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Experts See \$130 Billion 1967 Budget

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP)—The federal government may spend as much as \$130 billion in the present fiscal year and perhaps \$140 billion in the bookkeeping year beginning July 1, government experts said today.

The experts forecast today expenditures in the range of \$127 billion but say that the fiscal year compared with President Johnson's budget estimate of \$113 billion last November.

It spending goes as high as \$130 billion this year, these experts said, the budget could go \$10 billion higher.

But they described the \$140 billion figure as speculative. They gave no reasons for that, but they said that the budget deficit for fiscal 1968, which begins next July 1.

While spending is up sharply from the January estimate, the income picture is brighter. Experts now estimate revenues for the present year at \$117 billion or more, an increase of \$6 billion over the January estimate.

Assuming spending of \$127 billion and income of \$117 billion, there would be a budget deficit of \$10 billion for this year.

Defense spending, including the war in Viet Nam, accounted for about \$10 billion of the spending increase, experts said.

Higher interest rates and rising national debt and the tight money situation also are factors.

"You can't have overwhelming masses of the American people living in a deteriorating society," the Connecticut Democrat said in an interview.

"If it comes down to a question of no tax increase or a tax increase to solve the budget problem, the latter is the better choice of the American citizen, a tax increase would be justified."

At the same time, Ribicoff said that there is broad agreement in the House that there is a need to curb some expenditures to build cities and improve the quality of life there.

"I think this is a grave tragedy," said Ribicoff, chairman of a Senate panel now investigating federal efforts to cope with urban afflictions.

The Department of Housing and Urban Development, meanwhile, said that current federal goals and strategy should enable the nation to meet in one generation the need of decaying cities and their poor, their unemployed and their abandoned.

That assertion was made in a 130-page report to Ribicoff's government operations subcommittee. Ribicoff himself questioned the timetable.

Searchers Cover Lake Seeking Ship Survivors

REASCUB forces fanned out over Lake Huron today in search of survivors of the ill-fated Daniel J. Morrell, which sank in a storm with a feared loss of 28 lives.

One crewman survived the Great Lakes' worst disaster in eight years. Three bodies were recovered today after an all-night search.

Eleven bodies were recovered Wednesday. All were in an area about 20 miles southeast of the Harbor Beach Light.

Gale force winds and heavy snow hampered overnight rescue operations. Enlisted in the search were three Coast Guard helicopters, two cutters and three other vessels.

The search turned up several orange life jackets and waterlogged logs. Life preservers, all stamped Daniel J. Morrell, orange-colored oars and other debris also were recovered.

Its fate concealed by the storm for 34 hours, the 608-foot Morrell snapped in late Tuesday morning and sank in 145 feet of water 20 miles northeast of Harbor Beach, a town at the tip of Michigan's Thumb District.

Twenty-nine crewmen were aboard the ship, said John Hammann, a spokesman for the Coast Guard. He said that the bodies of three crewmen were recovered.

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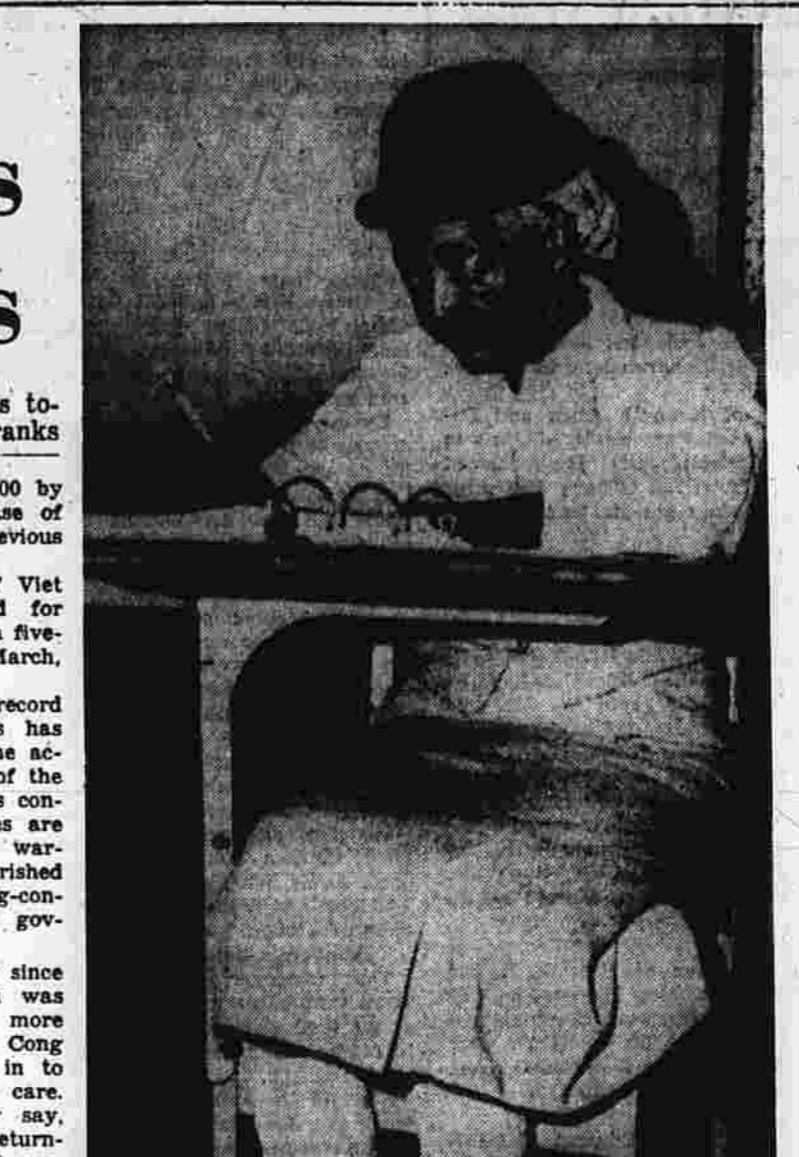

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New Slide Of Sludg In Wales

BERPAN, Wales (AP) — A new coal sludge slide similar to the one which caused October's school disaster here broke loose today.

There were no immediate reports of casualties or damage. The slide occurred on the same diater slip even as an inquiry court met to investigate the school tragedy.

The slide went 100 to 200 yards before it could be halted. Water channels, protective barriers and sandbags were hurriedly put into use.

The Oct. 21 avalanche of coal mine waste killed 344, mostly children. Later Philip Wain, investigating counsel, told the inquiry tribunal the pile of mine debris that was the source of the disaster had slipped again but that danger of a new tragedy apparently was being averted.

"I think it is right to tell the tribunal at the earliest opportunity that there has been another slide occurring at about 10:30 a.m., owing to heavy rainfall, a slide of Coal Tip 7, he said.

"The thickness of that slide is not very great and it has been dealt with immediately by water channels, protective barriers and sandbags.

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Huge Saturn Rocket Successfully Tested

BAY ST. LOUIS, Miss. (AP)—It exhilarating like speeding the rocket through the air, it was a matter of time before the Saturn 5 rocket designed to carry American astronauts to the moon, was ignited for a test flight.

The test flight was scheduled for Saturday at the Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Ala., and Maj. Gen. Samuel Phillips, director of the Project Apollo, said the test was a success.

Phillips told a news conference that all data from computer tapes and ground observers showed the rocket was performing perfectly.

The Saturn 5 rocket is the largest and most powerful rocket ever built. It is designed to carry astronauts and their supplies to the moon and back.

The test flight was the first of three planned for the Saturn 5. The other two are scheduled for next year.

Oatmeal Cakes

- 1 cup quick-cooking oats
- 1/4 cups boiling water
- 1/4 pound or 1/2 cup soft margarine
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1/2 cup preflaked flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg

Topping

- 1 egg
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 3 tablespoons margarine, melted
- 3 tablespoons milk
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts

Mix oats and boiling water in bowl and let stand one-half hour. Cream brown and white sugar with margarine, add eggs and vanilla and stir well. Add oat mixture to sugar and other ingredients and mix. Gradually blend in flour, baking soda, and spices. Pour batter in 12 x 9 x 2 inch greased pan.

Make topping by combining egg, sugar, melted margarine and milk. Pour this over batter then sprinkle with nuts and coconut.

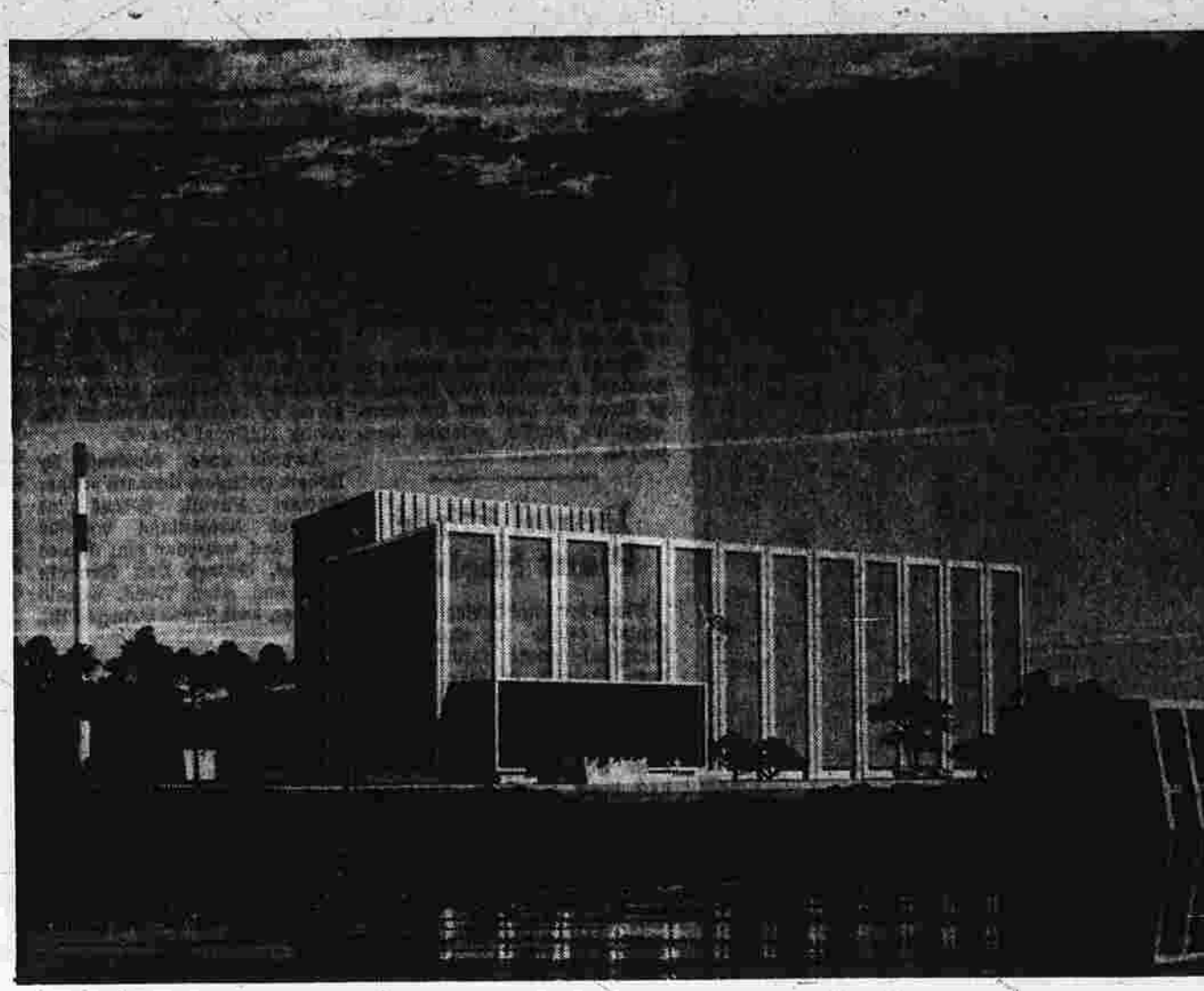

SALGON—A note of quiet despair is creeping into the top echelons of the United States mission charged with winning the war in Viet Nam. It grows partly out of frustration which one top embassy official privately describes as "the hot blue torch on our rear ends" that comes from Washington and particularly from the White House in search of ever-new victory formulas.

Most responsible officials here, for example, believe that a negotiated settlement would risk more for the future than it would gain for the present on both the military and political side of the mission. The more realistic hope of a status quo end of the war is simply more of what is now going on: mopping up and killing the main force military units of the Communist enemy, breaking up this political control in the hands of the villages and the tender shoots of political development.

In confidential conversations top officials here do not conceal their dismay at the U.S. pledge made in Manila to withdraw our forces within six months after the end of the war. The U.S. has provided that Ho Chi Minh's legions are withdrawn and the level of violence in the south "subsidized."

The fear is palpable here that Ho Chi Minh just might try to negotiate such an end to the conflict exposing the U.S. to the possibility of losing everything it has spent so much blood and treasure to gain here is not the slightest doubt here that if the United States loses in fact to withdraw the field might well be open to later conquest by the Communists.

By all means, one official here told us, "Hanoi will never accept those terms unless we give them some loophole." But the words did not carry overwhelming conviction. Moreover, as viewed by officials here, the mere offer to carry out the withdrawal in six months or next year but on a realistic projection of the modest gains now being made is great and painstaking effort.
