"The Welfare City"

The scene was a hearing of a subcommittee of the City Council of New York City. The topic was a series of proposed ordinances designed to establish strict anti-deception standards in the advertising done by New York City merchants. The spokesman was one Edward J. Brown, representing the Metropolitan New York Retail Merchants Association, and presenting the point of view that the proposed restrictions, although lofty and pure in concept, might have the practical effect of making it more difficult for New York's honest and reputable retailers to operate their

That was the background or a statement which, it seems likely, may apply more and more to more than one large American city. What Mr. Brown said was this:

"New York is in fact becoming a welfare city. If it were not for their suburban and out-of-town branches, some of our retail stores could not afford the luxury of their downtown em-

This is not too difficult to interpret. "A welfare city" is one in which a mafority of the population is on a scale of living which requires some kind of subsidy from public funds. People on that scale of living do not

very often patronize the fine, handsome People who would normally patronize such fine stores no longer live in the big

city, but out in the suburbs. As it gets to be more and more trouble for people living out in the suburbs to find their way into the big cities, the big city retailers who want to be sure of getting and keeping their kind of customers begine to locate handsome branches out in the suburbs.

Soon, as Mr. Brown said, such branch stores are paying their own way, while the original main stores, back in the big cities, are having trouble holding their own.

The cause is a complex of economics, architecture, transport, and sociology, The cure is something none of us really see, even though we concede certain possibilities to the refurbishing and rebuilding of the cores of the big cities, to the transplanting, for suburban cure, of some of their miseries. But the one thing nobody figures out, yet, is how to make the people who would be able to support Fifth Ave. stores move back near Fifth Ave. We doubt that is ever going to happen. The one Fifth Ave. will, we suppose, maintain itself almost forever, as a matter of showmanship prestige; but the lesser avenues in lesser cities, under a much greater compuision to earn their own way, may find they can't fight decentralization.

The Fault Was With Our Voting

It is very interesting to note that Mr. William S. Paley, chairman of the Columbia Broadcasting System, has defended television and radio coverage of the results of the Nov. 8 election by attacking our "outdated voting practices" and recommending that they be brought "up to date and in line with the opportunities and advances that modern communications offer."

The criticism he was answering was, of course, the criticism that radio and television were proclaiming results before all the polls were closed. He did not undertake to discuss those instances in which radio and television and their computer projections sometimes happened to make errors in their proclama-

Perhaps all that stands in the way of Mr. Paley's suggestion that we make our voting practices conform more strictly to television capacity and convenience is the discussion of how many millions it is worth to the television industry to have our democracy put into a neat package suitable for network presentation. Is democracy worth as many millions as a baseball team? Or as the rights to a football schedule? One trouble, obviously, is that we normally have elections only every two or four years, when sustained viewer interest might be better if we had one a month. But that seems a mere detail.

Kill and maim as many as you car up to 6 o'clock in the morning of Dec 24 and start killing again on the morning of Dec. 26. Do your damndest unti 6 a.m. Dec. 31 and again after Jan. 1, 1967, when it will be all right to slay, to bomb, to burn, to destroy crops and houses and the works of man until 6 o'clock on the morning of Dec. 24, 1967. "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men." By all means, let there be peace for 96 hours, which is that much better than uninterrupted war. Ever since the medieval institution—the truce of God -was invented by the Roman Catholic Church for private wars, the pause that comes in the midst of fighting is


a blessed surcease. Except for criminals, men do not kill each other for pleasure or material gain. Many millions still alive, who were on battlefields in the two World Wars, will remember the wonder and heartache that came with the brief si-

lence at Christmas time. So, for a few days, we will all be spared those dismal communiques about how many Vietcong have been killed and wounded compared to the casualties on the American and South Vietnamese side.

The different Gods in which each believes will be thanked. What about the statemen and the generals on both sides? How much thanks are they due? The time can be used by all concerned to prepare to kill that many more when the fighting starts up again. Some young men, and some Vietnamese women and children too, will live a few days longer than if there were

It is not enough. However, it is being made clear in statements on both sides that this is all there will be. The holiday truce will be a prelude to another full year of war. Washington, Hanol and Peking want it that way. There will be no extended halt of the bombing or the infiltration, no advance

and a peaceful New Year, but neither truce will bring hope as things look now. Neither will create a new situation nor break the automated progress of the war. Secretary of State Rusk has already rejected "the idea of a general pause, such as we had a year ago" or, it seems, a cessation of the bombing like last year's. There will be four days of peace-but not a moment of "good will on earth." - NEW YORK
