De Los Angeles Pleases Crowd

Victoria De Los Angeles provided the highlights of last evening's subscription concert by the Hartford Symphony. The Spanish mezzo-soprano elicited prolonged and enthusiastic applause from an audience of large but not capacity size.

Heard in several numbers, Miss De Los Angeles was at her best in Beethoven's early "Ahi Pericle," the most significant composition she was to sing. I have long been an admirer of her artistry. It is several years since I have happened to hear her and I'm happy to report that she is even better than she used to be. There is a certain warmer timbre to the voice than was evident in the days before she had become a mother.

As always, Miss De Los Angeles sang with excellent diction and flawless intonation. She was heard in English, Italian, and Spanish and one would be hard put to choose the language in which her declamation was the best. As soon as she had warmed up with the recitative which precedes Purcell's "When I Am Laid in Earth" her English was understandable for every word. Her Italian was excellent in the Beethoven and naturally her Spanish was fine in the remaining numbers which were sung in Spanish. These comprised five songs by Monteverdi, billed as being "Afro-Negro" but which were in fact, more Spanish or Moroccan than Negro. In her final "De los alamos" variety of music, she was superb.

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5 in 'Manfield Project' Successfully Employed

All five area participants in the "Manfield Project" have been successfully placed in gainful employment according to Dr. Raymond Ramsdell, superintendent of schools.

The project was conducted at the Manfield Training School under the direction of Hollis W. Shaw and involved 12 weeks of training to meet the vocational needs of young adults with mental limitations who lived in communities surrounding the school.

The basic aim of the program was to prepare trainees to become self-supporting, self-sustaining citizens, capable of managing their own affairs, while making contributions to the growth of their community.

Participants from 11 to 26 years of age were selected from 12 weeks of training in a variety of job settings, where their work potential, attitudes and how they could be observed and assessed by a professionally trained staff.

During the time the young people were involved in the program they were not divorced from the local school system but were brought to the local school some time during each day in order to maintain local contact.

The placement of the students in the jobs, some part-time and some full-time, was done on the basis of a careful evaluation which is repeated every three years. The student's education is not completed, but plans for his future.

The program at Manfield is a Federal program, known as the "Manfield Project," which has been operating since 1954. It is a model of a vocational program for the handicapped.

At the center individualized instruction is provided in reading, arithmetic and on the level of each child finds success, Ramsdell said. The staff consists of a full-time teacher-director, full-time tutor, part-time social worker and a part-time psychological examiner.

NOT ALL FIDELITIES SHOULD BE TAKEN BY ALFRED SHAINWOLD. As everybody knows, a finesse gives you a chance to avoid giving a trick to an opponent's high card in the rubber bridge tournament at the Sands Hotel in Las Vegas, one of our leading experts found that a finesse also gives the opponent a chance to defeat an unobvious contract.

Opening lead — seven of spades. West led the seven of spades, and dummy's king won. Declarer then led the ten of hearts from dummy for a finesse. This would be the correct play only if South had seen the king of hearts in East's hand!

Actually the finesse lost. West returned a diamond, reading his partner's high spade at the first trick as showing an entry in the higher of the two side suits (diamonds are higher than clubs).

East won with the ace of diamonds and returned a spade for West to ruff. West then cashed two more diamonds, and South was down one.

Should Play Ace South should play the ace of hearts instead of the king at the second trick. Declarer is sure if the trump break 3-1 they make the contract even if East has all three trumps.

At the cards he, the trump break, and only the king is left out. Now South leads a dummy hand and gets to declarer with a trump to discard the queen of diamonds and a diamond at once.

Performers Still at Work, Await Talks

NEW YORK (AP)—Officials of the radio and television performers' union said today they are ready to resume contract talks whenever the networks issue the invitation.

Officials of the AFL-CIO American Federation of Television and Radio Artists ended their last bargaining session with ABC, CBS, NBC and the Mutual radio network early Wednesday — four hours after their contract expired.

No strike was called and sportscasters, newsmasters and announcers continued working on a minute-to-minute basis.

"I was the one who walked out of the meeting," said Donald F. Conway, national executive secretary for the 17,000-member AFTRA, "but we are ready, willing and able to meet with the networks when they send out an invitation."

The networks, AFTRA and the AFL-CIO Screen Actors Guild were reticent about whether a strike was being held behind the scenes Wednesday, but Conway warned, "a strike is inevitable unless there is a change in the management point of view."

AFTRA's general manager said "great progress" was being made in the guild's part of the dispute but said AFTRA is "negotiating the entire basic contract, and at this time we do not know if AFTRA can reach an agreement with the networks."

Management personnel stood by and tape machines were loaded with reruns to continue programs in the event of a strike.

AFTRA is seeking a minimum weekly base pay of \$225 for newsmen — another \$225 weekly guarantee for camera appearances — a total of \$450 a week.

Union spokesmen declined to say what the present minimums are but a member said the current rate is \$215 a week plus on-camera and on-microphone fees which generally exceed the base.

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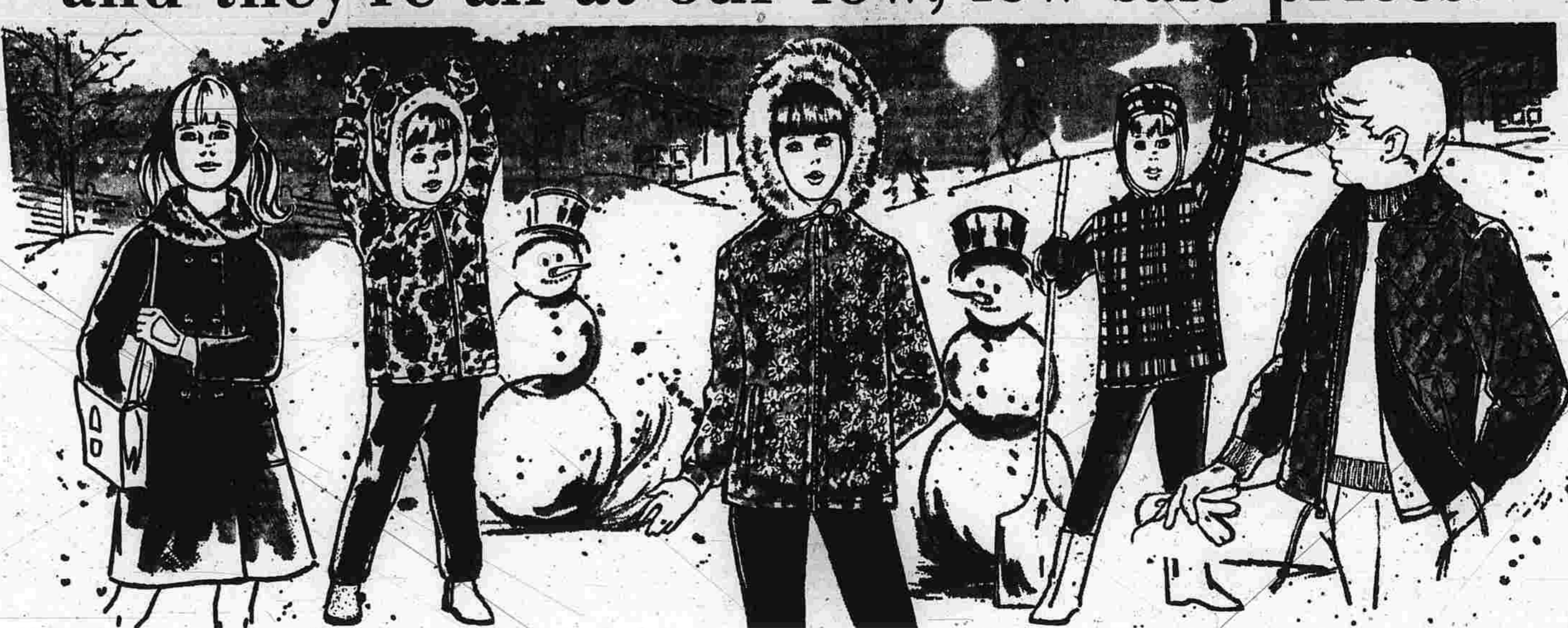

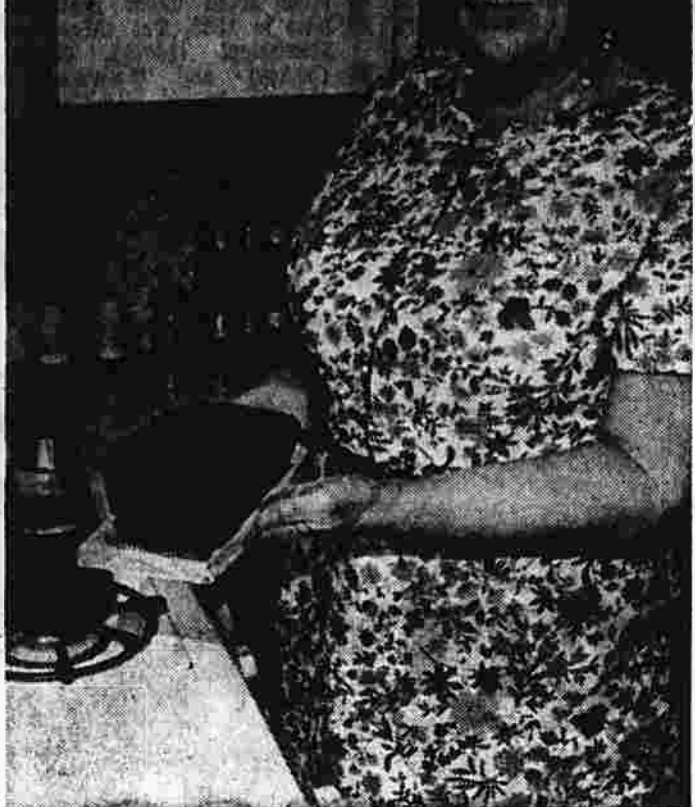

Mixed Prices For Holiday's Food Shopping

NEW YORK (AP) — There will be mixed blessings in the food stores for Thanksgiving shoppers.

Turkey and cranberry prices are slightly higher than a year ago, eggs took a big jump this week and many vegetables and fruits are higher.

But bacon is down and so are oranges and grapefruit.

A major supermarket chain in the New York area is selling small turkeys for 39 cents a pound, up 2 cents from last year's large turkeys — 18 to 24 pounds — are 35 cents, also up 2 cents.

There was a record turkey crop this year, but much of it has been eaten and more of the rest is going into special items such as turkey breasts that cost more.

Bacon, which sold as high as \$1.29 a pound last winter, has fallen to almost half that. Pork chops are down 10 cents in the New York area.

Pork and beef are down 2 cents a pound in San Francisco and Portland, Ore., reflecting larger supplies.

Egg prices have risen with the holiday demand. They are up 4 to 6 cents a dozen in the New York area, 5 cents in Southern California and 2 to 3 cents in the Pacific Northwest.

Florida is harvesting the first of what is shaping up as a record citrus crop. It will mean a steady supply in fresh oranges, grapefruit and tangerines this winter.

But frozen asparagus and carrots and canned applesauce, creamed corn and sauerkraut are headed higher.

Supplies already are tight in some fruits and vegetables because of crop problems last summer. The Defense Supply Agency also has taken more from the civilian market.

Action to Avoid Collision Seen Cause of Air Tragedy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Maneuvers to avoid an apparent collision threat caused an airliner to plunge into the Atlantic near New York last year, the Civil Aeronautics Board said today. Eighty-four persons died in the crash.

The board also said it found evidence of faulty coordination by operators of some of the radio installations used by the Federal Aviation Agency to control air traffic approaching and leaving the busy metropolitan area.

The board said in a report on the Feb. 8, 1965, accident that the evasive maneuver by the Eastern Air Lines DC7B was prompted by an illusion that made it appear that the plane was on a collision course with a Pan American Airways 707 jet inbound from San Juan, Puerto Rico. The airliner had just taken off from Kennedy International Airport for Atlanta via intermediate cities.

The Eastern plane crashed into the water 7 1/2 miles off the coast six minutes after takeoff.

The CAB said studies show glare, darkness and other factors led to false perceptions and illusions that caused them to become disoriented. When the Eastern plane turned away from the background lights of Long Island into a black area with no horizon and with the Pan American plane as the only light source, the board said, the Eastern pilot was unable to determine depth and distance. Robbery Victim Kissed and Told

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — The state hopes to send a man accused of armed robbery, Eugene David Massaro, to jail with a kiss.

The kiss, planted on the cheek of a bandit who robbed Miami Beach socialite Phoebe Morse of \$25,000 in jewelry Aug. 30, is a key to the identification of Massaro in a criminal court trial that opened Wednesday.

Mrs. Morse testified she asked for the kiss, explaining she did so to get a better look at the man, who was wearing dark sunglasses.

On the witness stand, she said the man who kissed her was Massaro.

Massaro's lawyer has said he will present more than two dozen witnesses who will testify that Massaro was somewhere else when the robbery took place.
