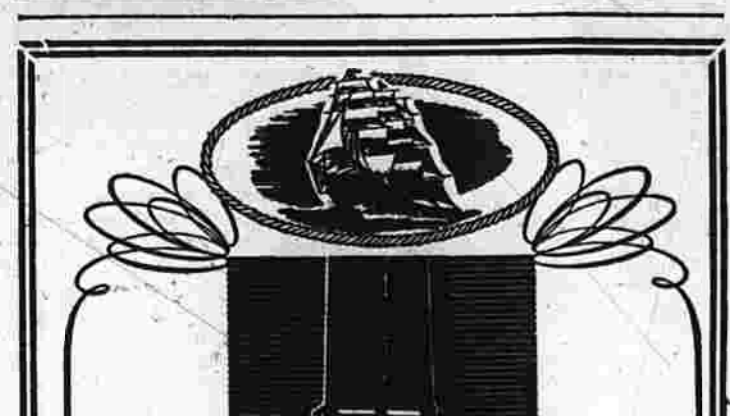

Tolland Lot Size Ruling Won't Need CRPA Review, King Finds

Town Council Robert D. King has challenged an opinion issued by the planning and zoning commission's representative to the Capitol Region Planning Agency regarding the referral of the town's increased lot sizes to the CRPA.

Atty. Preston Harding, the CRPA representative, maintained that the commission should submit its recent increased minimum lot size on property within 500 feet of the town boundary to the planning agency.

In a letter to the PZC last night King advised that the "revision of that zoning ordinance is not correct."

King's decision was based on a letter from CRPA planning director Robert D. Brown, a copy of which was sent to both King and Harding.

Brown referred to Section 8-3b of the General Statutes which "requires referral of a proposed 'repeal or change' of a zoning ordinance to the CRPA."

Brown said it had been customary for CRPA to leave the decision of referral to municipal officials.

The planning agency has always indicated that the provisions of the law were intended to apply to changes in the ordinance relating to use, density and dimensions.

No legal opinion has been rendered on the question, according to Brown, and the only court case on the zoning referral statute did not consider this question.

Brown recommended the town refer a zoning change "if there is the slightest question that the statute might apply, as the safest way to avoid a possible legal suit is to refer the change to the CRPA."

The board of representatives took a giant step last night and voted to implement steps which would take in three more phases of the town-wide sewer plan at a cost of about \$2 million.

The board at its meeting heard a report from A. Richard Lombardi of the engineering firm of Anderson-Nichols who is also town's consulting engineer.

Lombardi said in accordance with the request of the board he had tried to estimate the cost of providing sewers to the Box Mountain area and the Vernon Circle area.

The board voted to retain the Anderson-Nichols firm to limit the sewer pipes and to work up more definitive cost estimates for the sewer project. The town can be considered for federal and state grants to assist in the construction of the sewer and approved a motion to have the town council contact Jay Barry and Howard, the town's bonding counsel, as soon as definite figures are procured.

Lombardi told the board that the State Water Resources Commission fully expects the next legislature to enact legislation providing for state grants to match public law 866 (Water Pollution Control Act). Funds up to 30 per cent of the construction costs, therefore, for the work which is eligible under Public Law 860 not less than 60 per cent of the construction costs will be borne by federal and state governments.

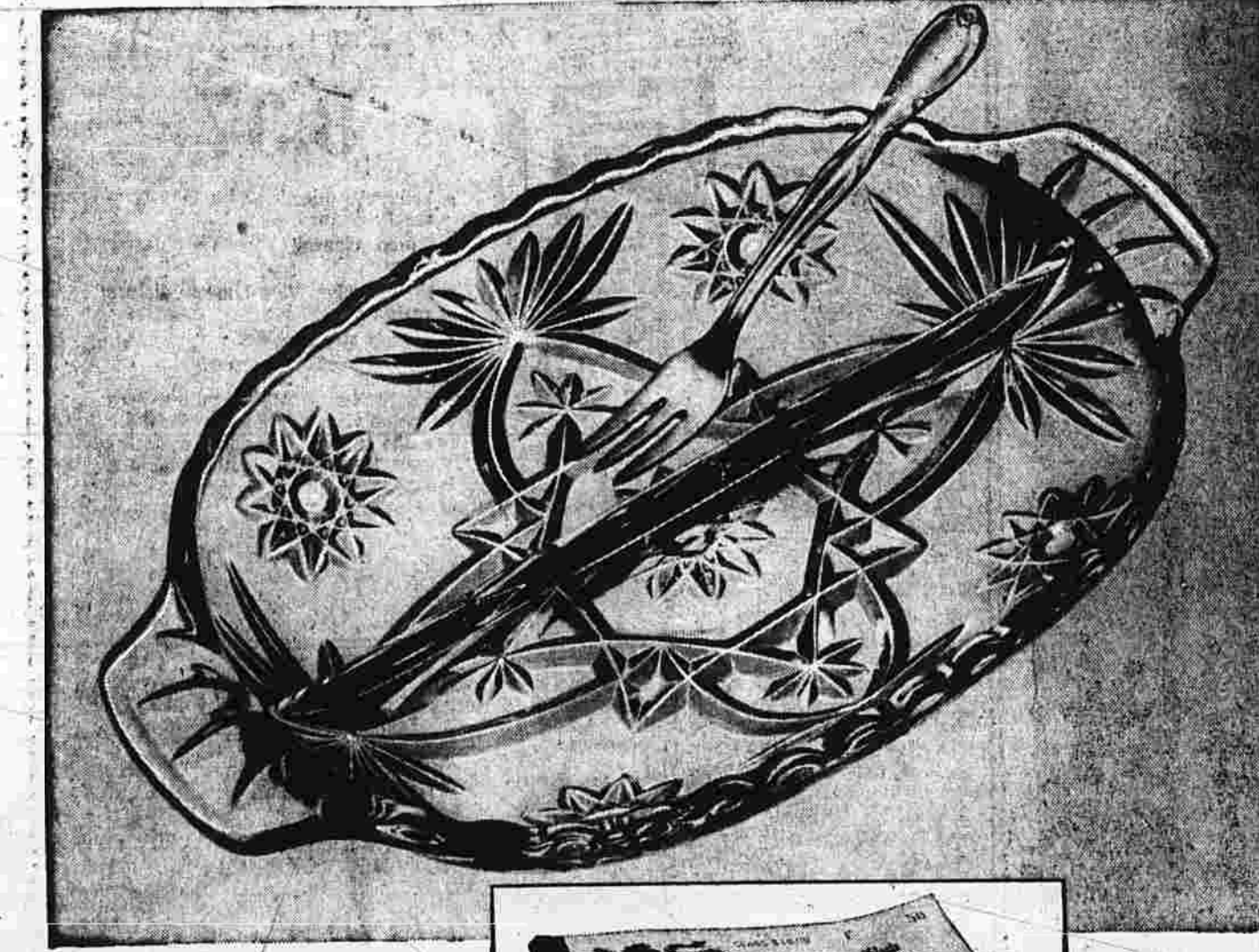

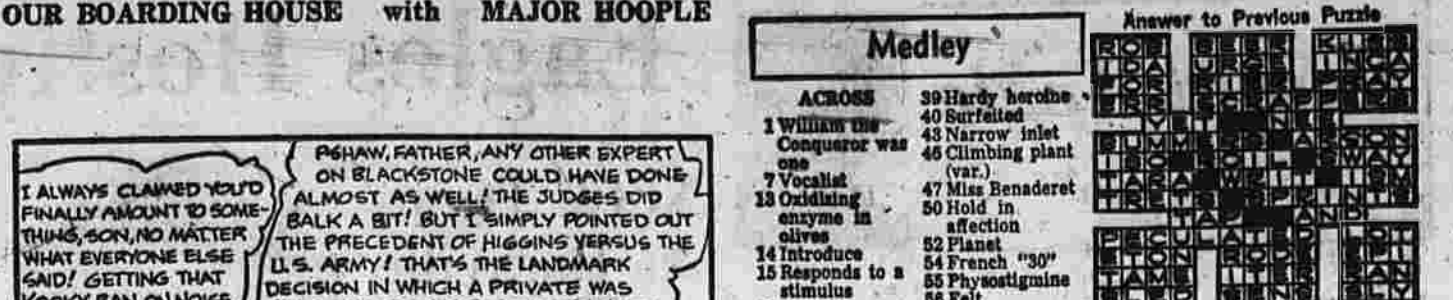

Viet Official Killed By 2 Young Gunmen

STUN CITY, ARIZ. (AP) — Vernon Sperry's decision to go to college brought these results:

After he enrolled in an art course at Glendale Community College, the school assigned him to night classes.

Sperry found the night drive to and from his home tiresome and applied for a tuition refund.

Two weeks later, the college advised that it had been dropped due to absenteeism.

Now Sperry, a 68-year-old veteran of World Wars I and II, says he has a letter ordering him to report to the draft as a school dropout.



SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Two youthful gunmen assassinated a leading South Vietnamese politician in Saigon today, and police announced that one of the assassins confessed he was a Viet Cong terrorist.

The gunman, firing at close range from a motorcycle, killed 58-year-old Tran Van Van as he rode in his car to his office.

A short time later, one of the pair was seized when he fell off the motorcycle near the residence of U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge. The other assassin escaped.

Premier Nguyen Cao Ky said the assassination showed the Communists "will resort to any cruel schemes to sow disorder" and hinder the building of democracy. There were fears that "new dissension in Ky's government might develop."

The capture is a slight youth with a pockmarked face identified as Vo Van En, 20. He was presented to reporters at a news conference at police headquarters presided over by Brig. Gen. Nguyen Ngoc Loan.

Although admitting taking part in the assassination, the youth reportedly denied firing the shot which killed the official. He said his only task was to drive the motorcycle.

He said he had orders to kill Van, but did not know why Van was chosen for assassination. The car hit a telephone pole and the accomplishment of the mission assigned to him and "if I had not been shot, I am glad to accept it."

\$10 Billion Needed To Meet War Costs

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — President Johnson estimates Viet Nam war costs between now and next June 30 will exceed earlier budget projections by \$9 billion to \$10 billion.

He plans to ask Congress next month for a supplemental appropriation to bridge the gap, he told a news conference Tuesday in his Federal Building office.

How much of the defense total is being spent on the war, no one will say.

Johnson made his announcement after devoting much of the day to conferences with Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara.

Boycott Ends At Berkeley

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — The University of California's classroom boycott was called off Tuesday night after regents threatened to force any faculty members who strike in the future.

The truce flag was hoisted after members of the AFL-CIO American Federation of Teachers and the Student Union, teaching assistants on campus, overwhelmingly voted suspension of their strike. It was labeled "conditional," however, depending on negotiations with the administration.

Student strike committees immediately called a "temporary recess" to their boycott, saying they would nevertheless persist in demands for campus reform. The committee's demands include advocacy rights on campus for certain non-union groups, and a promise that outside police never again be called to the campus.

Committee action came after some 6,000 students at a noon rally voted to return to classes providing the teachers federation called off its part of the walkout.

The student committee called for a boycott Nov. 30 after a sit-in and fight started over the presence at the Student Union of a Navy recruiting table. Alameda County sheriff's deputies were called by an administration officer and 10 persons were arrested, including six non-students.

Draft Change Is Expected At Conclave

CHICAGO (AP) — A national draft conference is expected to call today for a major overhaul of the nation's Selective Service System — with the emphasis on limiting the authority of local draft boards.

The consensus seemingly emerging after more than four days of wrangling debate on the draft and its alternatives.

The conference made it clear that they agreed, along with Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, that the present draft laws are a hodge-podge of inequities.

The Massachusetts Democrat said a new conference Tuesday night that revision of the draft will emerge as "one of the most important and significant issues Congress will address itself to in the next few months."

"There is a concern around the country about the draft," Kennedy added. "It is in the forefront in the minds of our young people."

He predicted Congress would act because the present Selective Service laws are not always fair, lack flexibility and have no degree of predictability.

To rectify this, Kennedy suggested that national standards be set up for the nation's more than 4,000 draft boards, making it impossible for one board to reject certain military jobs and another to classify them 1A, an exempt status.

Nitze Urges '41 Lessons Be Recalled

PEARL HARBOR, Hawaii (AP) — Secretary of the Navy Paul H. Nitze said today the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor 25 years ago taught the United States unforgettable lessons which must now be applied in Southeast Asia.

Speaking at services at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific, Nitze said that the sacrifice of 2,400 men who died at Pearl Harbor taught the United States it must maintain a deterrent to enemy attack "with strategic forces appropriately deployed and tactically defensive forces ready to move wherever they are needed."

He said that Pearl Harbor once again taught "that we must be prepared to preserve the peace through the use of international agreements and treaties, by military force if necessary."

Nitze reminded his audience of 900 survivors and their families to Asia, and the United States must remain vigilant. He said that the danger in Asia today is the threat posed to the rest of Asia by aggression, he added.

"Today we remember those who died at Pearl Harbor and the lessons learned, the sacrifice of so many American lives, and the need to change the laws of 1941 into 'a major power such as the one of peace and respect' in the days after Japan's attack on Pearl Harbor.
