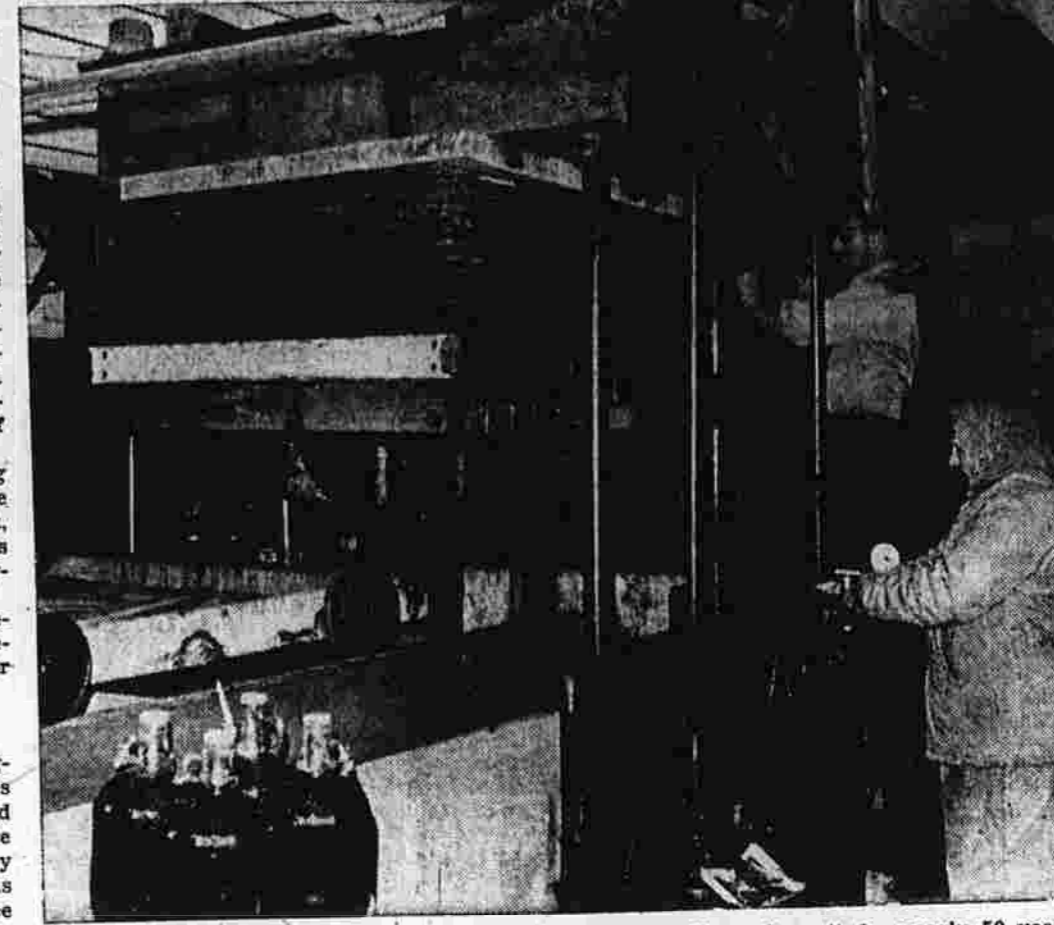

Report Cards Thing of Past For Catholic School Pupils

Conventional report cards are a thing of the past for primary grade children in Manchester's Catholic schools. The pupils at St. James' and St. Bartholomew Schools in Grades 1, 2 and 3 will no longer have to carry home report cards. The innovation is all part of recent decision to hold ungraded primary classes throughout the Archdiocese of Hartford, according to the Very Rev. Msgr. James A. Connelly, superintendent of schools. The ungraded primary program began in all diocesan schools in September. It allows each child to advance at his own rate, based on his individual abilities and learning capacities.

## The Specials Climb Among The Top Ten

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC sprinted back to the lead in the national Nielsen ratings in the report released Monday. CBS dropped back into second place. The averages for the two weeks ending Nov. 6 were NBC, 19.4; CBS, 18.3; and ABC, 16.7.

One interesting aspect of the new list was the strong showing of some special programs. Four made the top 10 and CBS' half-hour Halloween special, "It's the Great Pumpkin, Charlie Brown," a cartoon show, actually tied NBC's mighty "Bonanza" for top position. CBS' "Lucy in London" was next, followed by the weekly Red Skelton show on the same network.

Other programs in the top 10 were CBS' Lucy Show, NBC's Ice Follies, tied with CBS' Jackie Gleason Show, CBS' Green Acres, ABC's Alice Through the Looking Glass, and CBS' Andy Griffith Show.

None of the new series this season is listed among the top 20 shows, although CBS' "Family Affair," a situation comedy, was in the 22nd spot.

"Rat Patrol," the ABC action series that hit the top 10 at the start of the season and even beat its competition, "The Lucy Show," dropped back to 28th.

Two shows popular in other seasons are faring less well this year. ABC's "The Fugitive" wound up in the lower third of the Nielsen list — probably because of tough competition from NBC's movie reruns. "Gilligan's Island," which was a hit in a Thursday night time period, has dropped far down the list since CBS moved it to Monday nights. Neither "Batman" nor "Peyton Place" is doing as well as last season.

### SHAKESPEAREAN DRAMA

CBS has arranged with the Royal Shakespeare Company of England to present a series of plays by Shakespeare. The first three productions will be "King Lear," "Macbeth" and "A Midsummer Night's Dream." The first two will be shown next season, the third during the 1968-69 season. The plays will be filmed in England by the company and later distributed to theaters.

## NBC Launches Films Made for TV

By BOB THOMAS

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Saturday night may mark the beginning of a new era in show business. That's when NBC and Universal will launch the first "world premiere" attraction on "Saturday Night at the Movies."

"World Premiere" is the press agency term that has been tagged to the dozen full-length features that have been produced for a first showing on television. All are in color, with casts of recognizable names, old and new. The backers claim, to those which are seen in movie houses.

What is so revolutionary about Saturday night's "World Premiere"?

It signals the beginning of a full-scale program to supply brand new features for television. The need is not yet acute, but it will be in two or three years. When ABC adds its new Wednesday night movie in Jan-

uary, the networks will be presenting six nights of features.

On the basis of 30 first-runs and 22 repeats during the television season, that means the networks need 190 features per year. The combined studios make perhaps 150 first class attractions per year. Many of these would not be available to television.

As part of a deal with MGM, CBS will pay \$800,000 apiece for 18 future films. It appears that these movies will be released in theaters first, then on television. The network reasons that the publicity of a theatrical release can only help the films' appeal for television viewers.

Universal's Jennings Lang explained the economics of the features-for-television:

"We can make them for an average of a million dollars, and at that price they are economically sound. Prices for features are going up, and we can get added revenue from show-

ing some of the films overseas; of the first ten, I'd say about four would do well in foreign theaters.

"The features are also helpful as pilots for series. Our next three are designed with that in mind — 'I Love a Mystery' with Les Crane, 'Ironside' with Raymond Burr, and 'Outsider' with Darrin McGavin or Harry Guardino."

Lang said the new features are comparable to the regular movie product with these exceptions: They won't be spectacles with mob scenes and huge sets; the films can't afford million-dollar stars like Paul Newman and Julie Andrews; nor can they hire top directors like Billy Wilder or William Wyler.

"On the other hand, I have been talking to foreign directors like Fellini, Dassin, Richardson and Godard about making films for us next year," Lang said. "I told Fellini: 'How would you like to show your Rome to 40 million Americans?' He was excited about the idea."

In at least two respects, the new features may be better on television than movies made for theaters, Lang said. Directors are instructed to frame their shots so figures on the edge of the screen won't disappear. Also, the score is edited to provide more adroit transitions for commercial breaks.

Lang, a large, bearish man of vast enthusiasm, sees the features-for-television as the wave of the future.

"Now the big sponsors are talking about paying for movies to be made. Ford, which paid two million for 'River Kwai,' now is exploring what we could make for them for two million. If we were assured two million

from a sponsor and two million from expected returns overseas, we'd have four million to make a movie with. Think what we could make with that kind of a budget!"

### "DRAGNET" BACK

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC obviously is very high on "Dragnet," the series that was so popular in the 1950's. Jack Webb has made a two-hour film called "Dragnet 68" so it won't be confused with the old series still around on reruns. It also has a new batch of the series in the works. It could replace at midseason one of two NBC series reported to be in serious rating trouble. Webb will again play Joe Friday.

## On 'Felony Squad,' Cops Are Emotionally Involved

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — This week "Felony Squad" featured a story about a vigilante group that maintained an arsenal of arms for use against "left-wing" organizations.

Another segment of the ABC television series deals with a psychotic who launches a sniping attack from atop a tower.

Does this sound as if "Felony Squad" is stealing its plots from the headlines? Executive producer Walter Grauman claims innocence. In both cases, he testifies, the shows were filmed before the news events they paralleled.

This sort of thing worries Grauman, a dark, well-dressed veteran of the television and movie wars; he directed chapters of "The Untouchables" and "Naked City" as well as the film "Lady in a Cage." He wonders how many other "Felony Squad" plots will achieve reality.

"Felony squad" — original title: "Men Against Evil" — appears to be a success in a virtually hitless new season. At least the show has managed a respectable rating. It is one of the three newcomers to land in the top 40. Others are "Rat Patrol" and "Family Affair."

Credit for the achievement goes to Grauman.

"It's a cops-and-robbers show, but with a difference. The police have an emotional relationship to each other and to the case that they're on. I wanted the contrast between a mature detective, Howard Duff, who operates by instinct, and a younger one, Dennis Cole, who goes by the book. He has been taught to do so by his father, played by Ben Alexander, who is an old-time cop," Grauman said.

"The show is given a style of harsh realism by using real locations as much as possible. I think of it as an action show, even a chase, and I like to keep 90 per cent of it in movement. I hammer at the writers: Let us learn about the characters in action."

The Supreme Court rulings on treatment of prisoners has made "Felony Squad" update its methods, as it has with police departments everywhere.

"Instead of hamstringing police, I think the rulings have made them do more constructive work in investigations," Grauman opined. "It has also made us work harder in devising plots, and that is all to the good. We can't use the old dramatic devices of third-de-

grees and quick confessions."

The success of "Felony Squad" may have influenced NBC's decision to bring back "Dragnet" in January. The show will have Jack Webb back as Sgt. Friday, of course, but he'll have a new sidekick, Harry Morgan, since Ben Alexander is now employed in another show-his arm of the Los Angeles Police Department.
