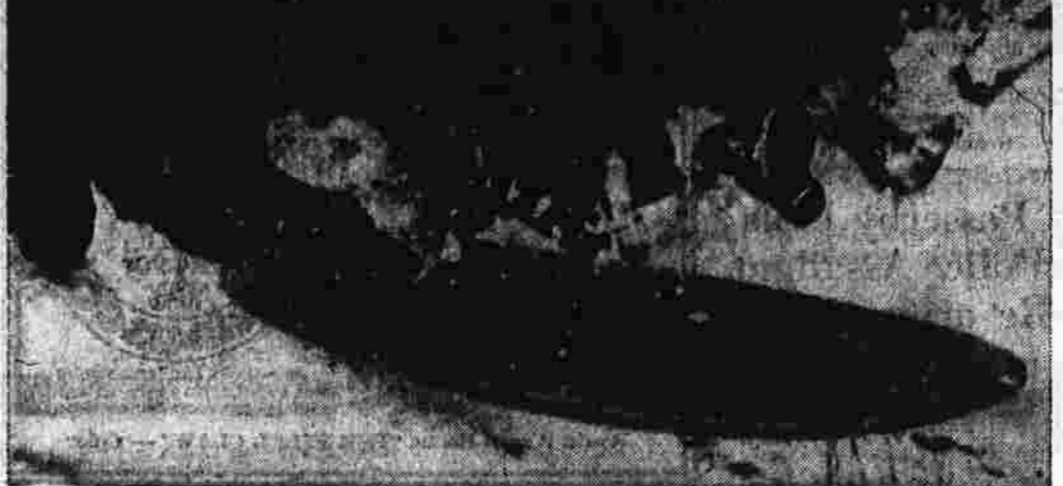

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Delay Said Possible In Trial of Turcotte

The trial of Richard E. Turcotte, 27, charged with first degree murder in the fatal shooting of his wife, is assigned for Tuesday in Superior Court of Hartford, but indications are that the trial will be postponed to give counsel more time.

When the trial starts, it will be against the background of news which is appearing without legal precedent in Connecticut. On a motion by defense counsel the Manchester firm of Lesser, Rottner, Karp and Pfeiffer, a court stenographer was present at the usual secret Grand Jury hearing. The Grand Jury brought in an indictment against Turcotte.

Defense counsel Sanford Pfeiffer made several motions before the hearing which were denied. Turcotte was present at the hearing and was represented by defense counsel present at the Grand Jury proceedings. Turcotte was responsible to have a stenographer present. That one was granted, but the court also ordered that the record be impounded.

The defense counsel is expected to make an attempt either before the trial or after.

Dodd Hearings Voted Top State News Story

Allegations of misconduct against Sen. Joseph P. Dodd and the ensuing investigation by the Senate Ethics Committee, constituted the top news story in Connecticut in 1966.

The Dodd affair even outlasted Connecticut's customary winner of the top spot in the annual poll of member newspapers and broadcast stations of The Associated Press in Connecticut.

It was only by two points that the Dodd story took first place over politics in the poll, tallied on the basis of 10 points for first place votes, 9 for second, etc.

While politics received the most first place votes — eight — Dodd's three — the story about the Democratic senator from Connecticut took first place on the basis of more second place votes.

Washington columnist Drew Pearson and Jack Anderson made a series of allegations against Dodd. As a result, Dodd himself called for the Senate investigation and filed a libel suit against the columnist.

The Senate hearings are scheduled to continue.

Gov. John Dempsey's stunning defeat of Republican challenger Clayton Gargan by a 115,000-vote margin in the November election was the second choice.

The politics category also included the heated campaigns and the aftermath of the election.

A story of a mass slaying in New Haven, in which six persons lost their lives, was rated third. Arthur J. Davis was arrested in the slaying and sentenced to death in the electric chair. He has appealed.

Fourth in the poll was the six caused by author Ralph Nader of Winford, whose criticism of auto safety standards led to legislative hearings. The hearings prompted auto manufacturers to make safety changes in their models.

The slaying of 30-year-old housewife Dorothy Thompson in Barkhamsted, and what developed later, was the number five choice. In this bizarre case, a victim's mother-in-law first was accused in the slaying but was committed to a mental hospital. Eventually, Harry Sobberg was arrested in the slaying and was tried. But the trial ended with a hung jury, and a new trial is forthcoming. And the mother-in-law, against whom a warrant eventually was dropped, died in the mental hospital.

Another shooting rampage — London — Britain is the one in which only the gunman world's largest exporter of agriculture — wound up in sixth place. The gunman, who had been sought in the slaying of a woman, was fired wildly in the lunchroom of the Winchester. Cont.

THE U. S. APOLLO Project to land a man on the moon for 1970 is, in reality, a global cooperative venture. Satellite stations in various parts of the world are an absolute necessity for success. To show the effect of the cooperative nature of the Apollo Project, the Ascension Island has just issued a new set of four stamps to honor their new satellite. The stamps are the British Crown Agents Stamp Bureau.

A stamp in this set has the same design but in different denominations. Depicted is a "ground receiver" in the foreground with the moon and the satellite in the background. A vignette portrait of Queen Elizabeth appears in the upper right corner.

AIRLIFT TOTAL 48,000

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—The U.S. government-financed airlift has brought nearly 48,000 refugees from Cuba. About two-thirds of the arrivals settle in cities other than Miami.

Switzerland's 1966 Pro Juventute semi-postals this year depict various animals. The 5 cent stamp shows a bear, the 10 cent a squirrel, the 20 cent plus 10 a fox, the 30 cent plus 10 a hare, the 50 cent plus 10 a rabbit, and the 60 cent plus 10 a hamster. The Pro Juventute Foundation in Switzerland receives 10 per cent of the additional value on each stamp and the remaining 10 per cent goes to other youth welfare organizations.

Here's a note to collectors of foreign stamps. All of the items mentioned in this column may be purchased at your local stamp dealer or department store that has a stamp and coin section. First-day covers of foreign stamps are most difficult to obtain directly from foreign post offices. Therefore, it is suggested that you go to your local stamp dealer and get the covers and stamps of your choice in person.

To commemorate the development of agriculture in Zanzibar and Pemba, the Zanzibar Post Office has issued four special stamps with symbolic designs. The 20 cents blue and sepia and the 2.50 shilling green and sepia show the planting of rice in a paddy. The background is a tractor. The 30 cents magenta and sepia, and the 1.50 shilling orange-brown and sepia depict two hands holding rice grains.

DA NANG, Vietnam (AP)—The Bob Hope Christmas show — with its jokes, girls and songs — left Vietnam today after Hope told troops in Da Nang the war is costing so much "that it must be cheaper to rent one."

The comedian's troupe wound up a series of performances for American servicemen in South Vietnam and Thailand in a drinking rain. Despite the weather, 11,000 Marines, airmen and sailors turned out.

Hope told the servicemen that "one of these days you guys are gonna go out there and have to open a can of corned machine gun."

From Vietnam, the troupe moved to Clark Air Base in the Philippines.

Tuesday the performers braved a pitching flight deck and 30-mile wind gusts to do for on the carrier Bennington in the South China Sea.

Two of the ship's crewmen, Robert H. Grimm, 28, of Salineville, Ohio, and Gerald A. Hampton, 22, of Modesto, Calif., participated in the show. Grimm introduced Hope and Hampton with "You're Just Too Wonderful" to Miss World, Rita Faria of Bombay, India.

Special Election

BRIDGEPORT (AP)—A special election to fill the seat left vacant by the death of State Sen. John J. Reihan is scheduled for Jan. 2.

Gov. John Dempsey issued a writ Tuesday calling for the election.

Reihan, a Democrat, won election to his fifth term last month, defeating Republican Abraham L. Gordon by an overwhelming margin in the new 2nd District. Reihan died Dec. 2.

The GOP is expected to renominate Gordon, while the Democrats are expected to put up Raymond C. Lyddy, a former state representative.

Five States Remain Free Of Holiday Road Deaths

Death bypassed the highways in five states during the Christmas holiday weekend, and traffic safety officials credited the achievement to intensive driver education, increased police patrols, bad weather and the spirit of Christmas.

Palatka dropped substantially in several other states, and some of them with large populations.

There were no traffic deaths reported in Idaho, Alaska, Nebraska, Delaware or Rhode Island.

Latest figures show that 84 persons lost their lives in the three-day Christmas weekend, and 720 persons were killed during Christmas cheer. Last Christmas four persons died on Nebraska roads. The 1966 Thanksgiving four-day holiday set an all-time record for any holiday period in five states during the Christmas holiday weekend, and traffic safety officials credited the achievement to intensive driver education, increased police patrols, bad weather and the spirit of Christmas.

"We had some inclement weather and that slowed people down," he said. "And I think the spirit of Christmas prevailed a little. People are getting into a little better driving, a little more courteous."

China's Mao Faces Purge Path Dilemma

 TOKYO (AP)—The attitude of Communist leaders toward any person who has made mistakes in the past should be one of leniency in order to help him change and start afresh and not one of coercion, unless he is incorrigible.

Chinese Communist Chairman Mao Tse-tung made this statement in 1958. Today 28 years later, Mao at 78 faces a dilemma: Should he continue to try to persuade his former liege apparatus, President Liu Shao-chi, and Communist party secretary Teng Hsiao-ping of the error of their ways? Or should he dismiss them as incorrigible and exclude them from the corridors of Chinese power?

The white-haired Liu and the short, Napoleonic Teng were subjected Tuesday night to the scorn of 100,000 young Red Guards at a rally in Peking at which Liu was branded the "Khrushchev of China" and the "Boss of capitalism."

Wall newspapers in Peking disclosed that Liu and Teng allegedly confessed to anti-Maoist activities before the party Central Committee last October, slightly more than two months after Mao had moved Defense Minister Lin Biao into Red China's No. 2 spot as designated heir.

Liu also admitted opposing Mao's industrial "Great Leap Forward." But instead of being punished, he emerged in April 1960, as president of China, replacing Mao himself.

Did Mao have to step aside because of the mistakes of his "Great Leap"? Did he turn over the direction of the country's day-to-day operation to Liu in October because of economic disaster, involving chiefly around his incorrect direction of the revolution purge in June and July, while Mao was out of Peking?

Liu's admitted mistakes go back to 1946. Their number and seriousness raise the question: Was he forced on such occasion to indulge in self-criticism? Or has he, through control of the party machinery, been able to defy Mao for two decades without being scratched?

It appears that in 1958 he favored a coalition government with Chiang Kai-shek, and a long period of peace for China. The implication is that Mao did not and sparked the belligerent wing of the party which welcomed the late U.S. Gen. George C. Marshall provided.

This bit of information will be of interest to American historians and politicians long at odds over whether the Communists plotted war while they talked peace. When all the facts are available, it may be seen that the United States got closer to success in the abortive coalition talks than anyone at the time realized.

This "mistake" by Liu was being made during the time he was in Yenan, the Communist center in north-west China. Yet this did not prevent persons high in the party from denouncing him for the time to a foreign newsmen — that Liu was Mao's designated heir.

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Goldwater's Mother Dies At Age of 91

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP)—Josephine Goldwater, 91, matriarch of a pioneer merchant family that produced a Republican candidate for president, died at her home Tuesday.

She outlived her husband Barry, who was twice elected to the U.S. Senate before losing the 1964 presidential election to Lyndon B. Johnson.

Another son is board chairman and chief executive officer of Goldwater Department Stores, a chain in central Arizona.

"God has been good to me," she said after Sen. Barry Goldwater was nominated by the Republicans for president in 1964.

Privately, she told friends she didn't raise her son to be President of the United States and seemed relieved when he lost.

Still alert but in failing health since she broke her hip in a fall Aug. 24, she lived in the North-east Phoenix home where Barry and Robert Goldwater, her sons, are. She has a daughter, her daughter, grew up.

Her husband, Baron Goldwater, whose department stores at Prescott, Ariz., and Phoenix were among the first of their kind in the West, died in 1928.

When his mother died, Barry Goldwater and his wife were flying to Hawaii for a long stay. A turn-around flight was arranged to return them to Phoenix.

Private funeral services will be held Thursday followed by burial in the family cemetery.

The survivors include 11 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren. Robert, a president of the family stores.

The Goldwaters were together Christmas Day, celebrating gifts stored beneath a tree in Mrs. Goldwater's bedroom. A private nurse was with her when she died.

A native of Bowen, Ill., she lived in Nebraska as a girl. She and Baron Goldwater were married in Prescott in 1908 by her brother, Morris, who was mayor of that city.

Mrs. Goldwater was West-ern head of the American Red Cross during World War II and was a medical philanthropist. She gave \$25,000 to help build a hospital at Shaw-Lee, Ariz., which has since been named for her.

Nothing but Disadvantage

Bare Bosoms Seen Doomed By Mid-Age 'Establishment'

LONDON (AP)—Milady's derwear, and diamond bracelets bare bosom is likely to remain popular but it's unlikely to become fashionable.

Now who's putting on that front?

A man, of course. He's John Taylor, editor of the British magazine of Male fashion, Tailor & Cutter, the voice of Saville Row.

In a book entitled "It's a Sami, Medium and Outside World," Taylor says that he has done a lot of research into his subject.

He says the topless dresses of the mid-1960s were really nothing new. He reports that in the year 1796, the Champs Elysees in Paris came to an interested halt one afternoon as two interestingly unclothed young ladies strolled beneath the leafy trees. One girl wore only a length of gauze, but tastefully draped. Girl No. 2 strolled beside her friend with her bosom entirely uncovered.

Those who witnessed the public reaction to the topless dresses in 1796 will be less than surprised at the repercussions in the Champs 168 years before.

Here's what the author says happened:

"Furious to see public convention so lightly disregarded, the surrounding populace caught its breath only deep enough to voice plain hostility. It then advanced upon the pioneers in phalanxes of high judgdon—or perhaps to obtain a clearer view—until the two ladies went in fear of their side."

Taylor says the two girls were acting under the leadership of a pair of Parisienne fashion queens—Madame Recamier and Tallien, who had been, for the best part of a decade, encouraging the use of less and less, and more and more transparent clothing.

On this subject he says: "Gossamer silk, muslin and a variety of other see-through materials, were quite unpopular with the proprieties of un-

Industry Still Can't Fathom Complex Consumer Minds

By JOHN CUNIFF
 NEW YORK (AP)—Despite smaller expenditures for research into the inner area of the consumer mind is an economically important today as the explorations of the heavens.

For years, consumer psychologists have been treated with great solemnity. Now we're finding that the consumer isn't a simple automaton that responds to stimuli as a light bulb responds to electric current. He is more complex.

The consumer's intentions cannot, it seems, be placed in the same category as business plans are made formally, often in a board room. Consumer plans are made informally, over the kitchen table. There's nothing definite about them.

What the consumer feels the researcher he intends to do, studies show, isn't always what he actually does. This we constantly find the word "unexpected" associated with consumer purchases.

In recent weeks, automobile sales are unexpectedly low. Christmas sales were not so great as merchants had hoped, and some retail prices fell, partly because of consumer resistance.

In just the automotive area, consumer resistance already has delayed or canceled sales that surveys had indicated would occur.

This has led Henry Ford II, chairman of Ford Motor Co., to say: "The biggest question mark in public confidence is the general economic outlook. If confidence is restored, purchasing power next year should be ample to support car sales of nine million or more."

"But if people are still worried about rising living costs and the possibility of higher tax, short work weeks and lay-offs, many of them may put off buying a new car."

Ford's statement shows a great deal of uncertainty now about the consumer mind, a contrast to the self-assured statements from the auto people earlier in the year.

Does the consumer ever admit to himself that he won't buy the car he had intended to?

How he admits it to a researcher? Does he ever make a clear decision? Or does he just let the matter drift?

Recognizing this uncertainty, the National Bureau of Economic Research, a reputable private group, has borrowed the term "weather forecasting" from weather forecasting.

Instead of referring to consumer intentions, the bureau attempts to determine the probability that the consumer will follow through on the stated intention.

One of the first findings was that most purchases in a group of households studied were made by those that had the most researchers they had no attention to buy.

Once More A Roosevelt Memorial

We suspect that when the Roosevelt family and the fate of the first proposed Franklin D. Roosevelt Memorial, which happened to be one we thought we liked, we began stirring up people against the event, we didn't know that matter what that proved to be. That may be why, so far as we can see, the only thing the new design has ahead of the original and much-debated "Instant Stonehenge" design is its apparent possession of advance approval from the Roosevelt family, so it won't again be so conspicuous in its effort to dictate what this nation's memorialization of an individual who was the nation's President shall be.

Other than its apparent possession of advance approval from the sources which killed off the original design which won the original open competition, it is doubtful that the new proposal has any really attractive improvements.

The basic material for the memorial has been shifted from concrete to granite, and granite is, one would grant, a nobler material.

But, whereas the concrete slabs of the original design could be concealed in a certain classic simplicity of form, the granite of the new design is to be cut into sharp looking darts and stand which look, in representation, like sharp clips from a milliner's scissors. And, on the central granite "core" a new thing in memorialization is to be tried, in the execution of an actual engraving of a portrait of President Roosevelt on the smooth, polished face of the stone, so that there the giant picture will be forever and ever. And, in place of the texts of famous Roosevelt speeches that were to be printed on the concrete slabs of the original design, the new memorial is to believe it or not, to offer periodic tape recordings of the actual Roosevelt voice, making the actual speeches.

From the start, of course, controversy over the Roosevelt memorial has been a matter of taste. Pardon our obviously poor taste, in considering the new design something less, and something tasteful, in comparison with the original.

In Defense Of Warm Bodies

It has been noticed that there has crept into the professional shop talk among employers of people an incorrect use of a certain term, namely "warm bodies," which is being employed in a connotation it is possible to regret and resent.

When you hear an employer talking about the "warm bodies" he is talking about the hardships of the employment situation, and about the fact that, in his desperate search for somebody to do the job, he is talking about the fact that he has been forced to put on his payroll a number of people whose actual usefulness and degree of performance are not what he would like. He is not talking about people who are not warm figures, but creatures of flesh and blood and potential animation, even though he, the employer, doesn't know how to use them.

"How's the help situation?" one tycoon will ask another.

"Oh, I've got a lot of warm bodies," the employer will answer sadly.

It is possible to resent the use of the term "warm bodies" in this connotation. There is a great deal that can be said for warm bodies. They are, in the first place, warm. They are sometimes very nice to have around you on a cozy evening by the fireplace. They are very useful on zero winter nights. In addition to such advantages, warm bodies are also a sort of common denominator among us all, and, therefore, fit subject for derision from none.

Power And The Public

A hearing whose outcome is of signal importance to virtually all New Englanders—businessmen, laborers, or just plain users of electricity—opens in Washington today before a Federal Power Commission panel.

Northeast Utilities, the organization comprising the Western Massachusetts Electric Co. and two other firms, seeks approval of its plan for a \$70 million pumped-storage hydroelectric plant at Northfield Mountain on the Connecticut River.

The companies' argument for the million-kilowatt facility is obvious enough: An expansion program is afoot, and with it a campaign to bring down New England's electric rates which now are way above the national average. If power costs drop, industry will find the region more attractive for investment, development, and growth. For simple economic reasons that affect everyone, the project is justified.

But as set apart from others like it by the pains the companies have taken to anticipate objections and accommodate them, particularly in the fields of conservation and recreation. The plan is not only to preserve the natural beauty of the mountain and the river at its foot, but to create facilities that improve their usefulness to outdoor enthusiasts. An aggressive job of public presentations and explanations has been rewarded by a vast array of endorsements, even encomiums, from conservation officials, members of Congress, and other interested parties.

That, of course, is as it should be. The plan is an excellent one and its implementation so far has been a success. It should be a model for all future developments of its kind. If licensed by FPC, the Northfield Mountain project will be a monument to creative, responsible public-utility planning and the increasingly important role of conservation-conscious public whose demands are getting close attention. If there is any hitch in the plan, it is in the Northeast Utilities and a lot of the rest of us will be asking: What does a power company have to do to do? —SPRINGFIELD UNION

The open space program was discussed by Joseph A. Ward Jr. of the Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources at an organizational meeting of the Conservation Commission last night.

Westmoreland candidacy is the hard historical fact that no general election has ever been held in the United States since the Civil War. It was a native of South Carolina whose politics, like General Eisenhower's, was always been muted, would return to the U.S. not as a victorious field commander but as the on-the-spot leader who could (as the Republicans would be sure to say) "finish the job" that President Johnson had been unable to finish.

As for himself, the general has consciously tried to stay out of political speculation. But recently in Saigon, intimates of the general confided that although he had never mixed in the politics of Washington, he might have to do so in the future. It was neither a promise like General Eisenhower's, nor a threat, but a simple statement of fact.

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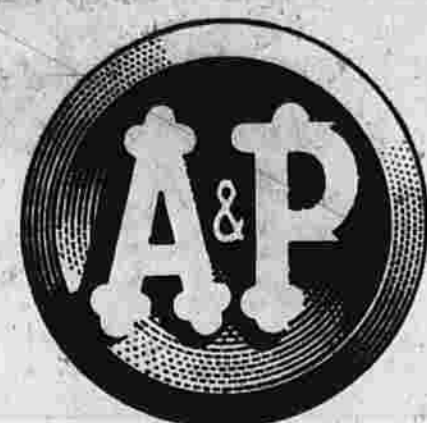

Manchester: Past Places, People

SERVICE ON THE DOORSTEP
Meat and fish, kerosene and tea, eye glasses and yard goods came to the housewife in the days before the supermarkets and the second car—or even a first car in most families.

Albert D. Kravitz, 44 Ridge st., remembers from his childhood the vendors and peddlers who went from door to door in horse-drawn wagons or on foot to find and serve customers. He shares his memories in the following account.

Fresh Meat and Fish
Regular sights on the street in my boyhood were the butchers, bakers, milkmen and fishmen.

The typical butcher's cart was usually white, for sanitary purposes. I suppose, while solid in structure and not so high or large, it was built in the style of the chuck wagons or covered wagons of the Western trail. The butcher went from house to house to his regular customers. While one could usually see him coming and he was waiting for him, when he came up to the house he shouted "Meatman" at the top of his lungs. Before the customer got out to the road, he had propped up the back of his cart, dropped the chopping-block tailboard, hung up the swinging scales, and was open for business. He didn't have a vast variety of cuts of meat but he would manage to slice off a special piece from a big chunk to the satisfaction of his customer. The most kept variety in the winter months, but, as I look back, I am sure that the springing of ice used in the summer months was more for effect than efficiency or sufficiency.

The fisherman's cart, in the summer months, was another matter. His cart was a water-tight affair. If you didn't happen to be at home when he came, you could follow his trail by the fish smell for some time. He was often a nocturnal peddler, coming late Thursday night so that the fish would be fresh for Friday—fish day. As children, we would peer out of the bedroom window at his lantern-lighted wagon as he passed by. His dress was on the eccentric side, with sleeve protectors half way up his arms, a rubber apron, and half boots. In most cases the horse knew the route and passed from one house to the next with a single "Get up" from his master. His fish horn had a singular sound.

Milk, Butter and Eggs
We still have milkmen, but I remember the ones who used to come to the door carrying a big can with a quart measure for a milk picher to the door. The milkman pulled the cap off the milk can, turned it upside down, measured out a quart or two of milk, and poured it into her picher. It was an inconvenience for the milkman; so some enterprising dealer conceived the idea of milk tickets. The tickets were used over and over until they were worn out, going from hand to hand, from house to house. By all medical standards, we should have had an epidemic, but we never did.

The butter and egg man I remember had a two-horse rig. On rare occasions a sleigh might also have two horses in heavy snow, or the old black hearse might have two horses. But most teams about town were drawn by single horses.

The eggman who came to our neighborhood had his wife with him. He drove the horse, it was the wife's job to deliver the eggs at each stop, carrying her basket to the door, holding a conversation, and making the sale. Her husband sat on the wagon seat, reins in hand, smoking a curved-stem pipe. The curvature seeming to parallel his mustache. They were German people and stopped at German homes. The most unforgettable impression was their immaculate appearance. He wore a dress, every brass buckle on the harness sparkled in the sunlight.

Ice, Kerosene, Laundry
The ice man was a summer visitor. In our town, the wagon was usually painted red with yellow lettering. Since it was a seasonal occupation, the job of delivering ice was sought after by college students, first to get the wages and secondly for the muscular development derived from carrying the pieces of ice. When making delivery, they invariably misjudged the size of the piece of ice which would fit the refrigerator so that it required clipping, with chips flying all over the hallway or kitchen. On a really hot day, it was fun for the youngsters to follow the cart and beg small pieces of ice to suck on.

The kerosene man had a cart mounted with a hand crank and a hose of incredible length. With the advent of piped gas, kerosene was on its way out of use. I can remember standing at the sidewalk and wondering how the man managed to make a living. I remember the horse's usual food whether the horse had been carted or not. I remember the ones who used to come to the door carrying a big can with a quart measure for a milk picher to the door.

The wash man (he wasn't yet called the laundry man or cleaner) came on Mondays. That was wash day and nothing could change it. The soiled clothing was set out in a round tin tub on Sunday night to be picked up early Monday morning and returned, wet, in the tub in time to get it dried that day in the yard. It was sheer tragedy if the schedule wasn't met, with threats to do it oneself or to change wash men if he was late. After Trouble, our

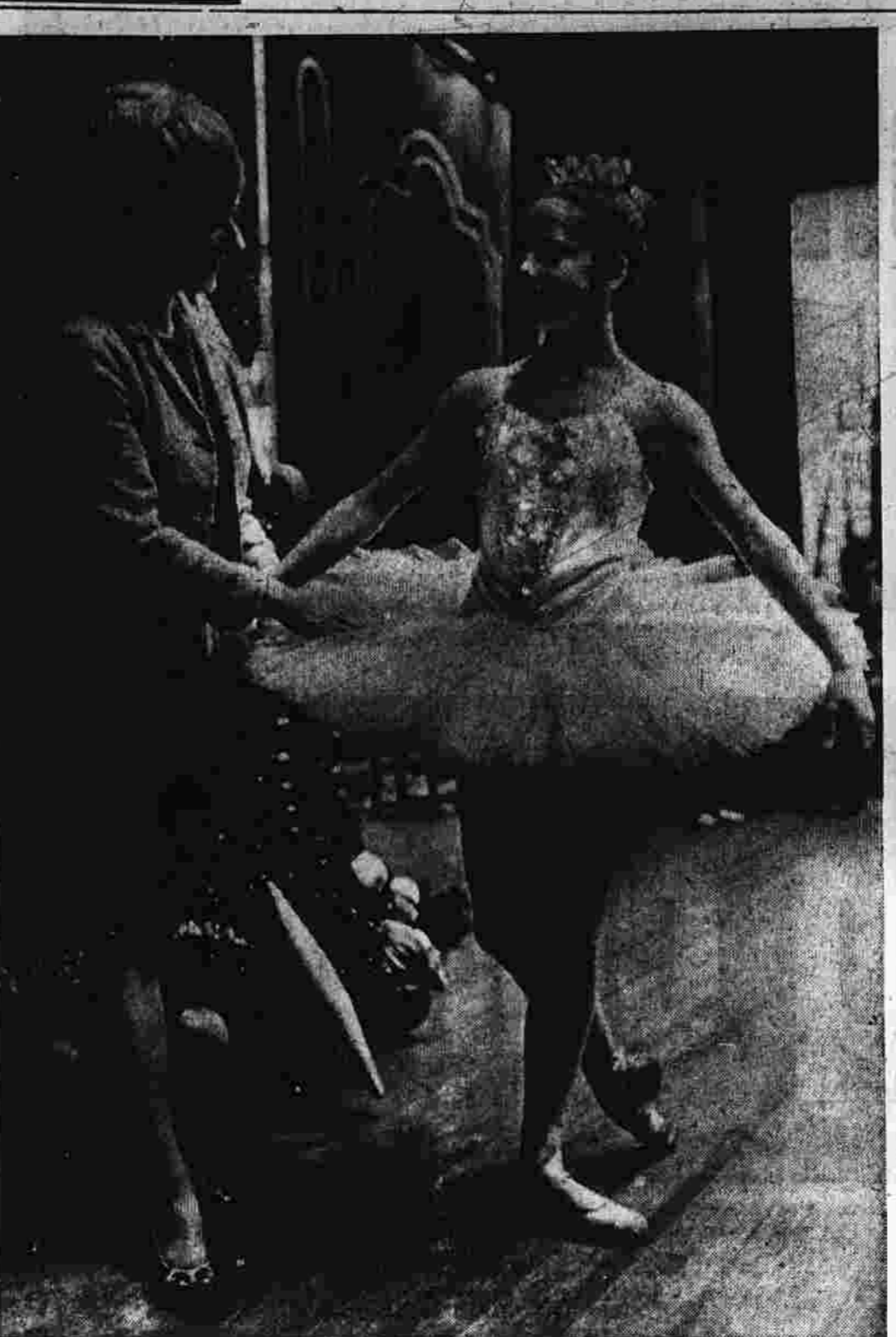

The Manchester Board of Public Works decided last night to appoint a 15 to 20-year payment sewer subcommittee, to review the proposed new rules for sanitary sewer assessments, before taking any formal action.

The Chamber subcommittee consists of Jack R. Hunter, chairman; Andrew Analdi, Alexander Harris, Jack Davis, and Frank Gambolati.

Many of his suggestions have already been accepted by Fuses, and others are being considered. On the subcommittee's recommendation, the outlet charge, for tying into down-stream sanitary sewer improvements, will be pegged at \$100 per dwelling unit; at \$500 per developed acre of land for institutional buildings, such as schools, churches, etc.; and at \$500 per acre of residential property, based on Metropolitan District schedules, were \$200 for the dwelling unit, and \$1,000 for the town developed-acre charge. Town 14.

Soldier's Medal
Army Cites Russell For Vietnam Heroism

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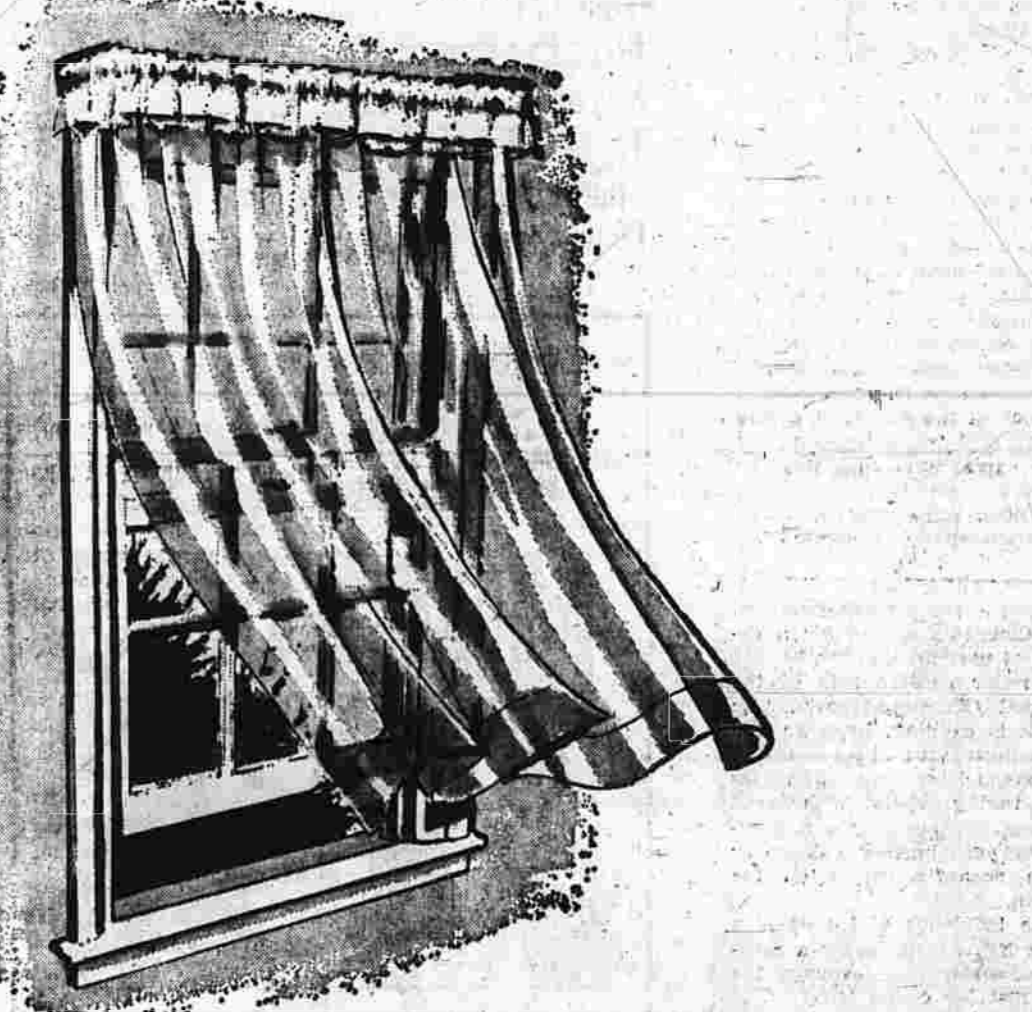

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New Brace Of Celluloid Epics Ready

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The year's end has brought a brace of super-specials for moviegoers. "The Sand Pebbles" and "Grand Prix," filmed for a total cost of \$22 million. Both seem to be winners.

Epics seem to arrive in pairs nowadays. One week in autumn brought premieres of two films with religious themes, "Hawaii" and "The Bible." Despite poor reviews, both seem to be faring well at the box office, especially "Hawaii."

How we have a couple of high-powered adventures, and they have been made by expert and loving hands. Robert Wise, who created the most popular movie of all time, "The Sound of Music," deals with different matters in "The Sand Pebbles." This time he depicts war and revolution, as if in answer to critics who assailed "The Sound of Music" as saccharine.

The setting is 1926 China. The figures in the foreground are the crew members of an American gunboat, the San Pablo, which attempts to protect the lives of missionaries and other Americans caught in the internal strife.

Admirers of Wise's musicals — he also made "West Side Story" — may have forgotten that he can also handle realism in an expert manner, as witness "Somebody Up There Likes Me" and "I Want to Live." He shows his skill in "The Sand Pebbles," especially in a prize-fight scene and in a shipboard battle.

Wise makes full use of the Chinese landscapes — actually Taipei and Hong Kong. But he is also an actor's director, and he draws from Steve Quayle a beautifully sustained and naturalistic performance. The rest of the cast performs with skill, and Candice Bergen in her first big role proves she has star quality.

"The Sand Pebbles" suffers the malady of all film epics, over-length. The message, which has something to do with the dangers of nationalism and the futility of war, is sometimes clouded. But it does interfere with enjoyment of the film as a rattling good adventure.

"Grand Prix" covers the more contemporary scene of the speed-car world as definitely as it can possibly be done. The audience is placed in low-slung racers and whirled around Europe's classic tracks at 180 miles an hour so that you get the thrill, the danger — and almost the smell — of the race.

Director John Frankenheimer, whose love of racing is obvious in every scene, has used the Cheernara screen for a degree of participation far beyond the roller coaster ride of the original Cheernara movie. The result is exciting, hypnotic and sometimes vertiginous. Frankenheimer wisely varies the racing shots with split screens and sometimes a fragmented one, hurrying a dozen or more separate scenes on the screen.

The brilliance of the camera work helps move along a rather pedestrian plot involving the love matches of the drivers. The international cast is attractive and able, but some of the members seem unsure in the English language.

Area Weather
WINDSOR LOCKS (AP) — The U.S. Weather Bureau says skies will be fair over Connecticut most of today but cloudiness will increase this afternoon, with snow expected late tonight and rain likely Thursday.

A developing storm in the central Mississippi River Valley was moving northward this morning. It is expected to be in the Eastern Great Lakes by Thursday morning. A very large precipitation area is associated with this storm. Snow covers most of the Great Lakes region and extends as far west as Nebraska. An area of freezing rain and sleet separates the snow area from rain in the south.

Snow from this system will spread into Southern New England later tonight. Southerly winds will bring warmer air into the state and change the snow to rain by Thursday morning. During the changeover there will be a period of sleet and freezing rain before the precipitation becomes all rain. Driving conditions will become difficult during this period.

A secondary storm is expected to develop along the Atlantic seaboard Thursday morning with rain over Connecticut lasting most of Thursday.

Temperatures tonight will fall off into the upper 20s during the evening. But as southerly winds increase, temperatures will climb back into the 30s as the snow changes to rain.

Five Day Forecast
Temperatures in Connecticut Thursday through Monday are expected to average near normal with little day to day change.

The normal high and low temperatures for this time of year are: Hartford 35 and 18, Bridgeport 33 and 23, New Haven 35 and 22.

Precipitation may total more than 1/2 inch water equivalent with rain likely Thursday.
