity was accidentally released into the atmosphere on Sept. 12 from an underground U.S. nuclear test blast in Nevada. But the amount of radioactive debris was so small that it could be detected only "by sensitive measuring instruments located in the immediate vicinity of the testing area," press officer Earl Burch said.
