

Once-Famous U.S. Hotel School for Mexican Priests

MONTREUX, N.M. (AP)—The rich and the famous once traveled to this mountain canyon to bathe in hot mineral springs and relax amid the splendor of a Swiss-style castle.

Today the hot springs still flow, but the turreted, castle-like building has been converted into a school for Mexican priests.

The 177-room main building and the 77-room annex were built by the Santa Fe Railway, six miles north of Las Vegas, before being abandoned and abandoned as a secular or diocesan training ground for Mexican priests.

Swinging French Singer Sets Dress Styles Too

NEW YORK (AP)—She looks like a gaitelle in miniskirts. She doesn't wear rouge or lipstick. She doesn't smoke.

"And I don't dance at all—except in my mind always," she said.

But at 22, Francoise Hardy, the symbol of swinging youth in France, is reported to get more fan mail than Gen. Charles de Gaulle.

The young singer composed her first hit song, "All the Boys and Girls," at 17. Since then she has met with an international acclaim as a recording star reminiscent of the cool, rise of the Beatles, Elvis Presley, and Barbra Streisand.

The French government, which she says now takes 65 per cent of her earnings, considers her a national resource.

"Everything happened to me so easily," she said. "But success forces you to be too concentrated in yourself. It makes you egocentric, and I am afraid that is now my biggest fault."

Francoise is pale and lovely and has green eyes, a quick wit, and long hair that falls around her shoulders in an autumn mist.

She came here for a visit after making her English-speaking debut as a star in the MGM-Columbia film, "Grand Prix."

Mrs. Hardy is a style icon in dress as well as in song in Europe. She once created a sensation by wearing the striped Savoy Hotel in London in orange trousers.

Heads craned, too, the other day when she entered the fashionable 21 Club restaurant here in a beige sweater, dark Italian moccasins, heavily textured white stockings, and a very abbreviated plaid skirt.

She couldn't have received the more startled glances if she had been a penguin in a striped sport jacket.

Hebron Extra School Funds Voted; Nasin Firm Wins Contract

The contract to build a 12-room school in Hebron was awarded to J. S. Nasin of William following a special town meeting last night at which voters increased the project appropriation from \$600,000 to \$685,000.

Approval of the additional funds followed a lengthy discussion of the warning and its legality and defeat of a proposal to build the school without kitchen facilities.

Richard M. Grant served as moderator for the meeting, attended by 58 townpeople.

The building committee reported on receiving two sets of bids. The first bids, ranging from \$293,045 to \$679,000, included kitchen.

New bids were sought after the school was redesigned and essentials were eliminated.

Finch of California May Be New GOP Star

By GEORGE BUCKER

LOS ANGELES, Calif. (AP) — Political insiders in California believe a new Republican star was born in the Nov. 8 election — and a lot of them don't mean Ronald Reagan.

The man they have in mind is Robert H. Finch, whose name was all but lost in the national headlines shuffle when Reagan was elected by nearly a million votes.

Almost unnoticed was the fact that Finch, running for lieutenant governor, had rocketed from relative obscurity a few weeks before election time to become the greatest Republican vote getter in California history.

Finch defeated Lt. Gov. Glenn Anderson, the incumbent Democratic incumbent, by 1.2 million votes. That was 300,000 votes more than running mate Reagan's margin over Brown.

It was the biggest majority ever won by a Republican candidate in a California election. Who is Finch? He is a rugged, handsome, 41-year-old Los Angeles lawyer, until recently known mainly as a manager of other people's campaigns.

He managed Richard M. Nixon's unsuccessful presidential campaign in 1960. Four years later he engineered the election of George Murphy into the U.S. Senate.

Finch is considered one of the keenest political strategists around. There are few who think he will be content to remain indefinitely in Reagan's shadow.

In his first bid for state office, Finch stamped himself as a practical, middle-of-the-road Republican despite the conservative tide which swept the Reagan ticket into office.

In a state where registered Democrats outnumber Republicans 2 to 1, Finch needed about 10 per cent of the opposition vote to win. He polled nearly 25 per cent.

Although a close friend of Nixon, Finch rejected the former vice president's offer to aid his California campaign, electing instead to set out on his own in quest of the No. 2 office in the state which is No. 1 in population.

Privately, campaign aides said Finch decided against Nixon's offer to help because "he did not want the voters to think Richard Nixon was still controlling the Republican party in California."

Finch counseled against Nixon's try for the California governorship in 1962 but says he took only token part in the campaign because of his mother's terminal illness, not because of any differences with the former vice president.

What's next for Finch? Should Reagan move on, he would be a logical candidate for governor. Or he could take a run at the U.S. Senate.

Publicly, Finch says he would not back for the seat of either of the state's two Republican U.S. senators.

He is a friend of Murphy and Sen. Thomas H. Kuchel, and says so long as they are in the Senate it is idle to speculate on what his plans might be. Kuchel's term expires in 1968, Murphy's in 1970.

Finch has championed the cause of party unity and a halt to ideological feuding, although he found himself at odds with Reagan on the campaign's most controversial issue, a censorship referendum known as Proposition 13. Finch openly opposed it.

The measure, the only voter initiative on the California ballot, would in effect have made the man on the street the sole judge of objectionable material.

"This was a soul-searching decision for Bob Finch to make," an aide said. "It was a gutsy position to take."

But the stand put Finch's name on almost every editorial page in the state. More than 230 newspapers opposed the stringent initiative. Finch for having the courage to stand up and fight on so controversial an issue.

The measure was defeated. Finch, ticketed for a key role in the Reagan administration, may find his own bandwagon carrying him toward higher office.

Both Kuchel and Murphy are in their 60s.

Major Sam Yorty of Los Angeles, frequently mentioned as a 1968 Democratic challenger to Kuchel, feels the GOP tide which swept the Reagan-Finch ticket into office may roll past the senior Republican senator.

Kuchel did not endorse Reagan's gubernatorial bid.

"I do have a feeling that the senator has lost touch with the people of California," says Yorty.

Finch was born in Tempe, Ariz. He Republican father served in the Arizona Legislature when it was heavily Democratic, a political feat which taught the younger Finch the importance of shrewd campaigning.

After the family moved to Southern California in 1932, the elder Finch died, forcing the son to work part-time to get through the last three years of high school.

At college, Finch organized 13 Young Republican clubs in Southern California college campuses.

His good looks and trim build are little changed from his

World War II days as a Marine officer.

It was while serving as Los Angeles County GOP chairman in 1957 that Finch became Nixon's chief lieutenant. He joined the vice president's staff in Washington the following year.

Five years earlier he had been the first Republican nominee in 26 years to take on a Democratic incumbent congressman in California's heavily Democratic 17th District. He was narrowly defeated.

Nineteen months ago he decided to seek his first state office and organized a grueling campaign which was to take him into cities in each of the 18 California counties with more than 8,000 registered voters.

Finch was well known within the party and by those he calls the "opinion makers," but his lack of visibility before the electorate concerned him.

"My main worry during the campaign," he said, "was whether the voters knew me."

His extensive campaigning won unprecedented support from hundreds of newspapers. Through both daily and San Francisco endorsed Gov. Brown, they backed Finch for lieutenant governor.

In the closing weeks of the campaign, Reagan went out of his way to appear jointly with his running mate. Finch credits this "team effort" with aiding his victory but as one Republican official put it, he helped Reagan as much as Reagan helped him.

Army helicopters Thursday brought water, medicine and food to the small town of Tulare County town of Johnsondale where 600 persons were isolated by washed out roads.

Road crews worked to open roads to Kernville in the mountains. Drinking water there and in Springville was contaminated and tank trucks were bringing in potable water.

Scores of bridges in Tulare and Kern Counties were washed away in the raging waters of the Kaweah, Tule and Kern rivers. Roads were inundated or dented.

The bodies of three flood victims have been recovered. Western Washington State was in for a little rain or snow in the extreme north. The eastern part of the state stood a chance of snow tonight and Saturday.

Western Oregon was due for rain this morning spreading inland. Small craft warnings are in effect for the coast. There was a marked contrast in temperatures in the eastern two-thirds of the nation. State News \$150 Million For Pollution Dempsey Bid

Dempsey met with officials of the State Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources Friday to consider the department's budget requests for the two-year fiscal period beginning next July 1.

The department also asked for about \$48 million for its capital programs to be used for building and grants. The current two-year budget carries only \$6.7 million for capital projects of the department.

Following the hearing, Dempsey urged that priority be given to the bonding program which is based on the recommendations of the State Clean Water Task Force. The group appointed by the governor met for several months to consider methods of eliminating water pollution.

The request for the Agriculture Department's operating budget for the next two years was \$20.5 million, nearly \$1 million more than the current budget provides.

The Park and Forest Division of the Department asked for capital funds of \$23.5 million for land acquisition, buildings and improvements in present facilities. The request is nearly ten times the current capital budget.

Operating funds requests from the Park and Forest Division totaled \$10.1 million, nearly double the current budget figure.

Romney Moves Ahead But Faces Sales Job

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP) — Michigan Gov. George Romney is making his move for the 1968 Republican presidential nomination—but there is a job of salesmanship ahead among his moderate colleagues as well as GOP conservatives.

There is California Ronald Reagan who said in an interview he is ruling out no potential candidate, is committed to none, and wants to see Romney in national action before he makes any decisions.

Reagan has had harsh words about Romney's refusal to endorse the 1964 GOP ticket headed by Barry Goldwater. The Michigan governor is known to have talked with Reagan in an effort to smooth out their differences. Reagan is likely to command California's 38 convention votes when the politicians gather to choose their next presidential nominee.

Some liberal to moderate GOP governors indicated that they, too, remain to be convinced about Romney. Oregon Gov. Wayne L. Morse, asking that his name not be used, said he wants to make sure that the advance of Romney is the actual national leadership. "Until I see committed to one."

Romney insists it will be six months before he decides whether to seek the White House. But there was little doubt about his candidacy today among other Republican governors and state party leaders.

They talked about states problems, they heard Romney urge a system of federal-state tax sharing, and they listened to a unity appeal from Gov.-elect Reagan.

Reagan suggested a national GOP convention that the Republican will say a word which the Democrats could one day use as an indication yet that the Communist would be interested in extending the 48-hour Christmas truck.

16 Marines Killed By Two U.S. Bombs

This may present added difficulties for Michigan Gov. George Romney, whose expected candidacy already is opposed by some conservative Republican groups because he failed to support GOP nominee Barry Goldwater in 1964.

The size of GOP convention delegations is determined by an elaborate formula which gives added weight to states which support the Republican presidential nominee, elect a Republican governor or elect a Republican senator in 1966.
