Viet Official Killed By 2 Young Gunmen

STUN CITY, Ariz. (AP) — Vernon Sperry's decision to go to college brought these results: After he enrolled in an art course at Glendale Community College, the school assigned him to night classes.

Sperry found the night drive to and from his home tiresome and applied for a tuition refund.

"Two weeks later, the college advised me that I had been dropped due to absenteeism," Sperry said.

Now Sperry, a 68-year-old veteran of World Wars I and II, says he has a letter ordering him to report to the draft as a school dropout.

Johnson went on to say, in response to another inquiry, that he would not speculate whether the new Vietnam cost estimate plus results of the business investment survey would make a tax hike more or less likely.

"People might get the wrong impression," he asserted. "I am not saying that a decision has been made, but I am saying that a decision has been made."

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One Admits Activity as VC Terrorist

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — Two youthful gunmen, assassinated a leading South Vietnamese politician in Saigon today, and police announced that one of the assassins confessed he was a Viet Cong terrorist.

The gunmen, firing at close range from a motorcycle, killed 58-year-old Tran Van Van as he rode in his car to his office.

A short time later, one of the pair was seized when he fell off the motorcycle near the residence of U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge. The other assassin escaped.

Premier Nguyen Cao Ky said the assassination showed the Communists "will resort to any cruel schemes to sow disorder" and hinder the building of democracy. There were fears that "new dissension in Ky's government might develop."

The capture is a slight youth with a postmark face identified as Vo Van En, 20. He was presented to reporters at a news conference at police headquarters presided over by Brig. Gen. Nguyen Ngoc Loan.

Although admitting taking part in the assassination, the youth reportedly denied firing the shot that killed En. He said his only task was to drive the motorcycle.

En said he had orders to kill Van, but did not know why Van was chosen for assassination.

MADRID, Spain (AP)—Spain's College of Catholic Bishops gave final secret approval to the long-delayed law of religious liberty in a conference which ended Tuesday, reliable sources in close touch with church leaders said today.

The action removed the last major barrier to speedy passage of the law granting Spain's 30,000 Protestants, its Jewish community, and other minorities equal rights to worship and practice their faiths in Roman Catholic Spain.

The next step is formal approval by the national parliament. The proposal retains Roman Catholicism as the official religion of Spain.

SEATO Conference

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP)—The military advisers of the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization began a two-day conference today with the Viet Nam war their main topic.

It was a regular semiannual meeting to review plans for the defense of the area. Six of the SEATO members—the United States, Australia, Britain, New Zealand, Thailand and the Philippines—were represented by top military men. France and Pakistan were represented only by low-ranking officers.

Does the Abominable Snowman exist? Inhabitant of the tiny kingdom of Bhutan, an Indian protectorate, think so. In fact, to emphasize such convictions, Bhutan has issued a new series of 15 postage stamps featuring paintings of the legendary figure called "The Abominable Snowman of the Himalayas."

Reports from Associated Press writer Santosh Basak in New Delhi and the Bhutan Post and Telegraph Department say the paintings on the new stamps are based upon original Bhutanese drawings found in monasteries, doonags (forts) or on ancient manuscripts. The multicolor stamps depict three impressions of how the Snowman may look.

The natives in the area call him "Yeti." One impression is that of a staggy ape-like beast, fierce and carnivorous. Another has him as a gentle human-like figure. A third observation sees the Snowman as a large but docile creature.

It is interesting to note that although various expeditions into the Himalayas have not uncovered positive proof that a "Yeti" exists, the mountain natives insist he does. And so, let the postage stamps enter into the old controversy.

To show that postage stamps are not always rectangular in shape, I have just discussed the triangular from Bhutan. But now mention a diamond-shaped adhesive issued by Iran. This new 5-rials stamp honors the Equity Court of Iran and depicts an oval seal of the courts as the main design.

NO NEED TO SACRIFICE AGAINST POOR PLAYER

The most productive bid doesn't always depend on the cards you hold or the skill of your partner. You must also consider the bridge ability of your opponents.

Opening lead—king of hearts. East came close to bidding two hearts at his first turn and even closer to bidding four hearts later. He decided not to encourage a sacrifice bid of five hearts because South was an inexperienced player.

East's timid bidding paid off when South found a way to go down at four spades. Declarer ruffed the opening heart lead in dummy and then began to draw trumps with the ace and king. When the trumps failed to break, South was down two for a penalty of 500 points.

Against a more reliable declarer East would have raised hearts at some stage. West would probably be doubled at five hearts, thus losing 200 points instead of making a profit.

Should Make Game

South should, of course, make the game and rubber by a more careful line of play. After ruffing the first heart in dummy declarer should play a low trump from each hand.

This allows East to win, and the switch to clubs would give South can win draw trumps with the ace-king-queen and then run the diamonds.

A sacrifice bid is useful only when it costs very little and when the opponents would have made their contract. Avoid sacrificing against an unskilful player.

Daily Question

Dealer, at your right, bids 1 NT (16 to 18 points), and you are seat to speak. Holding: Spades, A-K-Q-J-10; Hearts, 7-3; Diamonds, 10-4; Clubs, K-6.

What do you say? Answer: Pass. Since your distribution is balanced you should not expect to make a game against a notrump opening bid. Hence you stand to gain only a few points by bidding and may incur a severe penalty if the hand at your left has three or four spades and 8 or more points.

Two years later, after the Coppolinos had moved to Sarasota, Fla., Carmela died of an apparent heart attack. Less than six weeks later Coppolino married Mary Gibson, a divorcee.





School Consultant Saw Vennard Twice

A consultant for the State Department of Education testified today that Dennis Vennard was referred twice to her elementary school officials because of his inability to get along in school.

The consultant, Mildred Stanton, said she saw Vennard on May 1, 1954, and the second time on March 1, 1954, when she gave him an intelligence test at Bowers School. She said he scored somewhat above average.

Dr. Stanton, who holds a doctoral degree in psychology from Columbia University, testified that Vennard was "hyperactive" and that he stuttered badly "only when something was difficult to answer." The consultant said that Vennard reacted "rather quickly" in bursts, and that his speech also came in bursts.

She said that when she saw Vennard in 1954 he was not attending school. She testified that she saw Vennard's father and mother once, and told his mother, Mae Vennard, that she saw Vennard on a psychiatric help.

A carbon copy of a record which told her telephone conversation with Mrs. Vennard was entered as a defense exhibit over an objection by Assistant State Attorney George Sturges.

Stanton testified that the record was being entered in exhibit only to show evidence of "past recollection" recorded by Mrs. Vennard talked with Mrs. Vennard about her son.

Vennard, 23, is charged with first degree murder in the hammer-death of his 51-year-old mother, Mae Vennard. If convicted of the charge, he could receive the death penalty.

"Accumulations of buried bones, such as that at Dinosaur National Monument (in Utah and Colorado) cannot provide as reliable information about the natural association of different species, the size range within a species, and the habits of the animals," Baird said.

The professor added: "Probably nothing need be added about the potential (indeed the actual) economic spin-off from such a project."

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Rains Move Inland From Pacific Coast

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. Sedona, Ariz., by Oak Creek, Heavy seasonal rains moved inland from the West Coast today, threatening southern Utah and northern Arizona with widespread flooding.

The six-day storm forced more than 500 persons from their homes in California, hard-hit of the Pacific states. California also counted more than a score of storm-caused traffic fatalities, several collapsed bridges and stalled trains.

Rains in southern Utah isolated Zion National Park and threatened a dam 18 miles north of St. George. Baker Dam on Utah Highway 18 was reported overtopping, and a state of emergency was declared in the farm area.

More than 2 1/2 inches of rain have been recorded in four days at St. George. Many farms already have been inundated and where they flooded, Kern River property damage could run into the millions, authorities said.

WINDSOR LOCKS (AP) — The U.S. Weather Bureau says a broad area of unsettled weather will affect Connecticut weather for at least the next two days.







Views Vary on Sale, Board Delays Vote

The board of directors took no action last night on a Manchester Community College request for the sale of 150 acres of Globe Hollow land for college campus use.

At the end of a 3 1/2-hour public hearing on the proposal, held at Verplank School, the board, on a motion by GOP Director Harold A. Turkington, adjourned until Monday night at 8 p.m. in Municipal Building Hearing Room.

At that time, it will consider action on the proposal, based on a ruling requested of Town Counsel John P. Shea, regarding any referendum rights involved. Mayor Nathan Agostinelli asked for the ruling.

Approximately 150 persons attended last night's hearing, and 33 of them spoke—13 in favor, 18 in opposition and two who weren't clear on their positions. The proponents based their arguments on the theme that college use of the land would be in the best interests of the town.

The opponents argued that the Globe Hollow parcel was purchased for park and recreation use and that its sale would violate the terms of the purchase.

Manchester Community College president Frederick Lowe, who was the first speaker, stressed the need for the 150 acres, based on projected enrollment, projected for the year 1975.

He said, "The present and projected enrollments exceed our widest estimates of only one year ago."

He credited the increase to the drop in tuition, from over \$500 a year, when the college was run by the state to about \$100 a year, since the state assumed control.

Manchester's Town Planner Joseph Tammany disagreed. He said that the college would need for 150 acres and recommended that only 75 to 100 acres be conveyed to the state.

He endorsed the sale of the Globe Hollow land, if it were limited to his figures, and contingent on college agreement to acquire other private land to the west of the 38-acre Nike Site, for parking and for a second access road.

He called the college a reasonable and attractive facility for the town. He recommended that the income from the sale should be used for the purchase of additional open space land or for the development of existing open space land.

Wetters revealed that private appraisers had placed a value of \$3,800 per acre for the tract. The entire 1,000 acres of the Globe Hollow parcel had been bought for \$1,250,000 in 1953, or \$1,250 per acre.

He read a report from Public Works Director Walter Furr, which listed costs of \$468,500 for sewage and \$225,000 for water in the proposed college site.

Weiss said that the state would have to assume the full cost. Furr, in his report, stated that a college on the parcel would not adversely affect the Globe Hollow water supply, if all conditions for protection were carried out.

Weiss reported that Rec and Park Superintendent Horace Murphy was unequivocally opposed to the proposed sale, and countered that opposition with a letter of approval, dated yesterday, from Rec Director William Boyle.

Boyle, who stated that he is wholeheartedly in favor of the proposed sale, called it "a once in a lifetime opportunity for the Town of Manchester."

Murphy is on record for retaining the land for park and recreation use, and warning against "nibbling" at it.

Murphy has been park superintendent since 1928 and since 1954. Boyle has been a town employee, and Murphy's seven-member Conservation Commission, with only four members present, met Monday night to take a position on the proposed sale.

He said that the four were evenly split—two voting in favor and two in opposition.

Former Manchester High School Principal Edison Bailey urged favorable action on the proposed sale, "after due consideration to the recommendations made."

He said that educational needs were more important than others and told the board, "This is the only land which, if used by the college, would not result in the loss of tax revenue to Manchester."

James Sheldon of 158 S. Lakeswood Circle opposed the sale. He was referring to a Fox Grove offer to sell to the state 142 acres to the west of Kenney St., at about \$2,300 per acre.

The college officials decided not to pursue the offer. William E. Buckley, chairman of the Library Board and former chairman of the board of education, said that he is heartily in favor of the sale.

"I feel no sense of betrayal of faith to anyone in the proposed sale of the land to the state," he said. "As conditions have changed, our thoughts of the appropriate use of the land have changed."

He too said that education is a much more important matter than recreation. Mrs. Laura Belfiore of 88 Porter St. said, "We have something to give up—something you can't measure in dollars and cents."

Some of our kids have got chances to attend Manchester Community College that they would never had had," she said. Charles Riegel of 96 Francis Dr. said, "The question is not, should we keep the college in Manchester—but where in Manchester?"

"I'll join with Horace Murphy in protecting the integrity of the Globe Hollow land," he said. Riegel, who is president of the

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He reminded the board's Republican members of a pledge in the last election to hearken to the voice of the people. "I don't see how you can justify college on Globe Hollow land if you lose it, you will be forever damned by the people," he said.

"It would be robbing Peter to pay Paul," he cautioned, "and use the land from this sale to buy other lands, such as Case Mt."

Horton, an original member of the commission, urged approval for the proposed sale, calling it "a wise investment in Manchester's future."

"To simply say that all land would be sold, as you would, is not advanced planning. To seek a balance in the character and use of land."

Frank Lupion of 21 Sunset St. said, "I am in no way opposed to the proposed sale of Globe Hollow land in Manchester."

He accused college officials of bringing pressure to bear on the board. "Don't you believe that those schemers have you over a barrel," he cautioned the board.

He called on the board for "moral courage and public awareness to withstand the blizzarding tactics."

Due to the length of last night's public hearing on the proposed sale of Globe Hollow land for Manchester Community College use, the Board of Directors postponed, to Monday night, consideration of its entire agenda.

The only item of business completed last night was the award of certificates to 18 town employees, all women, for the completion of governmental courses.

WR (Young Republicans) Club, charged, "They (college officials) want the site just to enhance their lust for establishing a community college."

Michael McDonald of 489 Main St. urged the board to reject the proposal.

"The decision on the sale should be made by the taxpayers, not by a possible 900 local residents, in the year 1975."

Mrs. Ralph Lewis of 149 Steep Hollow Lane took the floor, addressing the board, said, "I came here tonight to hear you justify the proposed sale of this land."

She urged the board to "take a good look at what you have and what you will have, and balance it out. We are even now eating up park and open space land in Manchester."

Mrs. Lewis said that research reports recommend only a little over 10 acres for the two-year college of 3,000 students.

Gilbert Barnes, chairman of the community college's development committee, urged approval, calling the Globe Hollow site the best available site in the area.

Sherwood Bowers of 75 Denning St., a former Manchester mayor, said that he didn't see any need for additional college acreage, other than the 38-acre Nike Site, already decided to the state.

He warned that the holders of the bonds for the \$1,250,000 Globe Hollow purchase might have cause for complaint, if their assets were sold from under them.

He suggested that, if the land is sold, "and I am sure it will be sold," he should be inserted in the deed, guaranteeing that the land will revert to the town, within a specified time.

Bowers said that his principle reason for appearing last night was to protect my standing on the shadow board."

Robert Von Deck of 85 Eva Dr. urged the board, "don't be bound by a deadline. There are more desirable sites than this one."

"Let's keep it in its true perspective," he said. "It is a two-story building, and the entire 100 acres is not needed."

Atty. Robert Gordon said that as a Manchester taxpayer, he was against the sale of Globe Hollow land, but that, as attorney for the owners of the Fox Grove Golf Course, he was in favor of state purchase of that site.



Events In Capital

Paintings Slashed
WASHINGTON (AP) — A man wielding a pair of open scissors has slashed four oil paintings in the House wing of the Capitol.

Capitol police arrested a man Tuesday they identified as George Palakian, 27, of Paterson, N.J., and charged him with destroying government property. Chief J. M. Powell of the Capitol police force said Palakian admitted slashing the paintings.

The largest and most valuable of the damaged works was a 20-by-30-foot painting depicting the signing of the Constitution. Done by Howard Chandler Christy in 1949 at a cost of \$50,000, it hangs halfway up the double stairway from the House floor to the gallery level. The other three paintings were "Individual portraits of distinguished Americans."

In the large painting were horizontal ribs about five feet long. The three portraits hung side by side in the corridor outside the House gallery. One, of Henry Clay, had a triangular piece about 18 inches long cut out.

A portrait of Charles Carroll of Carrollton, Md., who signed the Declaration of Independence, had the face and chest in "ribbons." The third painting, of Gunning Bedford Jr. of Delaware, a signer of the Constitution, wore a large V-shaped rip across his chest.

Capitol Architect George Stewart said efforts would be made to restore the paintings, although several of them had slashes up to two feet long. Stewart said the paintings had never been appraised and he had no estimate of their value.

Tests for Ike
WASHINGTON (AP) — Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower will undergo a series of tests that may take three or four days after he leaves Walter Reed Army Hospital Thursday for removal of his gallbladder, doctors say.

Although doctors offered no information on the nature of the tests, one common test involves giving the patient a dye containing a dye. The dye is carried through the bloodstream into the liver and then into the gallbladder, making it visible for X-ray studies.

If gall stones are present, their shadow may show up in the X-rays. This test requires overnight absorption of the tablets — and may have to be repeated requiring another overnight wait.

Draft Test Dates

WASHINGTON (AP) — Selective Service headquarters says draft-eligible men seeking deferments as college students may take qualification tests at 500 locations across the country next March 11, March 31 or April 4.

The tests are similar to those given last month to more than 110,000 men. They are prepared and graded by the Educational Testing Service of Princeton, N.J., and the grades reported to local draft boards.

Application forms for the tests will be available to draft boards after Jan. 20. The applications must be postmarked not later than Feb. 10.

A draft board may consider the tests results along with other information in determining whether to grant deferments. Test results are advisory only and taking of the examinations is optional.

Officers had no clue as to who took the bonds.

The dead man was identified as William McCollough, 48.

Heaven removed the injured and rushed them to Provident, Michael Reese and Mercy hospitals.

The elevated railroad runs south from the main business district, takes a short jog to the east at the Indiana Avenue station, and then runs south again.

The first three cars in the train had reached the Indiana Avenue station, so the passenger had no trouble getting down to the street.

The dangle car was chained to the elevated structure to keep from falling on its side.

A newsman saw a section of rail, more than 30 feet long, underneath the car that came to rest on its side, indicating it had slipped up the tracks before the plunging.

Electric power was cut off on the elevated system in the area of the wreck. Traffic halted temporarily south of Roosevelt Road, which is a mile south of the main business district.

Buses were rushed into the district to carry passengers. The CTA estimated that at least 20,000 riders were inconvenienced.

A CTA spokesman said employees recall only two instances since 1908 when cars hopped off the elevated structure.

Golf Seen Direct Link With Key to World Peace

WASHINGTON (AP) — The possibility that anthropologists have unwittingly discovered a key to modern man was almost universally overlooked until a number of studies have accumulated in government archives which show that some primitive peoples work out

a nation's peace loving quotient can be accurately established by counting the numbers engaged in golf. Preliminary investigation indicates that where golfing is widespread no dictatorship can long survive. The anonymous scientist's initial findings are impressive and are here reported for the very first time. For example, there are no hard-driving aggressive people in the United States, Red China, Poland, Rumania, Bulgaria or Albania. The number of courses in once democratic Czechoslovakia has been reduced to two and they

are primarily for the use of decadent Western diplomats. The Communists reportedly object to golf on the grounds that it creates capitalist class distinctions. Obviously, anyone who plays golf requires considerable capital. One of the most significant findings in support of the theory involves Japan. Since 1945 the Japanese have renounced war as an instrument of national policy. As matters now stand, Japan is developing golfers at a rate more than any other nation in the world. Japan currently has approximately 1,300 golf courses and nearly 300 million golfers. The mere fact that three million Japanese maintain around 1,000 courses for 1.5 million golfers. The French supposedly have a passion for reason and logic, but the fact remains that their point-of-view has been a turbulent one. This is not particularly surprising, since France has only 80 golf courses and around 7,000 golfers. Most of these golf-

ers, however, are American servicemen. Germans have never really had a national pastime. It is entirely possible that, in time, a diplomatic drive will simply be one 30 yards shorter than a foreign opponent's. For the sake of national prestige, diplomats would have to keep their eyes on the ball and develop a smooth following. There would be peace in a swinging world. Germany is another case in point. This nation, which has brought about two world wars, has only 87 golf courses and 6,000 golfers. Most of these golf-

Since farriers learned to treat wounds and diseases of horses, farrier names to include the veterinary art, according to the Encyclopaedia Britannica.

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








