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State News \$150 Million For Pollution Dempsey Bid

Dempsey met with officials of the State Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources Friday to consider the department's budget requests for the two-year fiscal period beginning next July 1.

The department also asked for about \$48 million for its capital programs to be used for building and grants. The current two-year budget carries only \$6.7 million for capital projects of the department.

Following the hearing, Dempsey urged that priority be given to the bonding program which is based on the recommendations of the State Clean Water Task Force. The group appointed by the governor met for several months to consider methods of eliminating water pollution.

The request for the Agriculture Department's operating budget for the next two years was \$20.5 million, nearly \$1 million more than the current budget provides.

Romney Moves Ahead But Faces Sales Job

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP) — Michigan Gov. George Romney is making his move for the 1968 Republican presidential nomination—but there is a job of salesmanship ahead among his moderate colleagues as well as GOP conservatives.

There is California Ronald Reagan who said in an interview he is ruling out no potential candidate, is committed to move, and wants to see Romney in national action before he makes any decisions.

Reagan has had harsh words about Romney's refusal to endorse the 1964 GOP ticket headed by Barry Goldwater. The Michigan governor is known to have talked with Reagan in an effort to smooth out their differences. Reagan is likely to command California's 38 convention votes when the politicians gather to choose their next presidential nominee.

Some liberal to moderate GOP governors indicated that they, too, remain to be convinced about Romney. Oregon Gov. Tom McCall, asking that his name not be used, said he wants to make sure that the party provides the actual national leadership. "Until I see committed to one."

Romney insists it will be six months before he decides whether to seek the White House. But there was little doubt about his candidacy today among other Republican governors and state party leaders. They talked about state problems, they heard Romney urge a system of federal-state tax sharing, and they listened to a unity appeal from Gov.-elect Reagan.

Phil Burleson, one of Ruby's lawyers, said it was "too early to tell" how the illness might affect a new trial for his client.

An estimated 600-man Communist force attacked two companies of Vietnamese popular force soldiers at a training camp, 34 miles southeast of Saigon and took heavy toll before withdrawing.

The bombing strike was aimed at a suspected concentration of North Vietnamese troops on the ridge, the Viet few days.

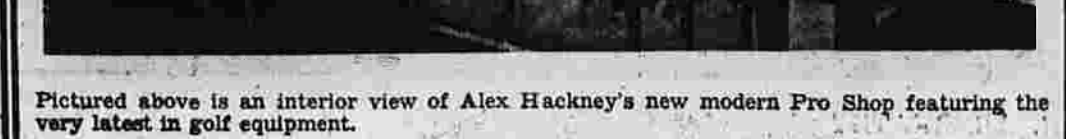

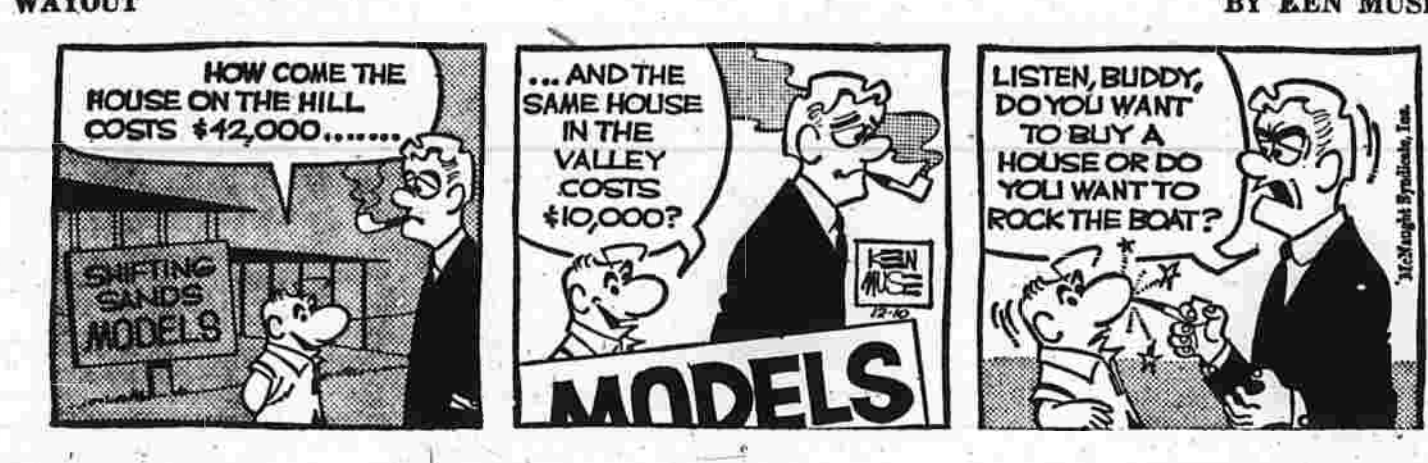

'Bonanza' Also for Women

NEW YORK (AP) — After "Bonanza" hit the popularity heights and stayed there, many a producer tried to ring a switch on the show's durable format — a family unit — and some have had considerable success.

There is a family feeling built around "The Virginian" with Shiloh Ranch. "The Big Valley" has a matriarch instead of a father-figure running things, but there are grown children on whom to hang plots.

None, however, has had "Bonanza's" success. And that success is not based merely on serving up an assortment of heroes, one of whom is bound to be popular with every segment of the viewing audience from junior to grandma.

Even more shrewdly, the show manages to combine story lines that are appealing to women while, at the same time supplying the horses, guns and flying fists that the men like.

Sunday night's episode was a typical example of the artful use of a sure-fire recipe for high Nielsen ratings.

The central figure was a nice girl who believed her incredibly boorish father when he kept telling her she was homely and bound to wind up a spinster. He kept doing dreadful embarrassing things like trying to buy her a bridegroom. Then there was a nice widower who didn't like to be bullied or bought but who was so shy he had to be blasted into pursuit of the girl.

As plots go, this old chestnut is not likely to result in any Emmy nominations, but it was the kind of happy ending Cinderella story in which women can get involved while the menfolk identify with the lads with the six shooters on their hips.

Right Formula

After a number of diffused, wandering programs and trying to cover whole music festivals, NBC's Telephone Hour seems to have hit upon a musical documentary formula that is pleasant to the eye, ear and brain.

It Had All but Comedy

NEW YORK (AP) — "The Jean Arthur Show," only 12 episodes old, departed from network television Monday night — a comedy series that had everything except comedy scripts.

Miss Arthur, who can do more with a bright line than most actresses, struggled and clowned gallantly, but no one could overcome the handicap of those dreary stories.

The final show, like the others, was given a glossy and professional production. But just when some substance was needed from the plot, everything fell into a ridiculous heap.

The plot of the final show had something to do with Mrs. Marshall — played by Miss Arthur — and her son — Ron Harper — quarreling and breaking up their law partnership. This in turn led to having them on opposite sides in a murder trial.

So far, so good, but when Miss Arthur and Harper had their courtroom scene, the supposedly invincible lady lawyer dissolved into a series of sentimental daydreams that had her adult son conducting the prosecution in various phases of his life, from infancy on. It was so bad that even the laugh track sounded embarrassed.

Next week the spot will be filled by "To Tell the Truth," a day-time panel game that has been around for years.

The season has been a rough one for some very big star names. Miss Arthur, Milton Berle and Garry Moore have received midseason cancellations, and Danny Kaye limps off at the end of the season — all victims of bad ratings.

The mass television audience may not always agree with the critics in its choice of programs, but it obviously knows what it likes. On the night last month when Red Skelton's "Clown Alley" special pre-empted Kaye's Wednesday night hour on CBS, it attracted an audience almost twice as large as Kaye did a week later.

Skelton occupied two positions in the Nielsen top 10 released Monday. "Clown Alley" was in third place and Red's regular Tuesday night hour was in fourth.

NBC's "Bonanza" was, as usual, in the top spot, followed by CBS' "Lucy Show," CBS' Jackie Gleason Show, Andy Griffith Show and Green Acres. NBC's Bob Hope comedy spe-

Delicate 'Menagerie'

NEW YORK (AP) — Tennessee Williams' drama of illusion was recreated with delicacy and perception Thursday night in CBS' two-hour adaptation of "The Glass Menagerie."

"The play is memory," stated Hal Holbrook, serving as both Greek chorus and actor in the play. But it was not a happy memory, centering around the restless, trapped young man, a prisoner of his mother's demands and his sister's physical and mental infirmities.

Living in a shabby crowded St. Louis tenement, so poor that an unpaid bill cut off the electricity in mid-dinner, mother, son and daughter all existed in their own, special dream worlds, their own refuges from unpleasant reality.

Amanda, the mother, constantly nagging and reproaching, alternately indulging in fantasy about her affluent girlhood and obsessed with finding a "gentleman caller" to court her daughter, lived in a strange world.

Laura with the crippled leg and so painfully withdrawn that even meeting strangers made her physically ill, spent her days with a small collection of glass animals and compulsively played old phonograph records.

And Tom, boiling with frustration in a menial warehouse job, wrote poems in the washroom and went endlessly to

movies to escape his dreary life. Goaded by his mother, the son invited a coworker home for dinner. Laura, panicky, became ill. But the "gentleman caller" did begin to bring her out of her strange shell. Then he utterly destroyed her by telling her of his impending marriage.

Shirley Booth gave a sure and powerful portrayal of Amanda. Barbara Loden's helpless, sensitive Laura made her seem like a frightened injured bird. And Holbrook's sullen explosiveness was just right. Pat Hingle played the gentleman caller with sympathy and understandings.

It was a moving, impressive two hours of fine theater, beautifully produced and lovingly handled.
