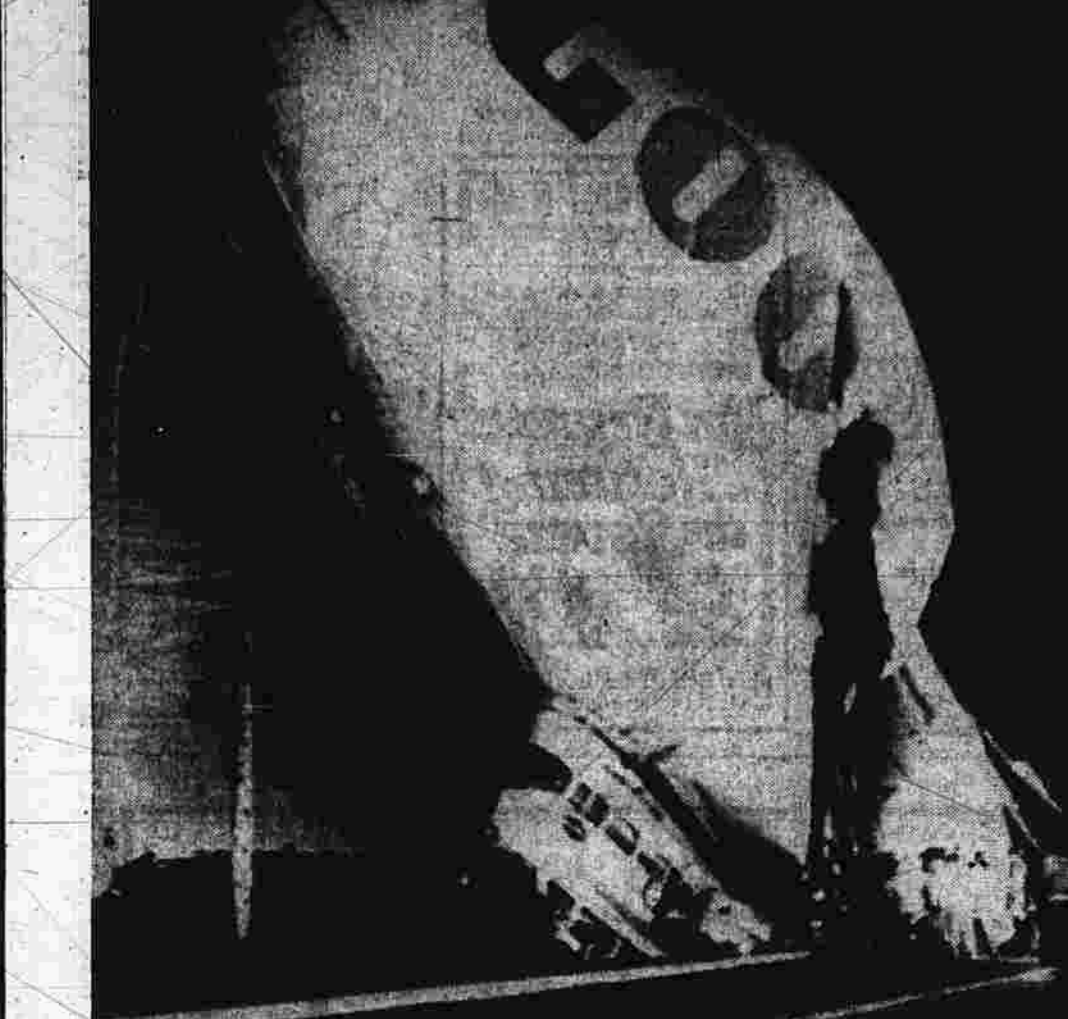

Final Gemini Space Launch Is Proceeding on Schedule

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—A fiery Atlas rocket thundered into the sky Friday, pushing an Agena satellite toward orbit as a target for the Gemini 12 astronauts. The Atlas-Agena combination vaulted from a launching pad at 2:08 p.m. EST after a two-day delay and gave the last of America's two-man Gemini missions a blazing start.

Police, armed with federal warrants, are searching today for two 24-year-old Manchester men, William Baldwin and Ronald Bourke, charged in the Rockville branch of the Vernon National Bank of \$25,434 on Oct. 3. Utilities Promotions Ruled Fair by PUC

HARTFORD (AP)—Connecticut gas and electric utilities on their promotional practices. The decision follows hearings begun in March and ending in June on their practices in obtaining new business. 19 Men Aboard Plane Missing Off Cape Cod

OTIS AIR FORCE BASE, Mass. (AP)—An Air Force Constellation was missing today, the Air Force pending notification of next of kin. A Coast Guard spokesman said the plane left Otis at 12:35 a.m., and was last heard from by radio at 1:22 a.m. Shortly after that, ground radar contact was lost. The Coast Guard said there was no indication the plane was in trouble when contact was lost. First word of a possible crash came by radio from a small fishing vessel. A massive search was organized immediately after the fishing vessel reported seeing a plane hurtle through the fog into the rough seas. "Rescue planes from Labrador and Bermuda and other Atlantic bases searched over the area seeking the lost craft. Coast Guard cutters, fishing vessels and merchant ships joined in the hunt. The searchers reported an oil slick and unidentified debris in the area where the plane was said to have crashed.

Lovell, Aldrin Set For 4-Day Adventure

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—Rested and ready, the Gemini 12 astronauts today prepared to rocket into orbit for a four-day adventure that will wind up the Gemini project and perhaps determine man's physical limitations in weightless space. All the news was good for Lovell and Aldrin was to start at 2:08 p.m. with the blazing liftoff of an Atlas rocket to boost an Agena target satellite into orbit. Lovell and Aldrin were to ride into space at 2:46 p.m. atop a Titan 2 to start the five-mile-a-second pursuit of the Agena.

4,000 More U.S. Troops Join Tay Ninh Battle

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—U. S. commanders sent another brigade of 4,000 men to Tay Ninh front today as the reported enemy toll in just over a week of fighting rose to 200 dead. An estimated 25,000 or more Americans have been committed to the operation to root out the enemy from the Viet Cong stronghold 80 miles northwest of Saigon near the Cambodian border. The operation is the second straight day. The bombers dropped their bombs on the enemy from Tay Ninh City. In the Mekong Delta, the Viet Cong launched a mortar, rocket and small arms attack on a president's camp of Vietnamese regional forces and killed or wounded 46 South Vietnamese, most of them wives or children of militiamen stationed in the provincial capital of Chanh. Then, 102 miles southwest of Saigon, U. S. ground forces reported killing 20 Viet Cong in new fighting to bring the Communist U. S. casualties for the week of fighting rose to 200 dead. HOMER, Mich. (AP)—A New York Central freight heaped the truck in this southern Michigan town today, sending three tank cars filled with potentially deadly gas crashing into the base of some gasoline and fuel oil storage tanks. One of the tanks burst, spewing flaming liquid as far as a block box apparently caused the derailment of 25 of the train's cars. The train was en route from Chicago to New York. Most of the cars were refrigerated units carrying fruits and vegetables. A nearby fertilizer plant was being wet down by firemen. "It had to burn itself out. According to prosecutor Joseph Paradiso, both men had previous records, but had been in jail for 18 days since their arrest.

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DAMAGE TO VENICE

VENICE, Italy (AP) — Near all shops, bars and restaurants in this canal city were damaged in last week's flood, officials reported today.

They said 56 per cent of all bars and restaurants were badly damaged, while damage to 40 per cent was heavy but less serious. Two to three per cent were destroyed.

No one knew how many died in the city. Municipal officials said about 38. But each day more bodies are found.

Among the rescue workers who have toiled with few hours of sleep, it was difficult to find anyone who estimated the dead under 100. Some insisted the toll would be 200.

Three more corpses were found Thursday, so covered with brown mud they looked like tarantula figures.

Men and women, some weeping quietly, lined railings of uncompleted bridges. They said they carried mud and debris up ramps and trucks hauled away the muck.

Thousands of gallons of oil swept away by the water left long black ribbons as broad as a man's hand on building walls, marble columns, traffic lights and plate glass windows from six to 28 feet above the street.

Children walked great distances with shopping bags and bottles to find bread, vegetables and water for their families.

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Chaplain Killed by Cong While Giving Last Rites

DAU TIENG, South Viet Nam (AP) — "My place is with them," Chaplain Michael J. Qualey replied when a 1st Division officer tried to dissuade him from boarding a helicopter to join American troops under heavy jungle attack. Hours later, he was killed by Viet Cong fire as he gave the last rites to a dying soldier.

Qualey, a Roman Catholic from New York City (801 W. 16th St., Manhattan), was the fifth U.S. chaplain to die in Viet Nam. He had volunteered for Army duty after three years at a church in a suburb of Mobile, Ala., and arrived in Viet Nam Jan. 25.

Father Qualey was assigned to the 2nd Battalion of the 1st Division's 28th Regiment, but when word reached forward headquarters Tuesday morning that the regiment's 1st Battalion was heavily engaged in the battle in Tay Ninh Province, he decided to go to it.

"No, Father," a senior officer told him. "You just stay right here at forward headquarters. You can do plenty of good right here. It's too dangerous out there."

But the priest insisted and climbed into a helicopter with medical and troop reinforcements.

He reached the battalion in War Zone C, northwest of Saigon. A Viet Cong attack before dawn had been repelled with the help of artillery, but the enemy was regrouping.

The Viet Cong made another assault as Father Qualey moved forward to a platoon of Bravo Company where several men were dying. Ignoring the battle, he gave the last rites to each.

The Viet Cong made another attack. A Communist soldier carrying a machine gun jumped from the bushes at Father Qualey and shot the chaplain in the head and stomach.

Father Qualey died moments later, not knowing that the Viet Cong attack had failed.

The last entry in the diary he carried read: "So will my heavenly Father, if you witness each of you forgives his brother with all his heart."

Father Qualey was born in Manhattan 37 years ago, dreamed as a youth of serving the poor and afflicted in the United States or in Asia or Africa as a missionary.

He attended the Marjoryn Seminary in Ossing, N.Y., and was ordained at 22.

In Mobile, Ala., as a missionary, he served four small churches for white persons and another for Negroes.

Eighteen months ago, he joined the Army's Chaplain Corps. After attending chap-

Lunar Orbiter Has Company In Space Work

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — America's Lunar Orbiter 2 — on a mission to take pictures of 18 possible astronaut landing sites — has company in lunar orbit — three Soviet spacecraft.

But scientists said Thursday after the 860-pound craft was looked in orbit that there is no danger of collision or radio interference.

Scientists at Jet Propulsion Laboratory who are controlling the craft ordered a braking rocket to be fired for 10 minutes Thursday, slowing Orbiter 2 from 5,186 miles an hour to 3,078 and allowing it to slip into an orbit 1,147 to 119 miles high.

The Soviet craft in lunar orbit are Luna 10, Luna 11 and Luna 12, also sent to orbit landing sites. The first two sent to pictures, but Luna 12 has transmitted photos taken from an altitude of 62 miles.

The United States' Orbiter 1 sent back pictures, but they were not of high quality.

Orbiter 2 will circle the moon every three hours and 40 minutes until Nov. 17, while controllers plot its track and study the moon's gravitational field.

Then the orbit will be altered to bring the spacecraft within 30 miles of the lunar surface when the picture taking begins Nov. 18.

NEW YORK (AP) — An off-duty policeman, described by fellow officers as "like a wild man," stormed into a Queens tavern early today, ordered all of the patrons out and then fatally shot the owner, police reported.

Two patrolmen, responding to a call, heard the gunfire and ran into the bar to seize the off-duty policeman, identified as Percy Mack, 36, a veteran of 11 years on the force.

Mack, who is married and lives in Brooklyn, was taken to headquarters and charged with homicide.

The dead man was identified as Anthony J. Miller, 54, who lives above the tavern, Shannon's Bar and Grill.

Mack's birth date is Nov. 10, 1930, and officers theorized that he may have begun a birthday celebration Thursday night.

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per cent of any American group would say yes, of course, to such a proposition. Under present actual implications, and as the question was phrased in Dearborn, with no assurance of a cease fire from the other side, no definition of what auspices and conditions would govern the Vietnamese people's settling of their own affairs, and with this particular referendum's proposition therefore sounding almost like one of peace at any price, it is rather remarkable it got as many as 14,000 votes, and we would by no means describe this particular referendum, as certain news summaries in print and on the air have done, as an "overwhelming" verdict.

The war was in the campaign. Some Republican campaigners deliberately put it there. President Johnson, with his elaborate campaign play of the great trip to Manila and way stations, fought the war issue as hard as he knew how, with the greatest weapons at the command of his high office.

He cannot, in the aftermath, claim that his leadership has been endorsed, any more than Nixon can claim, with validity, that it was his personal formula for the war the voters were seeking.

The country remains divided on the war. It could unite on the Vietnam peace. If the election is to have any positive effect, it would have to be by preparing a better climate, in this country, for the acceptance of a peace effort by third parties to broker a peace. The Johnson administration resigned any and all capacity to make peace when, in February of 1965, it chose the dead end, no choice path of punitive escalation.

WASHINGTON—In the early morning hours Wednesday after the election day debacle, Democratic leaders of Michigan were whispering that Lyndon B. Johnson must be removed from the top of the ticket in 1968 to avert another disaster two years hence.

It was a sentiment voiced in one major industrial state after another in the wake of the most impressive Republican election since 1944. In fact, the party was making President Johnson the scapegoat for their misery just two years after he had been elected in one of the great landfalls of American history.

In one sense, the attitude of the party leaders toward their chief is most unfair. The losses on Tuesday were mostly testimony to a dry rot that began to set into the Democratic Party as the major industrial states long before Mr. Johnson entered the White House. That decay was overshadowed in 1964 by the absurdity of Barry Goldwater's candidacy, but it is now visible for all to see.

In another sense, however, Mr. Johnson does bear some responsibility. Despite his brilliance as a Washington politician, he never has been a national party politician. Since becoming President, he has neglected party affairs and let the Democratic National Committee atrophy.

Thus, the President is in deep trouble looking ahead to 1968. The Republican sweep of the state-wide victories in the big seven states (including even Texas) revealed the feeble party leadership in states vital to presidential elections. What's worse, Mr. Johnson's relationships with the Democratic leaders in those states (with the exception of Texas) is poor.

That relationship deteriorated further during the past campaign by Mr. Johnson's curious detachment from elections so vital to him.

In California, for instance, as Republican Ronald Reagan's landslide win over Gov. Edmund G. (Pat) Brown became evident Tuesday night there was grumbling by party leaders over Mr. Johnson's failure to visit California in a losing cause (and praise for Vice President Humphrey and Sen. Robert F. Kennedy for doing).

Some grumbled that Mr. Johnson did nothing to win an endorsement for Brown from maverick Democratic Mayor Sam Yorty of Los Angeles, who maintains good relations with the President. The fact that the President placed no Tuesday night telephone call to lower Brown in Los Angeles was noted. Humphrey did also was noted.

California was not isolated. In Oregon, Democratic Congressman Rep. Robert Duncan's underperformance, losing Senate campaign against Republican Gov. Mark Hatfield backed the LBJ Viet Nam policy all the way but in return received no White House attention. In New York, Democratic leaders blamed the President for not helping finance Frank O'Connor's pinhead campaign against winning Gov. Nelson Rockefeller. But the depth of the Democratic problem Tuesday went (See Page Nine)

Cigar Binder Tobacco Crop Smallest Ever

WASHINGTON (AP) — Cigar-binder tobacco production for 1966 is estimated at 29.2 million pounds, the Department of Agriculture announced Thursday.

This amount is the lowest in 48 years of records. In 1958 34.3 million pounds were produced. The department said in its cigar binder production this year at 21.5 million pounds, compared with the record crop of 28.9 million pounds last year.

The expected yield per acre for cigar wrapper this year is 1,471 pounds.

Coventry Separate Building Urged For Central School Staff

The board of education has adopted a motion recommending that a separate building be constructed on town-owned land to house the superintendent of schools and central office staff. The recommendation came as the result of extensive study by a subcommittee formed to investigate the problem of central office space, currently housed at the high school.

The three subcommittee members, Richard Messer, Donald Averill and Mr. Paul Brook presented their proposals to the school board at last night's meeting.

The first proposal is one that has long been under discussion: Use of space in the town office building. Messier, in presenting the proposal, pointed out that conversion of town office space to suit the needs of the central office staff would be accomplished at a cost of about \$6,000. This would include the cost of an air-conditioning unit, which was felt to be necessary during the summer months because of the inside location of the room.

The second proposal presented by Messier was the use of the portable classrooms, currently in use at the County Grammar School. However, these would be needed as classrooms until projected completion of the new intermediate school in the fall of 1968. This would necessitate rental of space for the office staff until that time.

Messer pointed out, the subcommittee also considered the problem of the best and most permanent manner. Cost of relocating the portable classrooms was estimated at about \$7,000.

The third proposal, which the board adopted, was the building of a separate structure. Cost for this is estimated at about \$20,000. Of this amount, \$10,000 would be deducted from the state. Another \$9,000 from special town accounts can be deducted from this cost, bringing the actual cost to the taxpayers down to about \$1,000.

These special accounts come from the sale of the Center School, a capital improvement fund and the Interoceanic District 10 school fund. All three accounts may be used only for the creation or improvement of educational facilities.

The questionnaire did not discuss changing the observance of Christmas or New Year's Day. It was returned by 9,864 businessmen, or about one-third of the membership.

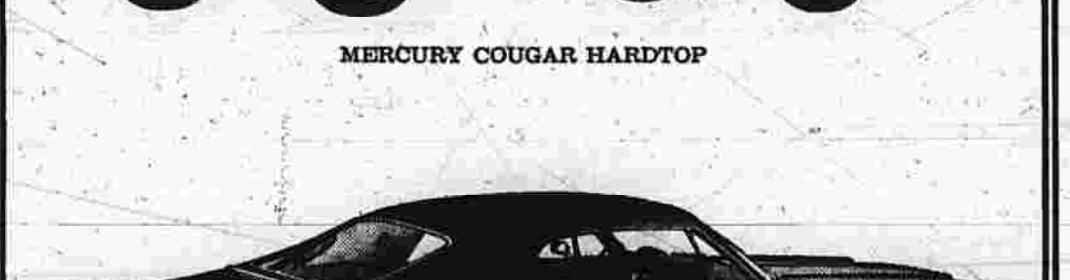

Hospital Reminder of Sacrifices Zoners Hear Bids Nov. 21

A memorial service in observance of Veterans Day was held at Manchester Memorial Hospital this morning—a hospital which was originally built and dedicated to those men who lost their lives in World War I.

A wreath was placed at the foot of the flagpole where, on a bronze plaque imbedded in stone, are the names of the Manchester men who gave their lives in that war.

The main address was given by Walter A. Von Hone, chairman of the Veterans Council of Manchester, who referred to the hospital as the "one victory over disease and destruction which attains greater stature with each passing year."

The ceremony began at 11 a.m. and Von Hone said "On November 11th, 1918 at 11 a.m. the guns fell silent after four years of spreading destruction and death from the North Sea to the Alps, across the Mediterranean to Africa, to the swamps of what was to become Poland, and the Near East, on the sea and from under the sea and even from the sky."

"The battles had been won, the men of America had indeed saved the world from destruction."

"The peace was another matter. The peacemakers, the statesmen of nations in their carpeted offices, far from the noise and smell of war, killed the returning warriors, heaped wood piles upon them for their gallant deeds and many sacrifices."

"Then the peacemakers proceeded to lose the peace by their greed, indecision and distrust of each other. The men of 1917 and 1918 saw their hard fought battles lost, a little at a time . . ."

"Today," Von Hone said, "50 years after World War I, 25 years after World War II and 10 years after the Korean War, we still have a victory that those men who served in the first great war presented to us. And it added: 'For so long as this Memorial Hospital shall stand it shall serve as a reminder of the sacrifices of Manchester sons of World War I.'"

Cond. Leo R. Grover, program chairman, read the names of the 45 men to whom the hospital is dedicated. He noted that in the charter of the hospital there is a stipulation that a free bed is always available for a veteran of the war.

About 30 veterans gathered at 10 a.m. at the American Legion Home on Leonard St. and march the sun came out and Hayes St. to the hospital for the ceremony.

About the time they were gathering, the skies had been cloudy but shortly before their march the sun came out and warmly shone on the participants during the brief ceremony.

The annual ceremony was arranged by the American Legion and all seven Manchester veterans organizations were represented.

Roland Wilson, commander of the VFW, commanded the color guard.

Leon Bradley, chaplain for the American Legion, was co-chairman for the program and served as master of ceremonies to introduce the proceedings. He asked those present to especially pray for the president of the U.S. in these troubled times, "so that he may achieve a quick and honorable peace."

Two other wreaths, beside the one placed at the hospital, were placed to commemorate the day. After the ceremony, a wreath was taken to Soldiers Field in East Cemetery, and one was taken to the memorial at Monroe Park.

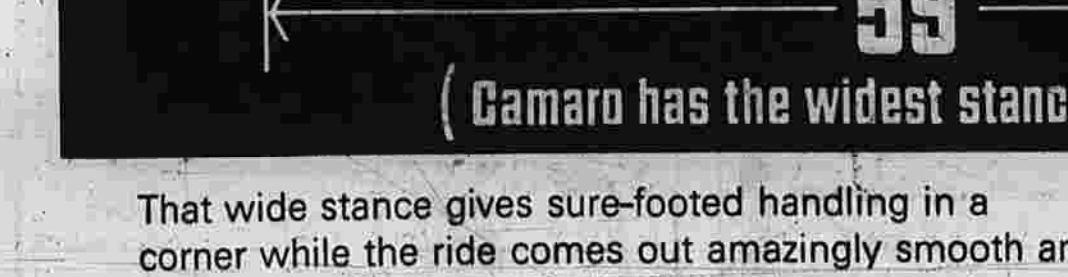

State Industrial Space Expands

HARTFORD (AP)—The State Development Commission reports that 10 million square feet of industrial space have been added in Connecticut during the past five years.

In 1961 a study showed there were 175 million square feet in the state's industrial establishments.

Parking will be permitted only in the rear half of a yard and within prescribed side and rear yard lines.

The equipment must be completely screened from off-premise view, except for a sign necessary for the loading or unloading of such vehicle or equipment.

Not more than one of each type of vehicle is to be kept on the lot and there will be no habitation of the vehicle or any utility or equipment on the premises.

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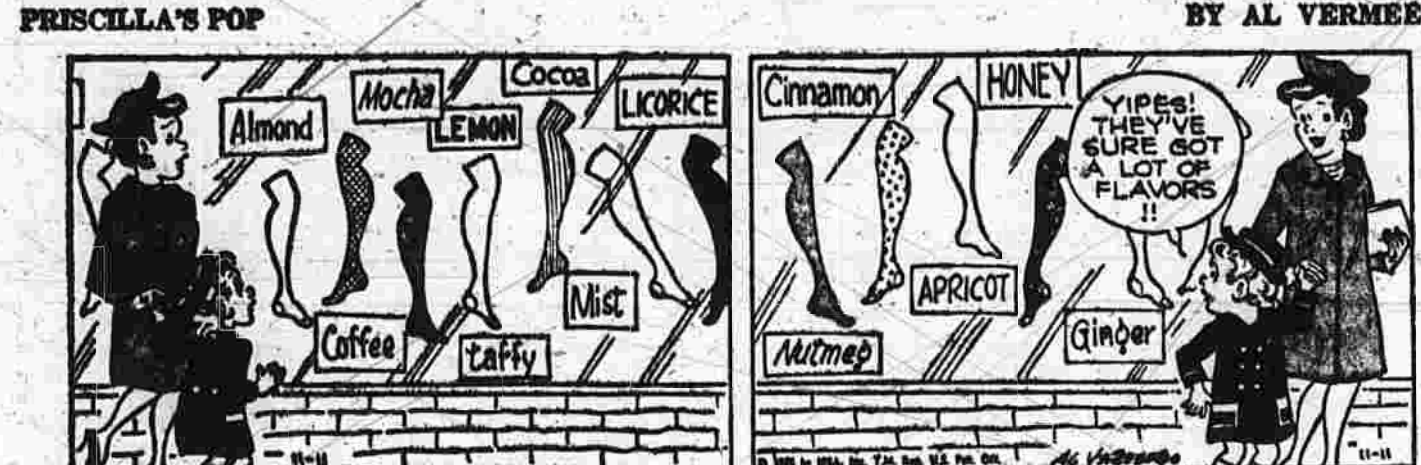

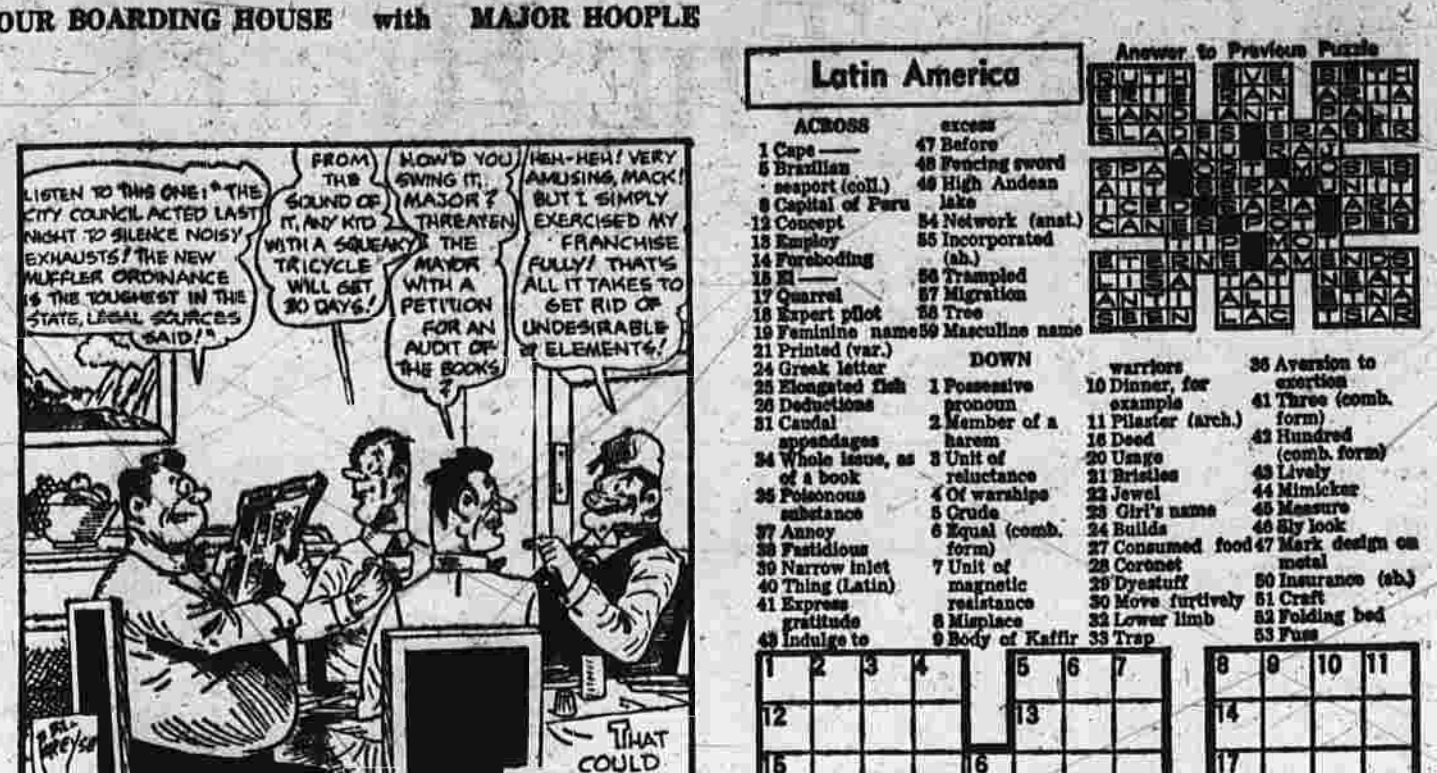

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Communist aircraft fire shot down five U.S. planes during raids over North Viet Nam Friday in one of the heaviest days of American losses of the war. U. S. headquarters, reporting this today, said the pilot of one plane was rescued, but the six others aboard the other four aircraft are missing. A Pass dispatch from Hanoi quoted the North Vietnamese News Agency as saying four planes were shot down and several U.S. Air Force pilots were imprisoned. Headquarters also announced that three American helicopters were shot down Friday while supporting ground operations near the Viet Djereng Special Forces camp in the highlands close to the Cambodian border. In ground action, the Viet Cong unleashed heavy mortar attacks Friday night and today.

"No state chairman can succeed in rebuilding the Republican Party unless he has unqualified support of all segments of the party," said Meskill in a statement. Asked whether he thought an earlier announcement might be better, Meskill said, "I think it's a fair assumption." He said, however, that he had no particular successor in mind for Pinney. Whoever is chosen to head the party should be a strong leader, with organizational ability as well as political savvy, he said. Meskill, a former mayor of New Britain, provided the few bright spots of the party's future.

For 10 minutes as their spaceship raced across the skies, James A. Lovell Jr. and Edwin E. Aldrin Jr. were busy jamming cameras, recording the steady movement of the moon as it slipped across the face of the sun. "We were unaccustomed in picking up the shadow," Aldrin said. "Roger," answered mission control. "We figured it would be a long way off."

WASHINGTON (AP)—U.S. officials are watching closely for the outcome of what now appears to be a bitter struggle within Communist China's hierarchy. State Department authorities, who have been able to say it is evident that the position has developed to the point of Chairman Mao Tse-tung. Mao has been telling visitors for some years that he was worried that the next generation would be less devoted to his foreign policy, a debate on military policy and disagreements on basic economic policy. Debate within the Chinese Communist party is not new, experts here say. The leadership, drawn from persons who have been comrades in arms for 30 years, has permitted this relationship. But those experts said that party leaders always had been able to reach a consensus until last spring. At that time the issues became so varied and extensive, and there was so much disagreement, that the party Central Committee was unable to reach a consensus. According to this view, Mao then created the Red Guard to stir up the so-called great cultural revolution and at the same time provide a shake-down in the leadership. Lifer Freed, Can't Decide Where to Go

CROOKSTON, Minn. (AP)—After 27 years behind bars, Andrew O. Larson has won his freedom. But he says he'll stay in the county jail here until he figures out what to do with his future. "I'm sort of at a loss to know what I should do," the 71-year-old Larson said. In an all-time high at Stillwater prison, Larson never tried to learn a trade. "I figured since I was in for life, I wouldn't need a trade," he said. Larson was 44 and a farmer near Fosston when he was arrested in 1939 for the shooting death of his wife's brother, Carl Sverson of Fosston. Larson was convicted of first-degree murder and sentenced to life at Stillwater Prison. One day last May, after consulting legal books in the prison library, he sat down with a piece of yellow paper and wrote a letter to Judge William T. Johnson of Washington County District Court, Stillwater. Larson complained that his confinement had been illegal, that he wasn't advised he could have a jury trial, that "they didn't even ask me if I did it."
