Touch Of Backlash In The Court? What is our very human Supreme Court doing in its latest? One might be tempted, if one did not know that Court decisions have to be reached and written in advance of their announcement, to say that Monday's decision on racial demonstrations was one which followed the election returns of Nov. 8. That, literally speaking, would have

But the Supreme Court does not always have to follow election returns. It could, on occasion, be sensitive enough to the trends of public opinion and feeling to anticipate them.

The specific decision on Monday held that when anti-segregation sit-in demenstrators chose the driveway of a county jail they were committing a kind of trespass which the law had a right to forbid and prevent. So the high court upheld the arrest and conviction of 32 of the demonstrators in question.

From 1961 on to this decision Monday, the Supreme Court had a record of upholding the right of peaceful sit-in or demonstration on all kinds of property,

public and private. Now, suddenly, the Court, in a five to four decision written by Justice Black, long a militant advocate of civil rights, but recently believed to be condemonstrations, finds one instance of

demonstrating it disapproves. As against the contention of Justice Black that the majority decision merely follows the direct meaning of the law itself. Justice Douglas, leading an emotional dissent, contended that the Court was actually reversing itself and all its previous rulings on similar situations. Justice Douglas warned that trespass laws will now be made the instrument to be used against demonstrators everywhere; he chapges that the Monday decision sets up a police state doc-

We tend toward the verdict that, as Justice Douglas suspected, the Court was following something in addition to the law. Just as, at the very beginning of its modern rulings in favor of civil rights, it was motivated primarily by a feeling that the time had come for progress in the economic, educational and political advancement of the people freed by the Civil War 100 years before, and then found the occasions and the laws for its point of view, so, in the present ruling, we feel it has judged it to be a time for a touch of restraint in the movement it itself helped launch. One can be equally sure that, if its new trespass ruling is abused by the police, the Court will in time find some way to balance this decision too.
