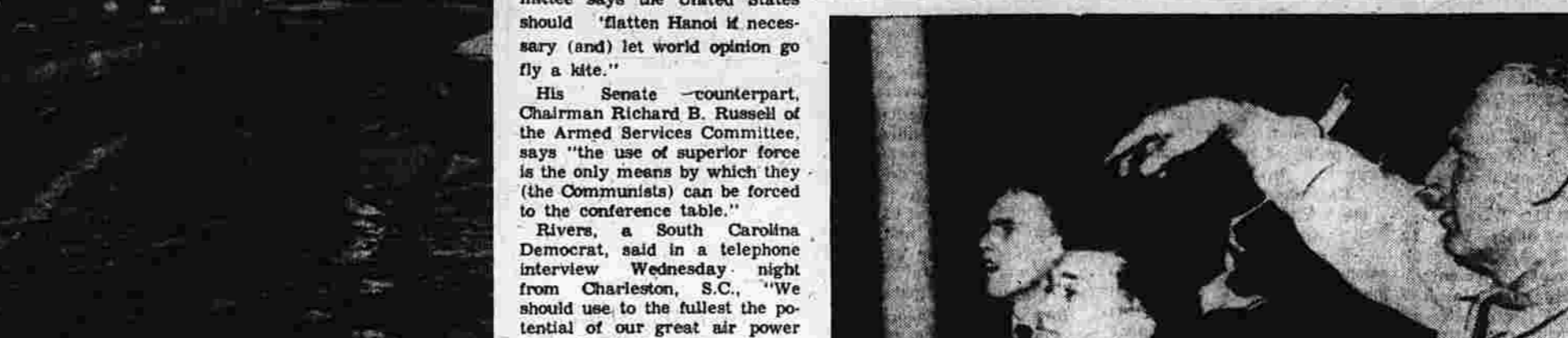

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With fine print ruled out as the hiding place for restrictions, reservations, and exclusions the seller doesn't want the buyer to know, where will the wary buyer look next?

Well, if we were to advise those writers of contracts who want to play their best chance of keeping their prospective customers loose and relaxed, we would suggest that their next resort be to the opposite end of the foot—to the really big type. There is always something infinitely reassuring, and yet confusing, about really big type, as in highway signs. Furthermore, all those who have trained themselves for generations to be suspicious of fine type have, by the same acclimation, killed themselves into a complete sense of security about anything which looks as if kindergarteners could read it.

If we may, since this is a rather relaxed discussion of matters close to shop anyway, divulge certain pertinent experience of our own, we would volunteer the information that those writers of Open Forum letters and pleadings of causes who have to be watched most closely for their trickiness of logic and their continual effort to catch both opponents and neutrals unaware are usually self-billed by their extravagant use of large type. When a letter comes in loaded with words and passages all written in CAPITAL LETTERS, like that, we know we are hearing from a real swinger, whose logic, even after it has been reduced to lower case, is likely to prove both slippery and smothering.

If, of course, anybody wants to avoid all effort or temptation to deceive, and merely wants to let sweet fair reason speak the way innocent and open-minded through an honorable presentation of unassailable truth, then one employs a modest, ordinary-sized type all the time, like a good, honest, reliable monotone. A sleepy reader, we have found, is a safe reader.

WASHINGTON—Serious Democratic politicians here, both inside and outside the Johnson camp, are deeply alarmed over the political impact of the Manchester book on the 1968 presidential election.

President Johnson himself has displayed no signs of distress in his intimates over the pre-publication of juicy bits and pieces alleged to be in the book. "The Death of a President" by William Manchester, and yet these disembodied excerpts put Mr. Johnson in a highly unfavorable light in the immediate aftermath of the tragedy at Dallas.

The biggest hunt for runaways went on in driving-rain over bleak Dartmouth. Four convicts who broke jail there three days ago were still on the run, and there was a report that they had grabbed several of the prison's master keys from a guard they slugged.

The hunters claimed that scores of sightseers and hikers were "mooching up the trails and confusing our dogs with too much human scent."

Escapes have increased since Earl Mountbatten's report just before Christmas of his investigation of prison security. He said Britain has no "really secure" prison, and several experts contended that amounted to an invitation to escape.

"Prisoners have realized they can get out if they want to," said Frederick Cameron, secretary of the Prison Officers' Association. This hadn't fully dawned on them before.

Alfred George Hinds, now illegally free but still regarded as the dean of British jailbreakers, commented: "The hardened convict could see that the Mountbatten report was the writing on the wall. They knew security would be tightened, so they got out while the going was good."

Study Recommends Closing Of Tolland, Windham Jails

A recommendation to abandon physical plants of Tolland and Windham State Jails was made by the Legislative Council in a report issued Tuesday. The council recommends that the jails be replaced by a single modern facility, conveniently located for the two counties. The Tolland jail has been in existence since 1857 and the Windham one since 1848.

Both jails have antiquated facilities, so do most of the other jails in the state. High Sheriff Paul B. Sweeney, who supervises operations at the Tolland jail, was commended recently by John W. Boyd, chairman of the Legislative Council committee for the study of state jails.

Boyd noted that the physical plant in Tolland, as in all other jails in Connecticut with the exception of New London County, is antiquated beyond the point of modernization at a reasonable cost.

Boyd said that as bad as the plant is, Sweeney has used thorough, ingenious and resourceful measures and provided a constructive program for rehabilitation which is one of the best in the state.

The Legislative Council originally was appointed to study the bill which provided a \$3 million bond issue for the erection of a new state jail in New Haven County. Later the city council of Hartford requested the Legislative Council to develop plans for removal of the State Jail.

Rather than making a study limited to the New Haven and Hartford jails, all were thoroughly inspected by the council. Eight of the jails range in age from 78 to 80 years. The only modern one is in New London, was constructed in 1958.

The council came to the conclusion that most of the state jails were hopelessly inadequate and that the physical plants of Tolland and Windham State Jails was made by the Legislative Council in a report issued Tuesday.

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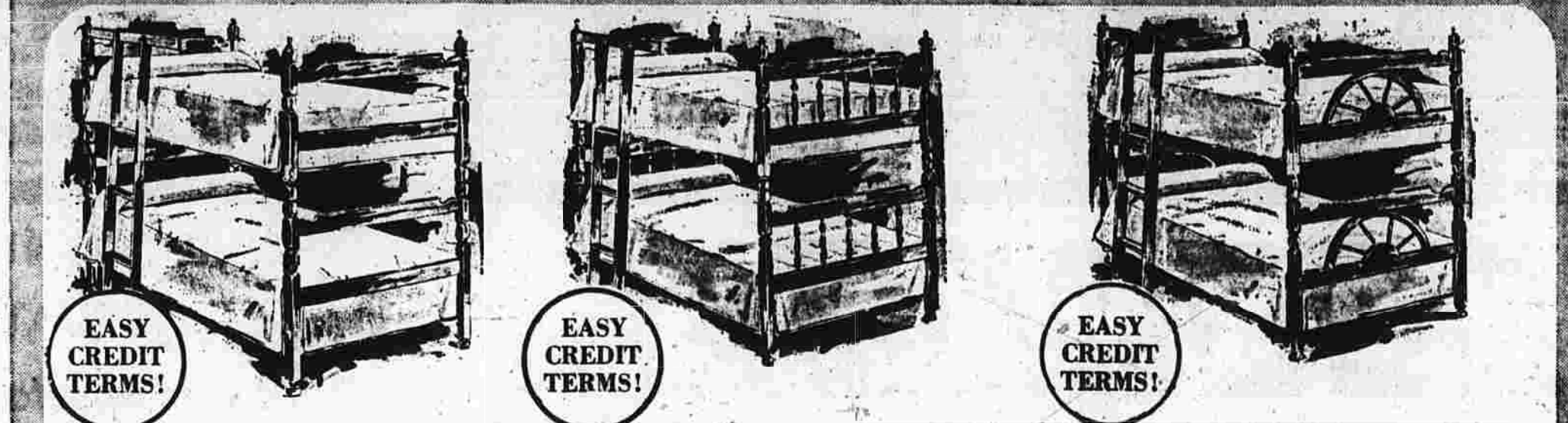
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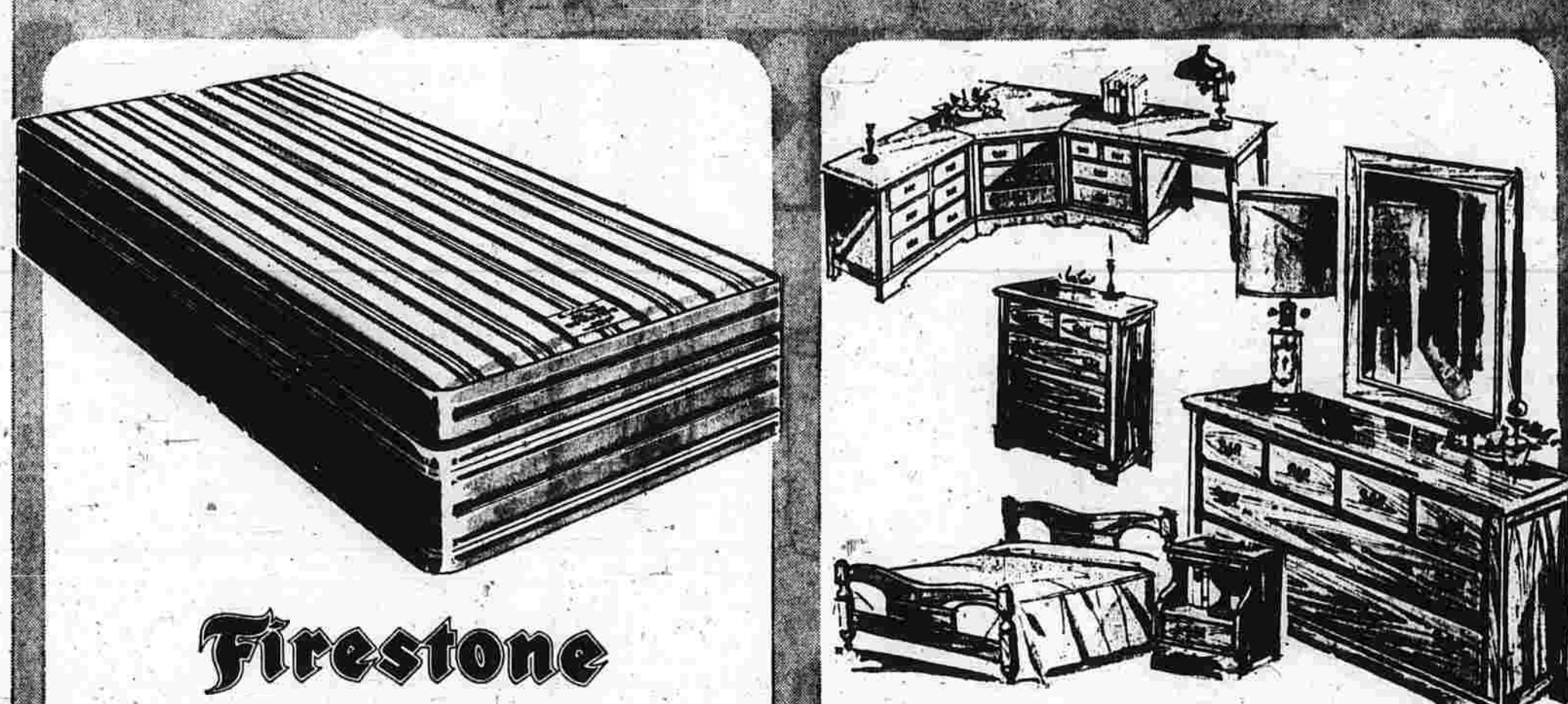

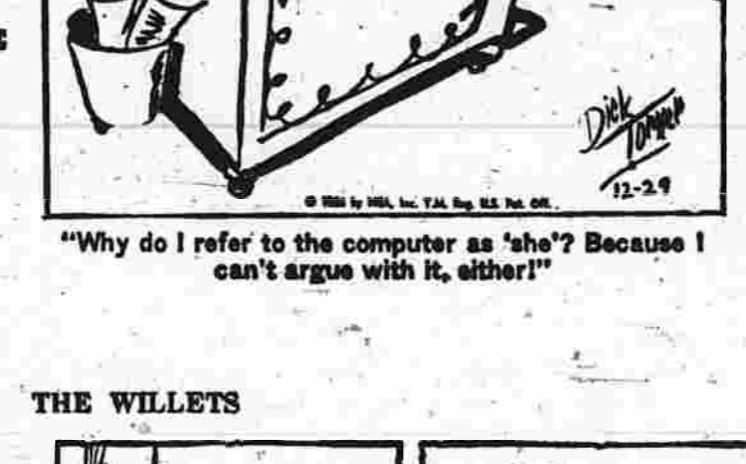

The government's figures cover only contracts involving 1,000 workers and smaller cases will bring the total number of workers involved considerably higher.

Information on contracts covering 44 additional 1.7 million workers isn't available for the labor department's report.

Of the 7 million workers listed, more than 3 million will be involved in new contracts. Hoffa, starting negotiations next month for some 400,000 Teamsters, says he expects a national trucking contract, opens the first of the major new contract negotiations.

Reportedly planning to demand a 7 percent hike in wages and fringe benefits, but possibly settling for 5 percent, Hoffa says. Teamsters will set the tone for the size of expected 1967 labor demands.

Although wage settlements averaged 3.7 percent in 1966, the pattern moved toward a 5 percent in the latter part of the year in major agreements covering airlines, trucking, and electrical industry workers.

The airlines suffered a six-week strike before settlement. Hoffa says he expects a national trucking contract, opens the first of the major new contract negotiations.

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2 Freighters En Route to 10 on Board
