Hanoi Accuses U.S. Of Second Jet Raid

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP)—The Communists reported that U.S. jets raided Hanoi and its suburbs today for the second day in a row. Radio Hanoi declared eight American aircraft, including a pilotless reconnaissance plane, were shot down.

The North Vietnamese charged that U.S. pilots bombed and strafed "many quarters inside and near Hanoi" and said the raids constituted "an extremely dangerous step of war escalation."

The organ of the North Vietnamese Communist party, Nhan Dan, called on its army and Viet Cong to "avenge the people of Hanoi."

Legislators Divided Over Vietnam Truce

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senator Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield proposed a 45-day or longer truce in Vietnam for the purpose of negotiations. But two dovish proposals, three hawkish suggestions and two endorsements of present administration policy.

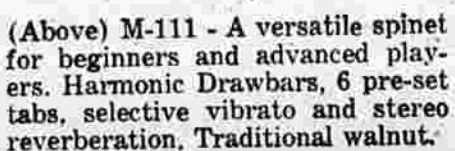

BOSTON (AP)—Southern New England ski slopes picked up 4 to 5 inches of snow today, and northern areas got considerably less, the weather bureau reported.

"Some snow depths as of 7 a.m. are as follows: Montpelier, 2 inches; Killington, 3 inches; Mt. Snow, 4 inches; Lebanon, 1 inch; Concord, N.H., 5 inches; Augusta and Portland, 1 inch; action formerly played Little League baseball.

HARTFORD (AP)—Anson T. McCook, active in state and city affairs for more than a half century, died Monday in the family home at 386 Main Street where he was born.

He was a former state treasurer, an executive aide to one-time Gov. Charles Templeton, and a Hartford city councilman. He became Templeton's secretary in 1922, and also was named to a number of city commissions. Later he served as state treasurer, filling a vacancy.

Guarantees Off

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP)—Constitutional guarantees were suspended in Venezuela Tuesday night for the first time since 1962 as part of a government crackdown on Communist terrorism.

Tests Completed

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet Union has successfully completed a series of rocket test shots into the Pacific two weeks ahead of schedule, Tass announced today.

The rocket tests, announced Nov. 29, were supposed to continue until Dec. 30.

The announcement said the South Pacific area closed for the tests was reopened to international shipping and air traffic today.

The area was more than 4,000 miles from the Soviet Union and 1,000 to 1,500 miles farther south than the usual Soviet target areas in the Pacific.

Cross Confirmed

CANBERRA, Australia (AP)—Queen Elizabeth II has conferred the first Victoria Cross of the laboratory of the Experimental Biology Institute in Moscow and granted back on the killed trying to rescue a doctor, along with other tissues wounded comrades in the face of a Viet Cong regiment.

The posthumous award to Kevin Arthur Whately of dye navy, was the third Victoria Cross conferred on an Australian and the first since World War II. It is the British Commonwealth's highest award for valor.

Whately, 28, was killed Nov. 18, 1965, when he tried to rescue a British officer, R. J. Swanton of Brisbane. Their bodies were found the next morning.

Trial Demanded

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP)—A meeting of student action fronts in Bandung has demanded that President Sukarno be brought to trial in connection with last year's attempted Communist coup, the student newspaper Kami reported today.

The student demand coincided with a condemnation of Sukarno in the armed forces Daily Mail military newspaper. The article said the president was responsible for the political-economic failure of the country and had to cancel a meeting Monday with the Tippecanoe County Planned Parenthood League.

Wives Can Visit Viet Civilians, Embassy Reports

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP)—The U. S. Embassy announced today that wives of American civilian officials stationed in Vietnam can come to Saigon to visit their husbands during the Christmas holidays.

Deputy Ambassador William J. Porter directed that wives but no children could visit in writing them in the newspaper.

Some 2,000 wives, children and other dependents of U. S. officials were ordered out of Vietnam in February 1966, as a safety precaution. Many of them live in Bangkok, Manila and Hong Kong.

Today's announcement said wives who visit Saigon must travel at their own expense and there must be a "clear showing that adequate accommodation is available."

No special planes will be arranged, a U. S. spokesman said. Travel reservations have been hard to obtain for the holiday period.

Paper Features Age-Old 'News'

LONDON (AP)—A paper given a copy while on a recent holiday in Israel. He was very impressed with it and brought home a copy and gave it to his 9-year-old daughter, Ruth.

CHICAGO (AP) — Chicago has charted a 15-year, \$4-billion campaign to rebuild large areas of the city and to seek lasting solutions to its social and racial problems.

The long-range, comprehensive plan will carry the city through the year 2000 and includes the reshaping of virtually every area of its life and basic structure.

Hailed by Mayor Richard J. Daley as "a practical design for the city's future," it provides for better neighborhoods, more housing and schools, new parks and recreation facilities, more rapid transit and faster transportation and a revitalized central core.

Most of the cost, an estimated \$400 million a year, will come from federal and state funds. Mayor Daley said the program will double present expenditures for such improvements.

In the social sphere, the plan calls for measures to bring more white families back into the city, to open more job opportunities for all persons and to expand greatly the educational system at all levels.

It provides for open housing for all of Chicago's citizens and recommends that "fair housing" laws be adopted throughout the metropolitan area.

The plan was accompanied by a specific set of recommendations for Chicago's near West Side, individual recommendations for 15 other Chicago areas and more recently, from Puerto Rico, the plan's authors state.

"The rise in status through education and employment has been far short of expectations, and access to improved housing has been restricted by discriminatory practices through the metropolitan area. There is need for area-wide action to establish freedom of residence and movement for all families."

In Chicago, the plan sets policies to provide for a "diverse, harmonious population."

—Reduce the loss of white families while accommodating the growth of the nonwhite population under the city's fair housing law.

—The use of redevelopment and conservation programs to achieve racial balance in neighborhoods threatened by massive racial transition.

—Local improvement plans to encourage established families to remain in their neighborhoods.

—The provision of "the broadest possible choice of housing cost and type to meet the needs of people, including low-income families and the elderly."

Interwoven throughout the plan are specific recommendations to reduce poverty and its effects on individuals and on the total city environment.

The physical aspects of the plan set forth goals in residential areas, business and industry, public safety and health, education and libraries, and parks and recreation.

The problems of the near West Side, the location of the Westboro District Court, City Planning Commission's first specific area proposals, are varied and complex as any in Chicago.

It was the site of racial rioting last summer and its southern and western sections are largely Negro.

Chicago's old row and Maxwell street's famous open air market are in this locality.

It also holds the new Chicago circle campus of the University of Illinois and the giant West Side Medical Center, one of the nation's largest concentrations of medical practice and education.

Hartford also was charged with drunkenness and hitchhiking when arrested Tuesday in Westboro District Court. His case was continued to Dec. 26.

Inner-Core Group to Handle Nuclear Defense NATO Chiefs Meet Without France

PARIS (AP) — Foreign and defense ministers of the North Atlantic alliance met without West Germany, Turkey, Greece, the Netherlands, Italy, the French today to put the planning and management of their nuclear defense in the hands of an inner-core group of six or seven nations.

The move, blueprinted by U. S. Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara, has a double aim:

—To give the West Germans and smaller European allies a voice in nuclear weapon policy and crisis management without allowing them direct access to the weapons themselves.

—To make it possible for the Soviet Union to join the West in an agreement to halt the spread of nuclear weapons.

The ministers met, as the Defense Planning Committee of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization to form two groups because of allied disagreements and Soviet objections that they use to pool and dovetail their information and appraisals of Communist Europe's aim and this must stop."

The NATO Council of Foreign Ministers, was formed by France's 14 partners to cope with the extraordinary situation created by President Charles de Gaulle's withdrawal of French forces from NATO's military network.

France no longer contributes men, material or money to the integrated defense system, and the allies no longer allow France to share in their military secrets.

Thus NATO today comprises two organs:

—In the defense field, France's 14 partners continue to pool and dovetail their military resources to meet any sudden Soviet thrusts or thrusts. The consensus seems to be that there is little or no likelihood of an attack from the East in the foreseeable future.

Coppolino Goes on Stand In Murder Charge Defense

FREEDHOLD, N.J. (AP) — Dr. Cost Coppolino took the witness stand in his own defense today and calmly testified that the man he is accused of strangling was in the throes of a heart attack when he last saw him alive.

Coppolino, a 34-year-old anesthesiologist, said he was summoned to the home of his alleged victim, retired Army Lt. Col. William E. Farber, by the colonel's wife, Marjorie, early in the morning of Farber's death.

The dark-haired doctor said his first examination of Farber indicated the colonel was suffering from some kind of a "cardiac episode." Farber, 50, was pale, awaiting and gasping for air, Coppolino told his murder trial jury.

After administering several emergency drugs, Coppolino said he pleaded with the Farbers to summon an ambulance.

But Mrs. Farber firmly refused, Coppolino said.

Barred by judicial ruling from discussing the case out of court, Bailey shrugged off all questions as to whether a decision had been reached.

Two defense pathologists testified Tuesday that Farber's sudden death in 1965 could have been caused by a heart attack brought on by what they diagnosed as severe arterial sclerosis.

Dr. Joseph Spelman, Philadelphia's chief medical examiner, and Dr. Richard Ford, medical examiner from Boston, further claimed that Farber's artery, or voice box, was fractured after he died — possibly by morticians or by grave diggers who exhumed his body.

Farber, a retired artillery officer, and his wife, Marjorie, were neighbors of Dr. Coppolino and his first wife, Carmela, in New Jersey's suburban Middletown Township.

Mrs. Farber, 52, testified that Coppolino strangled and smothered her husband with a pillow while she watched in a hypnotic trance. She admitted having a love affair with Coppolino before her husband's death.

On the stand Tuesday, Arthur Coppolino, the doctor's mother, testified that Mrs. Farber told her "she wanted to marry my son."

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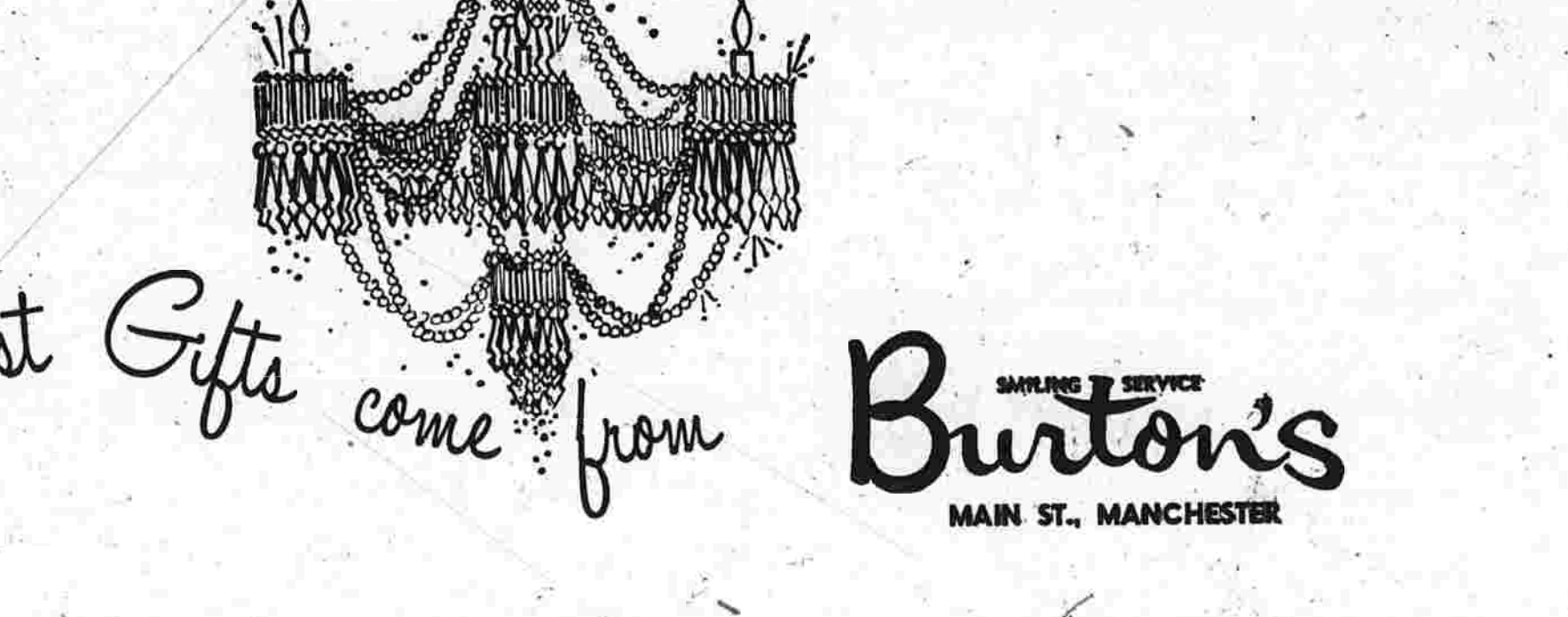

Vernon More Schools Urged In Long-Range Study

Projected enrollment figures for the next 20 years were formulated by the board of education and the planning commission. He is working with the town on the "701" program.

The board of education already has in the planning stage a proposal for another elementary school with the likely site to be that of the present junior high school on land bought by the town.

Pine recommends as the site for the second proposed elementary school the vicinity of South St. along the former city-firm district border. This giving both elementary schools the advantage of lying in the center of their own service areas, allowing minimum number of students to be bused.

A location for the proposed middle school is south of the Wilbur Cross Hwy. The intersection of Pleasant Lake and Washington Sts. is considered by the planner to be easily accessible from all future residential areas south of the highway, plus areas north of the highway in case the school's service area would need to be extended. An area of 25 acres would be needed for this purpose.

Alternatives Noted

Pine noted several alternatives exist for a new high school site, and since he projects that about three-fourths of the town's ultimate population will live north of the highway, the most logical location would be in the center of the town, namely in the Fox Hill section.

Pine noted that the required 25 to 30 acres would be difficult to assemble in the Fox Hill location unless an urban renewal project were to be considered elsewhere in the center of Rockville for this specific purpose. He further said if a considerable site could be established then it would warrant reconsideration by the school board of its present plans to add to the present high school building and to consider construction of a new high school with a capacity for 1,900 pupils.

It was the further suggestion of Pine that if a suitable site could not be established in the center than the present high school should be enlarged and a new high school site accommodating 1,400 pupils be sought south of the highway in the general vicinity of the proposed new middle school.

The plan presented by Pine also recommended that all future school sites be purchased as soon as possible so that they will be available when needed and that school plans be coordinated with the town's recreation and library needs to avoid the duplication of facilities.

4-4 Plan Sought

The board of education is working toward establishing separate school facilities housing kindergarten students, Grades 1 through 4 (elementary), Grades 5 through 8 (middle) and 9 through 12, high school. Pine pointed out, however, long-range policy would eliminate the separate kindergarten facilities when the town catches up with its building needs and would result in a 4-4-4 system.

Pine's report further pointed out that total enrollment in the local schools has increased by 87.4 per cent in only six years, with an average increase of 383 pupils per year. He noted these figures are especially remarkable when viewed in light of overall town population trends which increased by "only" 18.1 per cent during the same six-year period, pointing up the fact that the structure of most families that have recently moved into town includes children of school age.

Pine, using figures provided by Dr. Raymond Ramsdell, superintendent of schools, said in 1970 there would be 2,710 students in Grades 1 through 4, 2,189 in Grades 5 through 12. He said, "It is clear that the board of education decides to implement its proposed K-4-4 structure by 1970 there would be a definite shortage in kindergarten classrooms, middle schools and the high school."

Postponement Seen

Pine further said it appears that the board will be forced to postpone the attainment of the K-4-4 structure, thus also postponing its desired ultimate 4-4-4 structure. He based his statement on two conclusions: The official proposals call for two 2-4 elementary schools to be built in the near future, a departure from the K-4-4 structure. Even if these two schools would still be a definite shortage in capacity for Grades 1-4, through 8, a shortage for which

risk—that of prolonging the present war to its present levels—that would be involved in throwing an end to the bombing of North Vietnam on the scales for possible peace.

The risk of more war is always manly and virile and heroic. The risk of less war is classified as soft and cowardly, even though it may, in actuality, take many times as much real courage.

Strangely enough, it is usually generals and statesmen who are always in favor of prolonging the risk involved in living ever harder, and men of religion, philosophy, and idealism who are always suggesting that perhaps the risk of sparing a few lives ought to be tried, too.

The Honesty of Generations

This is, it appears, going to be one more kind of Christmas shopping season—the season of special crackdown on shop-lifting.

The police have launched special campaigns; the merchants associations are suggesting that the practice is getting worse and worse; the Yale Co-op is threatening Yale with expulsion from college if they are caught stealing; the national psychologists are helping out with their efforts to discover what it is that triggers what is so very often a sudden "compulsive" act which the otherwise normal individual involved never really intends to commit.

Comment from the head of the Yale Co-op indicated, we think, one key explanation of what goes on. His analysis detected a "casual attitude toward petty thievery."

His cure, which may or may not work, is to increase the severity of the penalty.

It is, we think, part of the "casual attitude" that petty thievery is actually considered, by some of the younger generation, a kind of indoor sport, played more for the test of skill and the moment of suspense in it than for the intrinsic value involved.

As for our judgment concerning such a trend, it rests upon the young people engaged in this twisted sport, and the members of the trucking industry who have had the privilege of dealing with him as the one who is going to miss him.

Is Justice Really Necessary?

Who, now that the Supreme Court has made it almost certain that James Hoffa will go to prison for tampering with a federal jury, is Hoffa's friend? The answer is that, although he may not have many friends, in a sentimental definition, he has a lot of people who are apparently going to miss him.

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The Risks Not Taken

What are, to try to turn philosophical for a moment, the "calculated risks" Mr. Arthur S. Flemming spoke of the other day, as this former member of the Eisenhower Cabinet and this president of the University of Oregon took office as new president of the National Council of Churches?

Mr. Flemming said, on this occasion, that people ought to be willing to take more "calculated risks" to get peace talks on Vietnam, and he criticized that some people "view this war entirely from a military point of view and are opposed to taking any risk whatever for peace."

What kind of risks?

So far as we can judge, the risks policy makers are taking to take are all of the underkill rather than the overkill variety. They feel that they have to be, waging a war, mortally in fear of appearing soft, or naive, or once the battle has been joined, too desirous of never ending it. Accordingly, they must never allow themselves to appear to be really willing to talk about peace talks, except in guarded response to some soft initiative on the part of the enemy.

They will willingly risk a thousand lives to try to gain some geographical point which, in their book, might be a step to peace through conquest of the enemy.

But they would not knowingly risk a single life on some gamble that the enemy could be brought to the peace table through some kind of cease-fire.

Specifically, in the minds of such as Mr. Flemming, the Johnson administration had no hesitation about beginning the bombing of North Vietnam when it had many powerful reasons to calculate that step might take the war out of anybody's control. But the same administration does not dream of taking now, the relatively tame kind of

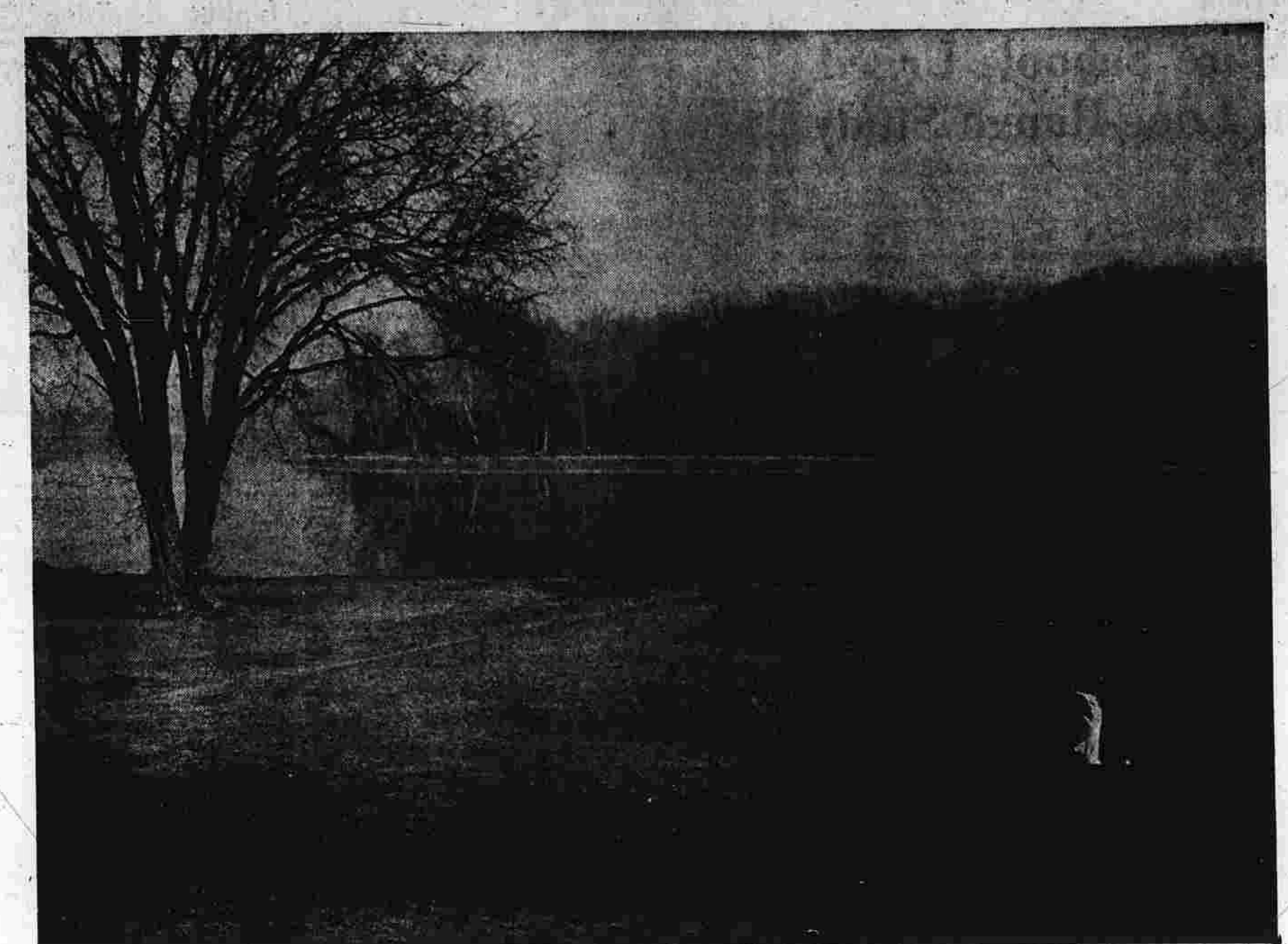
A Useful Suggestion

Making use of the abandoned New Haven Railway tracks rights, from Marmon to Old Saybrook, is a creative idea to develop in conjunction with the Connecticut River parkway proposal.

Whether the right-of-way should be used for a bicycle path, or a trail or a small automobile scenic drive is one of those questions that will have to be worked out. But Richard C. DJAKARTA, Indonesia—Neutrale General Kong Le of Laos made a secret appeal for help to Thai military officers on his way to a vacation here. The Thais vacillated here. What Kong Le wanted was military equipment from the Thais to shore up his personal standing within the neutralist force of some 10,000 soldiers in Laos, many of them defending the western end of the Plain of Jars from Communist attackers. The general has been undermanned by senior subordinates within his own neutralist camp.

But the Thais said no. Inordinately suspicious of the neutralists in any case, the Thais generally flatly refused to do business with Kong Le, even though they have a common Communist enemy. Thus Kong Le left his top-secret meeting in Bangkok empty-handed, and came here to get a much-needed rest.

He won't stay long. Indonesian officials will send him back to Laos.

WASHINGTON—In a repeat of history, moderate Republicans are on the verge of losing another political plum to the conservatives by default—this one the chairmanship of the Senate Campaign Committee.

Senator George Murphy of California, a conservative and long-time ally of Richard M. Nixon, is now the likeliest man for the job—mainly because the moderates just haven't organized themselves to fight for it. Although scores of them in 1964 when the moderates fumbled away the presidential nomination.

Last summer the prospect looked quite different. Senator Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania, Republican national chairman and a party moderate, was ready to battle Murphy for the job. Tolland School Study Panel Approved by Voters

Fifty residents attending last night's town meeting rapidly approved all five items on the ballot, including authorization of a final application for state and federal funds to defray part of the purchase price of the Cran-dall property and appointment of a study committee for a future elementary school.

The meeting was adjourned 55 minutes after it started, with most of the items raising little discussion.

Other items approved were the expenditure of an amount not to exceed \$3,000 from the Equipment Sinking Fund for the purchase of a sand spreader, road sander and a snowplow for truck attachment.

First Selectman Carmelo Zanghi stated he already has purchased the plow and spreader to take advantage of an opportunity to save \$190 on the purchase of the plow. His statement was in answer to the question raised by Democratic Town Chairman Robert Noonan.

Zanghi said he had not bought the sand spreader, but pointed out the need for it so he would not have to borrow the equipment from Coventry or Ellington as has been the practice. This will enable the town to set its own schedule for the use of the spreader and other towns. The town now has five sanders.

The motion passed by a vote of 41 to 1.

Few people questioned the need for an additional snowplow and sand spreader, but one or two watched snow swirling outside the windows of Hicks Memorial School gym, where the meeting was held.

Also approved was the transfer of \$4,000 to the general account of the budget, raising it from \$16,000 to \$20,000.

Zanghi explained the town was operating on a "small general budget" of about \$1.3 million. He explained that all town bills must be paid out of the general account, but that reimbursements are not in the General Fund.

He attributed the depletion of funds in part to the fact that Cervino, Rhodes, Bald Mountain and Anthony Roads, that was demanded by the general account, but that reimbursements are not in the General Fund.

Noonan asked how large a surplus the town has on hand before the \$4,000 is transferred.

Zanghi replied "I have been told \$200 plus, as listed in the annual report. I hope we have \$100,000 surplus when the new budget is up because we will need it."

Ambulance Appropriation
 The appropriation of an additional \$200 for the Ambulance Association account was approved unanimously after an explanation by Association president William Bridges.

Bridges pointed out that the service is being offered to residents at an operating cost which breaks down to 50 cents a family per year. He explained that members of the Association "optimistically underestimated the needs of the service when they set the budget at \$200."

He attributed the need for extra funds to unexpected repairs to the ambulance, which ran \$200 more than expected, and to doubling the amount of service provided.

The expense for each call average \$20 to \$25, while the service is provided at the rate of \$100 per year.

Republican Selectman Frank Kalas questioned the need for such a service when there are ambulances in the town, but available and asked whether the calls were limited to emergency cases only.

He also expressed disapproval of the ambulance being used to transport accident victims on the Wilbur Cross Highway.

Bridges said he also would be concerned about the highway service if it was common because it would take the ambulance away from town. The association has a fleet of three ambulances on the highway in 18 months, however, Bridges explained.

He pointed out that members of the association volunteer their services with each member logging his hours of duty time each month.

Last night's meeting authorized the filing of final application to the federal and state governments for open space funds to defray part of the purchase price of the Cran-dall property, which was approved by a vote of 41 to 1.

Purchase of property with open space funds aroused considerable controversy at various town meetings. It originally was proposed and defeated. The proposal was passed at a subsequent town meeting, which was largely attended. The funds were received 50 percent of the purchase cost from the federal government and 25 percent of the remaining cost from the state. A portion of acquisition expenses and legal fees also will be reimbursed.

The possibility of obtaining open space development funds was voted by members of the board of recreation. The funds, when available, would help pay for developing the 37-acre property for recreational purposes.

The recreation board will be responsible for maintenance and scheduling of use of the facility for the public, including a swimming program.

Pentagon Sees Russians Building Missile Supply

WASHINGTON (AP) — Pentagon sources indicate that the Soviet Union apparently has decided to develop multiple nuclear warheads to bolster its growing arsenal of intercontinental ballistic missiles.

The Soviet aim, sources said, obviously would be to neutralize any offensive advantage the United States would gain by installing the multiple warheads on its new Minuteman III and Poseidon ICBMs now under development.

High-level Pentagon officials generally were reluctant to comment on the reported Soviet program, first revealed Tuesday in a technical journal.

However, one source said, "We know they have missiles (ICBMs), and it's a standard technical option" to install the multiple warheads. "It's one of the things missile people think about."

The official, who could not be named, said "Everybody has a slightly different opinion of what they'll (multiple warheads) do for you and what the threat is. But anytime they change the sort of threat they're throwing at us, we have to take it seriously."

As envisioned by some sources, the new Soviet program apparently would consist of warheads — ranging up to one megaton in size — carried aboard a mother vehicle and dispersed after re-entry. A complicated control system would enable the warheads to be ejected at prescribed velocity and altitude after the ICBM's last stage had been spent.

The new development comes on the heels of a report by Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara that the Soviet Union was believed to be planning to deploy more long-range missiles than earlier indicated by U.S. intelligence estimates.

McNamara, speaking at the Texas White House last week, said that the United States still had a numerical advantage of more than 2 to 1 over the Russians in ICBMs. And this country, he said, would maintain its superiority over the Soviet Union for 18 more months even with its present supply of missiles.

Right now the Soviet Union is believed to have between 400 and 600 ICBMs; by mid-1968, according to the new intelligence estimates, it will have between 600 and 800. The United States now has about 1,000 long-range ballistic missiles.

What concerns some specialists is the possible implications of the added Soviet warheads on the pending U.S. decision on deployment of the multi-billion-dollar Nike-X antimissile system.

The addition of multiple warheads, if contemplated by the Russians in the near future, would amount to a major qualitative boost in the Soviet ICBM arsenal and pose a serious challenge to the effectiveness of the proposed Nike-X system.

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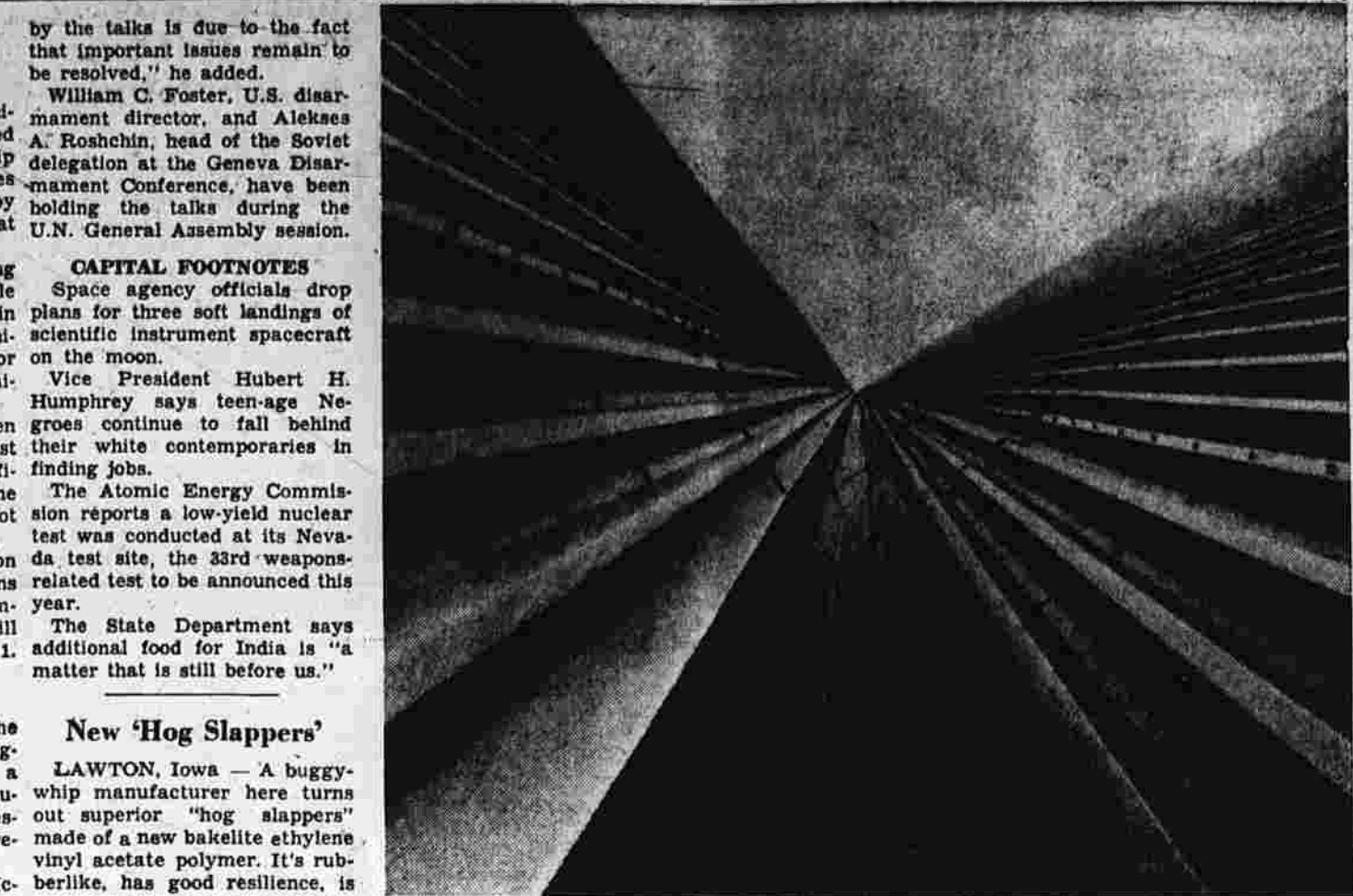

Tolland Trash Pickup, Fiscal Body Under Study by Selectmen

Two items under study by the board of selectmen were announced during yesterday's meeting of the board. They are the eventual formation of a fiscal body and the possible formation of a study committee on town rubbish collection.

Selectman Frank Kalas said the town should seriously consider establishing a fiscal body "before long" to handle the increasing financial matters of the town, including requests for funds not included in the budgets.

"These requests are taking much of our time," he stated. Selectman Carl e o Zangli agreed with Kalas, saying a fiscal board "becomes more necessary as the town continues to grow."

Zangli recommended selectmen investigate the possibility of providing town-wide rubbish collection, which would help to preserve the present dump. Town collection would afford better control over use of the facilities and the patrolling of the dump.

Many local residents present by contract for pickup of their rubbish, particularly with Lee's Sanitation Service, which offers transport unburnable rubbish to the dump themselves.

The town distributed stickers to all taxpayers about two years ago to be put on cars as a means of identifying their right to use the dump. However, the practice has not been kept up and many people moving into the town during the open hours, utilizing the services of local constables. It is common knowledge, however, that rubbish from other towns is brought there, often at night.

Selectman Stuart Danforth introduced a resolution which would allow the town to sue for damages if the town's rubbish is taken to another town's dump.

Maverick Priest Attacks Decision Halting Transfer

BALTIMORE, Md. (AP) — A Baltimore priest who opposes certain Roman Catholic Church reforms has challenged a Vatican ruling that nullifies his transfer to Italian jurisdiction.

Under the Vatican ruling announced Tuesday night in Rome, the Rev. Dominick DePaau is still bound by canon law to the Baltimore archdiocese.

Father DePaau, founder of the controversial American Catholic Traditionalist Movement which has resisted Vatican Ecumenical Council reforms, said in New York Tuesday night the decision was "illegal and immoral."

The Vatican decision was made by a special commission appointed by the Vatican's congregation of the Council, which has had charge of Roman Catholic diocesan affairs since the 1963 Council of Trent.

But according to canon law, Father DePaau said, the special commission was not competent to deal with his case. It should be handled by either Pope Paul VI or the Roman Rota, the priest said.

(Continued from Page One) Some abstentions were expected. Government employees who got four hours off, were placed in a 1 per cent withholding tax unless they voted.

Francisco's proposals, approved Nov. 24 by the Cortes, call for: —A king or a royal regent to succeed Franco on his death or retirement.

—Separation of the posts of head of state and of government, both now held by the generalissimo.

—Reducing the 84-member Cortes by 30 members, adding elected members and reducing the number appointed by the chief of state from 50 to 16.

—Permitting public religious services for faiths other than state-supported Roman Catholicism.

—Boasting the powers of the Council of the Realm, now an inactive advisory group and membership from 13 to 17 members, 10 of whom may be elected by the Cortes.

The constitution, however, continues to ban opposition political parties, a provision Franco's opponents are mounting a massive propaganda drive urging voters to support them.

Government officials said there is no legal opposition in Spain. The only group entitled to use the nation's propaganda and news facilities.

About a score of persons have been arrested for putting up anti-government posters and urging voters to stay away from the polls.

At the same time, the Viet Cong attacked a regional force platoon of about 20 men stationed at a bridge at Tam Ky and inflicted moderate casualties, a spokesman said.

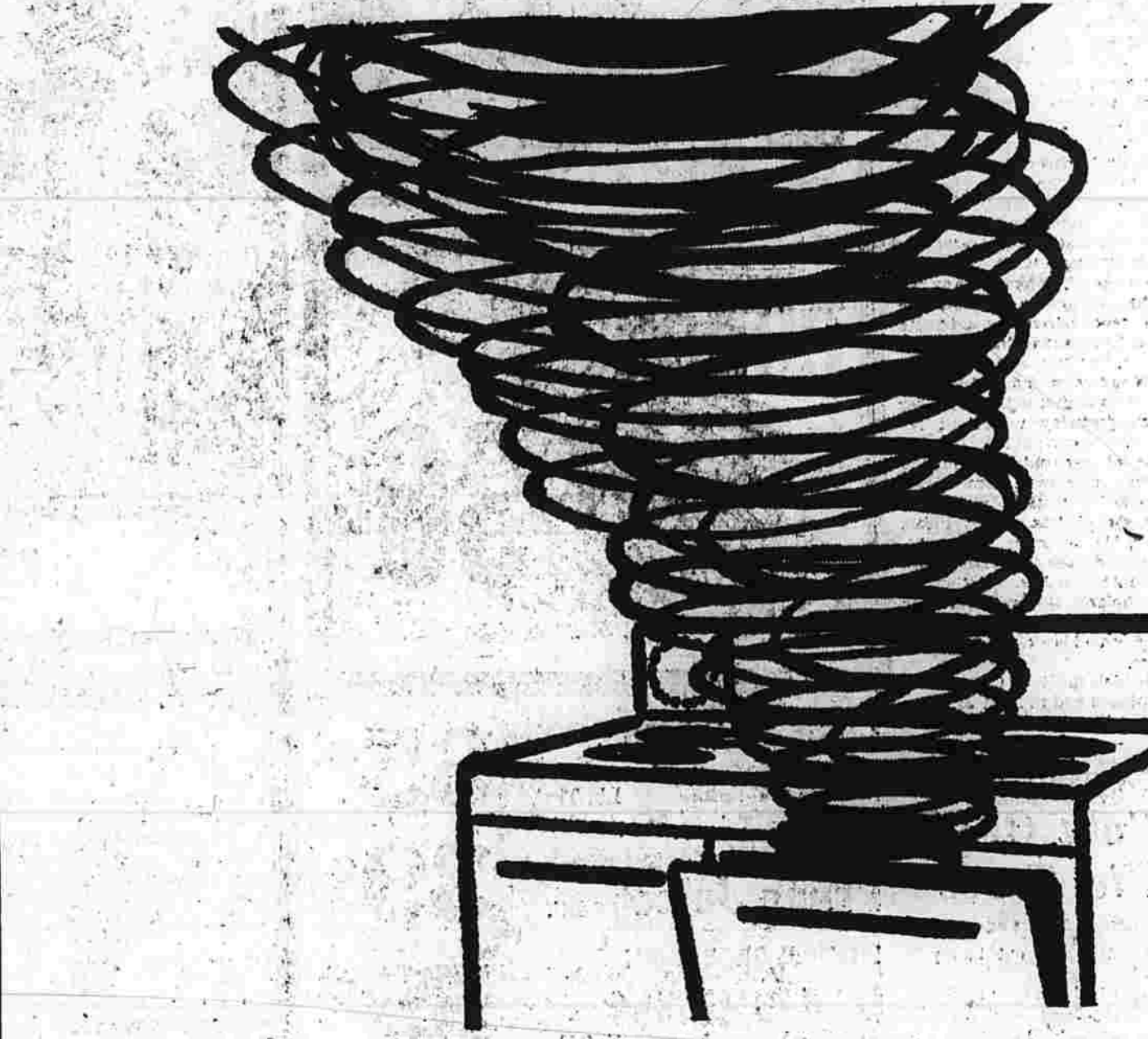

'Cold Blood' Film Script Tough Job
By BOB THOMAS
HOLLYWOOD (AP)—The secretary brought Richard Brooks a pre-written "Cold Blood" script, and the writer-director stepped it as he agonized over his chore of translating "In Cold Blood" to the screen.

The book was the work of Truman Capote, the noted party-giver, who invited Brooks and wife Jean Simmons to his recent annual ball. Brooks declined the invitation. "I'm not much for parties," Brooks, who had his work cut out for him: Making a compact, playable script out of Capote's "non-fiction novel" about the murder of a Kansas family by two ex-convicts.

"I'm supposed to start shooting in the Midwest in late February-early March, and I'm only half-finished with the script," Brooks sighed. "Frankly, I don't know how the hell it's going to end."

"Oh, the ending is there: The two guys get executed. But what is the picture going to say when it's all over? It's one thing to write a book about an atrocious crime and view it in a reportorial manner. But a film is different. These two men are guilty of a terrible deed. But how do you center the film on their lives and remain dispassionate about them? A film requires involvement on the part of the audience; no great movie is without it."

"There are a million people who will be ready to criticize me for how I treat the material. Many will want me to include everything in the book, and that would mean a 14-hour movie."

Because of his writing, Brooks hasn't been able to get around to other production chores as yet. He has cast only one performer — television actor Robert Blake, who will play one of the criminals, Perry Smith. "I found him on an old Richard Boone show," said Brooks, a brush-haired film veteran who has the look and manner of a longshoreman. "I see on the average of 30 television films a week, as well as tests and commercials; some of the best acting is on commercials."

Brooks expects to film "In Cold Blood" at the actual scene of the killings in Holcomb, Kans.; in the real courtroom and jail at Curtis City; the Kansas Penitentiary, if permission is granted; and in other locations at Leavenworth, Reno and Elko in Nevada, Kansas City, Mo., and Kansas City, Kans.; plus interiors in Hollywood.

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A follow-up letter from an anonymous correspondent noted that the North Methodist Church had Christmas tree parties in the late '80's and early '90's. An unidentified source reported that the Christmas tree idea came from Rockville mill workers who had left Rockville to work in the Millville woolen mill and became affiliated with the North Methodist Church.

Rockville's Christmas tree observance originated, according to the letter, with an orphaned little girl from Germany who worked in a woolen mill in Rockville. The superintendent was stopped and Patsy was found her crying one December day in 1890 because she was homesick for the Christmas celebration of her homeland. He excused her from work and the woman with whom she boarded her room for the night.

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Christmas 1917. 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Fires Decrease Bolton

The number of fires reported by the Town Fire Department in Bolton dropped compared with the number in October, but for the year the number is considerably higher, according to a monthly report by Fire Chief William C. Mason.

Fires in November numbered 28, as compared with 30 in October. This year, so far, there have been 133 fires, while last year to the end of November only 106 fires occurred.

The number of brush fires doubled, with 10 last month and five the month before. The number of building fires was 11 and each month.

The department performed 11 rescue and emergency operations in November. This was five more than the month before. So far this year, the department has taken part in 41 rescue calls.

The number of false alarms dropped to zero for the month of November with no fire alarm boxes being activated unnecessarily. In October three such alarms were sounded. For the first 11 months of the year, eight false alarms were turned in. In the similar time period of 1965, only five false alarms were sounded falsely.

Man's Breath Saves Piglets. MILES CITY, Mont.—A way to give artificial respiration to apparently stillborn piglets has been devised by Elmer Krehbiel, a geneticist in the federal government's Range Livestock Experiment Station here.

He uses an ordinary soft plastic funnel to adapt mouth-to-mouth resuscitation to newborn pigs. Fitting the funnel tightly over the pig's mouth and nose, he blows into the stem, forcing air into the lungs of the non-breathing pig. He says up to two-thirds of the apparently stillborn can be saved with his method.

Help! Help! WASHINGTON — There's a mild labor shortage even behind bars today. Federal Prison Industries, Inc., a government corporation that operates federal prison plants, blames more liberal parole policies and new rehabilitation programs that release some inmates to work for outside employers during the day. 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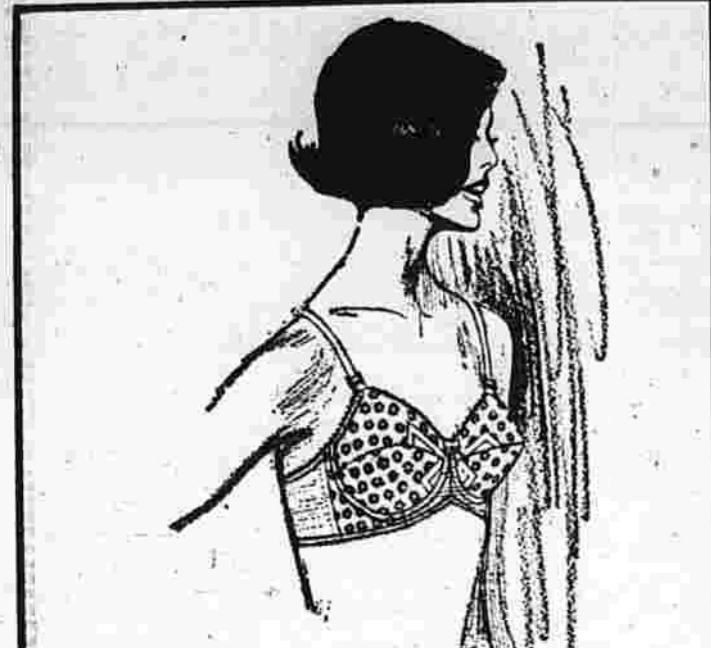

South Viet Finally Moves To Improve Army Leaders

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP)—South American prodding, the United States finally is under-taking a program to improve leadership in its armed forces.

The action comes nearly six years after the United States embarked on a major advisory program to help the South Vietnamese command and control.

For the first time, the Vietnamese command has installed a promotion system based on merit rather than political preference.

Some facets of the program are meeting resistance, sources said. Controversy swirls chiefly around measures designed to eliminate deadwood from the Vietnamese officer corps.

Many U.S. military men long have complained privately of inadequate leadership in the South Vietnamese army.

These Americans have charged that substandard field leadership has been responsible for lack of aggressiveness and grade and time spent in service schools.

New Kind of War In Mekong Delta

BEEN LUOC, Vietnam (AP)—northern edge of the Mekong Delta, the U.S. troops at Ben Luoc are evaluating conditions in the area. Men of the U.S. infantry squad fell to their knees, the platoon commander cursing quietly.

Elsewhere in Vietnam, standard operating procedure is to pour in artillery and air strikes on snipers. In the delta, however, the test units have been ordered not to do this. Too many innocent people live in the villages. To bring heavy fire down upon them might kill some of the soldiers dunked their heads in the water post to wash off the mud.

Towns Ask Bay State To Settle Water Fight

SOUTHWICK, Mass. (AP) — Two western Massachusetts towns are asking the state to settle a dispute over water rights which will affect their water supply plans 25 years or more. The land in question is much like the squabble in much like the neighboring communities of Southwick and West Springfield before the state Department of Public Health Tuesday for a decision on who has the right to tap water from wells under 100 acres of land in Southwick. Also at stake is a federal grant for developing water supplies. Like the Arab-Israeli dispute over the River Jordan, this controversy has a complex history which has given rise to conflicting claims. In 1888, the Massachusetts Legislature gave West Springfield permission to buy or take land around its town to get rid of its sewage. Harold A. Murphy of Westfield, who has been in the town since 1944, says he never had a chance to oppose it.

Egyptian Kidnap Attempt Bared by Physicist in Rome

ROME (AP) — A young Egyptian physicist was reported today to have fought himself free from two of his country's diplomats he said to have him aboard a plane for Cairo. The flight, United Arab Airlines 704, was the same one on which Egyptian diplomats tried to ship Mordechai Louk, an Israeli diplomat, to a U.S. diplomatic staff and rejected a protest by the Egyptian ambassador over the handling of the case. Louk returned voluntarily to Israel, where he was sentenced to 13 years in prison for spying for Egypt. A spokesman for the U.A.R. Embassy said the Shafiq episode was being too exaggerated. He said Shafiq had left Egypt.

Movie Producer Tiomkin On New Moscow Mission

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The first U.S.-U.S.S.R. movie project is proceeding at a brisk pace, says producer-composer Dimitri Tiomkin on his mission to Moscow in a New York, and in Paris and Florence, Italy. The position of producer in Hollywood, for 34 years one of Hollywood's most prolific writers of musical scores — Oscar, 20 nominations. But he has leaped into it with customary gusto and appears to be succeeding where others have failed, in bringing about an American-Russian film venture. Before flying on a Christmas journey to the Soviet Union — "It's a terrible time to go!" Tiomkin explained how the deal came about. He had originally been signed to produce a dramatic-musical subject for National General's proposed theater-television system, to be used in the theaters and chain's movie houses. Tiomkin came up with the idea of life of Tchaikovsky, which would be made in the Soviet Union. To his surprise, the Russians seemed interested. "They know my work, strangely enough," he remarked. "During the war, I had been with Frank Capra on the making of films for the government, and one of them was 'The Battle of Russia,' which the Russians liked. Also, they still remembered fondly 'The Great Waltz' for which I adapted the Strauss music."

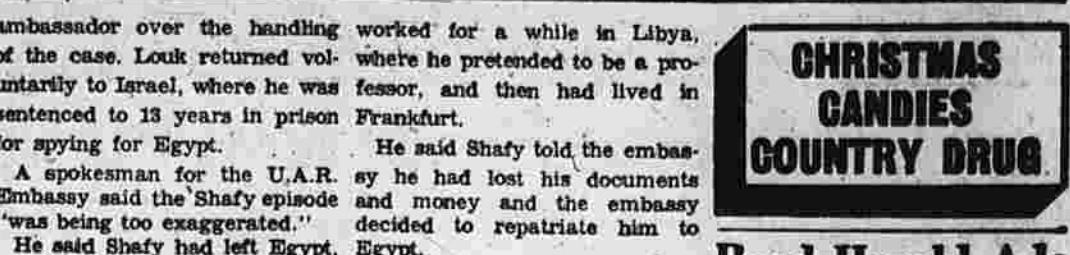

NORTHRIDGE, Calif. — A "tacile speech indicator" developed for the deaf-blind is being tested by the American Foundation for the Blind. Used on a telephone, it converts sounds into vibrations that the handicapped person can feel. In practice, the caller is asked questions that can be answered by "yes" or "no." 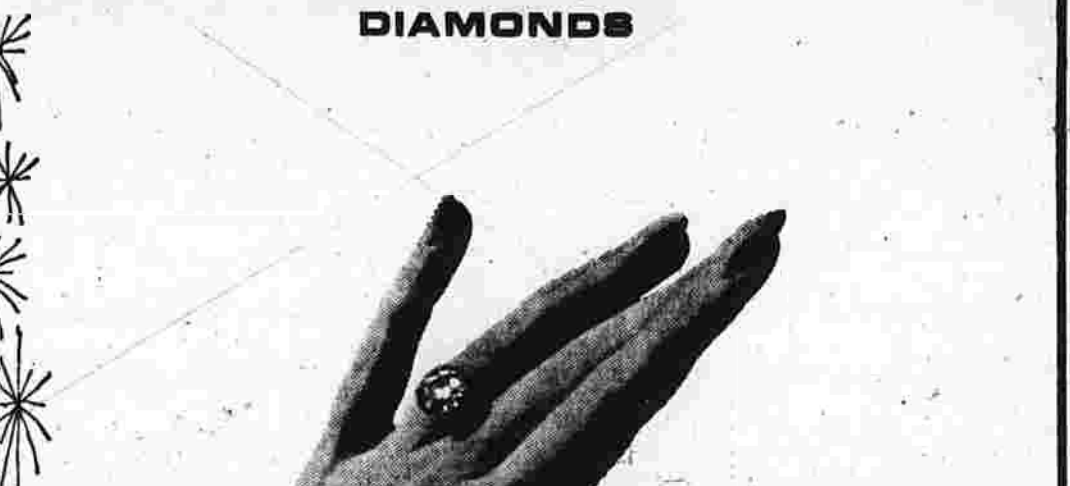

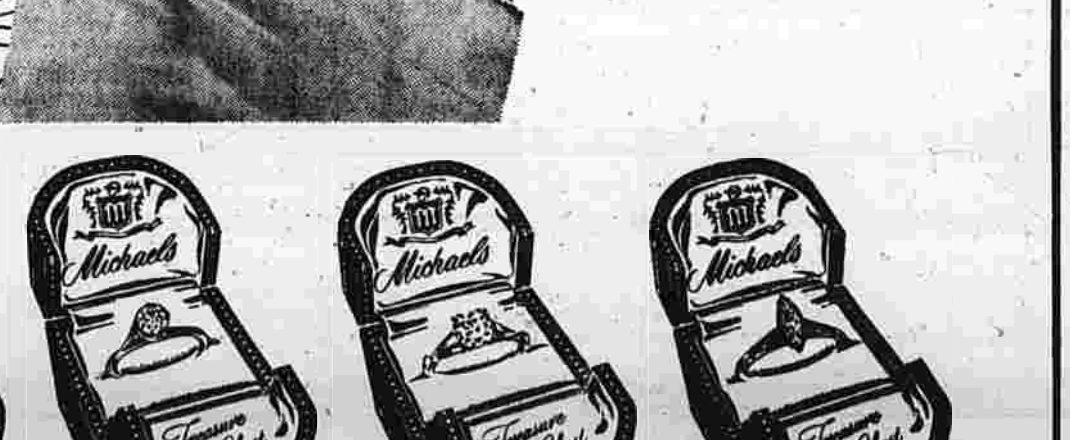
