# Couple Survives 11 Days on Peak

COLVILLE, Wash. (AP)—A car stuck in the snow led to the rescue of a Canadian couple who survived 11 days after their plane crashed on a north-eastern Washington peak.

Roy Brown, 36, of Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, and his wife, Betty, 32, were reported in good condition today at Mt. Carmel Hospital here.

Mr. and Mrs. Brown, the parents of six children, had been the object of a wide search in Canada and northeastern Washington since their single engine plane vanished Nov. 24.

They were flying to Vancouver, B.C., to join relatives at the Grey Cup Canadian championship professional football game Nov. 26.

There was no sign of them until late Sunday afternoon when Ron Ruble of Colville heard a cry for help as he was trying to dig his car out of the snow.

Ruble looked up and saw Mrs. Brown floundering through waist-deep snow.

"Wait for us," she cried. "Our plane crashed."

"We'll wait," said Ruble. "We're stuck."

## Gall Bladder Surgery for Eisenhower

GETTYSBURG, Pa. (AP)—Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower, 76, will enter Walter Reed Hospital this week for surgery to remove his gall bladder, Eisenhower's office announced today.

The five-star general will enter the hospital Thursday. The exact day or time of the operation was not given.

Eisenhower's office issued this statement: "The doctors have informed Gen. Eisenhower that he must have his gall bladder removed soon."

"He plans to enter Walter Reed General Hospital Thursday, Dec. 8, and plans to leave for Palm Desert, Calif., right after the turn of the year."

Eisenhower underwent surgery and also suffered a heart attack while he was president, and in the fall of 1965 he suffered a heart attack while vacationing in Augusta, Ga. He was hospitalized for several weeks then, first at an Army base in Georgia and later at Walter Reed.

Eisenhower checked in at Walter Reed for an overnight physical examination about 10 days ago. It is assumed that he received the advice of doctors for the gall bladder removal at that time.

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# Bond Rights Violated, Supreme Court Rules

## Atlanta Court's Ruling Reversed

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court ruled unanimously today that the Georgia Legislature violated Julian Bond's constitutional rights by refusing to seat him.

The court did not specifically direct that the Georgia Legislature seat Bond, confirming itself to the finding that he could not be constitutionally barred on account of views he has expressed.

Reversing a special three-judge federal court in Atlanta, Ga., Chief Justice Earl Warren said:

Legislators have an obligation to take positions on controversial political questions so that their constituents can be fully informed by them, and be

better able to assess their qualifications for office; also so they may be represented in government debates by the person they have elected to represent them."

Bond, a Negro civil rights worker and official of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, was twice barred from his elected seat in the Georgia House because he supported a committee statement describing U.S. policy in Viet Nam as aggression.

He was elected a third time last November from an Atlanta district while his case was pending before the Supreme Court. The lower court concluded by a 4-1 vote that the Georgia House was authorized by state law to refuse to seat Bond.

However, the high court said "the disqualification of Bond from membership in the Georgia House because of his statements violated Bond's right of free expression under the First Amendment."

Bond has been critical of the military draft system and has said he admired the courage of those who burned their draft cards although he would not burn his own.

When the Supreme Court heard arguments in the case Nov. 10, Georgia Atty. Gen. Arthur K. Bolton said the legislature did not believe Bond could honestly take the required oath to support the constitution because of his statements.

After detailing Bond's statements and the arguments presented to the high court, Warren said "we do not quarrel" with the state's contention that the oath does not violate the First Amendment.

However, he said, the oath requirement "does not authorize a majority of state legislators to test the sincerity with which another duly elected legislator can swear to uphold the constitution."

"Such a power could be utilized to restrict the right of legislators to dissent from national or state policy or that of a majority of their colleagues under the guise of judging their loyalty to the Constitution."

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## Draft Deferment Needs Revising, Educator Says

CHICAGO (AP)—An education official told a national draft conference today the student deferment program must continue, but should be revised to make it better understood and less open to criticism.

Harry Marmion, a staff associate for the American Council of Education, began a conference discussion on Selective Service by urging increased standardization of draft regulations at the local board level.

Noting that there are more than 4,000 local draft boards across the nation, Marmion said that they "have a wide latitude of action which in some cases may be used in an arbitrary manner."

"For example, one local board may induct part-time students before married men; another board's policies may be exactly the opposite," he added.

Another conference participant, Col. Dee Ingold, a special assistant to Lt. Gen. Lewis E. Hershey, the Selective Service director, acknowledged there is a variance among local draft boards but added: "There has

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## Romney Aide Cancels Exploratory Journey

LANSING, Mich. (AP)—Gov. George Romney today said he has told Michigan's Republican National Committeeman John Martin to cancel a trip to New Hampshire where Martin was to confere with GOP leaders about Romney's running in the 1968 presidential primary there.

"He's canceled it," Romney said when asked his reaction to Martin's comment last week that he would visit New Hampshire later this month.

"It created the impression that I had encouraged him to make the trip and that was not the case," Romney said.

Martin has been national committeeman from Michigan since 1967.

Questioned again regarding his possible candidacy for the 1968 Republican presidential nomination, Romney told a news conference:

"What I said before was that I intended to take a long, hard look at the question. I haven't. What I've said in effect is that it's something I intend to explore. But I have not made a decision and I am not a candidate."

"That's my private position and that's my public position, and I haven't indicated any differently to anybody," Romney added.

Romney, looking tanned and fit, returned Sunday from a 12-day vacation in Puerto Rico.

"It was a good rest," Romney said. "It's good to be back." The governor, landslide third-term winner in the Nov. 8 general election, announced plans for three trips later this week. He will speak before the Char-

UN APPEALS FOR BAN

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—The U. N. General Assembly appealed today to all nations to halt nuclear weapons tests both in the atmosphere and underground. Although no nations were mentioned by name, the resolution was aimed particularly at Red China and France, the only countries now testing weapons in the atmosphere. U.S. officials said last week they expect Red China to conduct its fifth nuclear test in the near future.

## Railroad Service To 10 Airports Asked in Study

PRINCETON, N.J. (AP)—High-speed passenger train service to 10 airports has been proposed as part of a fast rail bypass route between Boston and Washington.

A team of transportation researchers at Princeton University developed the plans disclosed over the weekend.

The study, already under review by governmental authorities and eastern railroads, generally calls for high-speed service over existing rail lines and in some cases on new rails to the west of major cities.

All but one of the 11 major airports in the region would be linked to the system, either directly or by spur lines.

Trains originating in Washington, for example, would start alternately from Union Station or from Dulles International Airport field in Virginia. New York's John F. Kennedy International airport also would be tied directly from Penn Station in Manhattan.

The experts said every major airport would be within 10 to 20 minutes of city centers by shuttle train.

The plans call for self-propelled cars capable of traveling at 160 miles an hour with a cruising speed of 135.

The team estimated it would cost \$1.5 billion to complete the program. The team, composed of engineers, economists, social scientists and architects, said the new system could pay for itself by generating new freight business and autotrain service—a plan to permit passengers to take their autos along when they go by train.

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## Rhodesia Rejects Pact with Britain

SALISBURY, Rhodesia (AP)—Prime Minister Ian Smith's Cabinet rejected tonight Britain's shipboard agreement on the 13-month-independence crisis. Smith told a crowd waiting outside his offices at 8 p.m.: "The fight goes on."

Smith said he accepted Prime Minister Harold Wilson's proposed constitution but was not willing to accept Wilson's terms for ending the rebellion and a return to what he called legality.

These terms apparently included giving power to the British governor, Sir Humphrey Gibbs, over police and armed forces and the power to appoint ministers.

The Wilson terms also included a demand that five members of the government should come from outside Smith's ruling Rhodesian Front party and that number must include two Africans.

The white minority regime's decision means that Britain will take its case to the United Nations and request mandatory trade sanctions against Rhodesia.

Wilson Sunday night had ruled out any changes or delay in the document, with his cabinet approved shortly after his return from the Mediterranean conference.

"It is a matter of accepting it

or rejecting it," he said. "All we want is a telegram saying 'yes' or 'no.'"

Smith outlined the proposals to the Rhodesian cabinet shortly after he returned to Salisbury Sunday night. The cabinet went back into session this morning.

Although Wilson on his return to London read a statement saying he and Smith had produced what he called "a working document," Smith called it "British terms" and refused to tell newsmen whether he accepted it personally.

Unless the way is clear soon to an end to the Rhodesian rebellion, Britain is pledged to call in the United Nations for compulsory, worldwide economic sanctions against the breakaway colony. That could produce heavy damage to Britain's shaky economy, as well as to Rhodesia's, because British relations with South Africa would be affected.

# U.S. Jets Avoid MIGs, Bomb Close to Hanoi

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—U.S. jets flew through a sky full of challenging Communist MIGs Sunday to bomb targets near Hanoi, and pilots reported shooting down one of the Red jets and probably a second.

Retaliating for the heaviest U.S. air losses of the war two days earlier, the American fighters also claimed widespread destruction to one of North Viet Nam's major railroad marshaling yards six miles northeast of Hanoi.

While the air war, swirled around the North Vietnamese capital, fresh fighting was reported on the edge of South Viet Nam's capital at the Tan Son Nhut Airport.

American guards led by sentry dogs reported killing 12 more Viet Cong in flushing out remnants of an enemy suicide force which penetrated the big air base Sunday.

In the last two days, U.S. spokesmen reported, 30 Viet Cong were killed inside the defensive perimeter of Saigon's air base. Three Americans were killed and five wounded in the first Viet Cong attack. U.S.

casualties in later action were reported light. One U.S. jet fighter and a Vietnamese transport were damaged.

Off the coast of North Viet Nam, the U.S. destroyer Ingersoll fought a gun duel with North Vietnamese shore batteries this morning. U.S. headquarters reported.

A spokesman said the shore batteries opened fire on the Ingersoll while she patrolled six miles off the southern coast of North Viet Nam. The Ingersoll replied with her five-inch guns.

A U.S. spokesman said the destroyer suffered slight damage but no casualties. He had no assessment of damage to the shore guns. The engagement took place 11 miles northeast of Dong Hoi, the spokesman said.

The stepped up air war around Hanoi dominated the war picture as only small, scattered ground actions again were reported.

U.S. headquarters said American pilots clashed with MIGs and the advanced model delta-wing MIG21s in four encounters.

# Games Called Off By Supermarkets

NEW YORK (AP)—After protests from picketing housewives, two supermarket chains have decided to drop promotional games. Some others indicate they may follow suit when their current promotions end, an Associated Press survey showed.

In Kansas City, games may be on the way out altogether. Three supermarket groups there have dropped games in which customers win prizes.

Safeway Stores Inc., the nation's second-largest food store operation, announced this week it would get out of the game business in January—although its Bonus Bingo was credited for half of the chain's 1966 sales increase.

"They've run their course," said Robert A. Magowan, Safeway chairman. "We don't think they have raised prices, but if the housewife thinks that, we won't fight her."

Fairy Stores Inc., an 84-store chain in northern California, dropped its sweepstakes games earlier, and offered a choice of Blue Chip stamps or a cash rebate of slightly more than 15 cents on \$10.

"It has become abundantly clear to us that games have lost their popularity," said Harold C. Ward, Purity president. The Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Co., which operates the nation's largest chain, said in New York last week it was neither adding nor dropping promotional games now.

"But that doesn't mean tomorrow or next week we won't change," an A&P spokesman said. "It is something always under study, and we leave it to our five divisions to work out their own promotions to fit local situations."

### The No Half-time Game

Watching a football game on educational television the other night was a pleasant experience. Not only was the game free, but the presentation was excellent. It was also free, for as far as we are concerned, that non-commercial educational television is the friendly little announcement that we imagine one for a football game—the following presentation of the following football game is made possible in part by a grant from the Royal Pigeon Converter Corp.

No, this presentation of a football game was not only completely free even the educational television type of commercial.

It had another innovation which was new.

The second half began about 30 seconds after the first half ended.

This is, of course, something that can only be accomplished when a game has been taped for showing at some later date. Then it becomes a relatively simple matter. The producers merely drop out the halftime tape, with all the marching, counter-marching, story-telling formations, baton-twirling, high-kicking and chest-arching that has become the great bore of autumn afternoons for television and stadium audience alike. The announcer says that now the second half begins. And it begins.

This is an educational television showing a game that must have been played a week or so before.

But it is such a pleasurable experience, when one encounters it, that it spurs wickily pleasant thoughts about what a small amount of imagination might do for commercial football.

All commercial television needs to do is have actual play of the game start half an hour before the production is put on the network. Then, when halftime occurs on the actual field, that neatly excises from the procedure, and the network joins the second half of the game live.

The hands still march, the twirlers still twirl, the chest archers still arch, the fans still stretch and treat their hunger and thirst, the players still get their talking to in the dressing rooms, and nothing whatsoever is lost, except a half hour which the home viewer for a college of some kind, there would, we imagine, have been general and enthusiastic approval.

That would still be the answer, if the question were being put theoretically. And it is also, we believe, the answer that should be given, with certain qualifications, when the question is being put specifically about a particular college on a particular part of the tract, as is now the actual case.

What would always have been considered an ideal use for a part of the tract would still make an ideal use of part of the tract now that the college involved is the Community College which is already functioning after high school hours in our high school plant.

The basic attractiveness and soundness of the proposition is not altered, when it comes to the process of community decision, by various fringe considerations. Like the strategic way in which Community College authorities have chosen to unveil their progressive needs, or the fact that somebody who has been in politics states ready to develop land on the other side of the proposed college site. Such circumstances add to the gossip, and to some of the emotions, in the situation, without, however, contributing basic argument one way or another.

Nor should we mind, in our discussion and decision process, smugged on the thought that we are about to give the state of Connecticut, and its Community College, something for nothing. This should be handled as a business transaction, in which the state will be dealing with the town as it might deal with any other property owner.

It may be that, since the town approves of the Community College which bears its name, and is indeed anxious to have the College remain in Manchester, the town has no instinct to prove a particularly hard bargainer, with the state.

But the price the state is to pay to the town for the acreage it needs should be determined through a process of professional appraisal, and it would, naturally, considering the change in real estate values since the town purchase of the tract, represent a dollar and cents gain for the town.

Manchester Community College was originally established, by Manchester enterprise and decision, to be a Manchester institution, on a footing which meant that its subsidization and auxiliary support would come from Manchester town budget. On such a basis, if the institution were to flourish and continue and grow, we ourselves would eventually have been forced to provide campus space for it, in which case it might well have been our eventual decision to allocate to this institution, free, the very acreage now in question.

Now the Manchester Community College is out of the town budget, and it is backed and financed by the resources of the whole state, and we are being asked to sell to the state for this institution land which we might otherwise eventually have decided to give to it.

We have land which is in the right place, and which can be spared as a slice off the giant Globe Hollow tract. The main thing that remains, in our opinion, is to see that the price asked the state is neither impossibly high, nor impossibly low.

Left Newsmen 'in the Dust' Presidential Driving Under Scrutiny Again

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Presidential Johnson's Texas driving habits are back in the news again. The White House, using figures from an official log, said Johnson "drove at a moderate speed" on his way to church along a fog-bound highway Sunday.

But a newsman and two photographers driving separate cars said they couldn't keep up with the President despite traveling 80 to 85 miles an hour, and faster in some spots. Johnson's accelerator foot showed an average speed of 42 miles an hour, including driving time on the ranch road leading to U.S. Highway 290 and several blocks of driving within Fredericksburg.

The three news representatives were waiting by the highway for Johnson to pass. Normally newsmen precede Johnson to church, but these waited because of the fog and what they felt was a slippery road.

The fog limited visibility to about 100 yards and was heavy enough to necessitate some use of lights and windshield wipers, the newsmen said. The front car hit 100 miles an hour several times but could get in sight only of the Secret Service car trailing Johnson and did not see the President's car. The second car, moving at speeds up to 90 never caught the first. The third car's driver said he never could catch up with the second car, and finally slowed down.

One driver in a sports car verified his speedometer by reading his tachometer, a device which measures the engine's revolutions per minute. The speed limit on open Texas highways is 70. U.S. 290 in the area is a two-lane, gravel-shouldered road through ranch and farm country.

On the drive back from church — when the weather had cleared — newsmen driving slower than 70, kept Johnson easily in view.

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Wittkofske Seeks Water Safeguards

Manchester Water Superintendent Lawrence Wittkofske has given conditional endorsement to a Manchester Community College request for the purchase of 150 acres of Globe Hollow land.

The conditions, all designed to protect the Globe Hollow watershed, are adherence to recommendations made by the Henry Southern Engineering Co. in a report dated July 22, 1966, and limiting the sale to the 150 acres without a future consideration of additional land.

A public hearing on the proposed sale will be conducted by the Board of Directors tomorrow night at 8 in the Verplanck School Auditorium. Already on record for the sale are the Town Planning Commission, the Town Development Commission and Town Planner Joseph Tamasky, all limiting the sale to a maximum of 150 acres.

The main objection to the sale has come from Park and Recreation Superintendent Horace Murphy, who has declared himself unilaterally opposed. The Town Conservation Commission, which has not on record concerning the sale, has declared itself as opposed, on principle, to the sale of open space land.

An informal Board of Directors meeting last month, at least five directors had expressed approval. The Henry Southern report, to which Wittkofske has referred, took no position for or against the sale. However, it offered seven recommendations, all designed to protect the public water supply of Globe Hollow Reservoir.

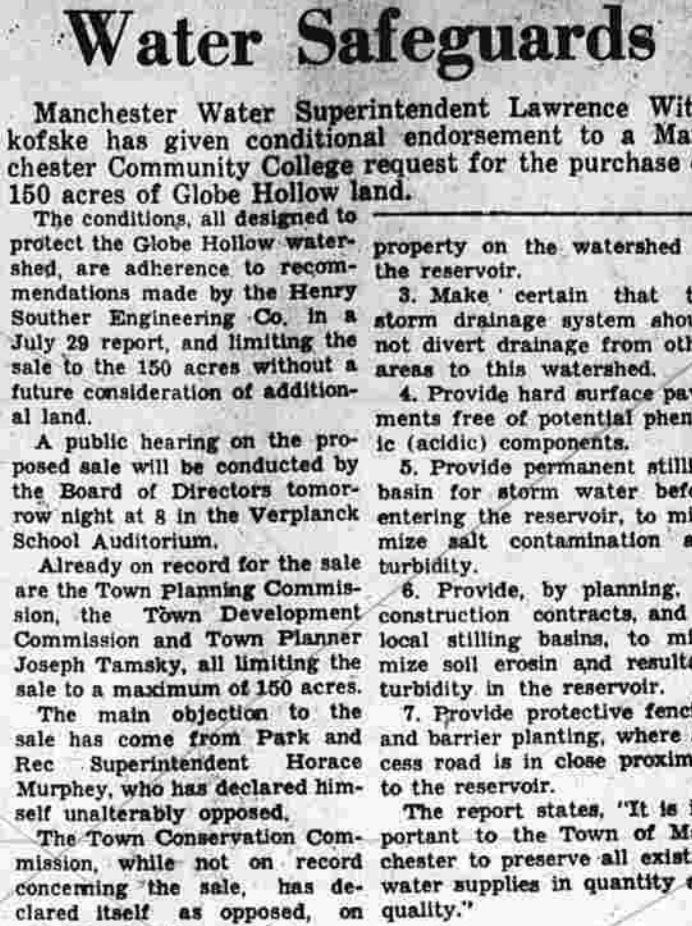
1. Provide for disposal of sanitary sewage and wastes to the public sewage collection system. 2. Minimize, insofar as possible, new construction in the area and struck a southbound car 20 acres comprising the ex-treme northeast corner of the 43, also of Columbia.

3. Make certain that the storm drainage system should not divert drainage from other areas to this watershed. 4. Provide hard surface pavements free of potential phenolic (acidic) compounds. 5. Provide permanent stilling basin for storm water before entering the reservoir, to minimize salt contamination and turbidity. 6. Provide, by planning, construction contracts, and by local structing basins, to minimize soil erosion and resultant turbidity in the reservoir. 7. Provide protective fencing and barrier planting, where appropriate, to the Town of Manchester to preserve all existing water supplies in quantity and quality.

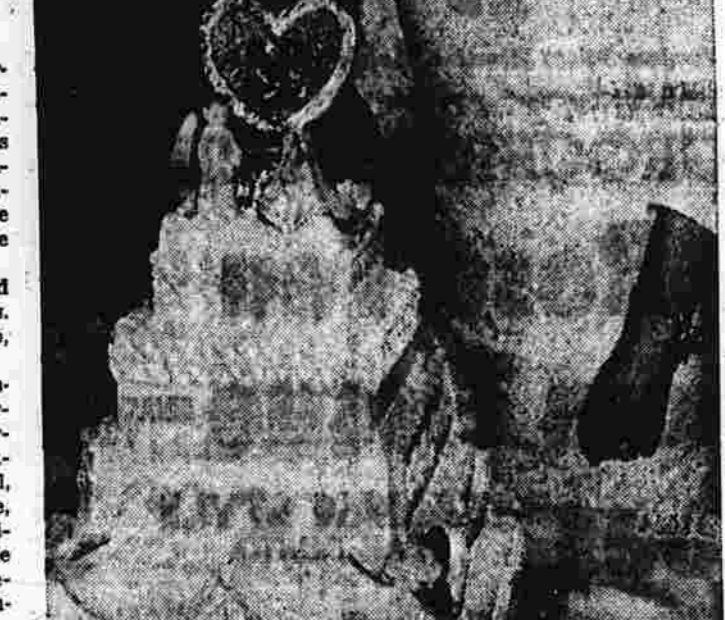

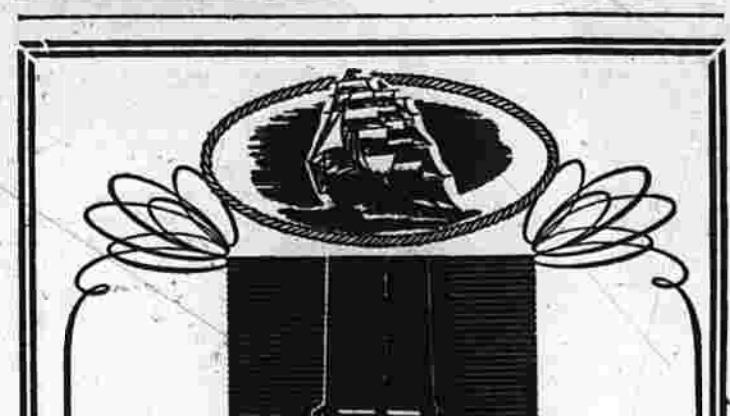
