**"THE WAY I HEARD IT"**  
 by John Gruber

Perhaps you're like me and do your Christmas shopping late. I always do. Somehow I can't seem to get into the mood until just a few days before the happy day. In that event, you may still be contemplating the purchase of a phonograph as a present to the entire family. And a very fine present it is.

Only the other day somebody asked me some pertinent questions regarding these electronic reproducing systems, and I found a great deal of confusion regarding some of the terms commonly employed in advertising: things that a prospective customer rightly should be considered before purchasing a system. So here are some facts presented in a manner I hope you can understand.

First of all the question arose, "What is the difference between 'stereo' and 'hi-fi'?" Actually, both are "hi-fi." In that they are supposed to reproduce the entire audible spectrum. The contrasting term to "stereo" should be "monaural." The actual listening difference is slight. You have two ears, and in a hall you hear music from a big orchestra, for example, slightly differently as your left ear than with the right ear. "Stereo" recording and reproduction endeavors to recreate this same effect.

This difference is most noticeable at a relatively short distance from the sound-source. In fact, it is most noticeable at a point equal to half the spread of the entire source. For example, in the Bushnell, the orchestra is spread over a stage about 50 feet wide. The "stereo" effect is most noticeable about 25 feet in front of the proscenium. This is where the conductor would like to stand but it is not practicable, of course.

Translated into terms of your living room, this means that if you put your two sets of speakers in the corner of a room 12 feet wide, the most noticeable effect will be at a point only 6 feet from the wall. From this point backward into the room the effect falls off according to the tangent of the listening angle, to be mathematical. That probably means little to you, and it means less in a hall or room. What with reverberation, absorption, ambient room noise, and so on, the formula isn't worth a darn in any event.

Have fun with that new set. Oh yes, I forgot to say, monaural records will play on a stereo player, and even vice-versa, but a stereo record will be aged in the latter case, so don't do it.

**Sheinwold on Bridge**

NEW YORK (AP) — West German Chancellor Konrad Kiesinger says his government may be able to help overcome some of the difficulties between France and the United States.

The chancellor, who announced last week that his government makes a major effort to coordinate policy with France, spoke Sunday on the Columbia Broadcasting System's "Face the Nation" television program.

Asked how Germany could be of help to both France and the United States, in view of current Franco-American difficulties, Kiesinger said: "I have always refused to accept the alternative of either the United States or France."

France, he noted in the interview, which was recorded in Bonn, is "the oldest ally of America here in Europe. And I am firmly convinced that this longstanding tradition of friendship will one day be revived."

And in this sense, "I continue to believe that Germany does not want to overtake our own capabilities and possibilities — the actual and potential — of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization."

Kiesinger said Bonn's effect "to bring about with France a core of European unity in no way has any anti-American feelings because we know only too well that European freedom depends on the alliance with the United States."

**Teens Stopped Hauling Liquor, Beer into State**

RIDGEFIELD (AP) — Troopers of two state police barracks combined over the weekend to make big checks of vehicles carrying teen-agers into Connecticut from New York state.

The checks on Interstate Highway 84 at the state line netted 29 warnings to 26 drivers under 20 years old. Among the items confiscated were nine quarts and 17 pints of whiskey and 720 cans of beer.

Cooperating in the crackdown were state troopers from the Ridgefield and Bethany barracks. It was part of a three-week-long program to halt teen-agers bringing liquor into the state from the Brewster, N.Y., area, a police said.

The drinking age is 18 in New York state and 21 in Connecticut. Drivers under 21 caught with liquor in their cars face a fine of \$50 and their Connecticut drivers' licenses. Most of the drivers were from Fairfield and Danbury areas, state police said.

During the three weeks, state police said, 129 vehicles containing a total of 506 teen-agers had liquor or beer confiscated. About 2,000 containers of alcoholic beverages were seized.

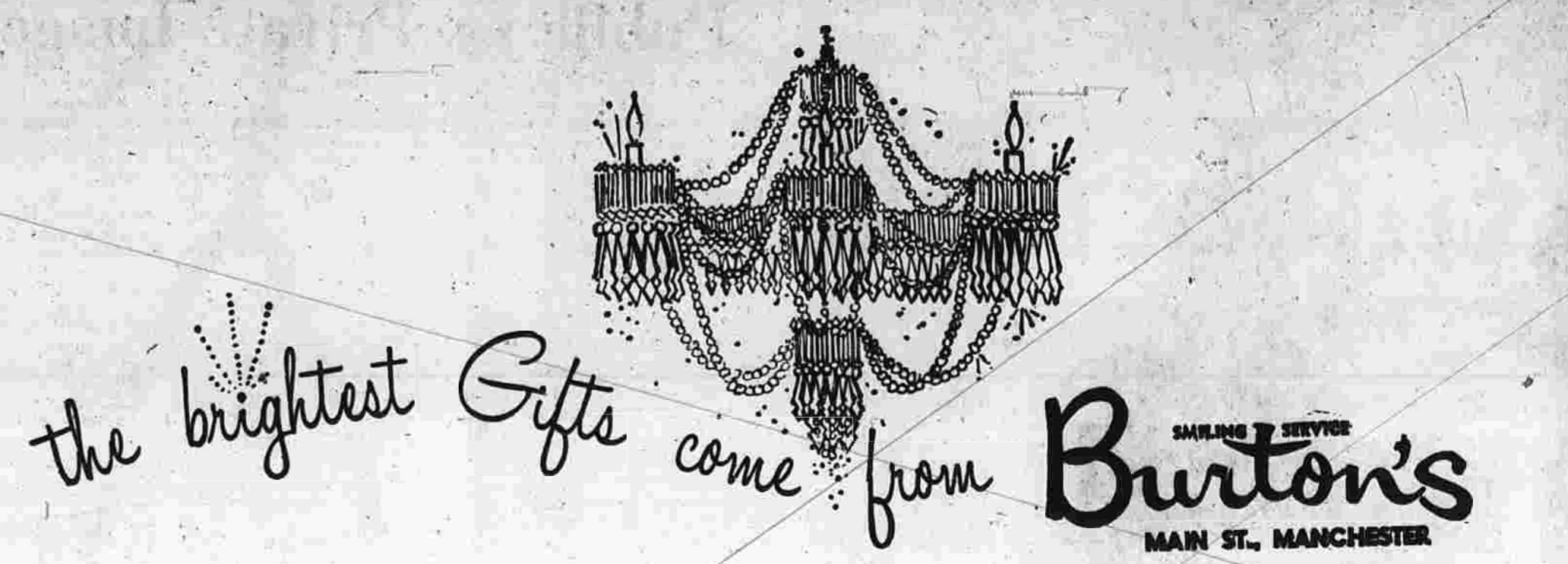

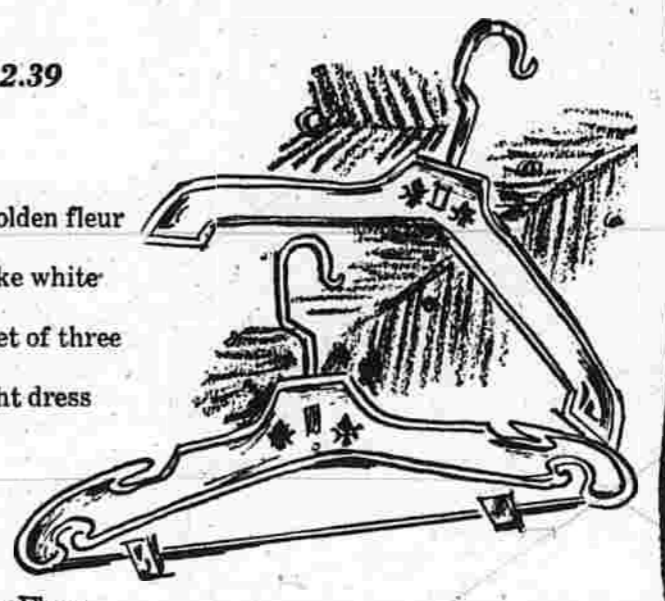

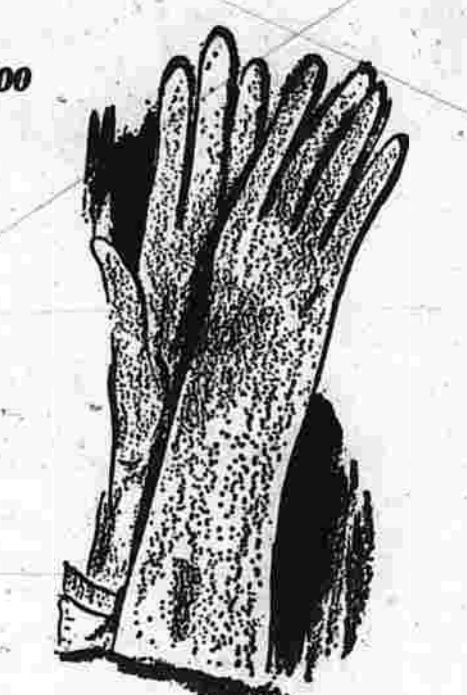

# The Real Disney Public vs. Private Image

## Brezhnev Honored Russians Drop Emphasis On Collective Leadership

**MOSCOW (AP)** — Leonid Brezhnev received praise and honors today given no Soviet leader since the fall of Nikita Khrushchev 20 months ago.

The Kremlin's emphasis on collective leadership since the fall of Khrushchev was dropped for Brezhnev's 60th birthday today. The general secretary of the Soviet Communist party was accorded honors far exceeding those usual even for a top official.

Normally only Pravda, the Soviet Communist party paper, is issued Monday. But all national newspapers published special editions with a large portrait of Brezhnev in the center of the front page.

Investing, the government's afternoon paper, came out this morning to honor Brezhnev.

All papers also carried a glowing tribute to Brezhnev signed by the party's ruling Central Committee, the government Council of Ministers and the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet.

They also published the text of the decree awarding Brezhnev the country's highest honor, the title Hero of the Soviet Union, which carries with it the Order of Lenin and a gold star

called "Comrade Brezhnev" "Comrade secretary" or what. "Don't be so formal, fellows," replied. "Just call me Dilych."

# Dying Ruby Is Bewildered By Talk of Plot in Slaying

**EDITOR'S NOTE** — Gravelly Jack Ruby today acts like a man who wants to remain alive long enough to be convinced that others believe beyond question that he "acted out of overwhelming emotion and without malice and without premeditation."

He said Jack Ruby kept referring to his movements the morning of Sunday, Nov. 24, 1964, when he was in the police and court building, and on impulse and the purest of chance, shot Lee Harvey Oswald.

"And he is bewildered that it is not plain to every one that it was a million-to-one chance that he would stumble into a situation in which it was just possible that Oswald could be shot," said Gertz.

Gertz and Earl Ruby said Jack Ruby has no recollection of the moment he shot Oswald. "That is a complete blank in my mind," said Gertz.

## Tolland 9-Member Panel Appointed To Study Elementary Needs

The nine members of the new school study committee have been appointed by the board of education, Chairman Edward J. Hendrick and Kenneth Kaynor. The committee will be responsible for studying elementary needs and reporting back to the board of education by April 1.

The study will include establishment of a public kindergarten, evaluating the middle school concept of education and relationship of education needs to its bonding capacity.

The probable need for an additional elementary school is emphasized last week when School Supt. Robert Branton stated that the new school enumeration forecasts an additional 821 children in local schools by 1968.

He foresees the need for "at least 77 classrooms to house the students in September, 1968, compared to the present 55. Both the Hicks Memorial and Meadowbrook Schools now are filled to capacity.

In his report to the town meeting, Cook recognized the need for a study committee, "which would not necessarily serve as a successor of a building committee."

He added that "we need a little rest," while warning that construction of an additional elementary school would cost about \$750,000 and "should be considered carefully, especially in light of the town's bonding capacity which is presently used up."

A portion of next year's bonding capacity already has been allocated toward furnishing the arts science wing of the high school, now under construction.

Cook's comments were made prior to release of the new school enumeration report, completed in October, which lists all the children in town under 21 years of age.

Based on the report, town schools will house 2,405 students in 1970, the first year the high school will contain Grades 9-12.

The 993-student increase over the present 1,412 students include students in kindergarten through Grade 12, and is based on children now living in town. It makes no allowances for new results.

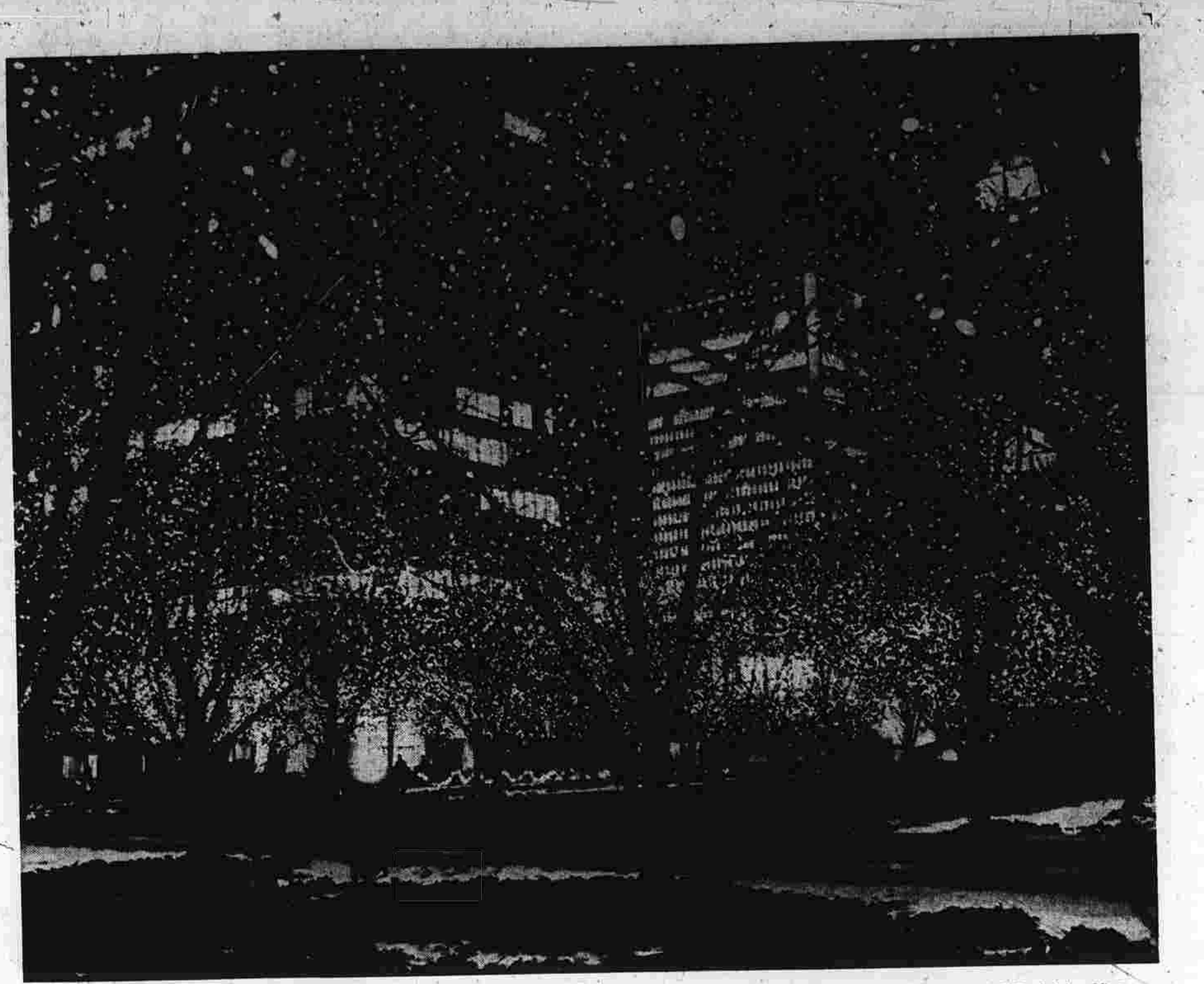

### South Windsor Librarian, Full-time Clerks Urged for School Libraries

A professional librarian for the town elementary school system and a full-time library clerk for each individual school have been requested in a report to the board of education from the South Windsor Library Council.

In presenting the report the group urged consideration of the hiring of full-time personnel. At the present time volunteer workers are staffing the libraries.

Noting that as volunteer school librarians certain limitations are recognized, the library council called for professional help as well as full-time coverage of the school facilities.

"At the present time, the elementary school librarians are in varying degrees of effectiveness due to some extent to the limitations of the volunteers who keep the libraries operating," the report said.

The report called attention to the lack of daily contact in the libraries and the poor coverage during school hours by a single person. These limitations also felt by the school administration because of their inability to direct parent library "patrons" on a professional basis.

While the hiring of a full-time library clerk for each school would not eliminate the need for volunteer help, such a step would improve the service given by these workers, the report said.

Closer supervision and teaching the operating system would also be a benefit if a clerk is hired, it said.

"The hiring of clerks would solve all the problems, a clerk without a librarian still leaves out four vital aspects of a library: a book specialist, a teacher, a library administrator and a professional expert," the report noted.

The report stresses that a point is being reached when it is necessary to obtain a certified librarian for the school system.

Librarian's Job The responsibilities of a librarian would include covering all books, evaluating and seeking out the best books with reference to subject matter. This is of tremendous importance, the report continued, and neither school administrators nor teachers have the special knowledge that this requires, nor the time to devote to this work.

A professional librarian would buy reference materials such as indexes or bibliographies only as these items are needed and prevent duplication of such materials within the school system.

"In this and other areas a librarian would work in cooperation with the high school librarian and the town librarians," the report said.

Other functions of a librarian for the position would be to secure necessary equipment for the elementary libraries and oversee and standardize the operation of the individual libraries.

Orientation of teachers regarding libraries and teaching library science to certain classes might also be included in these duties.

Programming library periods and working with teachers to obtain the maximum usage of all materials would be another important area covered by a librarian.

Miss Marguerite Thomas and Miss Evelyn Redfield, members of the library council and teachers in the system noted that a library is an integral part of every school and is able to do much toward increasing the effectiveness of teaching.

The range of service which could be offered by the library covers fact to fiction, independent reading, reference material and audio-visual material.

"The libraries in the South Windsor elementary school system have expanded so greatly during the past few years that something else is needed beyond the system of volunteer help now in effect," the report said.

## \$75 Million Industry Definition of Skiers As Broad as Figures

NEW YORK (AP) — Upon its now is a season commonly referred to as winter by some but more often as the ski season by some-where between 2.0 million and 2 million Americans.



He is Robert V. Borello, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Vincent F. Borello of 123 Eldridge St.

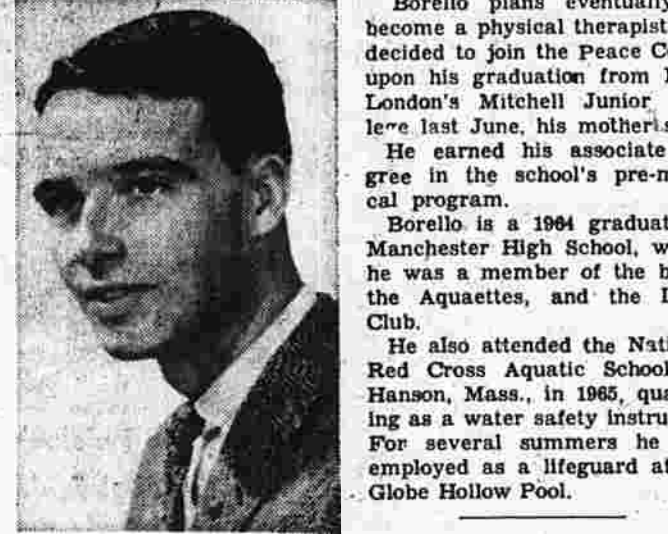

# UN Adjournment Periled By Peacekeeping Quarrel

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — A new quarrel over U.N. peacekeeping operations threatened today to delay adjournment of the General Assembly's 22nd session.

The Soviet Union and France warned Saturday night that a new quarrel might result if the assembly adopted a Canadian resolution setting guidelines for the special committee on peacekeeping operations. The two countries said the resolution was illegal.

A conciliation commission of 11 nonaligned countries sought to head off a showdown. One member said the commission wanted to withdraw the resolution. Another said it was trying to work out amendments acceptable to all.

The assembly postponed a vote on the resolution until today. It appeared that this would run the session into Tuesday, the scheduled closing day, and frustrate the hope of Assembly President Abdul Rahman Faisal of Afghanistan that he could end it a day ahead of time.

The basic issue was the same as that which paralyzed the General Assembly two years ago: whether the assembly with its majority rule, shares the constitutional authority of the Security Council, which has a big-power veto, to arrange for peacekeeping operations. "The United States and Britain say it does. The Soviet Union and France say it does not."

In 1964, the Soviet Union and France were two years behind in paying peacekeeping assessments. The special political committee recommended both resolutions Wednesday night. Each had better than the two-thirds majority needed for approval in the assembly. Diplomatic sources said the Soviet and French diplomats warned privately that if the assembly adopted the Canadian proposal, they would reconsider whether to stay on the peacekeeping committee.

**Council Forces Grim Christmas Road Death Toll**  
CHICAGO (AP) — A Christmas weekend traffic death toll of between 600 and 700 persons was estimated today by the National Safety Council.

The holiday period covered is from 4 p.m. Friday, Dec. 23 to midnight Monday, Dec. 26.

The council said that in a non-holiday period of equal length at this time of year the toll would be about 250.

Most of the nation's drivers will be on the road at some time during the weekend, the council said. It will raise the travel volume to 7.6 billion miles from 7.3 billion for a nonholiday period.

Howard Pyle, council president, urged all drivers to exercise caution, to be alert behind the wheel, and to adapt driving practices to weather, road and traffic conditions.

**Events In Capital**  
Major Threats Cited  
WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Joseph P. Clark said the major threats to American democracy are what he called the "military-industrial complex" and the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Central Intelligence Agency.

The Pennsylvania Democrat said the military-industrial complex "is evidenced in very high quarters by our strong support of military regimes in various parts of the world and by the enormous impact which the military and their industrial partners exercise over public opinion and on the members of Congress and the Senate."

Interpreted Sunday on the Mutual Broadcasting System's radio program "Reporters Roundup," Clark described the CIA as an agency "which we've got to have, which practically every other nation has, which I think is our country's most serious threat to the danger line."

"The third danger," Clark said, "is evidenced by recent disclosures in the newspapers of FBI and the threat they pose to the privacy of the individual citizen and the further threat they pose by way of blackmail, direct or indirect, on anybody who has the effrontery to say anything unkind about Mr. J. Edgar Hoover" — the FBI director.

**Shriver, GOP Agree**  
WASHINGTON (AP) — Sargent Shriver, director of the Office of Economic Opportunity, agrees with the Republican congressional leadership that the antipoverty program should be closely scrutinized.

This is the only way, he said, in an interview, to eliminate misconceptions that have cropped up in connection with various antipoverty projects.

Shriver said no one has suggested abolishing specific projects.

"They just say, 'Let's take a hard look at the war on poverty,'" he said. "If they will look close, hard and carefully, the program will come out O.K. If they can find any places where money has been wasted, let them cut it out."

HAVANA (AP) — Prime Minister Fidel Castro declared Sunday that Communists in Vietnam are showing the world that it is possible to resist and conquer "imperialist aggression."

Addressing a graduating class of 420 agricultural and ranching technicians at Havana University, Castro said, "Few small countries like ours, also threatened only to miles away from the imperialist monster, can appreciate the extent of the Vietnam example."

He accused the United States of intensifying the Vietnam war by bombing residential areas of Hanoi, a charge repeatedly denied by U.S. officials in Washington and Saigon.

"Our own embassy located in the center of Hanoi informed us that only a few hundred meters have the embassy bombs fell from capitalistic planes," he said.

Saud, 46, and his entourage of 40 wives, children and staff moved into a hotel overlooking the Nile Sunday for a "brief" stay.
